#### "Miracles Everywhere" – Psalms 77:14

"You are the God who performs miracles; you display your powers among the peoples."

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Miracles are happening everywhere in and through GNJ. This past conference was the largest in GNJ history, where six different languages were spoken and sung and groundbreaking decisions were made for the transformation of our communities, region and the world. We celebrated the growth of worship attendance in 2017 and the rising number of people in small groups, hands-on mission, increased giving, the birth of more than 50 new faith communities and the rebuilding of 271 homes in response to Superstorm Sandy.

During what became a historic 2018 Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church of Greater New Jersey, we publicly engaged to end school segregation in New Jersey for more than 271,000 Black and Latino students. We entered into an extraordinary partnership with Puerto Rico and Tanzania. We were graced by the presence of Bishop Hector Ortiz of the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico and Bishop Muyombo of the North Katanga Episcopal Region of the Tanzania Annual Conference. We set out to equip and cultivate 100 clergy and 100 laity who will make disciples who make disciples and approved a budget that reduces shared ministry.

We committed to a new mission campaign – Miracles Everywhere, which will transform and deepen the lives and faith of the Next Generation in student, campus and camping ministry, partner with Puerto Rico in hurricane relief, launch Hope Centers across GNJ and partner with the Tanzania Annual Conference to train pastors, build new congregations and a Hope Center for mission engagement. Already \$2.9 million has been committed toward the \$5.2 million fund. And the campaign is just getting started. Now that is a miracle!

Together we celebrated the miracles in our midst and the continued leadership of laity and clergy that's developing transformational leaders and growing vital congregations to transform the world. Building on what's been accomplished, we took on a new strategic plan focusing on leadership and discussed the challenges United Methodists face regarding gender equality, immigration, intercultural competency, diversity and inclusion.

Miracles are happening through the love and service of our presence in our communities. The details in this journal showcase the miracles at work and how they are changing the world. You too, are called to be a part of those miracles and live into God's miraculous story for GNJ.

In the midst of denominational challenges and division, GNJ is mission-minded and united in loving alike. We're just warming up, and God is on the move making miracles in and through us.

This journal represents past, present and future miracles. In it you will find the names of conference leadership and members who are committed to leading GNJ and its congregations, new faith communities and Hope Centers. I am thankful for our ministry and progress together.

You're invited to step up and be a part of God's miracles. In any and all circumstances, we can rejoice and celebrate a God of miracles who draws us in and offers us the marvelous opportunity to take part. Miracles are happening everywhere. Do you see them? All you need to do is accept God's call and look in the mirror.

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Whereas, in 2013, United Methodists of Greater New Jersey (GNJ) embarked on a five-year journey to grow the percentage of vital congregations from 14% to 41%, an ambitious goal that focused on the five markers of vitality: worship, small groups, mission, stewardship and making new disciples; and since, we have increased the percentage of highly vital congregations to 32% and experienced a renewed effort to make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world; and we are making strong progress

- 52 new faith communities<sup>1</sup> have been started
- 67% of our worshipers are now in small groups
- 2,810 young adults are in small groups
- 50% of our worshipers are participating in hands on mission
- 22% of our worshipers are racial ethnic
- 150+ congregations are multicultural/ethnic
- 100 appointments are cross racial
- 17% of the average congregation's budget is spent on mission
- 10% shared ministry reduction that translates to an additional \$1 million dollars available for mission in the local church
- \$5.5 million was raised through our congregations for the Mission Fund Campaign
- \$17 million was raised for A Future With Hope for Sandy recovery
- 256 homes have been rebuilt since Sandy and 13,000 volunteers from across the country joined our efforts

Whereas, God wants to continue working through GNJ passionate disciples, vital congregations and transformational leaders so that miracles of healing and transformation continue to occur across GNJ and around the world; and

**Whereas**, the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference empowered the GNJ Connectional Table to lead GNJ in a planning process to develop a new strategic plan for 2019-23, that over the last year has engaged a conference-wide process that involved more than 850 people to develop a Strategic Plan, and

**Whereas**, the proposed 2019-23 Strategic Plan builds on the progress of the current plan and casts a bold vision and set strategic priorities with the conviction that, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, *miracles can happen everywhere*.

**Therefore, be it resolved** that the 2019-23 Strategic Plan be adopted and carried out as delineated in the Plan, and that each year of the Plan's implementation a report be presented to the Annual Conference session on the progress, challenges and necessary modifications.

#### 2019-2023 Strategic Plan

#### Why does GNJ exist?

**GNJ exists to recruit and develop transformational leaders** so that people and communities experience healing, renewal and wholeness from God. Transformational leaders grow vital congregations who shape passionate disciples of Jesus Christ and share faith, hope and justice in the community.

#### **GNJ Adaptive Challenge**

Increase the *motivation*, *urgency* and *ability* of disciples, leaders and congregations to *connect* and *engage* with a diverse group of people in the community so that the people in the pews look more like all the people in the community.

#### Holy and Audacious Goal - Leadership 100

Cultivate and equip 100 clergy and 100 laity leaders who make disciples who make disciples.

Leadership 100 will change GNJ into a disciple-making and disciple-engaging force to transform the world. Leadership 100 will;

develop more transformational and apostolic leaders for our congregations and the community, and

- grow a pool of talented leaders who can be deployed to increase disciple-making by:
  - o changing the culture to nurture leaders who multiply passionate disciples
  - o growing vibrant missional congregations and
  - o transforming lives and communities

## We will know we have achieved this God-sized goal when we have 100 congregations whose worship attendance has moved from one category to the next.

In GNJ we presently have four categories of average worship attendance:

- 299 congregations with average worship attendance of less than 50
- 149 congregations with average worship attendance of 50 99
- 28 congregations with average worship attendance of 100 124
  - 76 congregations with average worship attendance of 125 or more, with: 21 congregations with average worship attendance of 125-149 23 congregations with average worship attendance of 150-199 14 congregations with average worship attendance of 200-299 9 congregations with average worship attendance of 300-499 6 congregations with average worship attendance of 500-699 1 congregation with average worship attendance of 700-999 1 congregation with average worship attendance of 1,000-1,499 1 congregation with average worship attendance of 1,500-1,749 0 congregations with average worship attendance of 1,750+

#### **GNJ Cultural Shifts by 2023**

GNJ will shift;

- 1. FROM a church that mostly serves its members and clergy TO a mission that connects with the people in the community through relevant ministries
- 2. FROM congregations with a single cultural expression and privilege TO congregations with multicultural expression and intercultural competence
- 3. FROM concentrating ministry and thinking with current church members TO further extend ministry and thinking to make and engage younger and more diverse generations of disciples.
- 4. FROM sharing information through workshops to train leaders TO using workshops that interact with and experience the content to form leaders
- 5. FROM maintaining congregations and their buildings TO working with congregations to repurpose buildings for regenerative mission
- 6. FROM depending exclusively on Shared Ministries (apportionments) for mission and ministry TO cultivating new sources of income to grow mission and ministry

#### **GNJ Strategies for the Next Five Years**

- 1. New Faith Communities new expressions of congregations that gather diverse people in ways that are relevant to them.
- 2. Intercultural Competency Develop leadership capacity for intercultural competence in GNJ so we can love across boundaries and differences and work towards inclusion of all people.
- 3. NextGen Ministries Cultivate and mobilize new generations of enthusiastic disciples of Jesus Christ that connect, engage and lead in their congregations and communities to transform the world through:
  - a. IGNITE life-changing worship, relevant teachings and authentic community for 6<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade
  - b. Youth Groups local, community focused places for young people to be introduced to Christ and shaped as disciples generally for 3<sup>rd</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade
  - c. Camping outdoors experiences that connect with God, purpose and promote meaningful relationships for elementary through high school students.
  - d. Campus Ministries places for college students to be introduced to Christ, shaped as disciples and developed as transformational leaders
- 4. Community Development Leverage existing human, relational and capital resources to create opportunities for healing, renewal and transformation to communities and sustainable financial support streams for congregations

- a. Repurpose church property into vibrant worship and mission centers
- b. Repurpose church property into affordable housing, senior living, community space and mission centers
- c. Create cooperative ministries within the community
- 5. Hope Centers Develop church-based community ministry that meets the needs of the community and serves children and youth, families, seniors and vulnerable populations

We will develop and resource these strategies partnering with the GNJ family of vital mission partners – A Future With Hope, Next Generation Ministries, Centenary Fund and Preacher's Aid Society and the United Methodist Stewardship Foundation of Greater New Jersey.

#### **GNJ 2023 Objectives**

- 1. Develop resources to equip congregations to assess and improve their pathways for disciples to know, grow in, live and share the life of Jesus every day, *so that* we increase the number of new disciples and vital congregations.
- 2. Develop laity leadership resources to equip the local church with the knowledge and ability to effectively lead congregations and address challenges in their ministry, *so that* we grow more vital congregations.
- 3. Incorporate appropriate training, language and practices into resources, events, agency work, and conference life, *so that* we grow cultural competency within the life and ministry of GNJ.
- 4. Create methods to recruit, resource and support congregational youth leaders, so that they are equipped to lead and grow a youth program equal to 20% of their worshiping congregation and we grow youth engagement.
- 5. Clarify the process, resources and support for Hope Centers, *so that* we develop 30 Hope Centers focused on community mission with students, the poor and the elderly, and increase missional impact in the community

#### GNJ Core Resourcing to Carry Out Our Mission and Achieve Our Goal

GNJ will resource congregations and leaders that are ready and desire to become vital and more like Christ primarily through:

- Laity Leadership Academy coordinated teaching and skill development with application and funding opportunities for laity to grow vital ministries.
- Coaching a resource to help clergy achieve ministry goals and action plans.
- PaCE facilitated peer learning groups that help shape pastoral identity, imagination and excellence.
- *Mosaic Ministries* a new way of thinking about and doing local church ministry, mission and leadership with promising young clergy and seminarians discerning their vocational calling.
- *Clergy Leadership Development Initiative* tools and applications for clergy to lead congregations to sustainable fruitful ministry
- Team Vital congregational community and ministry assessment and strategic planning process for vital ministry.
- *Communities of Hope* –strategic planning and implementation for asset-based community development.
- Lay Servant Ministries Certified Lay Servants, Lay Speakers and Lay Ministers, expand the ministry of the laity for training for pulpit supply as well as caring, leading, and communicating across the connection for transformational growth.

#### What Will Be Different?

As GNJ shifts the culture, accomplishes its goals and objectives, implements its strategies and resources leaders and congregations, it will see more disciples and congregations with:

- Passionate Faith Mature and fearless disciples that others want to emulate
- Boundless Hope Positive vision of current and future ministry
- Courageous Spirit Risk-taking relevant mercy and justice ministries
- Transformational Leadership Difference-makers who transform people's lives, the congregation and the community
- Congregational Vitality Vibrant and life changing congregations
- Regenerative Resources Extravagant generosity that inspires new giving and resources

- Passionate Faith Shape mature and fearless disciples that others want to emulate

A GNJ leader reaches out beyond the walls of the church into the community to transform lives by spreading God's love, hope and justice and bearing witness to Jesus Christ. GNJ leaders are fruitful by growing new disciples, worship, small groups, mission engagement and giving. GNJ will work with and grow leaders to be:

- *Fruitful* –grow new passionate disciples, inspiring worship, active small groups, risk taking community mission, and generous giving to mission.
- *Transformational* –lead congregations through missional, cultural and identity change.
- Apostolic –are on a clear mission to create something more than what is. Paul was an apostolic leader who went to places with few or no believers and his leadership transformed the community by generating congregations of passionate disciples.

Because of GNJ leadership, disciples will be even more *passionate*, congregations will be even more *vibrant and fruitful* and people and communities will *experience healing*, *renewal and wholeness from God*.

#### How We Will Make Decisions?

We will invest our financial and human resources in decisions that:

- 1. Develop transformational leaders
- 2. Maximize new disciples, vital congregations and world transformation
- 3. Reflect our core values
- 4. Encourage innovative, risk-taking regenerative ministry that effectively connects with and engage people in the community

#### Theological Grounding for GNJ 2019-23 Strategic Plan – Miracles Everywhere

"You are the God who performs miracles; you display your powers among the peoples." Psalm 77:14

God is creating signs and wonders in GNJ and there is even more God wants to do. God wants to continue working through the United Methodists of Greater New Jersey so that miracles of healing and transformation occur across GNJ and around the world (Isaiah 43:19).

The Gospels tell of Jesus' miracle ministry using two Greek words *dunamis and simaios*. In the synoptic Gospels, Matthew, Mark and Luke, the Greek word *dunamis* is used which means power - God's power to transform life. The Gospel of John primarily uses the word *simaios*, which means sign – a miracle that points to God's activity in the world. Miracles evoke wonder by demonstrating God's power and pointing to God's work in the world. In every age, God has been at work in the world healing and transforming lives.

Miracles happen everywhere. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the congregation, the body of Christ, is the primary actor to release the power of God to transform lives and the community (1 Corinthians 12:27). The congregation is the mission outpost where passionate disciples are formed, shaped and sent to love God and neighbors completely (Mathew 28:16-20).

Transformational leadership within congregations is crucial to fulfilling this mission (Ephesians 4:11-12) to release the Holy Spirit for miracles everywhere. Leaders who move the mission and turnaround forward are grounded theologically and biblically, possess competence and emotional intelligence, engage missionally and passionately, and are led spiritually.

As the church navigates through liminal times (a transitional time on the edge of what God has next for the church), the Spirit is calling GNJ to address our adaptive challenge and engage in new possibilities with courage (II Timothy 1:7). We are called to continue to imagine and discern innovative ways to effectively be in ministry in and with the community (Romans 12:2) so that we cultivate transformational leaders who make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world.

God is already working wonders in GNJ and is ready to perform miracles everywhere through passionate disciples, vital congregations and transformational leaders!

# OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH OF GREATER NEW JERSEY May 20-22, 2018 Wildwood, NJ

### Sunday, May 20, 2018, 4:00 p.m.

### LAITY SESSION

Rosa Williams, Conference Lay Leader, called the Laity Session to order and opened with prayer. Ms. Williams introduced the members of the Lay Leadership Board. Their focus has been to strengthen the laity knowledge. The board is ensuring the voice of the laity is heard and that laity are involved and equipped in the Greater New Jersey Conference.

Ms. Williams reviewed her past eight years in her role in the conference. She focused on the 5-Year Plan, which is centered on the five markers of vitality, along with growing new disciples and developing lay leadership.

She reported that the Greater New Jersey Intercultural Task Force completed both individual and collective intercultural competency assessment profiles and created a team and interpersonal development plan. The outcome is to ensure that the task force is competent to perform this work.

Over the next several years, the task force is looking to educate others in the conference in conjunction with a "Train-the-Trainer" approach.

Ms. Williams outlined the Laity Development Initiative that was created to develop a lay education plan using a dynamic system of educational excellence to equip laity to be transformational leaders. This plan is scalable for all churches regardless of their size.

Ms. Williams thanked all who coordinate and the lay servant classes both on the district and regional level.

### Video

A video was shown entitled "A Homeless Man Walks into a Church: What He Did Next Shocked Everyone". It depicts the journey of a homeless man in a 10,000-member congregation church on the same day that Pastor Jeremiah Steepek is to be introduced to his church. In the video, Rev. Steepek challenged the people by stating, "The world has enough people but not enough disciples. When will you decide to be a disciple? Being a Christian is more than something you claim. It's something you live by and share with others."

### 2019-23 GNJ Strategic Plan Overview

Judy Colorado, Lay Leader from the Gateway North District, member of the Laity Leadership Board and Connectional Table, provided a snapshot of the Strategic Plan. Ms. Colorado opened with a thank you to the laity for their leadership and their many contributions in moving the conference forward.

Ms. Colorado laid out the timeline and activities used to help develop the Strategic Plan. This included many listening sessions and countless hours of research undertaken by the Connectional Table, with an outcome of 3-5 recommendations to the Strategic Plan. To date, more than 850 people have contributed to this process.

### Laity Development Plan

Mr. John Hartman shared the new Laity Development Plan. He reported that the role of the laity in the Greater New Jersey has expanded by becoming more recognized and appreciated. The goal of the Development Plan is to grow vital congregations by instructing laity through training and education, supplemented by additional resources and programs.

The substance of this plan is to allow laity to enroll in learning opportunities with a goal of receiving certification credits in lay ministries. This will also cultivate and equip congregations to 'Make Disciples who Make Disciples."

### Lay Servant Ministry and Lay Leadership Academy

Mr. George Lagos, the Director of the Lay Servant Ministry, provided an overview of the Lay Servant Ministry and the Lay Leadership Academy. He thanked the laity for all the work that they have done for both the local churches and the Greater New Jersey Conference. He reviewed the changes to the number of classes, along with the introduction of the Summer Classes in June in both the Skylands and Palisades districts.

Mr. Lagos announced that the graduation for Lay Servant Ministers will be on Saturday, June 2, 2019.

Mr. Lagos outlined the Lay Leadership Academy in how it is mirrored on the 5 markers of Vitality. The tracks are (1) A Closer Walk, (2) Building up the Beloved Community of God, (3) Vital Ministries for Older Adults, (4) Generosity verses Fund Raising, and (5) Digital Strategy for Salvation.

### Lay Ministry Recognition

Ms. Williams discussed the Lay Minister Recognition that was held in April of 2018. There were 24 ministries that were recognized. She also encouraged all in attendance to share their ministry that is being done to the glory of God. A short video clip was shown highlighting this year's event.

### **Conference Recognition**

Ms. Williams called Mr. Jay Brown to the podium to recognize him for his continued work for the past eight years in the Certified Lay Ministry (CLM) program with a plaque from the United Methodists of Greater New Jersey and Laity Board.

Mr. Brown graciously accepted the award and left those in attendance with these words: "It is not about the title of being a Certified Lay Minister, it is being a humble lay servant ... Go out there and just give them Jesus."

### **Rise Against Hunger**

Marilyn Kinelski, from the Northern Shore District, provided an overview of the impact made by Rise Against Hunger and its volunteers. The organization has donated 300,000,000 packages of food to over 70 countries. She stated that the impact of feeding children increases the number of children attending school, reduces illiteracy and hunger and changes the world.

### Video

A short video clip was shown highlighting Rise Against Hunger.

### **Closing Prayer and Blessing**

The session closed with a blessing for dinner.

# Sunday, May 20, 2018 – 4:00 p.m.

### **CLERGY SESSION**

Bishop John Schol began with words of welcome. Rev. Christina Zito opened the session with prayer. Bishop Schol introduced Bishop Mande Muyombo from the Congo Central Conference of Africa and Bishop Hector Ortiz from the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico. He then announced that it was Rev. Jessica Brendler Naulty's birthday and led the session in singing happy birthday.

### QUESTIONS

Rev. Tom Korkuch, chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, along with Rev. Naulty of the Board, presented the report of the Board Report (Parts II-V of the Disciplinary Questions -17 - 50a). As each question was presented, it was received and/or adopted, as action required. During this time, the Candidates for Commissioning were introduced, let out of the room, and Bishop Schol asked for a vote to approve the candidates. They were approved unanimously. Similarly, the Candidates for Ordination were introduced. Bishop Schol asked the historical questions, and the candidates were led out of the room. Bishop Schol asked for a vote to approve the candidates. They were approved unanimously.

### **QUESTION AND STATEMENT**

When question 29 was presented, a question was raised as to whether moving Rev. Charles Perez from a full-time appointment to a part time appointment was a voluntary move. Rev. Perez stated it was involuntary. Rev. Wen-Ling Lai stated that her move from a full-time appointment to a part time appointment was also involuntary.

### **RECOGNITION OF LEAVING**

Bishop Schol gave thanks to Rev. Frank Davis for his years of service to the GNJ as he steps down as a District Superintendent and he moves to serve as a pastor in another Annual Conference.

### RETIREES

Bishop Schol acknowledged all the retirees.

### PRESENTATION OF REPORT

The Clergy Report was presented for approval. The report was approved.

### **FINAL WORDS**

Bishop Schol offered words of encouragement in these challenging times by saying all clergy should keep at it. He wants clergy to let the Conference know when things are going well. He encouraged clergy to help each other by sharing and working together. Most of all, don't give up.

### BLESSING

Rev. Drew Dyson offered a blessing and the Clergy Session concluded.

### Ordination

### ORDINATION AND COMMISSIONING SERVICE

The Service for Ordination of Deacons and Elders and Commissioning began with the song "Pour Out Your Spirit". B.J. Green and Steven Conaway, from the Nantioke Lenni-Lenape tribe, greeted the congregation with a Native American greeting. The clergy processed in to "I Sing the Almighty Power of God".

Bishop John School greeted the congregation with the words; "May the Grace of Jesus Christ be with you." He then offered an opening prayer. Bishop Hector Ortiz from the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico called upon the gathering to reaffirm their faith as he led the Apostles Creed. He then called everyone to remember their baptisms and be grateful.

Ms. Rosa Williams and Rev. Tom Korkuch, on behalf of laity and the Board of Ordained Ministry, presented the candidates to be commissioned and ordained for the ministry of the church. Rev. Eunice Vega-Perez introduced those individuals that were to be commissioned. Rev. Michelle Ryoo introduced the person who would be recognized as an associate member, the person to be ordained as a deacon and those persons to be ordained elders.

Bishop Schol and retired Bishop Alfred Johnson led the candidates through the General Examination.

The scripture read by Ms. Gabrielle Martone, was Psalm 77:14 in English. Ms. Elizabeth Gonzales-Sardinas read John 2:1-6 in Spanish, and Mr. Yoseb Jeon read John 2:7-12 in Korean.

Bishop Schol began his message, titled "Miracles Everywhere," by asking everyone in the congregation to share with their neighbor what one miracle they would like to have happen tonight and then to pray for their neighbor's miracle. Bishop explained that the church needs a new perspective, a new way of looking at and believing in miracles. He prayed for the Holy Spirit to come among the gathering.

Bishop Schol asked who was there tonight expecting a miracle tonight and told the congregation that we need a new perspective. He went on to tell a story of a woman who had been blind in one eye. This woman was at an annual conference where Bishop had been presiding, and by the end of the service her sight had been restored: even her doctor called it a miracle. Bishop Schol admitted he had been skeptical about her healing but realized the need for a shift in perspective. He stated he would never think of an annual conference in the same way again. He affirmed that God can break in everywhere – even at an annual conference!

Bishop Schol reminded the congregation that in the gospel of John miracles are called 'signs,' meaning that God is doing something here. He explained that the Greek word, *dynamis*, is translated as 'miracle' literally means 'power'. He said there is another word, *terata*, used in scripture which means 'wonder'. All are signs and seals of God's mission activity in the world, filled with power and wonder.

Bishop Schol encouraged the congregation to begin shifting their perspective from the "ordinary" to the "ordinary and holy," from "ordinary" to "ordinary and extravagant." He stated that this will take a shift from using "or" to using "and." He also stated that our perspective is too often about what **we** want to happen, and is focused on the activity, rather than getting the activity focused on God. He encouraged our prayers be about giving people an encounter with God.

Bishop Schol used the image of Jesus turning water into wine to reflect the shift from the ordinary to the "extravagant grace of God," reminding us that Jesus himself is the extravagant grace of God. Bishop reminded the congregation that when we offer less than our best, when we try to cut corners, in our ministries, we are cheapening the grace of God. He encouraged the congregation to make the most of what they have to offer the extravagant grace of God so others can know God's grace.

The service then moved into the time of Commissioning. Family and friends were invited to stand where they were for silent prayer during the laying on of hands as each candidate was commissioned.

# Tuesday, May 22, 2018, 8:30 a.m.

### GATHERING

The conference band gathered the worshippers with music and songs.

### PRAYER

Bishop Schol invited Mr. Haines Hoag from Medford UMC to come forward and offer the opening prayer.

### VIDEO

A video was shown showcasing the Hope Centers around the conference.

### **GENERAL BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY**

Bishop Schol introduced Dr. Susan Henry Crowe from the General Board of Church and Society and invited her to speak to the congregation about poverty and how we continue to work to eliminate poverty.

Dr. Crowe thanked the congregation for passing the legislation to end segregation in New Jersey as well as joining in partnership with Puerto Rico and Tanzania. She also thanked Bishop Schol for requesting the 'Faith and Facts' booklet from GBCS.

Dr. Crowe explained the purpose of GBCS as "works of righteousness," working for personal, social and civic righteousness. She went on to speak to the challenges our country faces at this time. The first was the widening income disparity between the rich and the poor. She spoke about how there has been stagnation in wages over the past ten years, contributing to the increase in poverty.

To show how churches can help work to eliminate poverty, Dr. Crowe talked about how several churches in the Dallas area have started the 'Zip Code Project' where they would distribute backpacks filled with school supplies in their zip codes. In doing this, they realized that there were several underlying issues that needed to be addressed, and have now begun new ministries to address those issues. She also spoke about Broadway UMC in Indianapolis who applied for a grant to fight racism.

Dr. Crowe gave one reason as to why there is so much poverty by quoting John Wesley, "One reason why the rich in general have so little sympathy for the poor is because they so seldom visit them. Hence it is that...one part of the world does not know what the other suffers." She noted that this quote reminds us that we are often disconnected from one another in an otherwise highly connected world. She gave several examples of items we typically use that are made by people or children that we don't even realize. She asked the assembly, "When did we start valuing convenience over faithfulness?" She encouraged the conference to go to slaveryfootprint.org to see how many items we may own that have been made by someone in slavery.

Dr. Crowe then spoke to the role of the church and what can we do to "turn the world upside down." She challenged the church to make a shift from one of scarcity to abundance, then to stop seeing those in poverty as problems but to see them as Christ himself, calling us to respond in love. A third action we need to take, she said, is to imagine an economy that works and honors the dignity and work of all people. The fourth purpose of the role of the church, she stated, is to proclaim and affirm the sacred worth of all persons.

Dr. Crowe reminded the congregation of our social creed that speaks to working for people who labor and improving the conditions in which they work. She quoted Cornell West stating, "Justice is what love looks like in public". Concluding, she encouraged the conference to work with the immigrant, to be in ministry with those in poverty, with those who have been hurt by the church, to help repair the broken system, and work towards a living wage.

Bishop Schol thanked Dr. Crowe for all her hard work and gave her a gift.

### Video

Bishop Schol introduced a video highlighting Lambertville UMC and their soup kitchen as they work to reduce poverty in their community.

### **READING OF APPOINTMENTS**

Bishop Schol read the names of the new appointees to the cabinet and to general agencies.

Each district superintendent came forward and read the names of the new appointments within their districts.

### Video

Rev. Alfred Day ended the reading of appointments by celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the United Methodist Church, showing a video highlighting the progress and emphasis since. He then called all clergy to go to their appointed churches and be truly catholic, evangelical, transforming and creatively adaptive.

### Video

Bishop Schol introduced a video on New Faith Communities highlighting the new site of Hope UMC.

### **RECOGNITION OF CONFERENCE ORGANIZERS**

Bishop Schol thanked all the teams that help organize and run the conference. A video highlighting this year's annual conference session was shown.

### CENTERING

The Annual Conference choir offered the centering song, "All We Ask".

### SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE AND COMMUNION

The Service of Remembrance and Communion opened as Bishop Schol, the cabinet, and the members of the families of those who had died during the preceding year, processed in to "Maker, in Whom We Live". Ms. Shelley Smith offered the greeting and led the Call to Worship.

Terisita Matos-Post read the scripture Joshua 4:1-9 in Spanish, Jennifer Cho Read Joshua 4:19-24 in Korean, and Emad Gerges read 1 Peter 2:4-8 in Arabic.

Rev. Ron Watts offered a sermon for the service, opening with prayer and then sharing the purpose of a stone he had brought with him from his parent's home. He placed it on the floor and explained that it was a witness stone, representing for him, all that they meant to him to make him who he is. He also spoke about the Vietnam War Memorial, another witness stone, which cries out to all visitors to remember those who had given their lives. He spoke about the wailing wall in Jerusalem, how it is also a witness stone.

Rev. Watts shared several memories of his childhood. He noted that when he had revisited the town where he grew up, he discovered how it had changed. He had found an old piece of stone that brought back many memories. Rev. Watts then shared a story of he and his daughter picking up shells on a beach and how he learned from his young daughter that all shells are beautiful. He went on to say that Jesus looks at all of us in the same way. Rev. Watts concluded by reminding the congregation that we are all called to be witness stones and to remember we are called to be living stones for Jesus.

# Recommended Changes to Rule 19

Rev. Dan Gepford presented the Rules Committee recommendation to Amend Rule 19(b) as an alternative to one presented by Mr. Creed Pogue, to address Legislation Proposed to Annual Conference, and moved its approval. The motion passed.

Rev. Jeanette Block moved the following amendment to Rule 19, "to be placed after line 25 or line two on page 55": "No legislation shall be decided prior to the Annual Conference." There was a second. Bishop Schol responded saying that her proposed amendment is a referral to the Rules Committee and that the Rules Committee will need to look at that and bring it back to Conference next year.

### Amend Rules 64 and 65

Creed Pogue presented a resolution to Amend Rules 64 and 65. Rev. Dan Gepford then presented the Report From Rules of Order Committee, speaking against the Amend Rules 64 and 65 resolution. The Resolution as presented by Mr. Pogue was defeated.

### **Reports to Annual Conference**

Rev. David Wiley made a motion to receive the reports on pages 89-133 of the pre-conference Journal and to publish them in the Journal, along with some reports that were received after the deadline for the pre-conference Journal but before the Annual Conference Session, including reports from such organizations as Africa University and United Methodist Seminaries, among others. After this was seconded he pointed out that these are reports, not resolutions, and that the Conference was receiving these reports, not approving them as they report the actions of the various groups, not necessarily actions that are adopted or endorsed by our Conference. The motion passed.

### **Resolution to End Harm to Youth**

Sherri Shumate and her son, Joey, presented the Resolution to End Harm to Youth and made a motion for it's approval. The motion passed.

### To Facilitate "A Way Forward"

Susan Zahorbenski moved for the approval of the To Facilitate "A Way Forward" resolution.

#### Amendment

Luana Cook Scott made a motion to amend line 41 on page 66 and line three on page 67 to state "women and men of the GNJ". The motion passed.

The motion for the full legislation passed.

#### Stay United as One Denomination

No one appeared to present this motion so it was not acted upon.

#### **Resolution for a Gracious Accommodation**

Rev. David Wehrle made a motion to approve the Resolution for a Gracious Accommodation.

#### Motion

Rev. Chris Heckert made a motion to table the Resolution for Gracious Accommodation to honor the process of the Commission on a Way Forward. The motion passed and the resolution was tabled.

#### Announcements

Bishop Schol announced we packed 30,000 meals for Rise Against Hunger. The GNJ gift shop raised \$12,000 for the Miracle Everywhere Campaign and the through the offering yesterday \$31,632 was collected for the Miracle Everywhere Campaign.

### **Moments of Privilege**

Lynn Caterson, conference chancellor, asked for a moment of privilege to speak to the body regarding the Nehemiah properties because so many had approached her with questions. Bishop Schol granted the moment of privilege. Ms. Caterson explained that the agreement is just an agreement. It is not valid if one of the parties does not agree with all the terms of the agreement. Since amendments were made, we are not in an agreement right now since the Nehemiah Properties needs to approve the amendments.

Bishop Schol explained to the congregation how the UMC is structured, stating that we have three branches of government. Because of this, at times, we act more like a government than a church. He explained that the reason the GNJ was placed on a law suit before annual conference was because all twelve committees unanimously approved doing so. It was not an individual decision.

Bishop Schol suggested open conversation, stating that a number of issues could have been resolved without the need for a judicial ruling. He assured the congregation that having honest conversations would not affect any one's appointment. He also explained that several ordinands might not have been able to be appointed to churches in GNJ, if the rule we asked for from the Nehemiah properties Resolution was applied to all employment in the Annual Conference. The same applies for Conference Office staff, some who are related to conference members. The Bishop pleaded again for conversations so the rules we already have in place can be explained and utilized.

Bishop Schol admitted that the church can get messy and stated that he doesn't have all the answers to this. He went on to state that he and Beverly have always put the mission of the church before their marriage and do not want to be the issue.

Bishop Schol talked about what an amazing Conference this has been. He celebrated some of the resolutions passed, such as how GNJ's name is on a law suit to end segregation in our schools. We've put a plan in place to lower apportionments over the next few years. He praised the worship that has happened. He stated that there's no other place he and Beverly would rather be. Mrs. Schol joined her husband on podium and they thanked the congregation for all they do.

Bishop Schol concluded by encouraging the conference to go home and keep up the good work, go home and keep doing what God has planned for you, go home and share the same kind of love you experience here, go home and invite people to church, go home and show your pastor some appreciation, go home and show appreciation towards laity, go home and share the love of Christ.

Bishop Schol presented a gift to Rosa Williams, thanking her for her years of service.

The conference adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

# The United Methodist Church of Greater New Jersey

### **RULES OF ORDER<sup>i</sup>**

Paragraph (¶) references are to the **2012 Book of Discipline**, **as corrected by Errata notations issued by the General Conference** Portions in "quotations marks" are Disciplinary wording.

### GENERAL

These Rules (hereafter called the "Rules") shall be standing rules for the governance of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference. At all times, the Rules shall be subject to the provisions of the applicable provisions of the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church (hereafter called the "Discipline". Unless otherwise indicated, all paragraph references below shall refer to the paragraph numbers and letters indicating provisions of the Discipline). Except as they may be inconsistent with applicable provisions of the Discipline, the Rules shall remain applicable unless and until modified or suspended as set forth below.

### I. MEMBERSHIP

1) **Composition** – "The annual conference shall be composed of clergy and lay members. The clergy membership shall consist of deacons and elders in full connection, provisional members, associate members, and local pastors under appointment. The lay membership shall consist of professing lay members elected by each charge, the diaconal ministers, the active deaconesses, and home missioners under episcopal appointment within the bounds of the annual conference, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the conference director of Lay Speaking Ministries, conference secretary of Global Ministries (if lay), the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, the chair of the annual conference college student organization and one young person between the ages of twelve and seventeen and one young person between the ages of eighteen and thirty from each district. Each charge served by more than one clergy shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are clergy members." (¶ 32) Each church shall elect a lay member and an alternate lay member as outlined in Rule 3a. Additional lay members, as provided in Rule 6, shall be members under the lay equalization formula.

2) Clergy Membership – "The clergy membership of an annual conference (¶ 370) shall consist of deacons and elders in full connection (¶ 333), provisional members, associate members (¶ 327), affiliate members (¶¶ 344.4, 586.4), and local pastors under full-time and part-time appointment to a pastoral charge (¶ 317). (See also ¶ 32)." (¶ 602.1)

a. "Clergy members in full connection shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except in the election of lay delegates to the general and jurisdictional or central conferences, and shall have sole responsibility for all matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy." (¶ 602.1a)

b. "Provisional clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of clergy delegates to the General and jurisdictional or central conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (¶602.b) Provisional clergy members who have completed all of their educational requirements may vote to elect clergy delegates to General and jurisdictional or central conferences. (See Judicial Council Decision #1181 and ¶ 35, Article IV)."

c. Associate clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. When associate members are members of the conference Board of Ordained Ministry, they have the right to vote at clergy session on matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (¶ 602.c) Affiliate clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except the constitutional amendments, election of clergy delegates to the General, jurisdictional or central conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (See Judicial Council Decision #1181 and ¶ 35, Article IV).

d. Full-time and part-time local pastors under appointment to a pastoral charge shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments; election of delegates to the General and jurisdictional or central conferences and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. When local pastors are members of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, they have the right to vote at clergy session on matters of ordination, character, and conferences who have completed course of study or

an M.Div. degree and have served a minimum of two consecutive years under appointment before the election may vote to elect clergy delegates to General and jurisdictional or central conferences. (See Judicial Council Decision #1181 and ¶ 35, Article IV).

### 3) Election and Qualifications of Lay Members -

a. Lay members and one or more alternate lay members for each church shall be elected quadrennially at the regular meeting of the charge conference following the meeting of the general conference. "Both the lay members and the alternates shall have been professing members in good standing of The United Methodist Church for at least two years and shall have been active participants for at least four years next preceding their election (see ¶ 32), except in a newly organized church, which shall have the privilege of representation at the annual conference session." (¶ 251.2) There shall be no restriction as to the number of terms for which a qualified person may be elected a lay member or alternate lay member.

b. District youth and young adult representatives may be elected annually by the Ministries with Young People Team (or its successor, however named).

4) **Seating of Lay Members** – Lay members and alternate lay members shall take office as of January 1 following their election, and the term of office shall be for the ensuing quadrennium. If the regular meeting of a Charge Conference is delayed beyond the year of the meeting of the General Conference, the lay member and alternate lay members shall take office immediately upon election. If the office of lay member or alternate lay member of any church becomes vacant during the quadrennium, a replacement for the unexpired term shall be elected at the next regular meeting of the Charge Conference or at a special meeting thereof. Each District Superintendent shall provide the Conference Secretary with a correct list of lay members from charges within the district by January 15 prior to the first meeting of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. It shall be to the lay members so listed that credentials shall be issued for seating at sessions of the Annual Conference.

5) Lay Representation of a Local Church – If the church's lay representative to the Annual Conference "shall cease to be a member of the charge or shall for any reason fail to serve, an alternate lay member in the order of election shall serve in place." (¶ 251.2) If there is no alternate lay member who can attend, another lay member or alternate lay member may be elected by the Charge Conference.

a. The pastor may request the District Superintendent to authorize a special session of the Charge Conference for the purpose of electing a lay member or alternate lay member. A special session of the Charge Conference requires the written consent of the District Superintendent in his/her absence, and at least ten days advance notice to its members. (¶ 250)

b. The pastor shall report to the District Superintendent and the Conference Secretary, in writing, the name and address of the elected lay member or alternate lay member.

c. Under no circumstances shall a person who is not duly elected as stated above be seated at sessions of the Annual Conference.

6) **Equalization of Lay Members** – "If the lay membership should number less than the clergy members of the annual conference, the annual conference shall, by its own formula, provide for the election of additional lay members to equalize the number of lay and clergy membership of the Annual Conference." (¶ 32) Members will be added in the order nominated or recommended for selection until the required number of additional lay members is reached. All terms will be for the quadrennium with the exception of category "i" below which shall be annually.

a. The following persons shall be named as additional Lay Members to Annual Conference:

i. The Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, and Conference Statistician, when persons elected to these offices are lay persons who meet the disciplinary requirements for Conference membership and are not otherwise elected.

ii. Elected Lay Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

iii. Lay Chairpersons of the following agencies not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference: Council on Finance and Administration, Commission on Archives and History, Commission on Equitable Compensation, Committee on the Episcopacy, Board of Pensions, Board of Trustees, Board of Church and Society, Board of Discipleship, Board of Global Ministries, Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Commission on Camps and Conferences, Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Commission on Religion and Race, Commission on the Status and Role of Women, Commission on Communications, <u>and</u> Commission on the Ethnic Local Church.

iv. The past conference Lay Leaders not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference. This includes the former Northern New Jersey and Southern New Jersey Conferences as well as the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.

v. Laity members of the Council on Finance and Administration not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

vi. Laity members of the Sessions Committee not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

vii. The District Presidents of United Methodist Women and District Presidents of United Methodist Men not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

viii. Lay Missionaries not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

ix. The District Directors of Lay Speaking Ministries not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

x. The co-secretaries of the Ministries with Young People Team, the Youth Service Fund Chairperson and one additional Youth and Young Adult from each District not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

b. Nominations for additional Lay members from local churches: In the year preceding the beginning of the quadrennium, the Laity Council shall solicit nominations for additional Lay Members from local churches through Administrative Boards or Councils. The Laity Council will receive the nominations and elect those who will serve as additional Lay Members for the succeeding quadrennium. Vacancies that occur during the quadrennium shall be filled by the action of the Laity Council.

7) Lay Membership – "The lay members of the annual conference shall participate in all deliberations and vote upon all measures except on the granting or validation of license, ordination, reception into full conference membership, or any question concerning the character and official conduct of ordained ministers, except those who are lay members of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the committee on investigation." (¶ 602.6)

8) **Seated Without Vote** – The following shall be seated without vote in the Annual Conference and shall be given the privilege of the floor without vote: student local pastors, lay missionaries regularly appointed by the Board of Global Ministries in fields outside the United States, and the Conference Chancellor(s) "if not otherwise a voting member of the annual conference" (¶602.10) The following shall be invited to attend the Annual Conference, without voice or vote, on the same financial basis as members of the Annual Conference: spouses of deceased clergy members, persons not officially eligible for appointment who have been assigned by the District Superintendents between sessions of Annual Conference as pastors in charge with the intention of appointment or reassignment for the ensuing conference year, and persons to be presented for consecration as Diaconal Ministers or ordained as Deacons or Elders. Staff and clerical personnel necessary for the conducting of the Annual Conference Session shall attend at conference expense.

9) **Attendance of Members** – "It is the duty of every member and all provisional members and local pastors of the annual conference to attend its sessions and furnish such reports in such form as the *Discipline* may require. Any such person unable to attend shall report by letter to the conference secretary, setting forth the reason for the absence. Should any ordained minister in active service be absent from the session of the annual conference without a satisfactory reason for the absence, the matter shall be referred by the conference secretary to the Board of Ordained Ministry." (¶ 602.8)

# **II. ORGANIZATION**

10) **Presiding Officer** – The bishop assigned shall preside over the annual conference, or "in case of inability, shall arrange for another bishop to preside. In the absence of a bishop, the conference shall by ballot, without nomination or debate, elect a president *pro-tempore* from among the traveling elders. The president thus elected shall discharge all the duties of a bishop except ordination." (¶ 603.6)

a. The Presiding Officer shall see that all business pertaining to the Conference shall be brought forward and conducted in a proper manner, according to the provisions of the *Discipline* and Rules for the Conference.

b. The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to the right of appeal by any member of the Conference.

c. The Presiding Officer shall appoint all committees and officers not otherwise designated to the Nominating Committee, unless otherwise directed by the Conference.

d. The Presiding Officer shall appoint an elder to preside at the Conference during any temporary absence.

11) **Conference Secretary** – At the session following the General Conference, the Annual Conference shall elect a Secretary to serve for the succeeding quadrennium. The Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Bishop and Cabinet, shall present the nomination. Term of office shall not exceed two consecutive quadrennia. "In the case of a vacancy in the interim of the sessions, the bishop, after consultation with the district superintendents, shall appoint a person to act until the next session of the annual conference." (¶ 603.7) Term limits of Rule 58a. shall apply.

a. The Secretary shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Conference, authenticating by signature all acts of the Conference.

b. The Secretary shall handle all notification and communications directed by the Conference.

c. Unless otherwise directed, the Secretary shall handle all other matters that normally come under the Secretary's responsibility.

d. The Secretary shall have the responsibility for editing, publishing and distributing the Journal, Yearbook and Minutes of the Annual Conference.

e. The Secretary shall nominate any staff that require election by the Conference.

12) **Conference Statistician** – At the first session following the General Conference, the Annual Conference shall elect a Statistician to serve for the succeeding quadrennium. "In the case of a vacancy in the interim of the sessions, the bishop, after consultation with the district superintendents, shall appoint a person to act until the next session of the annual conference." (¶ 603.7)

13) **Conference Treasurer** – The "annual conference, on nomination of its council on finance and administration, shall at the first session of the conference after the quadrennial session of the general conference or jurisdictional conference, or at such other times as a vacancy exists, elect a conference treasurer/director of administrative services. If a vacancy shall occur during the quadrennium, the council shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the annual conference." (¶ 619)

14) **Conference Chancellors** – The Annual Conference may designate as Chancellor one or more laypersons, each of whom is a member in good standing of one of the local churches or a clergyperson who is a member of the Annual Conference in the Episcopal Area, and who is a member of the appropriate bar or bars in the Episcopal Area. Each chancellor, who shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference, shall serve as legal advisor to the Bishop and the Annual Conference. (¶ 603.8)

15) **Conference Parliamentarian** – There shall be a Parliamentarian at each Plenary Session of the Annual Conference. The Bishop shall select the Parliamentarian(s).

### 16) Rules of Order Committee -

a. There shall be a standing Rules of Order Committee of eight (8) members, four (4) clergy and four (4) lay, nominated by the Committee on Nominations. The Conference Parliamentarian, if not already a member, shall be an ex-officio member of this committee with vote.

b. Prior to the consideration of any other business of an Annual Conference Session, the Rules of Order Committee shall present, for informational purposes only, any changes to the Rules mandated by changes in the Discipline.

c. The Rules of Order Committee shall also present for adoption by the Conference any other changes to the Rules that the Committee recommends. If any member of the Annual Conference desires to propose any other change to the Rules, the member shall submit a resolution setting forth the proposed change in accordance with the deadline for submitting proposed legislation. See Rule 19b. Upon its submission, the proposed legislation shall be referred to the Rules Committee for its review and response, prior to any vote on the legislation by the Conference.

### III. BUSINESS PROCEDURES

17) **Roll Call** – The Conference Secretary shall take the roll of all members of this Annual Conference, both clergy and lay, by card registration while the Conference is in session, and the attendance shall be recorded in the Journal. Upon registration, members shall receive a name badge which shall state name, church or position, and which shall also indicate voting rights.

18) **The Bar of the Conference** – The bar of the Conference shall be fixed at the beginning of each Annual Conference on motion of the Secretary. All members of the Conference, lay and clergy, must be within the bar of the Conference to have the privilege of the floor and to vote. Other persons shall be seated outside the bar of the Conference as indicated by the ushers.

### 19) Pre-Conference Reports and Legislative Recommendations -

a. Reports –

i. There shall be a Pre-Conference Workbook which shall contain all reports of Conference, Jurisdictional and General agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils or teams received at the Conference offices by the first business day of March (or such other deadline as the Conference Secretary may establish). Such reports are to identify how the agency or other body has helped the Conference make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, how the agency has furthered the goals of the Conference, and the goals of the agency or other body for the coming year. Any such report may be included in the Journal of the Annual Conference, subject to editorial corrections, at the discretion of the Conference Secretary. Any recommendations from such an agency or other body must be submitted separately as legislation for consideration by the Annual Conference, in accordance with applicable procedures and deadlines for legislation.

ii. Except as provided in (b) below, no reports or recommendations of any Conference agency excepting the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Committee on Nominations, and then only with the consent of the Bishop, shall be acted upon unless (1) they shall have been correctly and timely submitted to be included in the Pre-Conference Workbook as reports or legislation (as indicated above).

b. Legislative Recommendations -

i. The Pre-Conference Workbook shall contain all proposed legislation and all reports of agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils or teams that have been received by the Annual Conference offices by the first business day in March (or such other deadline as the Conference Secretary may establish).

ii. All proposed legislation and reports received after March 1, (or such other deadline as the Conference Secretary may establish), shall be submitted to the agenda committee for review. Upon the agenda committee's recommendation and the bishop's consent, such items may be included in the agenda where urgent and appropriate.

iii. The agenda for the Annual Conference shall contain all proposed legislation and reports calling for Annual Conference action that have been timely received pursuant to paragraph 19bi above. The agenda shall also contain all items approved for inclusion in the agenda pursuant to paragraph 19bii above. The agenda shall be designed with best efforts to allocate sufficient consideration by the Conference of all properly proposed legislation received by the submission deadline or otherwise included in the agenda pursuant to Rule 19(b)i and ii. During the second day of that year's Annual Conference, the agenda committee shall review the progress of the Conference in addressing the matters before it in the agenda. When it appears necessary and appropriate to schedule additional time for the Conference to address all legislation before the Conference, the agenda committee shall propose to the Conference a motion to adjust, extend or add to the second day's sessions, to facilitate the Conference's consideration of such legislation. Such a motion shall require no second, and shall be privileged over all other pending motions.

20) **Program** – The program as contained in the Pre-Conference Workbook shall be the official program of the session of the Annual Conference, subject to necessary modifications by the Chairperson of the Session Agenda Subcommittee.

21) **Official Journal** – The Conference Journal, signed by the Presiding Officer and the Secretary, shall be the official Journal of the conference. Among other materials included by the Conference Secretary, the Conference Journal shall contain all legislation and recommendations agreed to by the Annual Conference.

22) **Copy for the Journal** – All materials for publication in the Conference Journal shall be in the hands of the Editor of the Journal (who shall be the Conference Secretary, or a person selected by the Conference Secretary) by the close of the Conference Session. Exceptions to this rule shall be at the discretion of the Editor.

a. All substantive actions of the Conference shall be indicated in the Conference Journal. The Editor of the Journal shall have authority to make all appropriate, non-substantive editorial and conforming changes and corrections. Where explicitly so authorized by the Conference, the Editor of the Journal and the author of the action shall also be empowered to edit the contents of a given action together, to reflect the intent of the Conference. Rationales, preambles or supporting statements shall not be printed except in the case of complimentary resolutions.

b. Memoirs shall be limited to five hundred (500) words.

c. Addresses delivered to the Conference Session shall not be included in the Conference Journal, except for those of the Bishop, the District Superintendents and Conference Lay Leader(s). A motion to so include shall be out of order unless prior permission to make the motion shall have been received in writing by a committee composed of the Secretary of the Conference, the Editor of the Journal, the Chair of the Council on Finance and Administration, the Chair of the Conference Sessions Committee and the Dean of the Conference Cabinet.

23) **Distribution** – The Journal shall be distributed according to the following formula:

a. One mailed paper copy for each surviving spouse of clergy or laity member in the year the Memorial is printed in the Journal at no cost.

b. One paper copy to each conference officers, agency chairpersons, and general and jurisdictional agencies as required by the *Discipline*.

c. One mailed paper copy upon request to retired clergy.

d. A hard copy printed journal will be produced and available to all members upon request. A minimum fee for production and mailing costs will be assessed to each hard copy journal request. The amount to be paid for the journal will be published in advance.

e. An online version of the journal will be available on www.gnjumc.org and available for download and review.

f. All Annual Conference reports will be made available on the conference website.

g. The Conference Journal will not be produced in CD format.

24) **Copyright** – In order to protect its directories and contents from unauthorized use, the Conference Secretary shall copyright the Journal on behalf of the Annual Conference.

25) **Mail Ballot** - In an emergency situation as declared by the Council on Finance and Administration, a mail ballot may be taken of the Annual Conference. All members of the Annual Conference immediately preceding the emergency will receive ballots. The vote will be confidential with the outside envelope requiring the signature of the member.

### **IV. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES**

### 26) Order of Precedence of Motions -

27) **Main Motion** – A main motion is a proposal that the Conference take certain action, or that it express itself as holding certain views. Any member may make a motion.

28) Motions Which Are Not Debatable – The following motions shall be acted upon without debate:

- a. To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn the conference.
- b. To suspend the rules. (2/3 vote)
- c. To take from the table.
- d. To call for the previous question. (2/3 vote)
- e. To reconsider a non-debatable motion.
- f. To limit or extend the limits of debate. (2/3 vote)
- g. To call for the order of the day.

29) **Precedence of Secondary Motions** – If any one or more of the following motions are pending, the order of precedence in relation to one another shall be the same as the order of their listing below:

a. To fix the time at which the Conference shall adjourn. (This motion is subject to amendment or it may be laid on the table.)

- b. To adjourn.
- c. To take a recess.
- d. To order the previous question.
- e. To lay on the table.
- f. To limit or extend the limits of debate.
- g. To postpone to a certain time.
- h. To commit or refer.
- i. To amend or substitute.
- j. To postpone indefinitely.

30) When a Second is not Required – The following do not require a second, pursuant to latest edition of *Roberts Rules of* Order.

- a. To raise a question of privilege.
- b. Question of order.
- c. Objection to the consideration of a question.
- d. Call for the order of the day.
- e. Call for the division of the question.
- f. Call for the division of the Conference (for voting).
- g. Call for the motion to reconsider.
- h. Filling blanks.
- i. Nominations.
- j. Leave to withdraw a motion.
- k. Inquiries of any kind.
- I. Presentation of a report or recommendation by a Conference agency.

31) **Division of Question** – Before a vote is taken, any member has the right to call for the division of the question as the member indicates, if it is subject to division. If no member objects, the division shall be made; but if there is objection, the Chair, not waiting for a second, shall put the division to a vote.

32) **Tabling Related Motions** – No motion that adheres to another motion or has another motion adhering to it can be laid on the table by itself. If they are laid on the table, such motions carry with them the motions to which they respectively adhere or which adhere to them.

### 33) Motions After Speaking on a Pending Question -

a. A member may make a motion after a speech, although strict parliamentary practice requires motion to be made and seconded before a speech is made so the Conference may determine if it wishes to hear the matter.

b. No member who has spoken on a pending question shall at the close of the speech have the right to call for the previous question, to move for indefinite postponement, or to lay the motion on the table.

34) **Previous Question** – To move the previous question is to move that the vote now be taken on the motion or motions pending.

a. When moving a previous question, a member shall indicate to what such action applies if any secondary motion or motions are pending. If the member does not so indicate, the chair may regard it as applying only to the immediate pending question. This vote shall be taken without debate and if, in the judgment of the chair, two thirds (2/3) of those present vote for its adoption, the vote shall be taken on the motion or motion to which it applies.

b. It shall not be in order to move the previous question in cases involving character or Conference relations, or where the Rules otherwise expressly limit when it is in order to move the previous question.

35) **Reconsideration of a Question** – A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order at any time during the prevailing session if offered by a member who voted with the majority. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is not debatable, the motion to reconsider may not be debated.

36) **Suspension of Rules** – The application of any of the provisions of these Rules of Order may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Conference.

### 37) Motions and Resolutions are to be Written –

a. All motions, resolutions and reports shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary, properly signed by the movers thereof.

b. Motions made on the floor shall be written on forms provided by the Secretary.

38) When a Motion is in Possession of the Conference – When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution introduced and seconded, or a report presented and/or read before the Conference, or stated by the Chair it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference. But any motion may be withdrawn or altered by the mover with the consent of the Conference at any time before voting has commenced.

#### 39) Amendments and Substitutions -

a. Only one amendment to an amendment shall be in order.

b. It is in order to move a substitute for the main motion. In such case, the Chair shall proceed to perfect the original motion. When the main motion has been perfected, the Chair shall state the question on the substitute. If the substitute is adopted, it shall replace the original main motion and become the main motion. The Chair will then state the question on the (new) main motion. The new main motion can be amended only by addition. If the substitute does not carry, the Chair shall state the question on the original main motion as it has been perfected.

40) **Order of Amendments** – When a main motion, report or resolution is under consideration, only one amendment and one amendment to that amendment are permissible. While there can be only one amendment of each degree pending at the same time, any number of amendments can be offered in succession. A substitute and one amendment to the substitute may be offered while amendments of the first and second degree are pending. The permissive order then is: 1) main motion, 2) amendment, 3) amendment to the amendment, 4) substitute, and 5) amendment to the substitute. The voting in this order is 3, 2, 5, 4, 1. If the substitute becomes the main motion, it shall be treated as such.

41) **Appeal** – An appeal from the decision of the Chair shall be taken without debate, provided that after the Chair shall have stated the reason for the decision, the appellant may give the grounds for the appeal. (¶ 51)

42) **The Question of Consideration** – The question of consideration may be raised by any member upon the presentation of any matter that shall be deemed irrelevant, unprofitable or contentious, and shall be decided without debate by majority vote. This applies only to the main motion.

43) **Method of Voting** – Voting shall be by voice vote and/or show of hands, or by standing count (provided that in such a count those who cannot stand may vote by raising hands), or by ballot, at the discretion of the Presiding Officer, unless

otherwise ordered by the Conference. It shall be in order for any member to call for a vote by count on any question before the Conference, and, if the call be sustained by one-third (1/3) of the members present and voting, a vote shall be taken as called for.

44) **Robert's Rules of Order, Supplemental Authority** – In any parliamentary situation not covered in these Rules of Order, the Conference shall be governed in its action by the appropriate provisions of the latest revision of *Robert's Rules of Order*.

#### V. SPEAKING ON THE FLOOR

45) Securing the Floor – Before speaking in debate or delivering any matter to the Conference, a member shall approach and wait at a microphone provided for addressing the Conference from the floor, or shall raise a card provided for the purpose of gaining recognition. When the member has been recognized by the Bishop, the member shall proceed to speak at a designated microphone. Before addressing the purpose of speaking, members shall state their names and local church or affiliation.

#### 46) Limitations on Debate -

a. The chairperson of the agency that originated the report or recommendation(s) shall present them as the main motion before the plenary session, and shall have five (5) minutes for comment, except as provided under h) below.

b. If there is a (are) minority report(s) or recommendation(s) from members of the agency, a representative shall be allowed five (5) minutes for a presentation.

c. All debate on the floor of the Conference shall follow the principle of alternate debate, that is, a speaker for, then a speaker against. When no speaker on the side opposed to the last speaker is ready, the President may recognize one who desires to speak on the same side as the prior speaker.

d. No person shall speak more than once on the same question without permission of the Conference, except as provided under g) below.

e. No person shall speak more than three (3) minutes at one time without permission of the Conference, except as provided under a) or h).

f. The initiator of the main motion shall in all cases be entitled to three (3) minutes to either

i. oppose the motion to lay the report or recommendation(s) on the table.

ii. close the debate before the report or recommendation is voted upon.

g. An agency presenting Special Reports at the direction of the Conference shall have sufficient time as determined by the Sessions Committee to present such reports and recommendations.

h. Except for non-debatable motions, no report or motion shall be put to the question without the opportunity having been given for at least two (2) speeches for and two (2) speeches against the pending question. After two (2) speeches pro and two (2) speeches con and provided no secondary (subsidiary, privileged--other than "previous question"-- or incidental) motions come to the floor and no other member seeks the floor to speak on the pending question, the question shall automatically be put to the question.

j. The motion for the previous question shall not be in order on the pending question until opportunity has been given for at least two (2) members to speak on each side of the pending question. If, after reasonable opportunity has been offered by the chair, no member has requested to speak against a resolution, motion or amendment, any member may move the previous question, to close debate. Likewise, if one member has spoken against a resolution, motion or amendment, but, after reasonable opportunity has been offered by the chair, no second member has requested to speak against the measure, any member may move the previous question, to close debate.

47) **Representation of Committees** – When the chairperson of a Conference agency is not in harmony with a report or recommendation adopted by the agency, it shall be the chairperson's duty to state the fact to the agency. The agency may then elect one of its members to represent it in the presentation of the report or recommendation in Conference. If the committee fails to elect such a representative, the chairperson may designate a member to represent the committee.

48) **To Limit or Extend Debate** – To move to limit or extend the limits of debate is in order at any time, except when a member has the floor, except as otherwise specifically provided elsewhere in the Rules.

49) **Interrupting the Speaker** – No one shall interrupt a member who has the floor except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, a departure from the question, to direct the attention of the Conference that the time has arrived for a special order of the day, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.

50) **Questions of Privilege** – All requests from the floor to be recognized for matters of privilege must be made in writing to the Conference Secretary. They shall state the reason for the request to address the conference and the purpose of the request. The requests will be reviewed by a committee composed of the Conference Lay Leader, Conference Secretary, and the Chair of Conference Sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Presiding Bishop whether or not to recognize the requestor for the purpose of presenting the matter of privilege. The Presiding Bishop shall have sole authority in receiving and acting upon the recommendation of the committee.

### 51) Announcements, Courtesy Presentations and Distribution of papers -

a. Announcements of matters of information to the Conference shall be submitted on the Announcement Authorization Form to the Conference Secretary before the conclusion of the plenary session prior to the plenary session when the announcement will be made unless it is an emergency matter which may be submitted as soon as possible after the matter is known.

b. Requests to make Courtesy Presentation speeches during a plenary session by a person not a member of Annual Conference or by a member are subject to the discretion of the bishop. As a general rule, no presentations or speeches will be made to the Conference outside the agenda.

c. Papers or other materials may not be distributed to the members during the Conference sessions, except with express prior permission by the bishop.

52) **Privilege of the Floor for Lay Members of Conference Agencies** – Laypersons not members of the Conference but currently serving on Conference agencies shall have the privilege of the floor without vote.

53) Lay Officers of a Conference Agency – Any Lay Officer of any Conference agency, who is not a lay member of the Conference, shall have the privilege to move and defend the report of the group such Lay Officer represents, without vote.

### **VI. NOMINATIONS**

54) **The Committee on Nominations and its Ministry** – The Committee on Nominations will consist of the District Lay Leaders, the Conference Lay Leader, the Director of Connectional Ministries and the District Superintendents. The Committee shall nominate the appropriate number of people each year to the Annual Conference Session for election.

a. The Committee on Nominations will develop and use a system to identify nominees based on their gifts, experience, and skills that will help the Conference achieve its vision, mission and goals as adopted by the Annual Conference, particularly leadership evidenced in making and maturing disciples, growing vital congregations and transforming lives and communities. Additionally, the Committee shall ensure the nominations reflect the diversity of the Conference.

b. Agency members shall be elected and placed into four staggered classes and each class will serve for a term of two years. An agency member may serve for four terms for a maximum of eight years. Nominations and elections will follow the rotation schedule unless otherwise mandated by the Book of Discipline.

c. In order to aid the Committee on Nominations in its work, it is requested that any member of the Conference who has a personal preference to serve on any particular agency communicate such personal preference to the chairperson of the Committee on Nominations on the appropriate form prior to January 1.

d. Nothing herein shall exclude additional nominations from the floor of the Conference. All nominations from the floor must be submitted on forms supplied in the pre-conference mailing or secured from the Chairperson of Nominations prior to placing the name in nomination. The signatures of the nominator and nominee must be on the form or it will be declared invalid.

### 55) Chairpersons and Officers -

a. For the sake of empowering diverse leadership, the Committee on Nominations shall nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, all chairpersons and officers for agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils and teams except where the Book of Discipline instructs differently. All terms shall be for the quadrennial, or such other period as specified by the action of the Conference.

b. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate all chairpersons and officers for agencies, boards, commissions, committees, council and teams [hereinafter Agency/Agencies] that the Book of Discipline requires to select its own chair and officers. These nominations shall not come before Annual Conference, but shall be presented directly to the respective Agencies for vote at their first meeting after Annual Conference. In the absence of a duly elected Chair, whose term has not

yet expired, the District Superintendent assigned to the agency either permanently, or for the election process, shall chair the meeting until the new chair is elected.<sup>1</sup>

c. In all nominations, special attention shall be given to seeking diversity of inclusion by gender, age, racial and ethnic background, and to inclusion of people with disabilities and from all size churches. (See Discipline paragraph 610.5)

#### 56) To Fill Vacancies -

a. The Committee on Nominations is to recommend to the Connectional Table Executive Committee any persons to fulfill an unexpired term of any agency vacancy between Annual Conference Sessions except where the *Discipline* instructs differently.

b. Preference will be given to members of the Annual Conference to serve on conference agencies when they have the skills, experience and qualities being sought for an agency.

c. The Connectional Table Executive Committee shall approve the appointments or request additional nominations, in which case the Committee on Nominations is to submit new nominations. These individuals serve until they or someone else is elected at the next Annual Conference Session.

d. When a person duly nominated and elected to any Conference agency does not attend three (3) consecutive meetings of the agency, it shall be the responsibility of the chairperson to attempt to contact that person by mail or telephone with a view to activation or resignation. The chairpersons shall report in writing annually to the Chairperson of the Committee on Nominations regarding contact with all non-participants and the results of such contacts. This information shall be provided by January 31 of each year.

### 57) Elections -

a. The report of the Committee on Nominations shall be distributed in the Pre-Conference mailing and/or the packet received at the seat of the Annual Conference. The report shall be presented without reading. Upon adoption of a motion to close nominations, the Chairperson of the Committee on Nominations shall move the election of all nominees whose elections are uncontested.

b. When the number of persons nominated exceeds the vacancies on an agency or when more than one person is nominated for a specific office, there shall be a secret ballot listing only those persons where a contest exists. The ballot will be taken at a time subsequent to the election in a) above. The ballot shall be distributed, collected and tallied by tellers selected by the Conference Secretary, who shall report the results listing only those elected. Election shall be by a majority of those voting. Lacking a majority, there shall be another ballot listing only those receiving 25% or more of the votes.

### 58) Quadrennial Agencies -

a. An elected member of a conference or district committee, board or agency shall be eligible for not more than two consecutive four year terms unless specified otherwise in the Book of Discipline. Service of two years or more in filling an unexpired or vacated position shall be counted as a full four-year term. For this purpose, annual conference to annual conference shall be considered one year, regardless of the actual dates of the conferences.

b. Persons elected by the Annual Conference to serve in an affiliated organization\* may serve in accord with the bylaws of the organization in which they are elected to serve, except that no term of office may exceed five years. All persons elected or reelected to serve in an affiliated organization shall be elected in accord with the Annual Conference rules on nomination and election.

\*An affiliated organization is one that wishes to maintain a connectional relationship with the United Methodist Church through the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.

c. Members of the Annual Conference who are voting members of a general agency shall serve as ex-officio (with vote) members of the corresponding annual conference agency or its equivalent structure (¶¶610.6, 710.4 and 710.6).

59) **Quorum** – The members present and voting at any duly announced meeting of a Conference agency, board, commission, committee, council or team shall constitute a quorum.

60) Limitations of Service – No person shall be elected to more than two conference agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils or teams, except for persons who are ex-officio members by virtue of an office or as a member of a general agency.

61) **District Superintendent Voting** – A District Superintendent regularly assigned to any Conference agency by the Cabinet shall have a vote in that agency, and shall be the only District Superintendent who shall have the right to vote in such agency, except where the *Discipline* provides otherwise.

### VII. PETITIONS AND ELECTIONS TO GENERAL AND JURISDICTIONAL CONFERENCE

62) **Petitions to General Conference** – All petitions to General Conference shall be presented as prescribed in  $\P$  507 of the *Discipline*. Petitions for endorsement by the Annual Conference to General Conference will only be considered in the year in which General Conference delegates will be elected.

63) **Nominations** – In a year in which elections to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences are to be held, the Conference Secretary shall open nominations for lay and clergy delegates on December 15 and nominations will be closed on February 15. An individual who desires to be a delegate shall download and complete a candidacy nominations form from the web page. On the bottom of nominations for Lay Delegates shall be the names of two Lay Members of the Annual Conference who endorse the nomination of the candidate. On the bottom of nominations for Clergy Delegates shall be the names of two Clergy Members who are eligible to vote for such delegates, and who endorse the nomination of the candidate.

a. Nominees may address their respective sessions for no more than one minute each, provided that no more than forty five minutes shall be allotted for speeches. If more than 45 lay persons or clergy persons are nominated, the allowed times for individual speeches will be adjusted accordingly. No speeches regarding nominees will be in order after the original time allotted for such speeches.

64) **Balloting** – The Conference Secretary shall announce the number of clergy delegates to be elected. A like number of lay delegates will be elected.

- a. The time of initial balloting shall be set by the agenda committee.
- b. Balloting shall be by electronic or mechanical means.
- c. The Secretary shall announce a Chief Clergy Teller and a Chief Lay Teller, and two lists each of clergy and lay assistants.
- 65) **Voting** All members, lay and clergy, must be within the bar of the Conference to be eligible to vote.

a. Before each ballot, the President shall announce the number of delegates each ballot shall elect. To be effective, a ballot must list the exact number of names of lay or clergy delegates to be elected.

b. The intent of the voter shall be allowed regardless of mistakes in spelling.

c. Where there is more than one member with the same family name, the Christian name or identifying initials shall precede the family name.

d. A majority of valid votes cast shall be necessary for election, except on the ballot to elect reserve delegates pursuant to Rule 68.

e. Only those nominated are eligible for election. If a ballot lists someone who has not been nominated, the ballot will be disqualified.

### 66) Counting and Reporting -

a. After a ballot has been counted, the chief teller, either clergy or lay, shall furnish a written report to the bishop, which shall contain (a) the number of ballots cast; (b) the number of ballots not valid; (c) the number of valid ballots counted; (d) the number of ballots necessary to elect; and (e) the list of names of persons voted for, including the number of votes received by each. The results will be disclosed or displayed before the next ballot is taken.

b. Minimum Votes. On the first ballot for both General Conference and the jurisdictional conference, the presiding officer shall read or distribute all names receiving 5 or more votes, together with the number of votes cast for each. Thereafter, the minimum number of votes received to be included in the next ballot shall be increased by five for each delegate elected (that is, on the first ballot a minimum of 5 votes to be included in the next ballot; after the election of the first delegate, a minimum of 10 votes to be included in the next ballot; after the election of the second delegate, a minimum of 15 votes, etc.). After the ballot in which the last delegate is elected to the General Conference, all the names that were originally nominated are available for election to Jurisdictional conference. Those elected to General Conference will not be listed.

c. If necessary, another ballot shall be taken in like manner, and so on, until the proper number of delegates has been chosen.

### 67) Qualifications -

a. Clergy Delegates – The *Discipline*, ¶ 35 (Article IV), permits any active or retired member of the Annual Conference in full connection to be eligible for election to the General or Jurisdictional Conferences.

b. Lay Delegates - The *Discipline*, ¶ 36 (Article V), asserts that lay delegates shall be elected "without regard to age, provided that such delegates shall have been professing members of the United Methodist Church for at least two years next preceding their election, and shall have been active participants in the United Methodist church for at least four years next preceding their election, and are members thereof within the Annual Conference electing them at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional Conferences."

68) **Reserve Delegates** – After the authorized numbers of delegates have been elected, 3 clergy and 3 lay reserve delegates shall be elected on a single ballot, with the 3 persons receiving the greatest number of votes in each category being elected in the order of the number of votes received.

### VIII. CONCERNING FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

69) **Budget** – The Annual Conference shall adopt at each Annual Session a budget for each of the following: Clergy Support, Administrative Costs of the Annual Conference, World Service, Conference Benevolences, and other Apportioned Funds. These budgets become effective for the fiscal year beginning on January 1<sup>st</sup> following the session. Apportionments of these budgets shall be sent to the several churches as soon after the session as is feasible.

70) **Apportionments** – The Conference Shared Ministry Budget shall be apportioned annually among the churches of the Conference according to a formula recommended by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and adopted by the Annual Conference. Following adoption, the formula will remain in effect until such time as changes are recommended by the CF&A and adopted by the Annual Conference. The formula shall be outlined on a Shared Ministry data sheet, which shall be distributed to the churches as soon as practical after the end of each year's annual conference, but in no event later than the end of the fiscal year.

71) **Prior Action by Council on Finance and Administration** – Every motion, recommendation, resolution or other legislative act having to do with budgeting, apportionments, allotments or expenditure of funds shall first be submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration. After adequate time is allowed for investigation and study, the council shall report its recommendation to the Conference. This report shall be received before such legislation may be acted upon by the Annual Conference.

a. No agency or member of the Conference shall commit the Conference financially for the support of programs within or beyond the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference without first obtaining the approval of the Annual Conference after study and recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration, and not until funds are available or have been allocated to meet such commitments.

b. Any person or agency requesting an emergency offering should contact one of the Team Coordinators, who will present the matter to the Cabinet and the Council on Finance and Administration. Any funds received as a result of such an offering will be held by the treasurer and administered by a task force established by the Cabinet for that particular appeal.

### 72) Time Limit on Submitting Budget Requests -

a. Requests for inclusion of an item in the Clergy Support Budget and/or the Administrative Costs of the Annual Conference Budget to be acted on by an Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Treasurer's office by the third Monday of January preceding the date of the Annual Conference, except in cases of unavoidable emergency.

b. Requests for inclusion of an item in the World Service Budget and/or the Conference Benevolences Budget to be acted on by an Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Connectional Table by January 15 preceding the date of the Annual Conference, except in cases of unavoidable emergency.

73) **Amending Allotments** – An agency shall not attempt to amend its allotment in a proposed budget submitted to an Annual Conference unless it has previously presented an appeal to the Council on Finance and Administration at a meeting held preceding the date of the Conference.

74) **Increased Asking by Amendment** – In amending a proposed budget on the floor of the Annual Conference, no item shall be increased above the amount originally requested by the responsible agency in its asking to the Council on Finance and Administration, except when the consent of both the agency and the Council on Finance and Administration has been obtained.

75) **Proper Use of Budgeted Funds** – No agency of the Conference shall spend budgeted funds for any purpose other than the general purpose for which the funds were originally requested, unless the consent of the Council on Finance and

Administration and the Ministries Team has been obtained for such a reallocation. An expenditure item shall be budgeted for the year when it is expected to be spent, and it shall be spent only in the year for which it is budgeted. When uncontrollable circumstances warrant, an emergency request may be directed through the Ministries Team to the Council on Finance and Administration for a budget adjustment.

76) **Financial Appeals to the Churches** – Any agency planning to send a communication or appeal to the churches requesting contributions to any agency or fund shall first submit its proposed communication or appeal to the Council on Finance and Administration. The Council shall ascertain if the procedure is in accord with existing legislation, and shall make certain that remitting instructions are correct. Any contribution received by the Conference Treasurer in response to a communication which has not been cleared as herein provided shall be credited automatically to World Service and Conference Benevolences through the remitting church.

77) **Customary Draft** – When presented and endorsed, the customary draft from the United Methodist Publishing House shall be turned over to the Conference Treasurer for pensions for clergy of the central conferences.

78) **Bonding** – All persons who hold or disburse conference funds shall be bonded in such amounts as may be deemed wise by the Council on Finance and Administration.

79) **Fiscal Year** – The fiscal year shall coincide with the calendar year, unless another fiscal year is designated by the Conference Treasurer after approval by the Conference. All payments to be credited to a given fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer not later than the following January  $\frac{10^{th}}{20^{th}}$ . All local church financial reports shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer by a deadline to be announced annually.

80) Audit – The Council on Finance and Administration shall be responsible for arranging that a Certified Public Accountant shall audit the accounts of the Annual Conference. The Council on Finance and Administration shall publish a statement of Certification of each audit in the Journal.

### **IX. CONSENT CALENDAR**

### 81) Consent Calendar -

a. The Conference Agenda Committee may present to the Annual Conference a proposed consent calendar, including those items which the Annual Conference may approve with one vote of approval by the Conference membership.

b. A written list of items on the consent calendar, including the name of the motion, name of the author, and page number in the Pre-Conference Workbook will be presented to all members of the Conference upon check-in at the Conference session.

c. The consent calendar list will include a space where Conference members may check any item(s) which they would like to see removed from the consent calendar.

d. To vote to remove an item from the consent calendar, Conference members must:

- i. Check the item(s) they wish to see removed from the list, or
- ii. Write in an item which has been added subsequently by Conference action.
- iii. Print his or her name and church on the list, and sign the list.

iv. Bring the list to the Conference Secretary's table and give the list to the Conference Secretary or one of the Assistant Secretaries.

e. If any item on the consent calendar receives ten (10) or more such votes in favor of removing it from the consent calendar, that item will be removed and placed on the Conference agenda by the Agenda Committee.

f. All requests for items to be removed from the consent calendar shall be delivered to the Conference Secretary as early as possible, but no requests will be received within the last twenty-four (24) hours before the stated time of adjournment of the Conference session. During this last twenty-four (24) hour period, items may only be removed from the consent calendar by a  $\frac{3}{2}$  vote of the Conference.

#### X. NOMINATION OF EPISCOPAL CANDIDATES

82) **Nomination of Episcopal Candidates** - The procedure for nomination of Episcopal Candidates to the Jurisdictional Conference as permitted by ¶405 of the *Book of Discipline* shall be as follows:

a. In a year in which one or more Episcopal Candidates are to be nominated by the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall provide for the receiving of nominations until the deadline for submission of proposed legislation for that

year's annual conference. Each proposed nomination shall be submitted on one side of an 81/2 by 11 inch sheet of paper or by electronic means designated by the Conference Secretary. Only eligible persons may be nominated. The Bishop shall, before the ballot is taken, remind the Annual Conference of the eligibility requirements for election to the office of the episcopacy.

b. The Jurisdictional Conference delegates (acting as a group) shall have the privilege to speak to the Annual Conference on behalf of the person(s) they have endorsed for nomination to the episcopacy (provided they have submitted such nomination in the manner described in Rule 82(a) above). If no other nominations have been submitted as indicated in Rule 82(a) above, the Bishop shall call for a vote of the body. A majority vote will be sufficient for this person (these persons) to be recognized as the episcopal nominee(s) of the Annual Conference.

c. If there are additional nominations submitted in accordance with Rule 82(a) above, the Bishop shall call for a written or electronic ballot following this procedure:

i. Nominees may each give a three minute speech. There shall be no seconding speeches.

ii. If any ballot contains the name of an ineligible person, that name shall not be tallied, but other names on the ballot shall be tallied.

iii. Conference members may vote for one such nominated individual. An individual must receive 60% of those voting to be nominated by the Annual Conference. If an individual does not receive 60% of the vote by the fifth ballot there will be no nominee. If someone is nominated, the conference will take up to three ballots to see if a second person is nominated. If no one receives 60% of the vote by the third ballot there will not be a second nominee. Those who do not wish to see anyone nominated may so indicate that desire on their ballots (in the manner prescribed by the Conference Secretary) and the ballot shall be counted as cast.

d. Only the persons selected in the foregoing manner shall be deemed Nominees of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.

e. This procedure shall not foreclose efforts by individuals or groups in the Annual Conference to promote the candidacy for the episcopacy of other persons.

### **XI. RULES OF ORDER RESOLUTIONS**

#### 83) Resolutions to change the Rules of Order -

a. Any resolution or proposed change, by addition or deletion to the Rules of Order, with the exception of **VIII. Concerning Financial Operations**, shall first be referred to the Committee on Rules of Order for its recommendation. The Committee shall submit its recommendation to the body prior to any action by the body. The initiator of any proposed change to be included in the Pre-conference mailing shall at the same time submit a copy of said proposed change to the chairperson of the Committee on Rules of Order. The Rules Committee may request a meeting with the initiator prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.

b. If the change is proposed at the site of the Annual Conference, it shall be referred to the Committee on Rules of Order and a report to the body will be made no later than the next plenary session.

### XII. HOLY CONFERENCING PROCEDURE FOR CERTAIN GENERAL CONFERENCE PETITIONS

84) A procedure to facilitate holy conferencing shall be used, at the Bishop's discretion, to discuss petitions to General Conference regarding issues related to human sexuality or such other issues that would benefit from the same procedure.

A special order of the day will be established to provide for holy conferencing. The special order of the day shall proceed as follows:

1) Representatives of the two primary positions selected by the Bishop will each make a twenty-minute presentation.

2) Upon conclusion of the opening presentations, the Bishop shall bring the Conference into silent prayer for two minutes.

3) Then ten minutes will be provided for delegates to share what they heard with their fellow Christians seated to their immediate left and right. This is not a time for debate, but rather to listen to what their neighbors heard.

4) The Bishop will then call the Conference to order. Delegates will then have the opportunity to share their thoughts with the Conference. The Bishop shall establish a total amount of time for discussion, not to exceed sixty minutes. No member may speak longer than two minutes. All speakers will be notified when ten seconds remain of their time. The speaker will be allowed to finish a sentence at the expiration of allotted time. Then, that microphone will be cut off and the next speaker will be recognized. This will continue until the total allotted minutes have elapsed or everyone who wished to be recognized had an opportunity to speak, whichever comes first. No subsidiary, privileged or incidental motions will be in order during this time of discussion.

5) The regular business of the Conference will then resume.

At a previously noted time during plenary session on the following session day, the petitions will be voted upon by secret written ballot. Thirty minutes will be allotted for this vote. No debate or motions will be in order at this time.

### XIII. HOLY CONFERENCING PROCEDURE FOR PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

85) A procedure to facilitate holy conferencing shall be used at the Bishop's discretion to discuss proposed Constitutional amendments coming from the General Conference.

A special order of the day may be established to provide for holy conferencing. The special order of the day shall proceed as follows:

- 1. The co-chairs of the delegation to General Conference will present the proposed amendments to the Conference in a fifteen-minute presentation.
- 2. Upon conclusion of the opening presentation, the Bishop shall bring the Conference into silent prayer for two minutes.
- 3. Then up to ten minutes will be provided for members to share what they heard with their fellow Christians seated to their immediate left and right. This is not a time for debate, but rather to listen to what their neighbors heard.
- 4. The Bishop will then call the Conference to order. Members will then have the opportunity to share their thoughts with the Conference. Sixty minutes will be allotted for this. No member may speak longer than two minutes. Each speaker will be notified when ten seconds remains of their time. The speaker will be allowed to finish a sentence at the expiration of their time. Then, that microphone will be cut off and the next speaker will be recognized. This will continue until sixty minutes have elapsed or everyone who wishes to speak has been recognized whichever comes first. No changes are permitted to be made to Constitutional amendments.
- 5. The regular business of the Conference will then resume.

At a previously noted time during a subsequent plenary session, the amendments will be voted upon by secret ballot. Members will be able to vote in favor of or against each individual amendment. If a member wishes to abstain, the member will leave the ballot blank for that particular amendment.

Should any of the foregoing Rules of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference be in conflict with the provisions of the current Book of Discipline, then the provisions of the Discipline shall take precedence.

#### Archives and History, Commission on

2017 has been a very productive and successful year of engaging in the ministry of memory for the GNJC Commission on Archives and History (CAH). Through these initiatives we have supported vital congregations by encouraged clergy, lay leaders and local congregations to strengthen their Wesleyan identity and have successfully fulfilled our Disciplinary mission to identify, preserve and make available the historic record of ministry within GNJ. Highlights include:

### 1. Archival Depository:

- a. Archival Space: We preserve the historical records of all closed churches within the bounds of GNJC and its antecedents and provide for the retention of the corporate records of GNJC boards, agencies and committees in collaboration with those bodies. Our collection is located in the fire-safe and climate controlled archival depository in the vault of the General Commission on Archives and History (GCAH), UMC, in Madison, NJ.
- b. Cost-Effectiveness: Our archival space is secured through a unique and cost-effective rental agreement with GCAH, which is preserves our closed church and conference agency records and demonstrates effective stewardship by limiting the impact of archival costs on our shared ministry budget.

### 2. Communication Platforms and Strategies:

Our digital, print and oral communication strategies increased our ministry presence and impact and helped us be effective stewards of conference resources.

- a. Ancestry.com: Our GNJCAH page on Ancestry.com received a total of 508,986 page views, 289,026 image views and 219,960 text views for the twelve months between 12/01/16 and 11/30/17. Our closed church vital statistics (births, baptisms, deaths, and marriage records) are easily accessible, highly utilized and extend our ministry impact well beyond the boundaries of GNJ!
- b. Internet Archive: We completed the migration of our extensive digital library of historical journals and resources to Internet Archive (IA) and created a link to this resource from the GNJC website. IA is a free portal that allows us to post an unlimited amount of historical material on the internet. Utilizing IA has significantly increased the volume of historical resources we are able to make available online and reduced our actual and future impact on GNJC data rates. For the eleven months from 3/2017-1/2018, 79 items on IA have been viewed 1,209 times by people from 8 different states and two countries.
- c. GNJC Website: We recently recruited a CAH member, Todd Lattig, to serve as a blogger and look forward to engaging this platform further in 2018. During 2017, the GNJ website page for CAH received 286 page views, 400 page views for history resources and had 127 hits for downloaded resource items (St. Johns (Fordville) Oral Project—36 hits, 2017 Church Anniversaries page—35 hits and 2015 Church Anniversaries page—56 hits).
- d. Consultation & Speaking: We also supported local churches celebrating their Wesleyan identity and significant anniversaries by providing speakers. One of our consultants preached at a local church anniversary service and attended two historic site dedications. Other members remain available to assist local churches in reflecting upon on their Wesleyan identity and role within the mission of GNJC.
- e. Others: We ran advertisements for events and promoted our annual church history contests in GNJ Digest, updated our commission information and resources on the GNJC Website, advertised the church history contests and submitted an article for publication in the UM Relay on John Wesley's practice of worship and the principles that support vital worship today, and hosted a display table at annual conference which highlighted our awards, conference historic sites and the work of the commission

### 3. Conference Historic Sites:

We presented three nominations for Conference Historic Site status, which were approved by vote of the 2017 Session of GNJAC. These three new sites are the St. John UMC in Fordville, NJ; Frankford Plains UMC in Frankford Plains, NJ and The Old Stone Church in Nyack, NY. All are now registered on the GCAH denominational Historic Site list and either have already or will receive UMC Historic Site Markers in the near future. Nominating these sites created excitement about our historic heritage at annual conference and has proven to be a way that CAH can inspire our congregations to celebrate their place in the mission and ministry of GNJC. We continue to monitor a list of two dozen potential future Conference Historic Sites. We plan on nominating Kingwood UMC in Kingwood, NJ, Evangelical UMC in Clarksboro, NJ and Emmanuel UMC in Union City, NJ as three additional proposed Conference Historical Sites to be voted on and approved by the 2018 GNJ Annual Conference Session.

#### 4. Local Church History Awards:

We sponsor three church history awards each year to create incentives for congregations to collect, preserve and celebrate their stories of faithfully inspired ministry. The church history contest thus invites local churches to inspire their future by learning from their past.

- a. The Robert B. Steelman Methodist History Award: We gave the 2017 Steelman Methodist History Award to the Friendship UMC in Monroeville, NJ, for submitting the best overall church history within GNJC this year. The Steelman Award is given annually to the local church that submits a history which best exemplifies an inclusive narrative on the life and ministry of the congregation from its beginnings to the present day. This year, we are presenting the 2018 Steelman Award to Centenary UMC in Metuchen, NJ.
- b. The John C. Goodwin Multi-Media Church History Award: We awarded the 2017 Goodwin Multi-Media Church History Award to Midvale United Methodist Church of Wanaque, NJ, which was recognized for submitting the best overall multimedia church history within GNJC. This was a special recognition, as this is the first-ever presentation of the Multi-Media award.
- c. The Morris L. Smith Ethnic Local Church History Award: This year, we named the Ethnic History Award in honor of Mr. Morris L. Smith, the Church Historian of Zion UMC in Lawnside, NJ, in recognition for his longstanding efforts to use the history of his church and community to inspire pride and respect for his African American Heritage and for his practice of using stories of perseverance and faithful resistance to prejudice to build transformative relationships with persons of other racial and ethnic backgrounds within our conference. Our hope is that this award will carry on his personal legacy of promoting African American history as a tool for transforming our Church into a more inclusive, just, and faithful body, and also inspire other ethnic and multi-cultural churches within GNJC to honor and preserve their vital stories of faith.

### 5. Ministry Collaboration:

In 2017 we advanced the ministry of memory within GNJ and modeled good stewardship by collaborating with other conference, jurisdictional and denominational organizations.

- a. Dobbins UMC & GNJC Historical Society: CAH collaborated with Dobbins UMC in Delanco, NJ and the GNJC Historical Society by supporting the Historical Society's 2017 Annual Meeting and historical program on Saturday, October 28, 2017 entitled, "Bishop John Heyl Vincent's Influence on the Creation of Our Social Creed." The program featured Rev. Kevin Newburg, PhD, who is Assistant Professor of Christianity at Drew Theological School, as the keynote speaker and highlighted the work of Delanco's respected local historian Alice Smith. Through this collaboration we encouraged the telling of the dynamic stories of our faith tradition and recognized the contributions and expertise of a volunteer local church historian.
- b. On-Line Local Church Historian Training: We supported the Indiana Conference CAH's Local Church Historians School by advertising their program and encouraging our local church historians to participate in it. As a result, four persons within GNJC completed the three month on-line training course.
- c. NEJCAH: We continue to have a representative, Donald DeGroat, on the Northeast Jurisdiction Commission on Archives and History Executive Board, which gives GNJ CAH a presence, leadership role and influence on the jurisdictional commission. Additionally, our chairperson attended the NEJCAH meeting in Charleston, WV in April of 2017, where he and Don actively supported the ministry of the Jurisdictional Commission.
- d. GNJ Hispanic/Latino Ministries History Working Group: During 2017 our chairperson established a relationship with the chairperson of the GNJ Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministries and they took initial steps toward establishing a collaborative working group to craft strategies to identify, encourage and support ongoing efforts to collect, preserve and publish the story of Hispanic/Latino ministries within GNJ. This effort has already inspired several pastors to begin collecting materials in anticipation of the task force meeting in the near future. We look forward to this initiative continuing and toward growing CAH's ability to engage, partner with and support all of our ethnic congregations and constituent groups within GNJ.

### 6. Recognition of Significant Local Church Anniversaries:

We presented recognition certificates to those churches celebrating major anniversaries and continued to receive positive feedback that congregations were excited to receive the acknowledgement of their significant milestones.

### 7. Work of the Archivist:

Our commission assisted local churches efforts to document their past ministry with the help of our volunteer archivist, Walter Jones. Walt responded to 60 specific information requests in 2017, where he assisted in the research, and made many more referrals where he directed people to other resources. A statistical breakdown shows the range: Genealogy searches - 10, Baptismal records - 14, Marriage records - 4, Membership records - 1, Obituary requests 2, Burial records - 2, Churches merged – 3, miscellaneous inquiries – 24. We acquired some L. Burdell hawk sermons and the sold property records from Beverly Schol, Assistant Property manager for GNJC. The New York conference has digitized the records of the New York and Vicinity UMC including some

New Jersey and Connecticut from 1775 to 1949. Total records were 499,925. We encourage churches to place a Christian flag on the grave sites of ministers on Memorial Day.

### 8. Ministry Impact and Stewardship:

The cost-effectiveness of our archival storage arrangement with GCAH and with the metrics cited under Ancestry.com, Internet Archive, the Conference website and the Work of the Archivist, all noted above, combined with the other initiatives described herein, demonstrate that we were good stewards of conference resources. In 2017, we supported and resourced an incredible amount of inquiry and inspired historical preservation at limited, and in many cases no, expense to the conference Shared Ministry budget.

Beyond metrics, impact can also be assessed in terms of contributions. One example is that CAH has recently identified in our collection one of the few, if not the only official handwritten minutes of the early 19th century Methodist Protestant Church meeting—a significant contribution to our denominational DNA. Further, Don DeGroat, Commission Vice-Chair/Treasurer, has been researching the history of the Evangelical Association and the Evangelical United Brethren Church in New Jersey. He has identified that their challenges reaching people for Christ in areas of changing cultural dynamics, ethnic and racial heritage and languages seem prescient to today's challenges for congregations to embrace and engage changing communities.

Further, advertising for the upcoming church history contest inspired a person, previously unfamiliar with CAH's ministry of memory, to challenge the contest coordinator, CAH Vice-Chairperson and Treasurer Rev. Donald DeGroat to an intense theological discussion unrelated to a local church but related to sin and the issue of ethnic cleansing of Native American tribes. This was a three email exchange just before the Thanksgiving holiday. The writer—perhaps a youth, young anyway—had recently learned of his or her Native American roots and was wrestling with historical issues of ethnic cleansing and sin, now hitting close to her. While the long-term impact of this conversation remains an unknown, the tenor of the interaction gives us the impression the individual found the conversation a valuable support in their process of discernment.

We thus hold that our commission creates significant impact in a highly cost-effective manner. We are good stewards of the Ministry of Memory and of the precious conference resources that are entrusted to us. Therefore, in closing, I wish to express my profound gratefulness for all the dedicated volunteers who make our ministry effective.

#### A Future With Hope

A Future With Hope (AFWH) is a GNJ Vital Mission Partner working to extend our conference mission and ministry. Organized as a nonprofit in 2012 to provide relief and recovery following Superstorm Sandy, AFWH has accomplished the following in support of this ministry.

- Disaster Case Management services provided to 461 families
- Repaired or rebuilt 269 homes
- Housed and utilized the skills of more than 12,215 volunteers, who are residents of 46 states and Canada
- Volunteers contributed a financial value of more than \$8,117,000 toward labor costs
- Raised more than \$18 million dollars toward the recovery efforts

AFWH acknowledges and appreciates that these results were made possible in part due to the generous UMCOR grant, donations received through the A Future With Hope Mission Campaign, and the many GNJ churches who served as volunteer host sites, organized and sent volunteer teams, provided volunteer meals and offered generous financial support. We are deeply grateful for the sustained commitment of the people of GNJ.

As AFWH nears completion of their Superstorm Recovery efforts, we are being called upon to share best practices in disasters across the country. Recently, members of GNJ and AFWH traveled to Puerto Rico for the purpose of sharing expertise on hurricane recovery. AFWH's response model will continue to serve as the benchmark for rebuilding and recovery for disasters going forward.

From its inception, A Future With Hope recognized that as the recovery process across New Jersey helped communities rebuild, there would be a need to help them reach a place of transformation, a new normal where their neighborhoods could build upon assets they hadn't yet identified, where resilience became the framework for success. This foundation directed AFWH into the following areas during 2017:

- Communities of Hope training. Twenty-five congregations have been trained to date in community engagement, inter-cultural competency, community asset identification and development of key partnerships. Participants to date have established an initial action plan for their community, and in 2018 congregations and partners will receive continued training and guidance with the goal of identifying and achieving community aspirations for sustainable change.
- Hope Center locations. Eight outreach programs and partners that provide needed community services have been identified to date. They include CAMP YDP, CUMAC, Pathways to Prosperity, The Neighborhood Center, Camden Urban Ministry Initiative, The Crisis Room, and the Atlantic City Cooperative of three congregations. The target in 2018 is to identify an additional 8-10 locations. AFWH Community Engagement Specialists work with Hope Centers to improve diversity, maximize service delivery, enhance program savings, and support training needs with professional development and/or strategic plans.
- Repurposing of underused or unused church properties into sustainable, community valued, economic development projects. AFWH Community Engagement Specialists work with Church leaders to coordinate efforts for the vision and engagement with all identified stakeholders throughout construction.

In 2018, AFWH anticipates a productive year engaging our congregations and their partners in the ever-growing work of community leadership and transformation. Those interested in any of the programs may reach a Community Engagement Specialist at AFWH to begin the conversation.

A Future With Hope is exceedingly grateful to Bishop John Schol for his vision to create a God-sized ministry to support not only Sandy survivors, but all those in need in throughout New Jersey and to our Board of Trustees who guide this mission.

### **Boston University School of Theology**

Greetings from Boston University School of Theology (BUSTH) as we travel together in this journey of discipleship!

#### **Breaking News:**

- **Students**: Our entering students were the most diverse in our history, creating remarkable opportunities for in-depth exchange and fruitful collaboration.
- Faculty: We welcomed three amazing faculty this year: Rebecca Copeland in Theology (focus on environmental theology); Theodore Hickman-Maynard in Black Church Studies; and Cornell William Brooks as Visiting Professor of Social Ethics, Law, and Justice Movements. Thanks to loyal alums, we also endowed the Harrell Beck Professorship in Hebrew Scripture and installed Kathe Darr as the first Beck Professor.
- **Congregations:** The Lilly Endowment awarded the Center for Practical Theology \$1.5 million to create an innovation hub, which will foster creative vocational reflection in congregations, and a sharing of the congregations' wisdom.
- **Doctor of Ministry**: The DMin in Transformational Leadership is soaring with lively student cohorts that are broadly ecumenical, culturally diverse, and global. The model includes intensives, online courses, and faculty mentoring.
- Scholarships: We continue our offer of free tuition to UMC registered candidates for ordained ministry, and we continue to build student scholarships and housing as a central campaign priority. New scholarships include the Dale Andrews Scholarship in Practical Theology and Race, Korean Student scholarship, and the Bishop John H. Adams and Dr. Dolly D. Adams Scholarship for candidates for ordained ministry in the AME, AMEZ, and CME churches.
- Arts Initiatives: Recent exhibits and events include "Symbols and Art of China, Korea, and Japan" and "Bridging Divided Communities through the Arts"

**Partnering For Ministry and Transformation** Preparing students for ministry means meaningful partnerships with the local spiritual community.

- **Congregational courses**: Courses in congregations with church leaders and students learning together.
- Religion and Conflict Transformation Clinic: Internships and workshops that foster justice and reconciliation.
- **Travel seminars:** Courses engaging local communities on Arizona-Mexican border, Israel and Palestine, India, spiritual life centers, and Serbia and Croatia (with focus on interreligious dialogue).
- Ecumenical partnerships: Continuing close work with UMC, AME and other Wesleyan denominations, while launching robust Communities of Learning with the Episcopal Church and United Church of Christ.
- **Partnership with Hebrew College**: Joint courses and public events, plus co-sponsoring *The Journal of Interreligious Studies*. The focus is on enriching theological education with interreligious learning and leadership opportunities.

### **Taking Action Globally and Locally:**

- **Campus action**: Work to improve accessibility and sustainability. BUSTH is the first certified Green School in BU, and is active in the Green Seminary Initiative. It has also been named as one of the "Seminaries that Change the World."
- Internships in global service and peacemaking: Student-initiated internships for service with communities across the world, and for just peacemaking projects with international organizations.

Commitment to Justice: Celebrating differences while joining in action.

- Faculty and students have led and participated in service for victims of hurricanes and fires, protests on behalf of Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, protests of white supremacist movements, protests and services on behalf of immigrants and DACA young people, and ecumenical and interreligious witnesses for justice in the city of Boston.
- The community (often student-led) has had deep conversations on issues that divide (including theological issues). We seek to foster respectful listening that builds community life and communal action.

• Celebration of the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Anna Howard Shaw Center

#### Cabinet

"So, what exactly is your job?" That was the question asked of a District Superintendent by a local church member as the two walked from a meeting towards the parking lot. It is a fair question to ask since many in our churches have not grown up in The United Methodist Church and are unfamiliar with our polity and for those who have, it is often still seen in terms of mostly an administrator. However, in 2012 the General Conference of The United Methodist Church clarified the role of the District Superintendent as the "chief missional strategist". This description was a way of transforming the work and role of a superintendent from one of maintenance to mission. It has been the Cabinet's effort to continue trying to work towards that goal.

As "strategists" we continue to look for ways to help support and grow clergy to go further in becoming transformational and apostolic leaders. One of the successes has been in freeing more time for superintendents to do one on one coaching with their peers. This has allowed for clergy to find a place to share their challenges in ministry and be empowered to discover that answers are often within themselves if they just had the opportunity to be coached up.

Along with coaching we continue to strategize with the connectional ministry resource team to develop pace groups, workshops, day of learning, and district events where creative and adaptive ideas can be used in local settings in reaching our vitality goals. This has led to where the Central region brought together over 190 churches for a Super Saturday Church Conference. Beyond the business of the church, which must be done, it allowed for 1,000 in worship with the challenge to "jump into the deep end" in mission and outreach for Christ as well as remembering the connectional importance that we are in this work together. In the Southern region after the success of the Revolutionary Stewardship workshop it prompted the creation of the Refresh retreat where clergy had the opportunity to reconnect anew with their "call" story and how it impacts worship and small groups. In the Northern region last year Regional Day of Learning was named "Outbound" and it provided pastors and congregations with "out of the box" ideas about outreach and sharing the Message in new ways.

In the role of strategist, the cabinet has also been looking at the local church and communities to discern what challenges and opportunities stand before us. This has led to the continued work with Team Vital in walking along side of congregations that are rediscovering their changing communities both within and outside the doors of the local church. Team Vital has allowed us to dream and reimagine with the local church in helping them move from "status quo" to becoming risk takers for the Kingdom of God. Such things as "Dinner Church" and small groups meeting in coffee houses or other venues outside the church walls has emerged from such creative thinking. In strategically looking into the future, Team Vital for the first time has recently been offered in an all-Spanish segment so that we might reach our growing Latino population in our urban areas.

In their role as strategist, the cabinet has worked close with the Episcopal Team to encounter places where re-purposing buildings could be an option and where re-developments could take place. The facility of the former Fairfield UMC is under redevelopment to be transformed into a much-needed center for the training of handicap persons as a UM Hope Center. The Christ UMC in Jersey City is in the

process of being also transform into a 25<sup>th</sup> floor building. In the early steps of this project the superintendents help congregations identify themselves as the place where this kind of transformation will take place. As a Cabinet we are looking into our communities to explore the potential of Hope centers throughout the annual conference, where new ministries can develop that will address such things as urban poverty, opioid and other addictions, educational job training, life skills, youth and senior centers, etc. Such Hope centers are a means by which we continue in our rich Wesley heritage by "doing all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the places you can, to all the people you can, for as long as you can."

The Cabinet is also given the task of strategizing with the Bishop in the appointment process. This has meant spending time with staff parish relations committees and local churches to understand the needs, challenges, and missional possibilities of each congregation. While in one way we work independently in our church setting we are also connectional. Which means that pastors are members of an annual conference and all are reviewed to discern the best way to use their passion, fruitfulness, gifts and talents that will maximize our disciple making. We are very much aware that many of our clergy will also be nearing retirement in the next five to ten years and that finding that next transformational apostolic leadership is of vital importance. The cabinet continues to look at developing our next generation from within the conference as well as recruiting from seminaries around the country. We seek to find passionate people who can reach those in our pews and at the same time address the changing church culture in which we live.

Throughout our work we have been encouraged by how some of our churches, varying in different sizes, have been striving to make disciples of Christ, have transformed their worship experience, created new small groups, reached into their communities with out of the box innovative ideas and have grown in their level of generosity. We have witnessed as people have celebrated and found a deeper spiritual passion through remembering and reclaiming their Baptism through the Water and Roots series. There has been encouraging feedback about the Transitional Workshops and Cultural competency training that is helping both clergy and laity work through the challenges of change with positive outcomes. There have been new church starts and new ways of reaching out through technology in live feeds on social media, podcasts, and church apps. Leadership development has equipped pastors to sharpen their skill levels and raised the level of goal setting and higher expectations in their ministry. This type of effective leadership leads to reviving congregations.

However, in moving forward we are not without our challenges. The cabinet continues to deal with church closures, the number of fulltime appointments that have now moved to half-time, a decline in worship, an aging population, and a shrinking revenue base. There is the need to deal with developing more apostolic leaders, find ways to reach the next generation, address social ills, improve decaying facilities, and be the beacon of light that is needed in our communities. It will not change overnight or even in one year, but we continue to work in perfecting the new goals for our conference that will address these areas over the next four years. We continue to invest our time to be involved with the new camping ministry, the Ignite weekend, and working with grant recipients that can begin to make these changes as well as the many other ways that have been mentioned in this report. We refuse to become complacent or think our best days are behind us as a conference or church. Instead, like the Apostle Paul's words to the Corinthians, "we are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; stuck down but not destroyed." Our hope is in the Lord!

Yet, we are also mindful that we are more than strategists. We are prayer partners, laborers in the harvest, servants who are not afraid to wash feet, worship leaders, and disciples of this Christ who have been called into this position for such a time as to work alongside of our sisters and brothers for something greater than ourselves: to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. To that end we continue along this journey filled with optimism, determination, and hope that truly God is with us.

#### **Candler School of Theology**

For more than 100 years, Candler School of Theology at Emory University has prepared *real* people to make a *real* difference in the *real* world. Since our founding in 1914, more than 10,000 students have graduated from Candler, where they have been shaped as thoughtful, principled, and courageous Christian leaders dedicated to transforming the world in the name of Jesus Christ.

One of 13 official seminaries of The United Methodist Church, Candler has been included on a list of "Seminaries that Change the World" for five years running, and was recently named a "Bright Spot in Theological Education" by Auburn Seminary.

Candler is also one of seven graduate professional schools of Emory University, a top-tier research institution offering extensive resources and a demonstrated commitment to service. Our location in Atlanta provides a hands-on learning environment rich with opportunity: The General Board of Global Ministries is headquartered here, as are numerous public health, international development, and social service organizations. Simply put, there is no better place to prepare for ministry that engages our major denominational priorities: developing leaders, starting and growing churches, ministry with the poor, and improving global health.

In order to keep pace with the needs of the church and the world, Candler offers 16 degrees: six single degrees and ten dual degrees pairing theology with bioethics, business, international development, law, public health, or social work. One of our newest degrees is a Doctor of Ministry that is 90 percent online, so students can remain in their places of ministry as they study and immediately apply to their context what they learn in class. Our Teaching Parish program allows eligible United Methodist students to serve as pastors in local churches while they're enrolled—they earn a salary as they earn course credit and pastoral experience, plus they are mentored by an experienced United Methodist elder.

Candler's student body continues to reflect the diversity and breadth of the Christian faithful, with an enrollment of 455, reflecting 49 percent women, 35 percent people of color (U.S.), and a median age of 30. Students represent 39 denominations, with half coming from the Methodist family. 82 percent of students are seeking a degree to prepare them as ministry professionals.

Candler has a deep commitment to alleviating student debt and employs a multi-pronged approach to tackle this issue. In 2017-2018, we awarded \$5.3 million in Candler scholarships, with 97 percent of MDiv students receiving aid and the average scholarship covering 75 percent of tuition. Plus, our comprehensive "Faith & Finance" program teaches money management skills that serve our students now and will continue to serve them—and the churches they lead—well into the future.

Half of Candler's faculty are United Methodist and 58% come from traditions within the larger Methodist family. This year, we welcomed fellow United Methodist Helen Jin Kim to the faculty as Assistant Professor of American Religious History, and we sent best wishes along with our colleague Mary Lou Greenwood Boice as she retired after 25 years of remarkable service to Candler.

Candler draws considerable strength and inspiration from its relationship with The United Methodist Church. Our ability to fulfill our mission of educating faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries throughout the world depends upon your support, gifts, and prayers. ### The Centenary Fund and Preachers' Aid Society

The Centenary Fund and Preachers' Aid Society was established by charter granted in 1857. In 2000 the charter was amended to rename the corporation The Centenary Fund and Preachers' Aid Society of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. The purpose of the Fund is to provide maximum income, consistent with the preservation of principal, for the support of retired clergy and surviving spouses and dependent children of deceased clergy who have served in the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.

A primary way the Fund meets that purpose today is by contributing towards the cost of providing retiree healthcare. In 2017 the amount contributed was \$600,000, and since 2004 the Fund has contributed over \$6 million for this purpose. The Fund also provides grants to pastors and their families with special needs who have requested aid, including help with extraordinary medical expenses, transportation needs, and loans to assist retired pastors obtain housing in Methodist (and other) Homes, among other ways.

The Fund has only been able to do this through the generous support of clergy, laity and churches, by means of annual contributions and periodic donations as well as bequests. Since inception the Fund has received more than \$6.3 million in donations. The Fund Balance as of the end of November 2017 was \$11,656,099.

To continue support for retired clergy and their families in the future, increased donations will be needed. Reverend Douglas Miller is the Centenary Fund's Outreach Director and is working to increase our Donation Base. We have also recently partnered with the Stewardship Foundation and the Communications Committee to raise our profile and increase our support.

We hope you will help us build up the Centenary Fund with your tax-free donations so that The Centenary Fund and Preachers Aid Society will be able to continue the substantial contributions needed in the future to fund retiree healthcare and to provide aid to retired

clergy and their dependents.

Thank you so much for your support to date.

#### Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Committee on

2016 and 2017 are the fruitful year for Committee on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. On behalf of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference the members of the committee we could participate in many trainings on the local level in general and with other denominations. We had workshops and trainings with United Methodist Ecumenical and Interreligious Training (UMEIT) that was an interactive training session which helped us to come together with United Methodist ecumenists from the local and general levels of The United Methodist Church for mutual enrichment, encouragement and exchange of ideas.

The National Workshop on Christian Unity is an annual event shared by various denominations that brings together laity, pastors, ecumenical officers, theologians and church leaders to exchange ideas and programs, and to pray and plan together for the sake of Christian Unity. This annual workshop offered a rich variety of voices with ecumenical and interreligious experiences across Catholic and Protestant traditions in the belief that this is an opportunity to learn from each other and for the Holy Spirit to deepen God's gift of unity in our various churches and communities.

Our coming together as United Methodists created for a focus on ecumenical unity and challenged to ground us in our own faith tradition. Our ultimate hope is that as we participate in the prayer, programs and fellowship of the National Workshops to gain new inspiration and tools to strengthen our local witness of unity in Christ and make disciples of Christ as the Holy Spirit guides us.

Our attending the national level workshops benefitted to meeting the local leaders in other communities who shared their interest (vice versa) in ecumenical and interreligious work. This participation also helped us to develop a network for mutual sharing and support during the year.

Participating in the United Methodist connection is a way to train leaders for ecumenical and interreligious ministries. The involvement of our clergy and laity enriched our local congregation with new ideas and insights.

We as Committee on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns took the advantage attending numerous seminars held at Minneapolis, Minnesota for the week at the National Workshop on Christian Unity.

What are some of the highlights and headliners for CUIR this year?

CUIR is changing! In 2017, we began the transition from the committee members to young clergy and laity participation to annual training sessions. Under the leadership of Connectional Director of the Conference we have moved our activities from program to resource oriented. We also hope to establish a year-round internet and social media presence. We need our colleagues in the conference to help us think through how this idea "Program to Resource" can function structurally, financially and programmatically. Now this is our opportunity to impact the future development of CUIR and make it even more effective in meeting the needs of your ministry.

We have perceived the ideas of National Council of Churches in avail the suggestions on Interreligious Relations and Collaboration Table and its inclusive variety of viewpoints and traditions regarding interfaith relations and the work of the Table is carried out in consultation with other faith communities, such as

Study Interfaith Issues, Build relationships between the churches and people of other religious traditions, Develop opportunities for the fullest possible sharing of ideas and counsel among the churches on the topic of interfaith relations, Nurture relationships with local and national ecumenical and interfaith bodies, Promote Interreligious dialogue and understanding etc.,

Some of our members participated in "Sixteen Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence: This 16 Days of Activism against Genderbased Violence" in the month of November 2017. and amplify voices of peace. Throughout the campaign, the WCC will release special prayers, social media photos, and news and video releases.

Four members of the CUIR attended the workshop hosted by UMEIT and it was an Annual United Methodist Ecumenical and Interreligious Training in May 2017 in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The chair of CUIR attended the Conference of Episcopal Diocese on the invitation of Rev. Lynne Weber, Diocesan Ecumenical and Interreligious Officer. It was the 144<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Newark, held on Friday, January 25 –Saturday, January 26 at the Hilton Hotel, One Hilton Court, Parsippany, NJ 07054.

The CUIR met five times this year to discuss the importance of its existence in the conference and to coordinate the programs.

I take this privilege to thank all the members of the CUIR for their whole-hearted support.

#### CUMAC (Center of United Methodist Aid to the Community)

Thank you to our friends and partners within the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference for your help making 2017 a successful year! With your steadfast commitment to those we are called serve, CUMAC is ministering to the poor and working hard to feed people and change lives. In 2017, CUMAC celebrated the following accomplishments:

- Over 30,000 people, including 8,138 children, received food to stave off hunger, while an additional 35,000 people received fresh produce and bread
- Over 350 people were supported with disaster relief after experiencing fire, flood, domestic abuse relocation and other natural disasters
- 9 people had a place to call home and a support system to assist them as they work to recover from years of homelessness and instability
- Over 70 men and women had the opportunity to learn critical job skills needed to move toward gainful employment
- Nearly 2,000 children living with homelessness, illness and other challenges received school supplies, Easter baskets and holiday gifts
- Over 40 local pantries, shelters and soup kitchens were supported in their efforts to feed the hungry by the Depot and Community Food Coalition

At CUMAC, we are not only in ministry for the poor, but with the poor. With this guiding ethos, we are in constant communication with our clients, as well as community members and leaders, in order to better understand and respond to the issues our clients face every day. With knowledge gained from these conversations, CUMAC is now collecting and distributing hygiene items, which are prohibitively expensive for households on limited budgets. A growing number of UMC partners now collect the shampoos, soaps, toothpastes, deodorants and other items that go to families and individuals who would otherwise go without and we are so grateful. CUMAC's supportive housing program, Place of Promise, overcame one of its biggest challenges this past June by moving residents with a safe space in which to work toward personal development. Through a partnership with the Community Food Bank of NJ, CUMAC is now accepting and delivering over 100,000 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables annually to pantries and soup kitchens that collectively feed between 9,000 and 15,000 clients a month in some of Passaic County's most underserved areas. As an increased number of pantries are able to provide healthy food to their clients, families and communities who have struggled with food related health issues will instantly benefit and ultimately thrive.

CUMAC's leadership team has been busy nurturing partnerships with other leaders in hunger alleviation, health promotion and poverty reduction. We recognize that our 30+ year history uniquely positions us to lend resources and expertise to the larger conversation around poverty issues and we are dedicated to addressing the root causes of hunger. We are committed to fostering meaningful dialogue and action that has the power to create lasting change. In the words of our executive director, "we're working hard to put ourselves out of a job" by taking strategic steps to lift people out of poverty and beyond the need for emergency support services.

CUMAC is proud to start the year 2018 having hired 3 new staff members to fill critical roles in our office, warehouse and pantry. Each of our new employees were hired from the local community and bring to their work a deep understanding of the challenges faced by CUMAC's clientele. Growing our staff is critical to our ability to efficiently and effectively serve our clients, volunteers and donors, and we are proud to welcome our 3 new team members. We are also proud to announce equipment upgrades that include a brand new forklift

(which allows staff to unload and process food more efficiently), the purchase of a new refrigerated truck (which will be critical to growing our fresh food reclamation efforts) and a new stabilized shelving system that is helping us to safely and securely store the 1.2 million pounds of food that are processed by our Depot annually. Topping CUMAC's facility needs going forward is the repair or replacement of our aging elevator. This piece of equipment is critical to our ability to move food between our main and supplemental warehouse spaces, and operating without has been challenging.

In July 2017, Reverend Patricia Bruger retired as CUMAC's executive director after 27 years and was replaced by Mark Dinglasan. With more than 15 years of experience in both the corporate and not-for-profit sectors, Mr. Dinglasan has led teams in the areas of youth development, program management, sales and strategic planning, mission and ministry. Mark is using his considerable experience and skill to strengthen CUMAC's core foundation and to further the scope and breadth of CUMAC's mission. He has enjoyed meeting many of CUMAC's church partners and continues to visit UMCs throughout the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference in order to meet clergy and share CUMAC's vital mission.

Under Mark's leadership, CUMAC's staff and programs are looking toward "big, crazy dreams" and we're excited for what the future holds. Going forward CUMAC's leadership and staff are renewing efforts to grow our financial stability so that we can ensure our vital work continues unimpeded. CUMAC's leadership is working to increase the revenue it generates to support operations and build sustainable long-term relationships with corporate, individual, and government funders. To this end, CUMAC will focus on 4 development strategies:

- Develop an annual grant strategy
- Enhance revenue generated by CUMAC events
- Cultivate relationships with corporations centered on both volunteerism and sponsorship
- Strengthen individual giving

The desired short-term outcomes of this plan are to eliminate periods throughout the fiscal year with less than \$30,000 in CUMAC's main checking account; have strong fundraising events, and increase corporate presence at CUMAC. Desired long-term outcomes are to stabilize fiscal year revenues and ensure that we can continue our critical work from a place of strength in the years and decades to come. Increased financial stability is key to our ability to continue addressing facility and equipment needs, and also to filling critical staffing gaps, so that we can efficiently and effectively serve our community. These efforts will help ensure that CUMAC can continue to act as a bastion of hope in Paterson, Passaic County and northern NJ while serving with confidence in our ability to provide the best possible care to those who need us.

Our work would not be possible without the 2,800 volunteers and countless supporters who dedicate their time, talent and resources to ensuring people are fed, clothed, housed and cared for.

Throughout 2017, churches of the Greater Annual Conference played an instrumental role in our work. 27 Methodist churches sent volunteers, while 103 churches held food and other material collections, or made financial contributions to ensure CUMAC's vital ministry. Bible studies, UMWs, UMMs, youth groups, young adult groups, pastors and congregants alike found in CUMAC a way to live Christ's words in action: sorting and bagging food, collecting hygiene items, and ministering to the poor more generally. They joined hands with area civic groups, corporations, and other houses of faith to live a shared belief that together we have the power to make the world a better, more secure place for all of its inhabitants. Thank you and keep up the great work in the fight against hunger. For our friends old and new, there are many ways you can help CUMAC minister to the poor and hungry. Summer food collections and financial donations will be critical to ensuring children don't go hungry while not receiving in-school meals. Volunteers will be needed year-round to pack bags and prepare household items. Your work to organize speaking events and educate others about hunger will be imperative to keeping hunger awareness alive. You, more generally, will be instrumental to making sure that, in this age of plenty, none among us go hungry. We simply couldn't help so many without your creativity and generosity, truly we are blessed to count you among our fold. Thank you and keep up the great work in the fight against hunger!

### Church and Society, Board of

"The stranger who resides among you shall be to you as one of your citizens. You shall love him as yourself, for you were once strangers in the land of Egypt." Leviticus 19:33

The Board of Church and Society has been in a year of transition with interim leadership, yet continues to seek how we as the church can address issues of social justice at this time in our nation.

Our Board Focus dinner at Annual Conference welcomed the General Secretary of the Board of Church and Society, the Reverend Dr. Susan Henry-Crowe. Her keynote presentation, "Ministry with Immigrants and Refugee Communities" set the tone and direction for the Boards work in 2017/2018. In December a strategic meeting of the Northeast Jurisdictional Immigration Task Force at our Conference Mission and Resource Center, brought together some fifty clergy and laity throughout the jurisdiction, including seven members of the GNJC. A decision was made that the Board of Church and Society would be tasked with the creation of an immigration task force for GNJC.

In January, under the leadership of the Director of Connectional Ministries, the Rev. Hector Burgos, the task force met with Bishop John Schol, hearing powerful and moving testimonies of many of its members who came to the United States as immigrants and now serve churches throughout our conference. It has been noted by Bishop Schol that our five largest congregations are ethnic congregations, we speak nine languages on Sunday morning, and we have more than 150 multicultural congregations and more than 100 cross racial appointments.

While tasked with Broad issues around immigration, the immediate and primary objective was to engage clergy and laity in our conference to advocate for the Dream Act. The 2012 General Conference of the United Methodist Church, "urged the US Congress to adopt the Dream Act and provide for these children, who have lived in this country, access to educational opportunities and full participation in the life of the only nation they have known, and identify with the US", #3164 United Methodist Book of Resolutions. The Dream Act, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, provided a protected status for young immigrant people brought to the US by their parents from deportation. The program was phased out in 2017.

Task force members have been engaged in reaching out to congregations throughout the Conference in an effort to encourage members of the New Jersey Congressional delegation to be supportive of the Dream Act. Members include Rev. Nathan Addo-Nartley, Rev. Hector Burgos, Rev. David Delaney, Rev. Kay Dubisson, Rev. Henriella Griffin, Rev. Rupert Hall, Rev. Myungsun Han, Rev. Jack Johnson, Ms. Yesenia Palomino, Rev. Lyssette Perez, Rev. Pedro Pillot, Rev. Anna Thomas, Rev. David Tokpah, and Rev. Brenda Wheeler Ehlers.

The Board, under the leadership of Rev. Jonathan Campbell, awarded Peace with Justice Grants in 2017. The program underwritten by Peace with Justice Sunday, witnesses to God's demand for a faithful, just, disarmed, and secure world. Two congregations in our conference were recipients of those grants. The Galilee UMC in Englewood award was for its ministry, "Love and Action", designed to work with families whose members are imprisoned and to serve those who are in the process of transition from prison. St. Paul's UMC in Ocean Grove was awarded a grant to assist their efforts to provide housing for persons who are homeless.

The Board has continued to support the efforts of New Jersey Campaign against Isolated Confinement in New Jersey Prisons, the work of the Anti-Poverty Network of New Jersey, the Coalition of Peace Action's Annual Conference in Princeton, and the New Jersey Eastern Service Workers, whose work is focused on migrant farm workers.

Underscoring all the efforts of the Conference Board of Church and Society are ministries of transition from mercy to justice. One has said that "Compassion and Justice are companions, not choices.

In 2017 the Educational Society was delighted to award \$14,000 in scholarships to 3 recipients (Joshua Mularski, Rachel Callender) in order to further their seminary education. #### Finance and Administration, Council on

As we close 2017 and begin 2018 and beyond, we do so knowing together we have accomplished much with the resources God has blessed us. Under the leadership of our Bishop and Cabinet, the Council on Finance and Administration has been able to support the ongoing effort of the many programs within the Conference, including efforts for Hope Centers and our Vital Congregations Our congregations have led the support for these efforts by again raising the Shared Ministry collection rate to 87.84%, an increase over the prior year. We were blessed that 406 of our local churches paid 100% of their shared ministry allocation, while 449 paid 100% of their shared ministry allocation, while 449 paid 100% of their billables. We are grateful to the churches of the Conference for their stewardship and support, together we are accomplishing the work of Christ throughout our conference.

During 2017 we were able to maintain our funding commitments, for our staff and our programs, as well as for our clergy benefit programs. We have also partnered with other committees in support of a Strategic Plan, Hope Center developments and further outreach efforts to the communities we serve. In doing so, expenses were well controlled throughout the Conference, allowing our Conference to finish the year in a position to pay 100% of our General Church apportionments, for the 11th consecutive year.

The year also was marked by continued prudent investment returns, managed in partnership with Wespath Inc., as well as an enviable audit report of 2016, reflecting only minor areas of opportunity for improvement. All of the Council's sub committees were efficient and timely in their respective areas, insuring effective management of our precious resources.

As we begin 2018, we remain empowered by where Christ is leading us. We are working to develop support in the form of shared services for new efforts in Hope Centers, as well as other efforts in support of the conference, our churches and our staff. Additionally, we recognize the need to remain focused on attaining our current Shared Ministry formula goals and are committed to achieving the goal for the 2019 budget.

I would be remiss if we did not recognize the efforts of our Treasurer, John Cardillo and his staff for their continued excellence in preforming their roles. All of our staff remains dedicated to continuing to achieve outstanding results and their work does not go unnoticed. We are blessed to have them and are grateful and thankful for the blessings of them in our conference and lives!

In closing, on behalf of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, we offer our thanks to Bishop John Schol and the Cabinet for their leadership and support, as together we continue to spread the good news of Our Savior Jesus Christ.

Greater New Jersey's BHEM is working towards fulfilling its goals and responsibilities. This year GNJ BHEM's board members have met to review its responsibilities, mandates, and to set new goals. With the approval at last year's Annual Conference of Next Generation ministries along with new IGNITE initiatives and the proposed Greater New Jersey Strategic Plan, the BHEM will also be working on and intentionally finding ways to equip, develop, and nurture new generations of transformational leaders and disciples for Jesus Christ. The plan includes all young people from as early as the sixth grade to young adults and we are currently able to anticipate its success through IGNITE participants, growing campus ministries, and camp ministries.

Scholarship opportunities through GBHEM is another one of GNJ's most inspiring contributions. We receive numerous applications from students who share stories of witness, mission, and ministry and dream of integrating their passion for Christ in their careers of choice. It is very difficult to narrow down to a few the recipients of the scholarships. This past year 17 students were awarded scholarships. This year's scholarship process is currently underway.

Yearly, BHEM encourages and accepts nominations for the Francis Asbury Award which recognizes and encourages support of higher education and campus ministries within the United Methodist Church. It is for all clergy or lay, employed or volunteer, who are active in supporting, strengthening and promoting higher education ministries. It is a non-monetary award

The BHEM provides scholarships and grants to seminars, workshops, training, and conferences to clergy, deacons, laity, local pastors, and seminary students, as they continue to discern and prepare for their leadership roles and call to ministry and service in the United Methodist Church.

In an initiative from prior BHEM leadership, \$1,000 grants are awarded to local churches that apply and that envision new ideas and ways to bridge the church with students in nearby campus. This initiative encourages and unleashes creative ways not only to serve students but to engage with them in different service projects and ministry programs in the communities. This continues to be a very important part of GNJ's BHEM scholarship/grant contributions.

Campus Ministry chaplains currently serving are Rev. John Kwon at Rockland County Community College; Rev. Don Gebhard at Centenary College; Rev. Erik "Skitch" Matson, Wesley Foundation Director at Princeton University; and Jessica Winderweedle, FeedTruck at Princeton University. The Raritan Valley District local churches are envisioning ways to reach out to students of Rutgers University under the leadership of Rev. Frances Preston.

From the FeedTruck ministry was a three-year initiative funded by GNJ's BHEM and from this ministry was born the Princeton Feed Truck Café, a pop-up coffee shop and study space at Princeton University. The café provides a safe space for students to gather, study, fellowship, and engage in deep theological conversations.

Campus ministers and chaplains present a yearly report in which they share the joy of engaging in deep conversation and establishing meaningful relationships with students. Whether it be through coaching, counseling, discipleship, or simply sharing time of conversation, students look forward to their time in worship, Bible studies, mission, and ministry with their campus ministers and chaplains. Some students just feel comfortable being in a safe place and space.

Like all projects, mission, and ministries challenges present themselves in every turn and it is through generous donations from churches and other organizations that ministry is able to continue. This coming year, GNJ's BHEM will continue to create awareness in and encourage participation from local churches to participate in and with campus ministries through donations and hands on volunteers that will assist with the current GNJ limited funding availability. We will focus on contacting local churches, using social media, the sharing of stories from campus ministries to scholarship recipients at Annual Conference, district gatherings, and IGNITE events to create such awareness and increase participation.

As conversations and work continue around the proposed Greater New Jersey Strategic Plan, Next Gen Ministries, and the Connectional Team, BHEM anticipates an increase in participation of local churches, campuses, and students to further advance BHEM goals in providing leadership development and discipleship and ministry opportunities to all who are passionate about and heed their call to ministry.

The BHEM board members ask for GNJ's continued prayers and support as we move forward into a new season with God-sized visions and dreams and for current disciples and those disciples in the making everywhere.

Where doing the work of the church is exciting, invigorating, and fulfilling and each disciple is filled with passion, joy and enthusiasm. Everyone is invited to come into any church to worship and that we leave on Sunday to go out into the world to share the love of Christ in tangible ways. The Laity Board Partners with the community of Laity of GNJ. The Board is the elected lay leadership representatives of the Annual Conference.

The Discipline (¶631) is clear that the Board of Laity shall have responsibility for the following:

- fostering an awareness of the role of the laity,
- developing the advocacy role for laity,
- increasing the participation of laity in the life of the church
- encouraging laypersons in the general ministry of the church,
- developing and promoting programs to cultivate an adequate understanding of the theological and biblical basis for lay life and work,
- developing and promoting stewardship of time, talent and possessions,
- providing for the training of lay members to Annual Conference,
- providing support and direction for such lay programs as lay servants, the observance of Laity Sunday, and the work of lay leaders on the local and district levels,
- organizing a conference committee on lay servant ministries.

These are all action verbs that would suggest that the Board of Laity will be "doing something" rather than just "meeting". GNJ Laity Board are made up of the District Lay Leaders, Conference Lay Servant Director, President of the UMM & UMW, Lay Consultants and Director of Leadership Development.

Board of Laity Ministry Mission: To empower and equip lay persons to be partners with clergy in mission and ministry in all aspects of the life of the church, making a positive difference for Jesus Christ in our communities and world.

Conference Lay Leader Vision: To equip and mobilize the laity for ministry to become disciples who make disciples of Jesus Christ, going out into their communities and the world to witness and serve.

As GNJ Conference Lay Leader, I am a member of the team working on our new Strategic Plan for 2019-2023 "Miracles Everywhere." ### National Plan for Hispanic/Latino Ministry Committee

As the National Plan for Hispanic-Latino Ministries Committee in GNJ we are committed to help the Hispanic-Latino congregations to contextualized the Annual Conference Strategic Plan and empower them to move forward with the GNJ vision and mission.

#### Leadership Development

SELAH- (Hispanic/Latino Theological and Leadership Development Training Center). The mission of SELAH is to equip disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world; and its purpose is recruit and develop transformational leaders for the church of the 21st century by providing theological and practical ministry, and leadership development education in the Wesleyan tradition. We have been working on SELAH new curriculum, choosing the teachers who will be part of the faculty and the administration team. In March 18, 2017, 17 students from SELAH and 15 students from the National Plan Modules 1 and 2 graduated at Drew Theological School as Lay Missionaries.

### Support to Children and Youth Ministry

As every year we supported the Hispanic/Latino Children and Youth Retreat called "Niños y Jovenes para Cristo" that usually take place at Pinelands Center. This year we offered scholarships to 48 campers. We also offered 43 scholarships to support youth and young adults to participate at IGNITE 2017.

#### Support to Walk to Emmaus

We continue to support the ministry of Walk to Emmaus. This is a highly effective resource that provides spiritual formation for people to become faithful disciples of Jesus Christ.

#### Events to strengthen unity among our clergy and laity

The Epiphany Service it's a great example of the call to unity with in the Hispanic-Latino congregations in the conference. This event has great relevance for our community, because it strengthens the unity and traditions of the Hispanic/Latino people, and it is attended by all our congregations within GNJ. Bishop Schol was our guest speaker, and he was assisted by members of the cabinet in serving communion and pray for the people.

#### Native American Ministries, Committee on

We are grateful as Native people in this conference that the Act of Repentance is a part of the life of the conference. Again, we had an Indigenous Welcome at our 2016 Annual Conference. We were proud to have Ms. Allie Mosley, the young adult member of the CoNAM and the Princess of the Lenni-Lenape Tribal Powwow give the Welcome. At the Act of Repentance Service, Bishop Schol stated that the Tribes would not be forgotten. This has been true in two instances: first the Lenni-Lenape Tribe lost their state recognition and the conference stood by them as friends of the court and are therefore helping to bring back that recognition. The second time was when St. John UMC was recognized as a historical site.

One of our goals is to support the Tribes in the state. We continue to support St. John UMC with a VBS program. We are working on building relationships with the Rampough and Powhatan Tribes. Another goal is to include Native American youth and young adults into the life of the Church. We continue to send youth to the IGNITE and the Peg Leg Flamingos which is youth leadership program under the Native American International Caucus (NAIC). It is also important for the CoNAM to be involved with other Native American organizations in the Church. I attended the Why Waters Matter Summit in Minneapolis, MN and some of the items discussed regarding the respect and protecting the water will be implemented here in the conference; we again had four CoNAM members attend the Northeastern Native American Ministries Committee (NEJNAMC) Annual Meeting in Eliot, ME in October 2017. We were honored to co-sponsor the National CoNAM Gathering with the Native American Comprehensive Plan (NACP) which was held in Vineland and Bridgeton, NJ in September/October 2017. We also sent three people to the Native American International Caucus (NAIC) Native American Family Camp in Gore, OK in July. This was the first Camp since 2006, so it was a reunion for many that had attended in the past.

Our overall goal is to keep the conference informed on the work of the CoNAM and the issues that relate to Native people. We are happy that we have a webpage on the conference website. We look forward to people reviewing that page and sharing with us what type of information they would like to see.

#### Next Generation Ministries of Greater New Jersey

"Cultivating and catalyzing new generations of enthusiastic disciples of Jesus Christ that connect, engage and lead in their congregations and communities to transform the world."

Next Gen Ministries is a vital mission partner of GNJ that serves as an umbrella organization to lead and coordinate Youth Ministry/IGNITE, Campus Ministry and Camping Ministry. Last year, the Annual Conference session approved a robust and innovative Next Gen Strategic Ministry Plan that guides work and ministry.

Some highlights for the past year include;

### Youth Ministry/ IGNITE

- Piloted Student Leader experiences through new projects such as Student Leader Track at IGNITE Youth Leader Day, Online Student Leader Gatherings Using Zoom, Confirmation Day with the Bishop, and a Retreat for Youth/Young Adult Delegates at Annual Conference.
- We are beginning to integrate College Student Leaders into Leadership for Youth Ministry. Our ability to connect with young people and potential partners continues to grow.
- A GNJ Next Gen website has been designed and launched. Our contact database continues to grow with more than 1,400 names.
- We are looking forward to IGNITE 2018 on September 28-30. The IGNITE team has a goal of engaging, 1,500 students, 50 new churches and doubling the IGNITE Squad in 2018.

#### **Campus Ministry**

- Hosted a Campus Ministry "Think Tank Summit" at Pinelands in February. Many great ideas were shared and bonds were forged among ministry leaders at different campuses.
- We celebrate two new campus ministry-related pastoral appointments to Drew University and Rutgers University in July this year.
- In collaboration with GNJ, we are implementing the Cultivate Initiative, which seeks to provide vocational discernment opportunities to senior high school and college students through internships and ministry opportunities.

### **Camping Ministry**

- Earlier this year, we completed the sale of the Tannery Falls property at Aldersgate at a competitive price, which will provide a portion of the seed funding needed to update our camping facilities and re-launch our camping program and other Next Gen initiatives.
- We are excited to bring summer camps back to Pinelands. Senior High Leadership Bootcamp (July 23 July 28) at Pinelands is an intense deep dive into spiritual leadership for rising 9th to 12th graders. During this week of experiential learning in the great outdoors, students will explore artistic, athletic, spiritual, and service platforms for leadership. Junior High Camp with Barefoot Republic (July 30 August 4) is a vital multi-cultural camp seeks Christ-centered unity between campers from diverse racial,

cultural and socio-economic backgrounds through a pursuit of common passions and engaging discipleship. We pray that our young people will learn the wisdom that "my difference from you is my gift to you and your difference from me is your gift to me." Two Latino/Hispanic Camps, Niños para Cristo and Jóvenes Para Cristo, are being offered.

- We've begun to make enhancements to the property and facilities at Pinelands, and more GNJ local churches and other groups are using it for retreats and events. Plans are being developed to begin renovations at Aldersgate with the goal of launching a summer experience next year.
- We know a full re-launch of our camping ministries will take some time but we are already seeing considerable progress being made as we work towards sustainability for our camping ministries in the years to come.

Supporting the Next Gen Ministries is the best investment we can make to create a vital present and future for our churches and communities. Let us support our young people through the NextGen Scholarship Fund. We want every student to be able to benefit from the programs and initiatives being offered through Next Gen Ministries (http://gnjnextgen.org/donate-to-camping-scholarships)

### Parish and Community Development

"[Parish and Community Development] shall include persons involved in significant types of parish and community ministries...the general responsibilities of the committee shall include research, evaluation, planning and strategy development, policy formulation, program implementation, local and national liaison (denominational and ecumenical) related to parish and community development, and such other functions as the conference or agency to which the committee is accountable may determine."

Much of the work of this committee over the past year has been spent gaining clarity on who we are and on the nature of our mission. We have also been brainstorming and developing ways to foster greater connection and collaboration between churches and faith leaders and their communities. To this end, the committee is exploring the following:

- 1. Partnering with existing conference projects such as PACE groups and Communities of Hope in ways that align with our purpose;
- 2. Facilitating ways that clergy and churches can connect based on ministry affinities and strengths, not just along geographic lines, in order to have a greater community impact;
- 3. Working with churches on evaluative measures relating to their community connections and involvement.

#### Pension and Health Benefits, Board of

The Greater New Jersey Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits (<u>the Board</u>) is authorized by The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church to contribute to the support, relief, assistance and pensioning of clergy and their families, as well as other church workers and lay employees of the United Methodist Church.

Working with the Wespath Benefits and Investments, the Board endeavors to implement and interpret national and conference policy.

#### Pension

### Pre-1982 Pension Plan

The 2018 Past Service Annuity Rate for pre-1982 annuitant payment is \$672 per year of pre-1982 service. The 2019 Past Service Annuity Rate for pre-1982 annuitant payment will be \$685. The pre-1982 pension program continues to be fully funded and in a strong position.

### CRSP/MPP and CPP

The General Conference's pension plan, Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) is a hybrid of defined benefit and defined contribution approaches which took effect in 2007. For 2018 churches pay CRSP at 12.5% of clergy plan compensation and for the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) at 3% of clergy's plan compensation, and UMLife Options at 2% of plan compensation for ½ time clergy.

The 2012 General Conference enacted changes to the Clergy Retirement Security Program. Effective 1/1/2014 for all contributions going forward, the CRSP Defined Benefit component was reduced from 1.25% of DAC to 1.0% of DAC. Under the CRSP Defined Contribution component, contributions were reduced from 3% to 2% of clergy plan compensation and, in addition, match up to 1% of compensation if clergy contributes 1% to UMPIP. Contributions previously made will not be affected by this change and benefits paid upon retirement will be based on the previous formula for all benefits accrued prior to 1/1/2014. Any benefits accrued from that date forward is based on the new formula.

Additionally, the General Conference changed the participation requirements from all clergy under appointment to only clergy under full time appointment. Clergy appointed to less-than-full-time (3/4 and 1/2-time) are eligible based on the decision of the Annual Conference after approval of the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits. The Board has voted to include those clergy appointed to less-than-full-time (3/4 and 1/2 time) appointments in CRSP. For clergy appointed to 1/4 time appointments, a vote of the Board has made UMPIP available as a pension option for those clergy. Please contact Alexa Taylor, Insurance and Benefits Services Manager, for more information on this option. These changes require Annual Conference approval.

The rates of remittance for the Clergy Retirement Security Program/Ministerial Pension Plan (CRSP/MPP) and Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) decreased from last year's rates to 92.08% and 96.93% respectively. Eighteen percent of churches were unable to pay these bills on time. Below is a summary of 2017 remittances:

To maintain clergypersons' participation in CRSP/UMPIP and CPP/UMLife Options, the Greater New Jersey Conference fully pays delinquent church accounts using funds from the Reserve Account at Wespath Benefits and Investments. We are concerned that some churches are not fully meeting their obligations with the resulting decrease in the Reserve Account.

By 2017 year-end the cumulative delinquent amount for years prior to 2017 was \$2,015,000 for CRSP/MPP and \$433,000 for CPP - a total of \$2,448,000, an increase of \$120,000.

We thank those churches that maintained faithful stewardship, paying 100% of their obligation. We also appreciate the continuing efforts of our district superintendents, Alexa Taylor, Insurance and Benefits Services Manager, to collect the past due balances. More than \$100,000 of the 2002-2016 shortfalls was collected in 2017.

#### **Pre-Retirement Seminars**

As in years past, the Board sponsored a retirement education session held at the Mission and Resource Center of Greater NJ on March 1, 2018. The pre-retirement seminar focuses on those anticipating retirement within five years. Fifty persons were scheduled to attend. Presentations by Robert Christophel of Wespath Benefits and Investments and a Social Security representative provided valuable guidance to assist retirement planning. Special thanks go to Jennifer Cho for organizing this event. Thanks also to Alexa Taylor, Insurance and Benefits Services Manager, for assisting and providing support.

#### **Health Insurance**

For 2018, the Board continued Active health insurance under HealthFlex, the health insurance plan sponsored by the Wespath Benefits and Investments. The medical provider network is Blue Cross/Blue Shield PPO; the pharmacy benefits are provided through OptumRx. Beginning in 2015, Wespath no longer offers retiree health insurance. The Board implemented United HealthCare's National Medicare Advantage PPO Plan which combines the participants' Medicare A & B, supplemental coverage and Part D prescription plan.

The Board has again provided a contribution to participants' Health Reimbursement Accounts for 2018 of \$1,250 for single and \$2,500 for all other plan types which can be used for qualifying medical expenses (such as co-pays and deductibles). These funds do not expire and are accessed through a MasterCard branded debit card, or via a reimbursement form.

#### Premiums and Remittances

The following chart shows church premium rates in effect for 2018. These rates reflect a Cabinet- requested blended rate for all categories, which the Board has been moving toward for several years, so that health insurance premiums are not a factor in determining clergy appointments.

The Board thanks all churches that fully paid their health insurance premiums in 2017. Overall, churches paid 94% of the total \$3,762,507 health insurance billings, a decrease from the 2016 remittance rate of 96%. The 2017 shortfall was approximately \$220,000. By 2017 year end, the amount owed from years prior to 2017 had been reduced by \$118,059 and the cumulative unpaid health insurance bills had increased to \$3,194,630 owed for years prior to 2017.

Churches failing to fully pay their premiums burden all churches and result in higher health insurance premiums for all. Thanks go to the Conference/BOPHB Treasurer John Cardillo, Benefits Specialist Alison Walsh, and the Cabinet for their continued efforts to collect health insurance arrearages.

The Board and the Conference staff have continued their efforts to ease the continued transitions in healthcare. The Health Insurance Guidelines included in these 2018 Conference Reports and Recommendations have been updated.

### **Annuitant Health Care Liability**

As of the end of 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board FAS 158 liability for annuitant healthcare costs in the amount of \$58 million was posted to the Conference balance sheet. This liability is the estimated present value of the future costs of annuitant healthcare. The Annuitant Health Insurance Contingency Fund described below has been set up to address this large liability over time.

### Annuitant Health Insurance Contingency Fund

In 2002-2003 the Board, recognizing the growing magnitude of annuitant healthcare costs, together with the Centenary Fund, representatives of CFA, the Cabinet and the Association of Retired Ministers and Spouses (ARMS), developed a plan for a long term Annuitant Health Insurance Contingency Fund that begins to offset the liability and ensure that retirees continue to enjoy conference-paid health insurance. The Fund was initiated by the 2003 GNJ Annual Conference and earmarked exclusively for healthcare costs for annuitants to cover higher premium costs expected in future years. The plan for the Fund involves a multi-year period during which excess pre-1982 retirement funds would be used to pay CRSP defined-benefit requirements, and comparable funds from churches would be used to create a permanent retiree health fund. This is a critical initiative since it is clear that the Conference cannot continue to fund retiree health insurance on a cash basis out of the Conference Budget.

As of December 31, 2017, the Annuitant Health Insurance Contingency Fund held a balance of \$7,741,352 after transferring \$630,937 to the Annuitant Health Insurance Account to avoid a negative balance in that account at year-end. In 2017 approximately \$2,159,000 came into the Contingency Fund (representing the 2% clergy and staff salary contributions toward the cost of health insurance) plus the Centenary Fund's annual contribution (in excess of \$300,000, separate from their \$100,000 contribution directly to the Annuitant Health Insurance Account).

### The Board Itself

The Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits endeavors to serve the Conference and the needs of those in ministry. There continues to be much to accomplish, especially in the challenging field of health insurance. Christ strengthens us to meet these challenges and we pray for the Holy Spirit to guide and inspire our actions.

### Religion and Race, Commission on

"Now we got to get this thing right. What is needed is a realization that power without love is reckless and abusive, and that love without power is sentimental and anemic. Power at its best is love implementing the demands of justice, and justice at its best is love correcting everything that stands against love. And this is what we must see as we move on." Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. "Where Do We Go from Here" #MKL50

On April 4, 1968, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated by James Earl Ray while standing on a balcony of the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis, Tenn. A deep sadness and sense of despair hung over the country; acts of civil disobedience ensued in some areas. Later that month, on April 23, 1968, the United Methodist Church would be formed. Recognizing the challenges of race in this country and in this church, the General Commission on Religion and Race was established. Fifty years later we commemorate the life and legacy of Dr. King. Although the country has advanced in many ways, we recognize that we still have a long way to go to achieve the beloved community of which Dr. King spoke. It is my hope and dream that the people called United Methodist will "get this thing right" by leading the fight for justice, modeling the love of Christ and establishing an inclusive community where there is access and equity for all of humanity.

The Greater New Jersey Commission on Religion and Race (GNJ CORR) advances the mandate of the General Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR). "GCORR is the core agency within the United Methodist Church tasked with empowering the Church to pursue racial equity and cultural competency to build a stronger, more vibrant UMC." GNJ CORR is charged with this same task in the Greater New Jersey Conference (GNJ). By promoting full and equal participation of the racial and ethnic constituency in the total life and mission of the church, GNJ CORR seeks to empower clergy and laity to develop transformational leaders and vital congregations.

Appreciation and gratitude is extended to the members and volunteers of GNJ CORR for their diligent work; special commendations to Rev. Danny Thomas who leads the Prison Reentry PaCE group and Rev. Brian Joyce who opened the doors of Trinity UMC for GNJ CORR events.

#### GNJ CORR 2017 activities included:

- Coordinated the Prison Reentry PaCE group under the leadership of Rev. Danny Thomas. "The original scope of the PaCE group to introduce and pilot at least one Station of Hope congregation in the Southern region by end of 2017 was infeasible. ... What we discovered was that for many in our congregations, their employment was based on serving within or supporting of the prison system. We learned that re-entry programs may be easier to launch in areas where the congregation does not have daily service/subordinate contact with prison institutions." The next steps include inviting reentry and criminal justice specialist to speak.
- Developed draft curriculum for 2018 PaCE group, "Christianity, Race and US Law". "This PaCE group will review the intersection, influence and practice of the Christian religion, race and the development of US law as it is related to race, racism and marginalization and/or liberation of racial/ethnic groups. The goal is to understand how past actions have influenced the modern church and to think about methods of effective ministry to heal and make whole a church that has been divided along racial ethnic lines. We will pay particular attention to the influence and activism of Methodism."
- Co-hosted the 2017 Board of Church and Society Annual Conference Dinner "Living Faith, Seeking Justice, Pursuing Peace". The keynote speaker was Rev. Dr. Susan Henry-Crowe, General Secretary of the General Board of Church and Society.
- Participated in the Cultural Competency Taskforce and the leadership address at the Annual Conference. Rev. Wilson spoke about Cultural Competency and the work of the Cultural Competence Task Force.
- Co-wrote "The Uncomfortable Truth: Racism, Injustice, and Poverty in New Jersey", a report sponsored by the Anti-Poverty Network of New Jersey which was released September 2017. Rev. Wilson wrote the preface and was a chapter contributor to this report which examines the intersection of race and poverty.

- Served as a keynote speaker and panelist at the United Methodist Women Fall Meeting; discussed race and religion in South Africa and America from the perspective of an African American visiting the continent of Africa for the first time. Rev. Wilson also discussed feelings of displacement as an African American whose ancestors were victims of the Trans-Atlantic slave trade, as well as the beauty and acceptance that she found in South Africa.
- Facilitated A Wisdom Circle which provided an opportunity for clergy and laity at cross-racial, cross-cultural sites to be in conversation. Dr. Anita Foeman also spoke to this gathering about the DNA Discussion Project. GNJ CORR will host a DNA Discussion Group in 2018.

GNJ CORR looks forward to continuing to serve GNJ through training, consultation, research and advocacy to empower clergy and laity to be able to be an effective witness for Christ in a diverse world.

### Religious Leaders of New Jersey, Coalition of

This past year the Coalition welcomed Cardinal Joseph Tobin as the new Archbishop of the Roman Catholic Arch Diocese of Newark as its newest member. Bishop John Schol and Bishop Mark Beckwith of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark welcomed Cardinal Tobin in his service of installation on behalf of the New Jersey ecumenical community in New Jersey.

The fall meeting of the Coalition was the occasion to meet with the then two candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor Kim Guadagno and the Honorable Phil Murphy. The Coalition will be meeting with Governor Philip Murphy in the spring of 2018. This meeting will enable Coalition members to share their mutual concerns and serves as a moral voice on issues that impact the welfare of the citizens of New Jersey. The fall meeting also launched an effort to seek support from the New Jersey Congressional delegation to support the Dream Act of 2017. Some forty religious leaders in the state, including our Bishop, John Schol, endorsed the statement. The statement reads as follows:

Coalition of Religious Leaders here in The New Jersey expresses their deep concern and opposition to President Trump's plan to phase out the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) Program. We believe that this action is a clear violation of our faith principles of hospitality, compassion and justice. We believe the President's decision to end this program threatens the emotional, social, and economic stability for millions of individuals and tears at the fabric of our country. The young people, who have been protected from deportation by DACA, attend our schools, serve in our military, are members of our faith communities, and make significant contributions to our economy. Their hopes and dreams are no different from the children who are born here and there is no legitimate reason for inflicting this needless suffering on these children. Their only crime, if you even call it that, was that they lovingly and obediently accompanied their parents in pursuit of the dream of freedom and opportunity.

We, the Religious Leaders of New Jersey deeply lament the pain and fear that so many young immigrants are experiencing in the wake of the President's decision to terminate the DACA Program. We condemn this shameful and unacceptable position. We will not stand by as DACA youth, as well as undocumented immigrants, are blamed for the economic and social problems facing our nation.

We call upon members of our New Jersey Congressional delegation to support the Dream Act of 2017 (S 1615/HR 3440). This act will protect almost 800,000 youth who entered the United States as children and know America as their only home. Tens of thousands dreamers call New Jersey home.

Our respective faiths call us to welcome the dreamer, and we stand with them in this moment of time. It is for us a moral imperative that we call upon our representatives in Congress to support the Dream Act of 2017. We call upon our member congregations to pray and advocate for the dreamer and to uphold the dignity of every person and work for the common good. Let us exemplify our best ideals and beliefs.

Our March meeting will be a presentation by Rabbi Irwin Kula, President of the National Jewish Center for Learning and Leadership. Rabbi Kula's presentation will address cultural shifts that are changing faith communities. The Coalition will also host a State Legislative

Leadership Breakfast in June, at the Shiloh Baptist Church in Trenton. Legislative leadership will be addressing critical issues before the State Legislature.

#### Property and Liability Insurance Program of the Board of Trustees

#### 2018 Insurance Renewal:

For the 2018 policy year the Conference has renewed our coverage with Church Mutual Insurance Company. This year's negotiations resulted in a flat cost renewal. Included in the package was a 4% building and contents value increase for all church owned properties. It is critical that we continue to maintain up to date property values. Sovereign Insurance Group has been retained as our Broker for these negotiations. Church Mutual Insurance is the largest insurer of churches in America with over 100,000 house of worship insured. As it relates to United Methodists they insure over 10,000 United Methodist churches across the country. In 2018 the Conference looks forward to further utilizing additional loss control services provided by Church Mutual. That would include things like the use of Drone technology to perform church roof/steeple inspections, and the Nurses Hotline (Medcor) a service offered that allows our churches employees 24/7 access to call a nurse when they are injured to receive preliminary advice on how best to proceed with treatment. All of these initiatives are designed to help our conference control their overall cost of risk.

#### Sensor Program:

As part of our active loss control program the Conference churches have been participating in Church Mutual's CM Sensor program. This program provides 24/7 temperature and water monitoring units free of charge. The sensors themselves alert the local church in the event building temperatures drop or water begins to appear in unexpected areas. There are currently 433 properties eligible for the program and 326 of the sensors are actually installed. Our goal of course would be 100%. In the past 12 months CM Sensor have sent over 700 alerts to participating churches warning of a potential problem! With continued implementation of this program the Conference hopes we can continue to mitigate the claims caused by water damage.

#### Workers' Compensation:

Workers' Compensation coverage is with Church Mutual Insurance Company and is effective January 1, 2018.

#### Automobile Insurance:

The Board of Trustees continues to make available a voluntary automobile insurance program for church-owned vehicles. The 2018 premium cost is overall 3% lower than in 2017. Each church has access to this program and pays the premiums individually.

#### **Claims Experience:**

The 2017 loss experience was extremely good. We had very few significant claims. That certainly had an impact on our positive renewal terms. However, the loss ratio for the 2011 to 2016 policy years is 113% due to several large loss events. The Board of Trustees believes Church Mutual understands the nature of our overall loss experience and is committed to utilizing all available resources to help to control our losses.

#### Billing:

The 2017 billing was the final year of the ten year Parity Plan. For the 2018 renewal there was no cost increase to member churches.

#### Surplus:

The Board of Trustees endeavors to complete each policy year with a positive fund balance. The accumulated surplus is used to cover uncollected premiums, fund cash flow in order to pay insurers timely, assist in payments for uninsured or underinsured losses and to pay deductible differentials. Surplus is also potentially needed to offset future rate increases that might arise due to adverse loss experience.

#### Summary:

The Board of Trustees encourages each church to take advantage of the assistance available through Sovereign Insurance (800-222-4478), the Conference insurance program's broker.

Additionally, they oversee the actions needed to be taken in reference to churches and parsonages that have been closed, representative of formal action taken at prior Annual Conferences. Six cemeteries are also under the care of Trustees.

Some items of note as a result of Trustee action taken during the 2018 Conference Year:

-Seven of the closed churches have been sold in accordance with the Annual Conference action leaving fourteen left. The original number was twenty five.

The Trustees are privileged to work with, and receive the cooperation of, many individuals and groups throughout the Conference. The counsel which is offered to the Board from Conference Chancellors Lynn Caterson, Esq. and Sanford Brown, Esq. is invaluable. John Cardillo, Conference Treasurer and Director of Administrative Services, serves as Treasurer of the Board Alex Mayer, Property Manager and Beverly Schol Assistant Property Manager serve as staff liaisons to the Board. As a result of their guidance and expertise in reference to overall financial resources of the GNJAC and specifically the funds which the Board oversees, the Trustees are better equipped to prioritize and responsibly address the needs of the various properties. The Conference Trustees are also grateful for the opportunity to work more closely with Bishop Schol and the Cabinet during the course of this Conference year.

#### **Brief History:**

- Created in 1992 by action of the 135th Session of the Northern Annual Conference, with the first investment made by the Conference.
- In 2000, became the UMF of Greater NJ after the merger of the Southern and Northern Conferences.
- Wespath Investment Management became the Investment Manager in August 2015.
- As of the end of 2016, the amount of investment in the foundation was \$36 MM.

#### Developments in 2017:

- The Foundation hired Reverend Jana Purkis-Brash as the full time Executive Director on July 1, 2017. Under her leadership, the focus of the Foundation now is three fold to increase conference wide fund raising especially by providing planned giving opportunities; to assist congregational giving campaigns by providing stewardship education; and to provide socially responsible investment opportunities for congregations and conference mission organizations.
- Additional Foundation staff were also hired to complete the team Brian Mickle as Director of Development and Alison Aiello as Administrative Assistant.
- Jana and Brian made over 30 presentations at churches throughout the Conference explaining the work of the Stewardship Foundation.
- As of the end of December 2017, the investment balance invested with the Foundation totaled \$44.1 MM

#### Plans and Goals for 2018:

The Foundation continues to enjoy excellent investment returns through Wespath. We urge everyone to spread the word so more of our

churches and partner organizations whose missions align with Methodist principles will invest and grow through the Foundation. A very important goal for the Foundation in 2018 is to increase our Planned Giving capabilities. The initial focus is to be in a position to offer Donor Advised Funds by September 2018.

#### **United Methodist Women**

The Greater New Jersey United Methodist Women had a productive and spirit-filled year. In January, we sent nine new officers to the Leadership Development Days, in Charlotte, NC. Women from all over the United States and the world came there to be trained in their various leadership roles, to worship together, and to bond in spirit as United Methodist Women. Our theme this year was baptism, and "Wade in the Water'" became the theme song! This was the beginning of the assault by the current administration on immigration and turning back, without notification, peoples that had previous to this time had been in United States. Many of our number went to the Charlotte International Airport to protest this deportation of peoples from predominately Muslim countries.

March saw us at the Camden County Boathouse in Pennsauken, NJ to raise money for the teen program of the Camden Neighborhood Center at the 104th Winter Gala!! The Gala will be held this year at the Tavistock Country Club, Haddonfield, NJ, March 10, 2018 at 6 pm. The GNJ United Methodist Women and the GNJ Conference are proud major supporters of this Center that works to offer lunches and Bible study to seniors, daycare for toddlers, and an after-school teen program. A recent addition to their programing is the wonderful, ecumenically sponsored garden plot on their property that raises the vegetables for the lunch program during the summer camps for children of all ages.

Our spring program entitled "Economic Justice" was held at First United Methodist Church in Moorestown, NJ on April 1, 2017. Our UM missionaries Dr. Emmanuel Mefor and his wife Florence were our speakers during the worship. They showed a PowerPoint presentation and video of their work in Zimbabwe. Our speaker for the presentation on Economic Justice was Vicar Serena Rice, former director of the NJ Anti-Poverty Task Force. She discussed the prophetic wisdom of Amos 5: 24, "let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream," and compared this with the behavior of Jesus as described in Matthew. Jesus embodies God's justice in his relationships with others. Matt. 7: 12 "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you."

We co-sponsored Mission "u" with the GNJ Conference, offering 4 courses, including a weekend session at Georgian Court University at Lakewood, NJ July 14-16, and a day session at the Arcola UMC, Paramus July 22. There was also an active youth contingent at Georgian Court. Dean Rev. Dr. Rich Hendrickson ably coordinated the team that brought the school together. Grace Pugh Hubbard and Maria Sottile led us in music and praise. Millie Grey, Assistant Dean, designed a stunning candlelight worship service at Lakewood. The issue of The Missionary Conferences of the United States was one of the workshop topics. The spiritual growth study, living as a Convenant Community by Evy McDonald, was offered at both venues. This study examined the scriptural meaning of covenants with application for the modern church.

Our fall meeting was held October 21, 2017 at the Mission Resource Center in Neptune, NJ where our theme was "Racial Justice." Rev. Vanessa Wilson used the voice of Jerimiah and words from Lamentations 5:1-5 and 19-21 for her sermon entitled "I Am Here, Remember Me?" She discussed her trip to South Africa as part of her Drew Theological training requirement, a student cross-cultural experience. She experienced "Sawubona, Yebo Sikhona,"which translates to "I see you, I give you permission to see me." As a descendant of slaves from Africa, this was a very meaningful experience for her. She contrasted the disparity in education, wealth, and criminal justice in South Africa and the United States. Vanessa's group stayed in Johannesburg, but only 20 minutes away in Soweto, there was no running water or indoor plumbing. The ministry of remembering is important, remembering our history. The panel discussion that followed was a discussion on The Charter for Racial Justice. This was moderated by Janis Rosheuval, former Executive Secretary for Racial Justice with the United Methodist Women. Following lunch, the business meeting of GNJUMW was held, and 6 new officers were installed.

To wrap up the year, 11 officers attended the Leadership Development Days Training in Tempe, AZ, Nov. 17-19, 2017. Pat Schutz (Skylands District Co-President), Yvonne Bouknight, our GNJUMW member of the Program Advisory Group of United Methodist Women, and myself, Kathy Schulz (GNJUMW President), all went out a day early so that we could participate in a training event to help our UMW population in the Conference and the District understand and become better educated to have conversations around "Commission on A Way Forward." This plan was written by the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church. It details the "Mission, the Vision and the Scope" in their statement on how the church should expand its awareness to deal with the issue of LBGTQ community and inclusion of these persons in all aspects of the United Methodist Church. This Commission of Bishops will be bringing their report to the Special Session of General Conference in Feb. 2019. Our goal, as United Methodist Women, is to engage 50% of our membership in meaningful

and open conversations concerning this issue, which is one of many issues that, over the years, has threatened to divide the United Methodist Church. We are holding these conversations in district and conference events.

Our newest trainee, Betty Sayner, the Skylands District Treasurer, wrote a wonderful summary of her experience at this Leadership Development Days in Tempe. I will quote just a few lines to let you understand the scope and direction of the United Methodist Women: "As I reflect on the time (at the LDD in Tempe, AZ), I don't just miss the palm trees and cactuses! I am left with a powerful image of cardboard boxes that were used to build a big wall. The wall was set up just inside of the conference center where we attended trainings and participated in worship. The boxes had handwritten messages on them that described the walls that have been built up in our world today: roadblocks to citizenship for those who are undocumented, barriers to affordable health care and mental health services, the school to prison pipeline that often exists in communities of color, mass incarceration, white privilege, homophobia, transphobia, islamophobia, obstacles to living wages, a lack of quality maternal and child health care, and impediments to environmental justice. On Sunday morning, this wall that had been built up was dismantled and turned into a table, complete with tablecloth and place settings. The image is a powerful metaphor for the work that United Methodist Women is doing, as they put faith, hope, and love into action to support women, children and youth all around the world. Empowered by education about the walls that exist and what we can do about them, and powered by the generous donations of individuals and local UMW units, walls all over are becoming tables. ...I am grateful for the work of all the United Methodist Women who have come before me and for the hope that UMW gives me about our future."

As I look back over our year in mission, I could not envision a better team of women or a more loyal group of United Methodist Women to work with! We have grown closer to each other and to God on this walk to make the world better and to protect women, children and youth.

We wish to thank Bishop John Schol for his work with us, and Joanne Sullivan for coordinating our visits to the GNJC Mission Resource Center and making sure that all the bells and whistles are working!! We are, as always, so grateful for the musical accompaniment of our spring and fall meetings by Grace Pugh Hubbard, our guardian angel musician!





<u>CLERGY/LAITY SEXUAL MISCONDUCT, ABUSE AND HARASSMENT POLICY FOR THE GREATER NEW JERSEY ANNUAL</u> <u>CONFERENCE</u> (Approved at the 2009 Annual Conference)

All references to the *Book of Discipline* are in the 2008 edition. Paragraph numbers are for easy reference and may change with future editions of *The Book of Discipline*. Unless there are substantive changes to the content of the *Book of Discipline*, the Policy will be updated to reflect the current *Book of Discipline* as editorial changes without the need to re-approve the Policy. Future name changes of Greater NJ Annual Conference will also be updated as editorial changes.

#### I. Context

For the purpose of this policy, we will use "clergy" or "clergyperson" to refer to all ordained, commissioned, consecrated, licensed local pastor, supply pastor and Certified Lay Minister.

#### II. Purpose

Clergy are in a position of great trust, power and responsibility. This provides the opportunity for unique relationships of grace and caring. While most clergy remain faithful to their vows and their covenant with God and the church, there are clergy who sometimes violate the trust given them. Sexual misconduct is one grave violation of this trust. We also acknowledge that laypersons can engage in acts of sexual misconduct, abuse and /or harassment. This policy seeks to address the abuse of power by all clergy and laity who engage in sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or sexual harassment. (See Section IV for definitions)

Incidents of sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment have been reported in United Methodist Churches, agencies, and institutions. It is both the ethical and legal responsibility of the Annual Conference to ensure that there are mechanisms for addressing grievances in these matters. The intent of this document is to provide guidance to both laity and clergy of the Annual Conference, and to the local churches contained therein regarding clergy/lay sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment.

It is our hope, as the people of Christ that this policy will help serve to guard against inappropriate behavior and be a guide for our community of faith as we seek to handle grievances should sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment occur.

#### III. Theological Foundation

All persons are created by God. In the Genesis stories, as in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, it is affirmed that we are created in the image and likeness of God. God values human life, intending all women, men, and children to have worth and dignity in all relationships with God and others. God calls us into covenant with each other as children of God and as the body of Christ. The scriptures remind us that Jesus was sent into this world that we might experience whole relationships with each other and God. "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3: 28 RSV)

We affirm that our human bodies are good gifts from God and our sexuality is an integral part of our humanity. Healthy sexuality, and appropriate expressions of it, are derived from the goodness of the gift. As children of God, we are holy in Christ and created equal. Where one is injured, physically, emotionally or spiritually, all are rendered less than God's intended wholeness. Sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment is an exploitation of power and abuse of position that uses sexuality as an excuse and distorts the relationships and blessedness of relationships and the upbuilding which God desires for humanity. It is sinful behavior.

One who repents for sinful behavior is promised forgiveness. However, discipline should be distinguished from forgiveness. A clergyperson guilty of sexual misconduct needs and may receive forgiveness and be offered avenues for redemption and change. Forgiveness, however, does not excuse one from responsibility to the community and accountability for the brokenness caused by one's behavior. The church must still take steps to protect the people of God.

#### IV. Definitions

#### Sexual Misconduct

It is sexual misconduct when a person within a ministerial role of leadership (pastor, educator, counselor, youth leader or other position of leadership) engages in sexual contact or sexualized behavior with a congregant, client, employee, student, staff member, co-worker, or volunteer within the ministerial relationship. (1996 *Book of Resolutions*, pp. 128-132, 2008 *Book of Resolutions* p.134)

Examples of ministerial relationships:

- Pastor/member of church
- Supervisor/church employee
- Youth pastor/youth

- Sunday School teacher/student
- Pastor/student intern
- Pastoral counselor/counseled

Examples of sexualized behavior or sexual contact:

- Displaying sexually suggestive visuals
- Making sexual comments or innuendos about one's own or another person's body
- Touching another person's body, hair, or clothing
- Touching or rubbing oneself sexually in the presence of another person
- Kissing; fondling; sexual intercourse

This understanding is equally applicable in the context of ministries in which there are no "parishioners" but there is a community which acknowledges the authority of the clergyperson or lay worker as a spiritual leader or other ministries in which the ministering person serves a community much wider than the membership of the local congregation.

At the core of this definition of sexual misconduct is the abuse of power and trust that occurs when a ministering person initiates or allows sexual behavior with someone who is in a relationship of trust and/or dependence. Sexual misconduct breaks a sacred trust. Any such sexual misconduct is a violation by the ministering person who then bears the responsibility for his/her behavior.

#### Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment is any unwanted sexual advance or demand, either verbal or physical that is reasonably perceived by the recipient as demeaning, intimidating, or coercive. Sexual harassment must be understood as an exploitation of a power relationship rather than as an exclusively sexual issue. Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, the creation of a hostile or abusive working environment resulting from discrimination on the basis of gender. (1996 *Book of Discipline* ¶161.1, p.101, 2008 *Book of Discipline* ¶161.1, p.104)

Suggested guidelines for determining hostile environment:

- Is the behavior sexual in nature or gender specific?
- Is the behavior unwelcome?
- Is the behavior severe or pervasive enough so that it creates an environment which interferes with one's ability to work, get an education, or participate in ministry?

Sexual harassment also includes the development or attempted development of a sexual or romantic relationship between a clergyperson or lay worker and a person with whom he/she has a ministerial relationship, when that is an unwanted or inappropriate relationship.

#### Sexual Abuse

Sexual abuse is a sexual invasion of the body by force. Sexual abuse may be: rape, sexual assault, incest, indecent exposure, statutory rape, indecent assault, and aggravated indecent assault. Sexual abuse is also an internal assault, a deliberate violation of emotional integrity, and a hostile and degrading act of violence.

#### Domestic Violence

#### **Domestic Violence Policy**

It is not enemies who taunt me—I could bear that: It is not adversaries who deal insolently with me—I could hide from them. But it is you, my equal, my companion, my familiar friend, with whom I keep pleasant company. Psalm 55: 12-14a NRSV.

The Psalmist captures the feelng of many victims of domestic violence: the pain of being betrayed and injured by a loved one.

#### What is Domestic Violence?

Any abusive, violent, coercive, forceful, or threatening act or word inflicted by one member of a family or household on another can constitute domestic violence.

The United Methodist Church affirms the sacredness of all persons and their right to safety, nurture and care. It names domestic violence and sexual abuse as sin and pledges to work for their eradication. *2008 Book of Resolution*, p.59. Thus, we recognize domestic violence as an immoral act and a chargeable offense for both clergy and laity. 2008 *Book of Discipline*,¶ 2702.1 and ¶ 2702.3

We celebrate God's gift of intimacy, the image of God in each person, the inherent right of each person to health, wholeness, and safety, and we commit ourselves to working toward the elimination of domestic violence.

#### V. Standards for Clergy Conduct

- A. Clergy related to the Annual Conference are always accountable for the ways they respond to persons who ask their ministerial assistance and over whom they have authority. Any breach of this ministerial relationship, ministerial responsibility, and ministerial authority is abusive and unethical.
- B. Clergy often relate to persons who are fragile and vulnerable, and therefore must exercise special care:
  - 1. That clergy are psychologically, emotionally, and spiritually healthy.
  - 2. That there has been proper and adequate preparation and education as well as adequate continuing education for providing appropriate help for those under their care.
  - 3. That they seek counsel, advice, and supervision.
  - 4.
- C. Clergy sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment places an unfair and unavoidable burden on the victim of such conduct. It is in the best interest of the entire church to inform the laity concerning appropriate standards of ministerial conduct.
- D. Clergy self-discipline requires self-awareness and takes for a standard of ethics those implied and described in the vows of ordination and consecration. (1996, *Book of Discipline*, ¶301-¶365) Personal integrity and mature professional conduct are a part of every ministerial relationship. This prohibits any sexual behavior with a parishioner, colleague, staff, or client entrusted to his or her sacred care.
- E. All clergy have the responsibility for developing healthy and ethical relationships with other persons. Married clergy have covenanted to nurture and maintain a faithful marital relationship. The covenant also reminds single clergy that dating relationships must maintain full attention to sexual conduct as understood in Christian teaching and the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. (1996 *Book of Discipline*, **¶**65)
- F. When clergy are providing professional pastoral counseling to persons in their church or community, it is understood that they shall keep appropriate standards of professional behavior and boundaries in that relationship. It is also recommended that clergy seek supervision for their counseling by a certified counselor supervisor to ensure that proper counseling relationships are maintained.

#### VI. Standards for the Conduct of Laity

Within the United Methodist connection, lay persons are also called to a standard of conduct which stands against sexual misconduct, abuse and/or harassment as outlined in 2008 *Book of Discipline* ¶2702.3. Laity have the responsibility for not creating hostile environments as a result of sexual harassment, abuse and/or sexual misconduct against clergypersons or other laity. (*Book of Discipline* ¶ 605.8)

#### VII. Honoring Perceptions of Reality

We understand that intentions and perceptions are not always the same. It is our policy to treat seriously a person's perception of the truth of their experience if/when sexual harassment, abuse, and/or misconduct are reported.

#### VIII. Confidentiality

The primary purpose of this policy is to encourage and support victims of sexual harassment, abuse, and/or misconduct to report such incidents, by providing a process that protects them from intimidation and preserves their dignity. We recognize that there also may be occasions when persons are falsely charged with sexual harassment, abuse and/or misconduct. In either case, it is of the utmost importance that confidentiality be assured for both the victim and the accused, and that advocates, church officials and others who may be involved in the process take every reasonable and legal precaution to honor the issue of confidentiality.

Some instances of sexual harassment can be resolved easily and informally between parties. In all other instances, misconduct of a sexual nature or abuse within the local church should be reported to a Contact Person for sexual harassment and abuse. If the conduct involves a clergy person, the complainant may consider filing a written complaint and/or speaking with a District Superintendent.

#### IX. Compassionate Advocates

The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church provides the following support system to assist any individual who has a concern about an issue of sexual misconduct, harassment, or abuse with the church.

Listed at the end of this document are Compassionate Advocates trained by the Annual Conference and who will provide immediate support and direction for persons who feel that they have been sexually abused or harassed. Compassionate Advocates will explain policy and procedure and will provide confidential guidance throughout the process and respect confidentiality. Compassionate Advocates will be available for the complainant, the accused and the church.

We urge all related institutions/agencies in the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference to identify and train Compassionate Advocates to serve within their organization.

#### X. Process

The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference will adhere to the following steps when an accusation of sexual misconduct, harassment or abuse is brought to the attention of a District Superintendent:

- 1. A letter shall be provided to both the complainant and the accused at the time they first contact or are contacted by the District Superintendent. These letters are included in this policy as *Appendix A*.
- 2. Limit all media responses on behalf of the Church/Conference to the Bishop or the Bishop's designate.
- 3. If the complainant chooses to file a written complaint, the process will proceed as indicated in the 1996 *Book of Discipline*, section XIV ¶358, 2008 *Book of Discipline* section XV ¶ 361.
- 4. A complainant has the option of following church policy and discipline when bringing a complaint of sexual misconduct against a pastor. They also have the option of seeking legal advice and filing charges.
- 5. Any incidence of sexual abuse in which the victim is a minor is a crime and must be handled appropriately. Anyone within the church who becomes aware of a child abuse issue is morally—for clergy, legally required—obligated to take steps necessary in the attempt to prevent further harm to the child. If an incident of child abuse occurs involving a church employee or volunteer within the church building or at any church activity, or if a minor brings forth a complaint of sexual abuse it must be reported to the local authorities.

The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference recognizes that accusations of misconduct of a sexual nature can be harmful to the whole congregation. The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference will provide support to the church affected by these accusations by providing guidance from the Leadership Advocacy Team and counsel in the form of a response team.

#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

We have audited the accompanying unconsolidated financial statements of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church (the Conference), a nonprofit organization, which comprise the unconsolidated statement of financial position as of December 31, 2017, and the related unconsolidated statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the unconsolidated financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these unconsolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### NOTES TO THE UNCONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2017

# 1. Organization:

Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church (the Conference) is an integral part of the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. Each member church in the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference supports the operating budget and, in addition, makes contributions or grants to the Conference's and General Conference's missions and programs. Investment revenue and program revenue also support the activities of the Conference.

The Conference is exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

# 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

(a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Conference have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

(b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, the Conference considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

(c) Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at fair values based on quoted prices in active markets (national security exchanges) for identical assets, with gains and losses included in the statement of activities. Donated investments are reflected as contributions at their fair values at date of receipt.

(d) Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debt expense and an adjustment to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable.

(e) Firm Pledges

Firm pledges are recognized as income in the year for which the pledge is made. Pledges that are expected to be received within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Pledges that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-free interest rates applicable to the year in which the pledges are received. Amortization of the discount is included in contribution

### (e) Firm Pledges (continued)

revenue. The Conference uses the allowance method to determine uncollectible receivables. An allowance for uncollectible pledges is estimated based upon management's judgment and includes factors such as prior collection history.

### (f) Land, Buildings and Equipment

Depreciable assets over \$5,000 are recorded at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation is recorded on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives as follows:

Buildings	25 - 40 years
Equipment, furniture and fixtures	4 - 10 years

Property and equipment are reviewed each year for impairment or whenever events or changes in business circumstances indicate carrying value of the assets may not be recoverable. Impairment losses are recognized if expected future cash flows from the assets are less than their carrying values. No impairment losses were recognized during the year ended December 31, 2017.

# (g) Post-retirement Benefits

The Conference has adopted FASB ASC 715, Compensation – Retirement Benefits which requires that the funded status of defined benefit pensions and other postretirement benefit plans be fully recognized in the statement of financial position.

# (h) Net Assets

The net assets of the Conference and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted net assets include all resources which are not subject to donor imposed restrictions of a more specific nature than those which only obligate the Conference to utilize funds in furtherance of its mission.

Temporarily restricted net assets carry specific, donor-imposed restrictions on the expenditure or other use of contributed funds. Temporary restrictions may expire either because certain actions are taken by the Conference which fulfill the restrictions or because of the passage of time. Expirations of temporary restrictions on net assets (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets.

## 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies: (continued)

### (h) Net Assets (continued)

Permanently restricted net assets are those that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions which will never lapse, thus requiring that the funds be permanently retained. Generally, the donors of these funds permit the organization to use all or part of the income earned on related investments, and the net capital appreciation thereon, for general or specific purposes.

### (i) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities and reported amounts of revenues and expenses in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from these estimates

# (j) Prior-Year Summarized Comparative Information

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Conference's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2016, from which the summarized information was derived.

# (k) Reclassification

Certain accounts in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform to the presentation of the current-year financial statements.

Agency relationship funds totaling \$324,806 have been reclassified from non apportioned revenue line and other disbursements line on the statements of activities. Administrative expenses totaling \$432,782 have been reclassified out of other disbursements and other revenue lines to administrative expense line.

Unreimbursed pension and health insurance expense of \$2,219,784 has been reclassified out of other revenue and is reported in the statement of activities as a separate line.

\*The Conference invests in the Multiple Asset Fund, a mutual fund managed by Wespath, that has as its objective to attain current income and capital appreciation by investing in a broad mix of different types of investments. The strategy of the mutual fund is to invest in four other Wespath mutual funds to maintain an investment allocation of approximately 40% U.S. equity, 25% international equity, 25% fixed income, and 10% inflation protection. The asset allocation will be rebalanced periodically when holding falls outside of a 3% tolerance

## 4. Fair Value Measurements:

The Conference reports its fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy defined by generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements).

The three levels as of the fair value hierarchy under GAAP are:

- Level 1 Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the asset or liability;
- Level 3 Prices or valuation techniques that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable (that is, inputs supported by little or no market activity

# 9. Conference Board of Pensions:

Effective January 1, 2007, the Conference adopted the Clergy Retirement Security Program which had been established by the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. This plan supersedes and replaces the provisions of the prior plans. The church contribution rate under the Clergy Retirement Security Program is 12.50% of the active participant's plan compensation for a plan year. The 2017 church contribution rates under the Comprehensive Protection Plan are 3% for full-time clergy, 3.4% for less-than-full-time (3/4 and 1/2 time), and 4.4% for optional coverage (1/4 time or leave status.)

Under the provisions of the plans, the Conference is required to maintain an amount in its Deposit Account sufficient to provide for the monthly transfer of the church contributions on behalf of its active participants.

# 10. **Defined Contribution Plan:**

Effective January 1, 1975, the Conference adopted a contributory pension plan for lay employees, covering all full-time employees electing to participate. Under this plan the Conference will contribute 6% of each participant's annual salary, and the participants will contribute an additional 3% of all past earnings of eligible employees.

# 11. Multiemployer Defined Pension Plan:

The Conference contributes to three multiemployer defined benefit pension plans - the Pre-82 Plan, the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), and the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP). The Conference does not directly manage these multiemployer plans, which are managed by The General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits of The United Methodist Church. A majority of the Conference's employees are participants in one of these multiemployer plans as of December 31, 2017, subject to eligibility requirements.

# 11. Multiemployer Defined Pension Plan: (continued)

Each of these plans is organized as a nonelecting, noncontributory multiemployer church retirement plan, and therefore the plans are not subject to certain reporting requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended. The plans' certified zone statuses are not available since the plans are not subject to ERISA reporting requirements.

The risks of participating in a multiemployer plan are different from a single employer plan in the following aspects: (1) assets contributed to the multiemployer plan by one employer may be used to provide benefits to employees of other participating employers; (2) if a participating employer stops contributing to the plan, the unfunded obligations of the plan may be borne by the remaining participating employers; (3) if an employer chooses to stop participating in a multiemployer plan, the company may be required to pay the plan an amount based on the underfunded status of the plan, referred to as a withdrawal liability. If a plan were to terminate, if participants voluntarily withdrew or there was a mass withdrawal, the Conference may also be required to make additional payments to the plan for its proportionate share of underfunded liabilities.

The plans' accumulated benefit obligations are determined annually by the plans' actuary. Significant actuarial assumptions utilized for the Pre-82 Plan include a discount rate of 6.625%, an expected rate of investment return of 6.625%, and an expected rate of salary increase of 1.68%. Significant actuarial assumptions utilized for the CRSP include a discount rate of 7%, an expected rate of investment return of 7%, and an annual cost of living benefit increase of 2.5%. Significant actuarial assumptions utilized for the MPP include a discount rate of 6.25%, and expected rate of investment return of 6.25%, and an annual cost of living benefit increase of 2.5%.

Plan assets for CRSP are invested in Multiple Asset Fund (MAF). The MAF is a mark-to-market fund with a target mix of asset classes of 10% Inflation Protection Fund, 25% Fixed Income Funds, 35% U.S. Equity Fund and 30% International Equity Fund. Actual allocation may vary slightly.

Assets supporting MPP Annuities are invested at Wespath with an overall target of 50% fixed income, 30% equities and 20% alternative investment. Actual allocation may vary slightly. The specific funds employed are the Fixed Income Fund, the Inflation Protection Funds, the Positive Social Purpose Lending Funds, the U.S. Equity Funds, the International Equity Funds, and the Special Opportunities Fund.

Plan assets for Pre-82 Plan were invested with a target mix of assets: 33% U.S. Equity Funds, 28% International Equity Funds, 28% Fixed Income Fund and 11% Inflation Projection Fund. Actual allocation may vary slightly.

At January 1, 2017, Pre-82 plan was funded 96.80%, MPP was funded 79.24% and CRSP was funded 66.2%.

### 12. Post-Retirement Benefit Obligation:

The Conference's post-retirement health care benefit plan provides health insurance coverage to employees with 20 years of service who retire directly from active service at or after the age of 62. Married employees eligible for the plan will also have coverage for their spouse. Upon an eligible retiree's death, spousal coverage continues for the spouse's lifetime.

Effective July 1, 2002 a person becoming an annuitant after July 1, 2002 with less than 20 years of annuity credit in the United Methodist Church at retirement shall share in the cost of the premium. The annuitant's share shall be 5% times the number of full years by which the annuity credit is less than 20.

Effective July 1, 2003 for an annuitant under the age of 65 commencing benefits after July 1, 2003, the Conference shall contribute an amount equal to the coverage cost of a Medicare-eligible annuitant, prorated for service years less than 20.

#### 15. Endowment:

The Conference's endowment consists of approximately 14 individual funds established for a variety of purposes. Its endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Council on Finance and Administration to function as endowments. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Council on Finance and Administration to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

#### Relevant Law

The Council on Finance and Administration of the Conference has interpreted the New Jersey State's Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Conference classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets are classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Conference considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- (1) The duration and preservation of the fund
- (2) The purposes of the organization and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- (3) General economic conditions
- (4) The possible effect of inflation and deflation
- (5) The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- (6) Other resources of the organization
- (7) The investment policies of the organization.

## 15. Endowment: (continued)

### Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Conference has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the organization must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Council on Finance and Administration, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that exceed the price and yield results of the S&P 500 index while assuming a moderate level of investment risk. The Conference expects its endowment funds, over time, to provide an average rate of return of approximately 6.5 percent annually. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount.

# Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Conference relies on a total return strategy in which investments returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Conference targets a diversified asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

# Spending Policy and How the Investment Objectives Relate to Spending Policy

The Conference has a policy of appropriating for expenditure 5% of the average fair value of each respective endowment. The Organization expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment funds to grow at a minimal average rate of 5% annually. This is consistent with the Organization's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts and investment return.

Expenses are charged to program and supporting services on the basis on periodic time and expense studies. Allocation of expenses for the year ending December 31, 2017 and 2016, is as follows:

### 17. Income Taxes:

The Conference is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and application state law.

The accounting standards on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes address the determination of whether tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded in the financial statements. Under that guidance, the Conference may recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more likely than not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by taxing authorities based on the technical merits of the position. Examples of tax positions include the tax-exempt status of the Conference and various position related to the potential sources of unrelated business taxable income (UBIT). The tax benefits recognized in the financial statements from a tax position are measured based on the largest benefit that has a greater than 50% likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement. There were no unrecognized tax benefits identified or recorded as liabilities for fiscal year 2017 and 2016.

The Conference is not required to file a federal form 990 because it is an integrated auxiliary of a church. Therefore, the Conference has voluntarily elected not to file a federal form 990 since its inception and for that reason; the statute of limitations has not started to expire for IRS examination of income tax issues.

The Conference provides administrative services to various related organizations. The payments received and in-kind services provided in 2017 are as follows:

The New Jersey Episcopal office of the United Methodist Church maintains a verbal agreement with the Conference to occupy office space. The lease is on a month-to-month basis. In 2017, the related rental revenue totaled \$12,000.

The Conference subsidizes a part of The Episcopal Office's administrative expenses. In 2017, the Episcopal Office received an allotment from the Conference of \$141,678.

At December 31, 2017, the Conference had a receivable from The Episcopal Office amounting to \$79,660.

# 19. Beneficial Interest in Trust:

Under the terms of the perpetual trust, the Conference has the irrevocable right to receive the income earned on the trust asset in perpetuity, but never receive the asset held in trust. The Conference has recorded the asset at the estimated fair value of the Conference's share of the beneficial interest in trust assets. Distributions from the trust assets are recorded as unrestricted investment income in the accompanying statement of activities unless restricted by the donor. #### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2017

#### 1. Organization, Contributions and Benefits:

The Centenary Fund and Preachers' Aid Society of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church (the Fund) was founded to serve the needs of retired clergy, widows and dependent children of deceased clergy. The Fund is exempt from income tax as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### 2. Summary of significant Accounting Policies:

The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

(a) Accrual Basis Financial Statements

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis and conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and in accordance with the principles of not-for-profit accounting.

(b) Net Assets

The net assets of the Fund and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

- Unrestricted net assets include all resources which are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions of a more specific nature than those which only obligate the Fund to utilize funds in furtherance of its mission.
- Temporarily restricted net assets carry specific, donor-imposed restrictions on the expenditure or other use of contributed funds. Temporary restrictions may expire either because certain actions are taken by the Fund which fulfill the restrictions or because of the passage of time. Expirations of temporary restrictions on net assets (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets.
- Permanently restricted net assets are those that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions which will never lapse, thus requiring that the funds be permanently retained. Generally, the donors of these funds permit the organization to use all or part of the income earned on related investments, and the net capital appreciation thereon, for general or specific purposes.

#### (c) Prior-Year summarized Comparative Information

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total, but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the organization's financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2016, from which the summarized information was derived.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2017

#### 2. Summary of significant Accounting Policies: (continued)

#### (d) Contributions

Contributions are recorded as revenue upon receipt of cash or unconditional promises to give (pledges). Contributions are considered available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

#### (e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash includes checking, savings and money market accounts. Certificates of deposit with maturity of three months or less when purchased are considered to be cash equivalents. Money market funds held by brokers for investment purposes are classified as investments.

#### (f) Investments and Investment Income

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at fair value based on quoted prices in active markets (national securities exchanges) for identical assets, with gains and losses included in the statement of activities. Donated investments are reflected as contributions at their fair value at date of receipt.

#### (g) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from their estimates.

#### (h) Reclassification

Expenses classified as health insurance support totaling \$11,813 in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified as retired ministers support for comparative purposes to conform to the presentation in the current-year financial statements.

#### 3. Investments:

Investments at fair value, by type, are summarized as follows at December 31, 2017:

The Fund invests in the Multiple Asset Fund, a mutual fund managed by Wespath that has as its objective to attain current income and capital appreciation by investing in a broad mix of different types of investments. The strategy of the mutual fund is to invest in four other Wespath mutual funds to maintain an investment allocation of approximately 40% U.S. equity, 25% international equity, 25% fixed income, and 10% inflation protection. The asset allocation will be rebalanced periodically when holding falls outside of a 3% tolerance.

#### 4. Fair Value Measurements:

The Fund reports its fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy defined by generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under GAAP are:

- Level 1 Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term of the asset or liability;
- Level 3 Prices or valuation techniques that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable (that is, inputs supported by little or no market activity).

There are no unfunded commitments associated with the Mutual Fund (fund of funds), nor are there any significant restrictions on the Centenary Fund's ability to sell these investments. Additionally, there are no circumstances under which the investments would not be redeemable. Redemption of \$2 million or more may take up to 15 business days to process.

### 5. Unrestricted Net Assets:

#### (a) *Donation Base*

Donation base net assets represent the cumulative balance of gifts made to the Fund designated for long-term investment.

#### (b) Distribution Fund:

Distribution fund net assets represent the cumulative investment return net of the Fund's expenses. Distribution fund net assets are expendable for the Fund's charitable purpose.

#### 6. Related Parties:

Administrative services are provided by the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

#### 7. Cash Flow Information:

No liabilities for income taxes or interest expense were incurred or paid for the year ended December 31, 2017.

#### 8. Income Taxes:

The Fund is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state law.

The accounting standards on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes address the determination of whether tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded in the financial statements. Under that guidance, the fund may recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more likely than not that the tax positions will be sustained on examination by taxing authorities based on the technical merits of the position. Examples of tax positions include the tax-exempt status of the Fund and various position related to the potential sources of unrelated business taxable income (UBIT). The tax benefits recognized in the financial statements from a tax position are measured based on the largest benefit that has a greater than 50% likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement. There were no unrecognized tax benefits identified or recorded as liabilities for fiscal year 2017 and 2016.

The Fund has not filed IRS Form 990 in recent years since its inception because it is exempt from filing as an integrated auxiliary of a church. Therefore, the statute of limitations has not started to expire for IRS examination of income tax issues.

#### 9. Subsequent Events:

In preparing these financial statements, the Fund has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through July 6, 2018, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

**Plan Overview**: The Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) retirement program providing lifetime income and account flexibility designed for those who serve as clergy of The United Methodist Church. The plan is designed to provide participants with one portion of their overall retirement benefits. CRSP replaced the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) effective January 1, 2007.

CRSP consists of two components:

- A defined benefit (DB) plan--provides a monthly benefit at retirement based upon years of credited service to the Church
- A defined contribution (DC) plan--provides a retirement account balance established and funded by the annual conferences

# Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP)

**Plan Overview**: Supplement Three to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church from 1982 through 2006. MPP is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) retirement plan. MPP requires that exactly 65% of the account balance must be annuitized when it is to be distributed. The remainder may be rolled over to UMPIP, another qualified plan or an IRA, or paid in a lump sum.

# Pre-82 Plan (Pre-82)

**Plan Overview:** Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Pre-82 Plan, provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church prior to 1982. The Pre-82 Plan was replaced by MPP effective January 1, 1982. If a clergyperson retires within the conference (and does not terminate), the minimum benefit payable is based on two factors:

- 1) Years of service with pension credit--approved by each conference on the recommendation of the Conference Board of Pensions (CBOP) in accordance with plan provisions and The Book of Discipline.
- 2) The conference pension rate (past service rate)--the dollar amount chosen by the conference as the amount payable for each approved year of service with pension credit (may change from year to year).

The number of years of service with pension credit is multiplied by the PSR, and the product is the minimum annual benefit payable to those clergy eligible for Pre-82 Plan benefits. In certain situations, the benefit received from the Pre-82 plan may vary based on the applicability of what is referred to as Defined Benefit Service Money (DBSM), which is the defined contribution feature of the Pre-1982 Plan. At the time that a participant retires, the DBSM account is converted to a life-based benefit. At that point, the clergy's benefit is the greater of the PSR benefit or DBSM benefit. If the conference increases the PSR, the clergy's benefit is recalculated; however the DBSM-based benefit does not change.

# **Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)**

**Plan Overview:** The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) provides death, long-term disability and other welfare benefits for eligible clergy of The United Methodist Church and their families. It is an Internal Revenue Code 414(e) "church plan" funded by plan sponsor insurance premiums. Generally, clergy are eligible to participate in CPP if they satisfy the eligibility requirements, including full-time appointment with plan compensation of at least 25% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC). Plan sponsors may elect to cover participants with three-quarter time appointments and/or to continue to cover clergy who, due to certain leaves or appointments, are not otherwise eligible to continue coverage.

The CPP adoption agreement executed by the GREATER NEW JERSEY contains its elections to cover or not to cover categories mentioned above.
