Friends in Christ,

In 2021 the United Methodists of Greater New Jersey continued to excel in advancing the mission during the pandemic and other challenges. Together we began implementing A Journey of Hope to end the sin of racism, strengthened financial practices, embraced new hybrid gatherings for worship and continued to make progress on growing vital mission congregations and Hope Centers. In the face of crisis, we acted boldly to move forward and live into our mission to make disciples and grow vital congregations for the transformation of the world. Thank you for stepping forward in a challenging time.

In 2021, together we accomplished the following.

- Grew vital mission congregations surpassing our 41% with 46% of our congregations reaching the markers of vitality.
- Implemented systemic changes to end racism, including a more equitable formula for shared ministries and billings, an Implicit Bias Review process for reports and legislation to the Annual Conference, and began training for over 130 leaders in GNJ with the Journey of Hope Consultant, Fearless Dialogues.
- Overcame a financial challenge by acknowledging the problem, undergoing a rigorous review of our finances and financial practices, strengthening policies and procedures, and charting a plan to rebuild our reserves by 2026. In 2021 we reached 93% Shared Ministry and 98% billings giving rate, surpassing GNJ giving levels in the past.
- Moved swiftly in response to Hurricane Ida which left millions of dollars in damages for our churches and neighborhoods by relaunching a network of disaster responders, raising funds, and awarding nearly \$400,000 to local congregations.
- Celebrated the first full year of the GNJ Leadership Academy, including over 700 leaders and 50 facilitators to equip new leaders for vital congregations

We do more together than we can do alone.

The pages of this journal contain the stories of those disciples. We celebrate their service, and we lift up those who will lead us in taking the next steps in our ministry together. It also details our commitments to God, our ministry together and the mission field as we live out our goal to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.

In 2021, we acted boldly to move forward in the face of what seemed impossible. I am blessed to be on this journey with you, knowing that you are strong and courageous. God is with you.

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2019-2023 Strategic Ministry Plan

Why does GNJ exist?

GNJ exists to recruit and develop transformational leaders so that people and communities experience healing, renewal and wholeness from God. Transformational leaders grow vital congregations who shape passionate disciples of Jesus Christ and share faith, hope and justice in the community.

GNJ Adaptive Challenge

Increase the *motivation, urgency* and *ability* of disciples, leaders and congregations to *connect* and *engage* with a diverse group of people in the community so that the people in the pews look more like all the people in the community.

Holy and Audacious Goal - Leadership 100

Cultivate and equip 100 clergy and 100 laity leaders *who make disciples who make disciples*.

Leadership 100 will change GNJ into a disciple-making and disciple-engaging force to transform the world. Leadership 100 will;

- develop more transformational and apostolic leaders for our congregations and the community, and
- grow a pool of talented leaders who can be deployed to increase disciple-making by:
 - *changing* the culture to nurture leaders who *multiply* passionate disciples
 - *growing* vibrant missional congregations and
 - *transforming* lives and communities

We will know we have achieved this God-sized goal when we have 100 congregations whose worship attendance has moved from one category to the next.

In GNJ we presently have four categories of average worship attendance:

- 299 congregations with average worship attendance of less than 50
- 149 congregations with average worship attendance of 50 – 99
- 28 congregations with average worship attendance of 100 – 124
- 76 congregations with average worship attendance of 125 or more, with:
 - 21 congregations with average worship attendance of 125-149
 - 23 congregations with average worship attendance of 150-199
 - 14 congregations with average worship attendance of 200-299
 - 9 congregations with average worship attendance of 300-499
 - 6 congregations with average worship attendance of 500-699
 - 1 congregation with average worship attendance of 700-999
 - 1 congregation with average worship attendance of 1,000-1,499
 - 1 congregation with average worship attendance of 1,500-1,749
 - 0 congregations with average worship attendance of 1,750+

GNJ Cultural Shifts by 2023

GNJ will shift;

1. FROM a church that mostly serves its members and clergy TO a mission that connects with the people in the community through relevant ministries
2. FROM congregations with a single cultural expression and privilege TO congregations with multicultural expression and intercultural competence
3. FROM concentrating ministry and thinking with current church members TO further extend ministry and thinking to make and engage younger and more diverse generations of disciples.
4. FROM sharing information through workshops to train leaders TO using workshops that interact with and experience the content to form leaders
5. FROM maintaining congregations and their buildings TO working with congregations to repurpose buildings for regenerative mission
6. FROM depending exclusively on Shared Ministries (apportionments) for mission and ministry TO cultivating new sources of income to grow mission and ministry

GNJ Strategies for the Next Five Years

1. *New Faith Communities* – new expressions of congregations that gather diverse people in ways that are relevant to them.
2. *Intercultural Competency* - Develop leadership capacity for intercultural competence in GNJ so we can love across boundaries and differences and work towards inclusion of all people.
3. *NextGen Ministries* - Cultivate and mobilize new generations of enthusiastic disciples of Jesus Christ that connect, engage and lead in their congregations and communities to transform the world through:
 - a. *IGNITE* - life-changing worship, relevant teachings and authentic community for 6th through 12th grade
 - b. *Youth Groups* – local, community focused places for young people to be introduced to Christ and shaped as disciples generally for 3rd through 12th grade
 - c. *Camping* – outdoors experiences that connect with God, purpose and promote meaningful relationships for elementary through high school students.
 - d. *Campus Ministries* - places for college students to be introduced to Christ, shaped as disciples and developed as transformational leaders
4. *Community Development* – Leverage existing human, relational and capital resources to create opportunities for healing, renewal and transformation to communities and sustainable financial support streams for congregations
 - a. Repurpose church property into vibrant worship and mission centers
 - b. Repurpose church property into affordable housing, senior living, community space and mission centers
 - c. Create cooperative ministries within the community
5. *Hope Centers* – Develop church-based community ministry that meets the needs of the community and serves children and youth, families, seniors and vulnerable populations

We will develop and resource these strategies partnering with the GNJ family of vital mission partners – A Future With Hope, Next Generation Ministries, Centenary Fund and Preacher's Aid Society and the United Methodist Stewardship Foundation of Greater New Jersey.

GNJ 2023 Objectives

1. Develop resources to equip congregations to assess and improve their pathways for disciples to know, grow in, live and share the life of Jesus every day, *so that* we increase the number of new disciples and vital congregations.
2. Develop laity leadership resources to equip the local church with the knowledge and ability to effectively lead congregations and address challenges in their ministry, *so that* we grow more vital congregations.
3. Incorporate appropriate training, language and practices into resources, events, agency work, and conference life, *so that* we grow cultural competency within the life and ministry of GNJ.
4. Create methods to recruit, resource and support congregational youth leaders, *so that* they are equipped to lead and grow a youth program equal to 20% of their worshipping congregation and we grow youth engagement.
5. Clarify the process, resources and support for Hope Centers, *so that* we develop 30 Hope Centers focused on community mission with students, the poor and the elderly, and increase missional impact in the community

GNJ Core Resourcing to Carry Out Our Mission and Achieve Our Goal

GNJ will resource congregations and leaders that are ready and desire to become vital and more like Christ primarily through:

- *Laity Leadership Academy* – coordinated teaching and skill development with application and funding opportunities for laity to grow vital ministries.
- *Coaching* – a resource to help clergy achieve ministry goals and action plans.
- *PaCE* - facilitated peer learning groups that help shape pastoral identity, imagination and excellence.
- *Mosaic Ministries* – a new way of thinking about and doing local church ministry, mission and leadership with promising young clergy and seminarians discerning their vocational calling.
- *Clergy Leadership Development Initiative* – tools and applications for clergy to lead congregations to sustainable fruitful ministry
- *Team Vital* – congregational community and ministry assessment and strategic planning process for vital ministry.
- *Communities of Hope* –strategic planning and implementation for asset-based community development.
- *Lay Servant Ministries* - Certified Lay Servants, Lay Speakers and Lay Ministers, expand the ministry of the laity for training for pulpit supply as well as caring, leading, and communicating across the connection for transformational growth.

What Will Be Different?

As GNJ shifts the culture, accomplishes its goals and objectives, implements its strategies and resources leaders and congregations, it will see more disciples and congregations with:

- *Passionate Faith* – Mature and fearless disciples that others want to emulate
- *Boundless Hope* – Positive vision of current and future ministry
- *Courageous Spirit* –Risk-taking relevant mercy and justice ministries
- *Transformational Leadership* – Difference-makers who transform people's lives, the congregation and the community
- *Congregational Vitality* – Vibrant and life changing congregations
- *Regenerative Resources* – Extravagant generosity that inspires new giving and resources

A Holy Spirit-led *servant-leader* that forges a path forward where others do not see the way. A GNJ leader reaches out beyond the walls of the church into the community to transform lives by spreading God's love, hope and justice and bearing witness to Jesus Christ. (Matthew 23:11, Philippians 4:13)

GNJ leaders are fruitful by growing new disciples, worship, small groups, mission engagement and giving. GNJ will work with and grow leaders to be:

- *Fruitful* –grow new passionate disciples, inspiring worship, active small groups, risk taking community mission, and generous giving to mission.

We will invest our financial and human resources in decisions that:

1. Develop transformational leaders
2. Maximize new disciples, vital congregations and world transformation
3. Reflect our core values
4. Encourage innovative, risk-taking regenerative ministry that effectively connects with and engage people in the community

Theological Grounding for GNJ 2019-23 Strategic Plan – *Miracles Everywhere*

“You are the God who performs miracles; you display your powers among the peoples.” Psalm 77:14

God is creating signs and wonders in GNJ and there is even more God wants to do. God wants to continue working through the United Methodists of Greater New Jersey so that miracles of healing and transformation occur across GNJ and around the world (Isaiah 43:19).

The Gospels tell of Jesus’ miracle ministry using two Greek words *dunamis* and *simaiois*. In the synoptic Gospels, Matthew, Mark and Luke, the Greek word *dunamis* is used which means power - God’s power to transform life. The Gospel of John primarily uses the word *simaiois*, which means sign – a miracle that points to God’s activity in the world. Miracles evoke wonder by demonstrating God’s power and pointing to God’s work in the world. In every age, God has been at work in the world healing and transforming lives.

Miracles happen everywhere. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, the congregation, the body of Christ, is the primary actor to release the power of God to transform lives and the community (1 Corinthians 12:27). The congregation is the mission outpost where passionate disciples are formed, shaped and sent to love God and neighbors completely (Mathew 28:16-20).

Transformational leadership within congregations is crucial to fulfilling this mission (Ephesians 4:11-12) to release the Holy Spirit for miracles everywhere. Leaders who move the mission and turnaround forward are grounded theologically and biblically, possess competence and emotional intelligence, engage missionally and passionately, and are led spiritually.

As the church navigates through liminal times (a transitional time on the edge of what God has next for the church), the Spirit is calling GNJ to address our adaptive challenge and engage in new possibilities with courage (II Timothy 1:7). We are called to continue to imagine and discern innovative ways to effectively be in ministry in and with the community (Romans 12:2) so that we cultivate transformational leaders who make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world.

God is already working wonders in GNJ and is ready to perform miracles everywhere through passionate disciples, vital congregations and transformational leaders!

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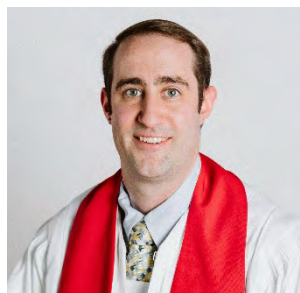

C.A.M.P. YDP (Community Association with a Ministry to People Youth Development Program) Provides pre-school, after-school and summer programs for children aged 5 - 14 and their families, mainly on the north side of Paterson. The program runs throughout the year. As an organization, we are committed to work as a "partner" within the community. A stimulating and nurturing environment is provided. Total care is available as well when schools are not in session with transportation available to pick up children from certain schools.

Centenary Fund/Preachers Aid Fund Supporting retired clergy and spouses.

Christian Outreach Project provides no-cost home repairs to persons in need in the northwest area of our Conference. Participants are made up of high school youth and adult volunteers. In addition to home repairs, participants engage in morning devotionals, singing, worship services and recreational activities.

CUMAC/ECHO works to alleviate hunger and its root causes for those in need in Paterson, Passaic County and northern NJ. CUMAC has a Pantry feeding 3,000+ monthly. Our Depot warehouses over 2 million pounds of food annually for a network of about 40 partner feeding programs. This Community Food Coalition (CFC) distributes food while also screening clients for member pantries. We advocate at the local and state level on behalf of CFC clients. CUMAC also has a Community Closet that offers clothing & household items; Pathways to Work imparts job skills and hands-on experience; Place of Promise is a supportive housing program for chronically homeless individuals; and our seasonal projects for school supplies, holiday gifts and other items for area children in need. All our programs rely heavily on volunteer and financial support from the community.

C.U.M.I. Camden Urban Ministry Initiative, a cooperative After-School Program is a shared ministry amongst Camden churches. This partnering reaches families to ensure positive development of children. We provide a safe environment for youth activities, such as an after-school program, summer day camps, youth Bible study, choir and a career training program. There are arts and cultural activities for all ages. The exchange of stories, wisdom, advice, and experience builds a shared understanding of family and community. This church-based intergenerational community surrounds our youth with caring Christian adults who encourage, support, and pray for our youth while also holding them accountable. We are dedicated to the spiritual, emotional and social growth of Camden Youth.

First Friends of New Jersey and New York With the expansion of detention centers in New Jersey, the need to provide advocacy, research and social services to detained and released detainees has increasingly grown. We provide a link to the outside world by providing toll free lines (English & Spanish) in five different detention facilities where more than 2000 individuals are detained, and through visiting individuals in detention. Our Pen-pal Program allows volunteers who cannot visit to write to detainees.

Justice for Our Neighbors (JFON) is a ministry that works with people God calls us to work with: the immigrant or what the Bible referred to as the stranger in both the Old Testament and Gospels. New Jersey is a state of immigrants. Unique to this ministry is that three conferences, Peninsula Delaware, Eastern Pennsylvania and Greater New Jersey, will pool resources to serve together to support immigrants in the Southern New Jersey, Philadelphia and Delaware Region. It will provide volunteer

compassion ministry and professional legal services. Greater New Jersey has long provided such services to clergy and laity, particularly in Northern New Jersey. This new ministry will provide services in Southern New Jersey, particularly to those with the lowest incomes.

The Neighborhood Center has served the Camden community since 1913. Today, they are a community center that provides a healthy and nutritious lunch six days a week, day care, an after-school program, and an evening teen program. We focus on a two-generation approach to lift families out of poverty. Our commitment is to provide a safe space for Academic achievement, Athletic accomplishment, and a flourishing Arts program. Our hope and vision for the next century of service is to create a "community living room."

Pennington School A college preparatory institution affiliated with the Methodist Church, reflecting the principles espoused by John Wesley and core values of Honor, Virtue, and Humility. Students experience an environment where talents and values are forged for making a positive difference in the world. We provide half scholarships for students in grade 6 to 12.

Ranch Hope/Victory House Ranch Hope provides ministry to troubled boys ages 9 to 16 ½ and Victory House provides services to troubled girls between the ages of 14–18 years. We are faith-based and provide learning environments for those whose needs can best be met through experiences outside their homes. They can obtain or regain their long-term academic, behavioral, and spiritual focus in our residential setting. Counseling, housing and recreation is offered, as well as spiritual guidance, time to attend chapel services and Bible study. We are licensed by the New Jersey State Department of Children and Families.

The Maker's Place is a new initiative of the United Methodist Church of Greater New Jersey. The goal is to connect neighbors in Trenton with neighbors in central New Jersey and beyond, by opening a neighborhood resource center that empowers poor and marginalized people in our capital city. The Maker's Place is a site for local mission and ministry. Starting with initiatives centered around food and families, The Maker's Place will cultivate transformative relationships that help people build bridges out of poverty, and create a multiethnic and economically diverse community hub where all people can experience the wide welcome of God.

Clergy Executive Session of The Annual Conference of
UNITED METHODISTS OF GREATER NEW JERSEY
via Zoom Webinar
THURSDAY, MAY 13, 2021

OPENING

Bishop John Schol welcomed everyone to the virtual Clergy Session and thanked the technology team for managing and supporting the virtual gathering. Referring to the “Ebenezer Stone” on his table, Bishop Schol reflected on the battle that Samuel won against the Philistines with God’s help. Similarly, God has been helping us in difficult times.

Following a prayer by District Superintendent, Rev. William Williams, Bishop Schol called the session to order and explained the use of Zoom technology for voting and participation.

Rev. Shelley Smith, Conference Secretary, set the bar of the Clergy Session. The motion passed.

SESSION REPORT

Rev. Michelle Ryoo, Rev. Jessica Brendler-Naulty, and Rev. Sang Won Doh gave the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the GNJAC Cabinet. (Business of Annual Conference Parts II – V of the Disciplinary Questions 17-50a). As each question was presented, it was received and/or adopted, as action required. As appropriate, prayers were offered for provisional and commissioned elders, deceased clergy and their families, and retirees.

Bishop Schol informed the Session that effective July 1, 2021, District Superintendent Rev. Gina Hendrickson will serve in a pastoral appointment and District Superintendent Rev. Gina Kim will retire.

MOTION

Rev. Jessica Brendler-Naulty made a motion for approval of the report with corrections. The motion passed.

Bishop Schol made remarks and thanked all the clergy for their leadership throughout the COVID pandemic. Bishop Schol closed the session with prayer.

GATHERING

Virtual selections by church choirs and praise bands from Greater New Jersey Annual Conference region provided inspiring music as members logged on.

EPISCOPAL ADDRESS

The Annual Conference Session opened with a video of Bishop John Schol preparing the sacraments in celebration of the eucharist. He emphasized that celebration is important, as it gives us an attitude of gratitude, and by celebrating the progress along the way, things can turn around. Bishop Schol shared that he celebrates our laity in all that they do in our Conference.

The celebration of Baptism is important as we welcome others into the family of Christ. Current and new ministry and missional events throughout the Conference during the pandemic were recalled and celebrated.

Acknowledging the challenges during the pandemic, Bishop Schol reminded the Conference of previous challenges that we have overcome, including the equality and ordination of women, celebrating the 65th anniversary of women's ordination.

Three challenges facing us today are racism, churches separating from our denomination and finances. Bishop stated that racism is a sin, and it hurts all people. Further, there are those who have allowed racism to continue in our world, our communities and in our churches. God can bring out of our brokenness resurrection, and it will take active work to dismantle racism in our society. Bishop Schol commended Greater New Jersey for taking steps to end racism.

The second challenge addressed by Bishop Schol was the brokenness in our denomination. He expressed that he is saddened that acceptance of differences and believes that God wants to work resurrection through the UMC. Bishop Schol's vision is that the UMC, the GNJUMC is receptive to differences and can work together with those differences.

Bishop Schol stated that he believes the conference is aware of the financial challenge being faced in GNJ. There is a plan to meet this challenge, and in ten years GNJ will be back to where we should be. He celebrates the progress we are making. He assured the Conference that the previously spent funds were used to help our churches by subsidizing billings to congregations. Bishop Schol stated that GNJ is not in a financial crisis, but it has a challenge, a resurrection.

Bishop ended his address by encouraging the Conference to continue to celebrate and move forward with God.

OPENING

The Conference transitioned to live streaming, and Bishop Schol welcomed everyone to the Annual Conference session. Procedures for voting, for speaking for/against a motion, amendments, parliamentary items, and questions were explained. The Conference was made aware of changes in the agenda.

Bishop raised Rev. Frank Fowler in remembrance of his passing on Friday.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

ORGANIZING THE CONFERENCE

After praying for the proceedings of the Annual Conference, Rev. Shelley Smith, Conference Secretary, explained that all participants registered and present via Zoom webinar for Conference had been vetted and all have the right to voice and vote. She went on to explain who had a right to voice but not vote. Rev. Smith moved that the bar be set for all on Zoom and present in the Conference office. The motion passed.

LEADERSHIP REPORT

Rev. Juel Nelson presented the Conference Leadership Report. She celebrated how the Leadership Academy of GNJ programs have influenced people all over the world. She shared the schedule of courses being offered during the coming year, and that the vision for the future is to align with the Journey of Hope to deepen faith and develop transformational leaders.

Lay Leadership

Bishop Schol introduced Carolyn Pendleton to give the Lay Leadership report on behalf of Judy Colorado. Carolyn Pendleton celebrated the creative ministries that laity continued or developed over the past year, as they persisted in sharing faith in their communities during the pandemic. She also celebrated the Lay Servant ministries that continued over the past year and all those who participated. She closed by quoting 1 Cor. 15:58.

LEGISLATION

Nominations Report

Carolyn Pendleton presented the Nominations report in the Pre-Conference Workbook as well as the addendum found on the Conference website. Carolyn Pendleton made a motion for its adoption. The motion passed.

Point of Order

A point of order was made by Rev. Drew Dyson. He posted a motion in the Zoom Chat at the beginning of the Nominations Report presentation, and it was not addressed. Bishop Schol apologized for the miscommunication and invited Rev. Drew to speak to the amendment.

Amendment

Rev. Dyson made a motion to amend the report by the deletion of the name of Rev. Jana Purkis-Brash from the Conference Board of Trustees found on the addendum of the Nominations Report. The motion passed.

Congregational Development Report

Rev. Hector Burgos presented the report of the Congregational Development committee, celebrating the way congregations transitioned into online worship at the beginning of the pandemic. He celebrated congregations that found new ways to engage in their communities through the pandemic. Opportunities are being offered in the coming months for congregations to continue to grow. Rev. Burgos encouraged everyone to be watching for the ability to learn about the Journey of Hope's activities.

Journey of Hope Plan Report

Rev. Enger Muteteke reported on the progress that has been made on the Journey of Hope Plan, as presented at the October 2020 session of the Annual Conference. She explained the Plan's goals and the

progress that has been made. The Journey of Hope team selected ‘Fearless Dialogues’ as consultants to facilitate conversations, train leaders, and adapt resources and processes that support JOH goals. The Conference was informed of the number of churches currently entered in the plan. Rev. Muteteke discussed the progress of the Forbearance Plan and the Connectional Obligation Reduction Plan. Presently, sixty-six churches are in the JOH equity program. Ninety-two churches have been included in the debt forbearance program. The Implicit Bias team is now working with committee leaders.

Journey of Hope Legislation Modification Resolution

Rev. Hector Burgos presented the Journey of Hope Legislation Modification Resolution (on page 44 of the 2021 Pre-Conference Workbook) on behalf of Conference Finance and Administration and the Cabinet. It clarifies the intent of the Journey with Hope legislation and provides a fairer policy for churches in low-income communities. Rev. Burgos made a motion for its approval. The motion passed.

VIDEO

A video by the Journey of Hope committee was presented.

SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE

The service opened as Rev. Hector Burgos led the Call to Worship and Opening Prayer. This was followed by the hymn, “Precious Lord,” by the Conference Praise Team. Psalm 23 was read by Carolyn Pendleton.

Bishop Schol introduced Rev. Gina Hendrickson to preach the Word. She acknowledged that it is a challenge to be separated from one another, again, for Annual Conference. She related these challenging times as the ‘valley of darkness’ written about in Psalm 23. Rev. Hendrickson expressed that the Psalm is balm for her soul in this time and invited everyone to let the 23rd Psalm become their words as we remember all the loved ones who have passed this past year. She turned the Psalm into a mantra – Fear Not! It reminds her that God is with us always, not just sometime. She encouraged that the phrase to become the mantra for each of us so we can become the voice of God for others. She reminded us that our loved ones are back home with God, so we should Fear Not! Rev. Hendrickson closed the sermon in prayer.

Bishop Schol introduced the Roll Call of Clergy and Laity who died through April 20, 2021. He offered the opportunity to celebrate a loved one by posting something in the Chat room. Rev. Shelley Smith introduced the remembrance video of the Saints who have gone on to glory.

Gyuchang Sim made a motion for an amendment “inserting the words ‘except the presence of conflict of interest’ in every paragraph line forty-four, page seventeen and after ‘taken’; line two on page eighteen after ‘empowered’; line nine after ‘authorized’; line fifteen after ‘empowered’; line twenty-three after ‘effect’; line thirty-six after ‘empowered’; line forty-three after ‘authorized’ as words inserted in the resolution above.”

Rev. Gina Hendrickson made a motion to refer this amendment to GCFA to look over all the pieces that are being amended. The motion passed.

Amendment

Rev. Robin Mitchell made a motion for an amendment for full transparency. After some discussion, Rev. Mitchell was satisfied to have the motion referred to the Board of Trustees.

The original motion made by Rev. Still passed.

Conference Advanced Specials

Rev. Isabel Quezada, Chairperson of the Conference Board of Global Ministries, presented the Conference Advanced Specials report and moved for its approval. The motion passed.

Equitable Compensation Recommendation for 2022

GNJAC Arrearage Policy for Clergy Salaries

Standard for Parsonages

Rev. Steven Bechtold, Chairperson of Commission of Equitable Compensation, presented the Equitable Compensation Recommendation, the GNJAC Arrearage Policy for Clergy Salaries resolution and the Standard for Parsonages resolution and made a motion for their approval. The motion passed.

Pension and Health Benefits

Rev. Bill Wilson presented the Pension and Health Benefits resolution and made a motion for its approval. The motion passed.

Amendment

Creed Pogue made an amendment to add to page 29, line 9: “However, no modified plan design for annuitant health care that would increase the maximum out of pocket of participants by more than 10% shall be implemented without an affirmative vote of Annual Conference.”

Rev. Brian Roberts made a motion to refer Creed Pogue’s amendment to CFA and have them report back at the special session of Annual Conference in October 2021. The motion passed.

The original Pension and Health Benefits motion for approval passed.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Church Closures

Rev. William M. Williams, III, on behalf of the Cabinet, presented the Church Closures resolution. He expressed gratitude for Mt. Fern UMC in Randolph, NJ, Bethany Browne Memorial UMC in Jersey City, and Centre Grove UMC in Millville, and added Verga Welfare UMC, in West Deptford, NJ; Elm UMC in Atco, NJ; Siloam UMC in Freehold, NJ, with discontinuance beginning on May 31, 2021; Eldred UMC with discontinuance beginning on September 12, 2021; and Dunellen UMC with discontinuance beginning on September 30, 2021. Rev. Williams made a motion for the resolution with the addition's approval. The motion passed.

Bishop Schol offered a prayer for all those who participated in the life of those churches.

Fund Legislation

Motion

Rev. Drew Dyson made a motion to postpone this legislation until the next called session of Annual Conference to allow the treasurer to provide a full accounting of the receipts, disbursements and balances for the last five years of all funds listed on pages forty-one to forty-three of the Pre Conference Workbook as required by paragraph 619.1(c)(2) of the Book of Discipline and allow the conference trustees to provide a full report of its holdings and conference property transactions over the same time as required by paragraph 2516.2 of the Book of Discipline. Discussion ensued.

Rev. William Cologne made a motion to Call the Question regarding Rev. Dyson's motion. The motion to Call the Question passed.

The motion to postpone the Fund Legislation passed. **The documents for this legislation can be found in the adjourned Annual Conference minutes.**

GENERAL SESSION

OPENING

Bishop Schol introduced Marielle Cologne who opened with prayer.

TIME IN MEMBERSHIP SESSION

Bishop Schol requested a membership session to discuss confidential matters of the conference that included staffing and sale of church property. A motion was made, and the conference approved moving into a membership session.

VIDEO

A video was presented by the Church and Society committee.

ORDER OF THE DAY

Bishop Schol introduced the United Methodist Men's report, focusing on the line that state's "When a man comes to Christ, the family follows. When a woman comes to Christ, the man and the rest of the family may not find Christ." Bishop explained that this is not the opinion of all UMM but the opinion of one man who wrote the report. Additionally, all reports belong to the Annual Conference, and are

received by the Conference Secretary who does not have any authority to edit, revise, eliminate, censor all or any part of a report. Bishop Schol invited people to speak of any experiences of sexism experienced in the past year or two. Several women shared some of their experiences.

Rev. Iraida Ruiz de Porras, a member of Commission on Status and Role of Women (COSROW), presented a motion stating: "Be it resolved that GNJ Annual Conference affirm that women are full and equal parts of God's human family with equal value, skill, influence, and potential.

Be it further resolved that as an Annual Conference we denounce the sin of sexism in all [its] manifestations in and outside the church. And all forms of prejudice and biases that negatively impact women, men, youth and children in our congregations and communities.

Be it further resolved that the harmful statement posted by the UMM in the [Pre]Conference Journal [Workbook] is not received by the Annual Conference and not included in this years' Conference Journal as it does not represent who we are as United Methodist in Greater NJ.

Be it further resolved that the Annual Conference amend the Greater NJ Rules of Order number nineteen to add the following paragraph: The Greater NJ Commission on the Status and Role of Women and the Greater NJ Commission on Religion and Race shall review all reports, resolutions and legislations submitted for the consideration to the Annual Conference prior to the printing of the Preconference Journal for explicit or implicit biases and recommend changes to the appropriate bodies or individuals through the Conference Secretary to insure just, inclusive and equitable reports and resolutions that honor all of God's people and do not harm. If the agency decides not to make the change to its report, COSROW and Religion and Race will report to the Annual Conference session their concerns.

Be it further resolved that COSROW at the next Annual Conference session will bring concrete action and steps to end the sin of sexism."

As this motion requires a rule change, Bishop Schol invited Daniel Gepford, Chairperson of the Rules Committee to speak. The Rules Committee supports the change. The motion passed.

Bishop Schol offered a prayer.

LEGISLATION

CFA

Vasanth Victor presented the CFA report, reporting on the current income, trends, and objectives.

Intersectional Peace with Justice

Sue Zahorbenski, president of the United Methodist Women, presented the Intersectional Peace with Justice resolution and made a motion for its approval. The motion passed.

Making the Educational Society of the GNJAC a Subcommittee of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry

Don Stevens presented the Making the Educational Society of the GNJAC a Subcommittee of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry resolution and made a motion for its approval. The motion passed.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Presenting Recommendations – Rule III 19

Bob Costello presented the Presenting Recommendations – Rule III 19b resolution and made a motion for its approval.

Rule III 19 b) iii: “iii. All recommendations submitted to the Conference Secretary in a timely manner shall be submitted to the CF&A by the conference secretary or his/her designee in time for the CF&A to present its findings to the annual conference in the Pre-Conference journal. If CF&A determines that adoption of the recommendation would have a financial impact, CF&A shall report its understanding of such impact.”

The motion passed.

Inclusive Nomination Process to the General and Jurisdictional Conference

The Inclusive Nomination Process to General and Jurisdictional Conference resolution by Gyuchang Sim was presented with recommended modifications by the Rules Committee, to which Mr. Sim agreed. Daniel Gepford presented the modification and clarification. The modified resolution was provided to the members in the Pre-Conference Workbook Addendum.

Amendment

Creed Pogue made an amendment to substitute the underscored addition in lines 12-15 to read as follows: “Nominations must be received by February 28 to be placed in the Preconference booklet. Nominations received after February 28 but before March 31 shall be presented on the Conference website and appear on the electronic ballot. The Conference Secretary is expected to undertake outreach efforts with the goal of a group of nominees broadly representative of GNJ’s diversity.”

Bishop Schol suggested to move this entire resolution to the Fall session of Annual Conference. Everyone offering motions and amendments agreed to postpone their submission until the Fall Annual conference. **The documents for this legislation can be found in the adjourned Annual Conference minutes.**

Itemized Shared Ministries Statements and Remittance

Bishop Schol asked Tom O’Hearn if he would be agreeable to moving his resolution to the Fall session. Mr. O’Hearn preferred to discuss it at this session. Bishop explained that, according to the Book of Discipline, CFA has the authority on how to present the Shared Ministries statement.

Motion

Rev. William Williams made a motion to refer the Itemized Shared Ministries Statements and Remittance to CFA so they may make recommendations at the Adjourned Annual Conference Session. The motion passed. **The documents for this legislation can be found in the adjourned Annual Conference minutes.**

The General Examination

Bishop Schol asked all the candidates the traditional General Examination questions.

The scripture, Proverbs 3:5-6 was read by Rev. Eunice Vega-Perez in Spanish, by Rev. William Williams in English and by Rev. Sang Won Doh in Korean.

Bishop Schol opened his message with the story about the challenges he had when climbing a mountain by taking a straight path. From that experience, he realized that his path of ministry has not been a straight path, but rather, a labyrinth, taking many turns.

From his experience, he recommended not presuming the idea that there is one sure and reliable path. He has found that nothing is sure. Our plans are often not God’s plan and being in ministry is to be on God’s path. Bishop Schol suggested that to stay on the path is to narrow the path. By looking at his life in five-year increments and asking himself what gave him joy and energy during those times. He was most alive when he was playing. He was most alive when he was serving. He warned the candidates that when our job becomes our only means of service, we are off the path. He made sure that he found other ways to serve God and creation outside the job. The candidates were encouraged to find other ways to serve God outside their job. He thrived when he was with family and friends and encouraged the candidates to do the same. Bishop Schol realized that he was closer to God through all these moments. He encouraged everyone to do more things that bring them joy. He encouraged the candidates to stay on the path God has for them.

Testimony Moment

Laura Quackenbush-Steele began her testimony by stating how she was an imposter, defining it as the feeling of not being worthy. She shared that even during a difficult childhood, the messages she heard at her church made her feel loved and welcomed. She found that the grace of God stayed with her even through her ‘wild child’ time and she sometimes, asks ‘are you sure me, Lord?’. Now, when she hears that inner voice says ‘imposter’, she responds, loudly, with ‘impossible!’.

Testimony Moment

The Conference Praise Team led the recession with “Marching Zion”.

Benediction

Bishop Schol gave the final charge to go into the world with God’s hope, peace, love, and blessing.

The Conference Praise Team opened the session with the song, "Same Power." The theme of the worship service was "We Move Forward." Rev. Glenn Conaway read 1 Thessalonians 5:19-20. Bishop Mande Muyombo, presiding bishop of the Tanzania Annual Conference, preached a message that gives hope during this pandemic. Using Paul's words, 'Do not quench the Spirit,' he reminded the session that Paul wrote this letter after people had fallen away from God and encourages them to 'not quench the spirit' but stay faithful. Bishop Muyombo encouraged everyone to continue in mission in your community because God's image is in every human throughout the world. The Praise Band closed with "You Are My Strength."

OPENING

Bishop Schol welcomed everyone to the session and thanked Bishop Muyombo for joining us. Bishop Schol then welcomed Judy Colorado, conference lay leader and Rev. Shelley Smith, conference secretary.

ORGANIZING THE CONFERENCE

Rev. Shelley Smith made a motion to set the bar of the conference to include members of the Annual Conference on the Zoom webinar and members present in the Conference office. She explained who may have voice but no vote. The motion passed.

Bishop Schol provided instructions regarding the use of technology for asking questions or move to parliamentary procedure.

LEGISLATION

2022 Consolidated Budget

Vasanth Victor, Council of Finance and Administration chairperson, presented the 2022 Budget. He explained the Shared Ministry rationale, the key budget assumptions and 2022 Shared Ministry and Billable Statements. He explained that the Shared Ministry includes all the income and revenue resources of GNJ, providing more transparency. Acknowledging that 2020 was a hardship year for many churches, the percentage rate for 2022 will be 15.2%, based on the 2019 ministry base. The key budget assumptions include the support of six district superintendents, \$1.732 million from property sales to support congregations with their billings, and a 5% draw from GNJ designated funds. Monthly statements to churches will contain the total apportionment to the congregation for GNJ shared ministry, and the total apportionment to the congregation on behalf of the general church. The general church will be paid the amount that is received from the churches. After a time of questions and answers, Vasanth Victor made a motion for the budget's acceptance.

The motion passed.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

District Restructuring

Rev. Sang Won Doh, chair of the cabinet, made a motion to restructure Greater New Jersey Annual Conference from nine districts to six, effective January 1, 2022. The motion passed.

Time of Music

The Praise Team helped refresh us with “Halle, Halle, Halle.”

Learning Moment

Rev. Juel Nelson, director of leadership development, invited everyone to consider the hopes, aspirations, and goals they may have for their church, congregation, and community. She then suggested that everyone consider how far apart those goals are from where they are now. She provided six ways for adaptive leadership:

1. Get into the balcony to see with a broader view.
2. Consider the timing. Small groups may work better to identify leaders.
3. Who am I in this?
4. Build on the past.
5. Create diverse teams and reach out into the community.
6. Celebrate

She concluded by encouraging those attending the session to use these tools to continue to make disciples for Jesus Christ.

LEGISLATION

Designated Fund Legislation revisited

Vasanth Victor presented the Designated Fund Balances report. He reminded the session that at the May Annual Conference, there was a vote to postpone the legislation until the CFO/treasurer provided a full accounting of funds and trustees provide a report of property sold. Both were provided in the pre-conference workbook. Vasanth Victor presented a general overview of the spending and explained the new procedures that CFA wants to implement to avoid inappropriate spending.

Amendment

An amendment was made by Creed Pogue stating, “No district parsonage shall be sold until after the 2023 Conference session adjourns and that any proceeds from those sales shall be designated to the Superintendent Housing Fund.”

Motion

Rev. William M. Williams III made a motion to refer the amendment to the Board of Trustees for the board’s members to review the matter and decide how to move forward on that review. The motion passed.

Motion

Gyuchang Sim made the motion, “To change the percentage of retiree healthcare to 20 percent from 15% and property redevelopment fund to 10% from 15%”. Bishop Schol reminded the body that these percentages would not take place until finances reached steady state which is expected to be in 2026. The motion passed.

A motion for the approval of the original legislation was made. The motion passed.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Council on Finance and Administration Report on the proposed “Shared Ministry Statements and Remittance Forms” Legislation

Vasanth Victor made a motion for the acceptance of the CFA report on Shared Ministry Statements and Remittance Forms approve the recommendation. The motion passed.

Trustees Enabling Resolutions Amendment: Adding Conflict of Interest Statements

Iona Harding, member of CFA and chair of HR, presented the Trustees Enabling Resolutions Amendment: Adding Conflict of Interest Statements legislation.

Motion

During the time of questions and answers, a motion was made to call the question. The motion passed.

A motion was made for the approval of the original resolution. Bishop Schol stated that this resolution will be sent to the Council of Bishops. The motion passed.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY AC 10/21

Iona Harding presented the Conflict-of-Interest Policy resolution. A motion was made for its approval. The motion passed.

JOINT BOARD OF PENSIONS/CFA RETIREE HEALTH BENEFITS AMENDMENT

Rev. Jennifer Cho, chair of Board of Pension, presented the Retiree Health Plan resolution on behalf of the Board of Pension and Council of Finance and Administration. Rev. Neill Tolboom shared the process used to develop a viable plan.

Motion

Rev. Shelley Smith suggested to extend our time to 1:00 p.m. No one opposed.

Substitute Amendment

A substitute amendment was made by Creed Pogue stating: ‘Substitute for Committee Report “Add to page 29, line 9 of the May Pre-Conference Workbook for Pension Board Guidelines: However, no modified plan design for annuitant health care that would increase the maximum out of pocket (MOOP) of participants by more than 15% shall be implemented without an affirmative vote of Annual Conference. This vote may be conducted by special session, mail or electronically whether by email or webinar.”

Point of Order

Bishop Schol informed the Conference that the last line in the substitution must be stricken because it does not follow our current rules.

Point of Order

Lynn Caterson, conference chancellor, informed the body that, due to our rules, we could not substitute any part of a conference board’s report, since it was the report submitted by that group.

Call for the Question

A motion was made to Call for the Question. The motion passed.

A motion was made to receive the report by CFA and Board of Pensions. The motion passed.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

RULES AMENDMENT: NOMINATIONS FOR GENERAL JURISDICTIONAL DELEGATES

Bishop Schol introduced the Rules Amendment resolution.

Motion

Rev. Shelley Smith made a motion to refer this amendment back to the Rules Committee to get clarity of the term “every ethnic group” found in the Adjourned Session Addendum, page two, line 21. The motion passed.

CLOSING REMARKS

Bishop Schol thanked all who worked to prepare for the Adjourned Session and all of the members for attending. He encouraged the conference to “continue to move forward, not quench the Spirit and to be open to the movement of God through us and for us and in the world.”

The Conference Praise Team closed the session with “Child of Love.”

RULES OF ORDER

Rules of order

Paragraph (¶) references are to the 2012 and 2016 Book of Discipline as corrected by Errata notations issued by the General Conference. Portions in “quotation marks” are Disciplinary wording.

GENERAL

These Rules (hereafter called the "Rules") shall be standing rules for the governance of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference. At all times, the Rules shall be subject to the provisions of the applicable provisions of the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church (hereafter called the "Discipline". Unless otherwise indicated, all paragraph references below shall refer to the paragraph numbers and letters indicating provisions of the Discipline). Except as they may be inconsistent with applicable provisions of the Discipline, the Rules shall remain applicable unless and until modified or suspended as set forth below.

I MEMBERSHIP

- 1) **Composition** – “The annual conference shall be composed of clergy and lay members. The clergy membership shall consist of deacons and elders in full connection, provisional members, associate members, and local pastors under appointment. The lay membership shall consist of professing lay members elected by each charge, the diaconal ministers, the active deaconesses, and home missionaries under episcopal appointment within the bounds of the annual conference, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the conference director of Lay Speaking Ministries, conference secretary of Global Ministries (if lay), the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, the chair of the annual conference college student organization and one young person between the ages of twelve and seventeen and one young person between the ages of eighteen and thirty from each district. Each charge served by more than one clergy shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are clergy members.” (¶ 32) Each church shall elect a lay member and an alternate lay member as outlined in Rule 3a. Additional lay members, as provided in Rule 6, shall be members under the lay equalization formula.
- 2) **Clergy Membership** – “The clergy membership of an annual conference (¶ 370) shall consist of deacons and elders in full connection (¶ 333), provisional members, associate members (¶ 327), affiliate members (¶¶ 344.4, 586.4), and local pastors under full-time and part-time appointment to a pastoral charge (¶ 317). (See also ¶ 32).” (¶ 602.1)
 - a) “Clergy members in full connection shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except in the election of lay delegates to the general and jurisdictional or central conferences and shall have sole responsibility for all matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy.” (¶ 602.1a)
 - b) "Provisional clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, election of clergy delegates to the General and jurisdictional or central conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (¶602.b) Provisional clergy members who have completed all of their educational requirements may vote to elect clergy delegates to General and jurisdictional or central conferences. (See Judicial Council Decision #1181 and ¶ 35, Article IV)."

RULES OF ORDER

- c) Associate clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. When associate members are members of the conference Board of Ordained Ministry, they have the right to vote at clergy session on matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (¶ 602.c) Affiliate clergy members shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except the constitutional amendments, election of clergy delegates to the General, jurisdictional or central conferences, and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (See Judicial Council Decision #1181 and ¶ 35, Article IV).
- d) Full-time and part-time local pastors under appointment to a pastoral charge shall have the right to vote in the annual conference on all matters except constitutional amendments; election of delegates to the General and jurisdictional or central conferences and matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. When local pastors are members of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, they have the right to vote at clergy session on matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. (¶ 602.d). Local pastors who have completed course of study or an M.Div. degree and have served a minimum of two consecutive years under appointment before the election may vote to elect clergy delegates to General and jurisdictional or central conferences. (See Judicial Council Decision #1181 and ¶ 35, Article IV).

3) Election and Qualifications of Lay Members

- a) Lay members and one or more alternate lay members for each church shall be elected quadrennially at the regular meeting of the charge conference following the meeting of the general conference. "Both the lay members and the alternates shall have been professing members in good standing of The United Methodist Church for at least two years and shall have been active participants for at least four years next preceding their election (see ¶ 32), except in a newly organized church, which shall have the privilege of representation at the annual conference session." (¶ 251.2) There shall be no restriction as to the number of terms for which a qualified person may be elected a lay member or alternate lay member.
 - b) District youth and young adult representatives may be elected annually by the Ministries with Young People Team (or its successor, however named).
- 4) **Seating of Lay Members** – Lay members and alternate lay members shall take office as of January 1 following their election, and the term of office shall be for the ensuing quadrennium. If the regular meeting of a Charge Conference is delayed beyond the year of the meeting of the General Conference, the lay member and alternate lay members shall take office immediately upon election. If the office of lay member or alternate lay member of any church becomes vacant during the quadrennium, a replacement for the unexpired term shall be elected at the next regular meeting of the Charge Conference or at a special meeting thereof. Each District Superintendent shall provide the Conference Secretary with a correct list of lay members from charges within the district by January 15 prior to the first meeting of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. It shall be to the lay members so listed that credentials shall be issued for seating at sessions of the Annual Conference.
- 5) **Lay Representation of a Local Church** – If the church's lay representative to the Annual Conference "shall cease to be a member of the charge or shall for any reason fail to serve, an alternate lay member in the order of election shall serve in place." (¶ 251.2) If there is no

alternate lay member who can attend, another lay member or alternate lay member may be elected by the Charge Conference.

- a) The pastor may request the District Superintendent to authorize a special session of the Charge Conference for the purpose of electing a lay member or alternate lay member. A special session of the Charge Conference requires the written consent of the District Superintendent in his/her absence, and at least ten days advance notice to its members. (§ 250)
 - b) The pastor shall report to the District Superintendent and the Conference Secretary, in writing, the name and address of the elected lay member or alternate lay member.
 - c) Under no circumstances shall a person who is not duly elected as stated above be seated at sessions of the Annual Conference.
- 6) **Equalization of Lay Members** – “If the lay membership should number less than the clergy members of the annual conference, the annual conference shall, by its own formula, provide for the election of additional lay members to equalize the number of lay and clergy membership of the Annual Conference.” (§ 32) Members will be added in the order nominated or recommended for selection until the required number of additional lay members is reached. All terms will be for the quadrennium with the exception of category “i” below which shall be annually.
- a) The following persons shall be named as additional Lay Members to Annual Conference:
 - i. The Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, and Conference Statistician, when persons elected to these offices are lay persons who meet the disciplinary requirements for Conference membership and are not otherwise elected.
 - ii. Elected Lay Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.
 - iii. Lay Chairpersons of the following agencies not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference: Council on Finance and Administration, Commission on Archives and History, Commission on Equitable Compensation, Committee on the Episcopacy, Board of Pensions, Board of Trustees, Board of Church and Society, Board of Discipleship, Board of Global Ministries, Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Commission on Camps and Conferences, Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Commission on Religion and Race, Commission on the Status and Role of Women, Commission on Communications, and Commission on the Ethnic Local Church.
 - iv. The past conference Lay Leaders not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference. This includes the former Northern New Jersey and Southern New Jersey Conferences as well as the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.
 - v. Laity members of the Council on Finance and Administration not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.
 - vi. Laity members of the Sessions Committee not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.
 - vii. The District Presidents of United Methodist Women and District Presidents of United Methodist Men not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.
 - viii. Lay Missionaries not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.
 - ix. The District Directors of Lay Speaking Ministries not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

RULES OF ORDER

- x. The co-secretaries of the Ministries with Young People Team, the Youth Service Fund Chairperson and one additional Youth and Young Adult from each District not otherwise elected as Lay Members of the Annual Conference.
- 2) Nominations for additional Lay members from local churches: In the year preceding the beginning of the quadrennium, the Laity Council shall solicit nominations for additional Lay Members from local churches through Administrative Boards or Councils. The Laity Council will receive the nominations and elect those who will serve as additional Lay Members for the succeeding quadrennium. Vacancies that occur during the quadrennium shall be filled by the action of the Laity Council.
- 7) **Lay Membership** – “The lay members of the annual conference shall participate in all deliberations and vote upon all measures except on the granting or validation of license, ordination, reception into full conference membership, or any question concerning the character and official conduct of ordained ministers, except those who are lay members of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the committee on investigation.” (§ 602.6)
- 8) **Seated Without Vote** – The following shall be seated without vote in the Annual Conference and shall be given the privilege of the floor without vote: student local pastors, lay missionaries regularly appointed by the Board of Global Ministries in fields outside the United States, and the Conference Chancellor(s) “if not otherwise a voting member of the annual conference” (§602.10) The following shall be invited to attend the Annual Conference, without voice or vote, on the same financial basis as members of the Annual Conference: spouses of deceased clergy members, persons not officially eligible for appointment who have been assigned by the District Superintendents between sessions of Annual Conference as pastors in charge with the intention of appointment or reassignment for the ensuing conference year, and persons to be presented for consecration as Diaconal Ministers or ordained as Deacons or Elders. Staff and clerical personnel necessary for the conducting of the Annual Conference Session shall attend at conference expense.
- 9) **Attendance of Members** – “It is the duty of every member and all provisional members and local pastors of the annual conference to attend its sessions and furnish such reports in such form as the Discipline may require. Any such person unable to attend shall report by letter to the conference secretary, setting forth the reason for the absence. Should any ordained minister in active service be absent from the session of the annual conference without a satisfactory reason for the absence, the matter shall be referred by the conference secretary to the Board of Ordained Ministry.” (§ 602.8)

II ORGANIZATION

- 10) **Presiding Officer** – The bishop assigned shall preside over the annual conference, or “in case of inability, shall arrange for another bishop to preside. In the absence of a bishop, the conference shall by ballot, without nomination or debate, elect a president pro-tempore from among the traveling elders. The president thus elected shall discharge all the duties of a bishop except ordination.” (§ 603.6)
 - 1) The Presiding Officer shall see that all business pertaining to the Conference shall be brought forward and conducted in a proper manner, according to the provisions of the Discipline and Rules for the Conference.
 - 2) The Presiding Officer shall decide all questions of order, subject to the right of appeal by any member of the Conference.

RULES OF ORDER

- 3) The Presiding Officer shall appoint all committees and officers not otherwise designated to the Nominating Committee, unless otherwise directed by the Conference.
 - 4) The Presiding Officer shall appoint an elder to preside at the Conference during any temporary absence.
- 11) Conference Secretary** – At the session following the General Conference, the Annual Conference shall elect a Secretary to serve for the succeeding quadrennium. The Nominating Committee, in consultation with the Bishop and Cabinet, shall present the nomination. Term of office shall not exceed two consecutive quadrennia. “In the case of a vacancy in the interim of the sessions, the bishop, after consultation with the district superintendents, shall appoint a person to act until the next session of the annual conference.” (§ 603.7) Term limits of Rule 58a. shall apply.
- 1) The Secretary shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Conference, authenticating by signature all acts of the Conference.
 - 2) The Secretary shall handle all notification and communications directed by the Conference.
 - 3) Unless otherwise directed, the Secretary shall handle all other matters that normally come under the Secretary’s responsibility.
 - 4) The Secretary shall have the responsibility for editing, publishing, and distributing the Journal, Yearbook and Minutes of the Annual Conference.
 - 5) The Secretary shall nominate any staff that require election by the Conference.
- 12) Conference Statistician** – At the first session following the General Conference, the Annual Conference shall elect a Statistician to serve for the succeeding quadrennium. “In the case of a vacancy in the interim of the sessions, the bishop, after consultation with the district superintendents, shall appoint a person to act until the next session of the annual conference.” (§ 603.7)
- 13) Conference Treasurer** – The “annual conference, on nomination of its council on finance and administration, shall at the first session of the conference after the quadrennial session of the general conference or jurisdictional conference, or at such other times as a vacancy exists, elect a conference treasurer/director of administrative services. If a vacancy shall occur during the quadrennium, the council shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the annual conference.” (§ 619)
- 14) Conference Chancellors** – The Annual Conference may designate as Chancellor one or more laypersons, each of whom is a member in good standing of one of the local churches or a clergyperson who is a member of the Annual Conference in the Episcopal Area, and who is a member of the appropriate bar or bars in the Episcopal Area. Each chancellor, who shall be nominated by the bishop and elected by the Annual Conference, shall serve as legal advisor to the Bishop and the Annual Conference. (§ 603.8)
- 15) Conference Parliamentarian** – There shall be a Parliamentarian at each Plenary Session of the Annual Conference. The bishop shall select the Parliamentarian(s).
- 16) Rules of Order Committee** –
- 1) There shall be a standing Rules of Order Committee of eight (8) members, four (4) clergy and four (4) lay, nominated by the Committee on Nominations. The Conference Parliamentarian, if not already a member, shall be an ex-officio member of this committee with vote.
 - 2) Prior to the consideration of any other business of an Annual Conference Session, the Rules of Order Committee shall present, for informational purposes only, any changes to the Rules mandated by changes in the Discipline.

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- 3) The Rules of Order Committee shall also present for adoption by the Conference any other changes to the Rules that the Committee recommends. If any member of the Annual Conference desires to propose any other change to the Rules, the member shall submit a resolution setting forth the proposed change in accordance with the deadline for submitting proposed legislation. See Rule 19b. Upon its submission, the proposed legislation shall be referred to the Rules Committee for its review and response, prior to any vote on the legislation by the Conference.

III BUSINESS PROCEDURES

- 17) Roll Call** – The Conference Secretary shall take the roll of all members of this Annual Conference, both clergy and lay, by card registration while the Conference is in session, and the attendance shall be recorded in the Journal. Upon registration, members shall receive a name badge which shall state name, church, or position, and which shall also indicate voting rights.
- 18) The Bar of the Conference** – The bar of the Conference shall be fixed at the beginning of each Annual Conference on motion of the Secretary. All members of the Conference, lay and clergy, must be within the bar of the Conference to have the privilege of the floor and to vote. Other persons shall be seated outside the bar of the Conference as indicated by the ushers.
- 19) Pre-Conference Reports and Recommendations** –
 - a) Reports –
 - i. There shall be a Pre-Conference Workbook which shall contain all reports of Conference, Jurisdictional and General agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils, or teams received at the Conference offices by the first business day of March (or such other deadline as the Conference Secretary may establish). Such reports are to identify how the agency or other body has helped the Conference make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, how the agency has furthered the goals of the Conference, and the goals of the agency or other body for the coming year. Any such report may be included in the Journal of the Annual Conference, subject to editorial corrections, at the discretion of the Conference Secretary. Any recommendations from such an agency or other body must be submitted separately as legislation for consideration by the Annual Conference, in accordance with applicable procedures and deadlines for legislation.
 - ii. Except as provided in (b) below, no reports or recommendations of any Conference agency excepting the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Committee on Nominations, and then only with the consent of the bishop, shall be acted upon unless (1) they shall have been correctly and timely submitted to be included in the Pre-Conference Workbook as reports or legislation (as indicated above).
 - b) Recommendations –
 - i. The Pre-Conference Workbook shall contain all proposed legislation and all reports of agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils, or teams that have been received by the Annual Conference offices by the first business day in March (or such other deadline as the Conference Secretary may establish).
 - ii. All proposed legislation and reports received after March 1 shall be submitted to the agenda committee for review. Upon the agenda committee's recommendation and the bishop's consent, such items may be included in the agenda where urgent and appropriate.

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- iii. All recommendations submitted to the Conference Secretary in a timely manner shall be submitted to the CF&A by the Conference Secretary or his/her designee in time for the CF&A to present its findings to the annual conference in the Pre-Conference journal. If CF&A determines that adoption of the recommendation would have a financial impact, CF&A shall report its understanding of such impact.
- 20) Program** – The program as contained in the Pre-Conference Workbook shall be the official program of the session of the Annual Conference, subject to necessary modifications by the Chairperson of the Session Agenda Subcommittee.
- 21) Official Journal** – The Conference Journal, signed by the Presiding Officer and the Secretary, shall be the official Journal of the conference. Among other materials included by the Conference Secretary, the Conference Journal shall contain all legislation and recommendations agreed to by the Annual Conference.
- 22) Copy for the Journal** – All materials for publication in the Conference Journal shall be in the hands of the Editor of the Journal (who shall be the Conference Secretary, or a person selected by the Conference Secretary) by the close of the Conference Session. Exceptions to this rule shall be at the discretion of the Editor.
- a) All substantive actions of the Conference shall be indicated in the Conference Journal. The Editor of the Journal shall have authority to make all appropriate, non-substantive editorial and conforming changes and corrections. Where explicitly so authorized by the Conference, the Editor of the Journal and the author of the action shall also be empowered to edit the contents of a given action together, to reflect the intent of the Conference. Rationales, preambles or supporting statements shall not be printed except in the case of complimentary resolutions.
 - b) Memoirs shall be limited to five hundred (500) words.
 - c) Addresses delivered to the Conference Session shall not be included in the Conference Journal, except for those of the Bishop, the District Superintendents and Conference Lay Leader(s). A motion to so include shall be out of order unless prior permission to make the motion shall have been received in writing by a committee composed of the Secretary of the Conference, the Editor of the Journal, the Chair of the Council on Finance and Administration, the Chair of the Conference Sessions Committee, and the Dean of the Conference Cabinet.
- 23) Distribution** – The Journal shall be distributed according to the following formula:
- a) One mailed paper copy for each surviving spouse of clergy or laity member in the year the Memorial is printed in the Journal at no cost.
 - b) One paper copy to each conference officers, agency chairpersons, and general and jurisdictional agencies as required by the Discipline.
 - c) One mailed paper copy upon request to retired clergy.
 - d) A hard copy printed journal will be produced and available to all members upon request. A minimum fee for production and mailing costs will be assessed to each hard copy journal request. The amount to be paid for the journal will be published in advance.
 - e) An online version of the journal will be available on www.gnjumc.org and available for download and review.
 - f) All Annual Conference reports will be made available on the conference website.
 - g) The Conference Journal will not be produced in CD format.

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- 24) Copyright** – In order to protect its directories and contents from unauthorized use, the Conference Secretary shall copyright the Journal on behalf of the Annual Conference.
- 25) Mail Ballot** - In an emergency situation as declared by the Council on Finance and Administration, a mail ballot may be taken of the Annual Conference. All members of the Annual Conference immediately preceding the emergency will receive ballots. The vote will be confidential with the outside envelope requiring the signature of the member.
- 26) Remote Participation Annual Conference** - In a situation which a state of emergency has been declared by the Governor of New Jersey or other applicable governmental authority, or in extraordinary circumstances as declared by the Bishop, Cabinet, Conference Trustees and CFA, the regular Annual Conference session, or a Special Annual Conference session, or parts of either, can be held by means of remote participation. Notice of such a session and all such means of remote participation shall meet all requirements of the Discipline, applicable state law, and the Rules of Order, including without limitation:
- authorization and prior notice of the meeting and means of participation.
 - verification of membership and voting credentials.
 - reasonable opportunity to concurrently see, read or hear, participate and vote; and
 - record and maintain a record of any votes or other actions.

27) Order of Precedence of Motions –

Main motions

28) Main Motion – A main motion is a proposal that the Conference take certain action, or that it express itself as holding certain views. Any member may make a motion.

29) Motions Which Are Not Debatable – The following motions shall be acted upon without debate:

- To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn the conference.
- To suspend the rules. (2/3 vote)

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- c) To take from the table.
- d) To call for the previous question. (2/3 vote)
- e) To reconsider a non-debatable motion
- f) To limit or extend the limits of debate. (2/3 vote)
- g) To call for the order of the day.

30) Precedence of Secondary Motions – If any one or more of the following motions are pending, the order of precedence in relation to one another shall be the same as the order of their listing below:

- a) To fix the time at which the Conference shall adjourn. (This motion is subject to amendment, or it may be laid on the table.)
- b) To adjourn.
- c) To take a recess.
- d) To order the previous question.
- e) To lay on the table.
- f) To limit or extend the limits of debate.
- g) To postpone to a certain time.
- h) To commit or refer.
- i) To amend or substitute.
- j) To postpone indefinitely.

31) When a Second is not required – The following do not require a second, pursuant to latest edition of Roberts Rules of Order.

- a) To raise a question of privilege.
- b) Question of order.
- c) Objection to the consideration of a question.
- d) Call for the order of the day.
- e) Call for the division of the question.
- f) Call for the division of the Conference (for voting).
- g) Call for the motion to reconsider.
- h) Filling blanks.
- i) Nominations.
- j) Leave to withdraw a motion.
- k) Inquiries of any kind.
- l) Presentation of a report or recommendation by a Conference agency.

32) Division of Question – Before a vote is taken, any member has the right to call for the division of the question as the member indicates, if it is subject to division. If no member objects, the division shall be made; but if there is objection, the Chair, not waiting for a second, shall put the division to a vote.

33) Tabling Related Motions – No motion that adheres to another motion or has another motion adhering to it can be laid on the table by itself. If they are laid on the table, such motions carry with them the motions to which they respectively adhere, or which adhere to them.

34) Motions After Speaking on a Pending Question

- a) A member may make a motion after a speech, although strict parliamentary practice requires motion to be made and seconded before a speech is made so the Conference may determine if it wishes to hear the matter.

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- b) No member who has spoken on a pending question shall at the close of the speech have the right to call for the previous question, to move for indefinite postponement, or to lay the motion on the table.
- 35) Previous Question** – To move the previous question is to move that the vote now be taken on the motion or motions pending.
- a) When moving a previous question, a member shall indicate to what such action applies if any secondary motion or motions are pending. If the member does not so indicate, the chair may regard it as applying only to the immediate pending question. This vote shall be taken without debate and if, in the judgment of the chair, two thirds (2/3) of those present vote for its adoption, the vote shall be taken on the motion or motion to which it applies.
 - b) It shall not be in order to move the previous question in cases involving character or Conference relations, or where the Rules otherwise expressly limit when it is in order to move the previous question.
- 36) Reconsideration of a Question** – A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order at any time during the prevailing session if offered by a member who voted with the majority. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is not debatable, the motion to reconsider may not be debated.
- 37) Suspension of Rules** – The application of any of the provisions of these Rules of Order may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Conference.
- 38) Motions and Resolutions are to be Written** –
- a) All motions, resolutions and reports shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary, properly signed by the movers thereof.
 - b) Motions made on the floor shall be written on forms provided by the Secretary.
- 39) When a Motion is in Possession of the Conference** – When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution introduced and seconded, or a report presented and/or read before the Conference or stated by the Chair it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference. But any motion may be withdrawn or altered by the mover with the consent of the Conference at any time before voting has commenced.
- 40) Amendments and Substitutions** –
- a) Only one amendment to an amendment shall be in order.
 - b) It is in order to move a substitute for the main motion. In such case, the Chair shall proceed to perfect the original motion. When the main motion has been perfected, the Chair shall state the question on the substitute. If the substitute is adopted, it shall replace the original main motion and become the main motion. The Chair will then state the question on the (new) main motion. The new main motion can be amended only by addition. If the substitute does not carry, the Chair shall state the question on the original main motion as it has been perfected.
- 41) Order of Amendments** – When a main motion, report or resolution is under consideration, only one amendment and one amendment to that amendment are permissible. While there can be only one amendment of each degree pending at the same time, any number of amendments can be offered in succession. A substitute and one amendment to the substitute may be offered while amendments of the first and second degree are pending. The permissive order then is: 1) main motion, 2) amendment, 3) amendment to the amendment, 4) substitute, and 5) amendment to the substitute. The voting in this order is 3, 2, 5, 4, 1. If the substitute becomes the main motion, it shall be treated as such.

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- 42) Appeal** – An appeal from the decision of the Chair shall be taken without debate, provided that after the Chair shall have stated the reason for the decision, the appellant may give the grounds for the appeal. (§ 51)
- 43) The Question of Consideration** – The question of consideration may be raised by any member upon the presentation of any matter that shall be deemed irrelevant, unprofitable, or contentious, and shall be decided without debate by majority vote. This applies only to the main motion.
- 44) Method of Voting** – Voting shall be by voice vote and/or show of hands, or by standing count (provided that in such a count those who cannot stand may vote by raising hands), or by ballot, at the discretion of the Presiding Officer, unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. It shall be in order for any member to call for a vote by count on any question before the Conference, and, if the call be sustained by one-third (1/3) of the members present and voting, a vote shall be taken as called for.
- 45) Robert's Rules of Order, Supplemental Authority** – In any parliamentary situation not covered in these Rules of Order, the Conference shall be governed in its action by the appropriate provisions of the latest revision of Robert's Rules of Order.

V SPEAKING ON THE FLOOR

- 46) Securing the Floor** – Before speaking in debate or delivering any matter to the Conference, a member shall approach and wait at a microphone provided for addressing the Conference from the floor or shall raise a card provided for the purpose of gaining recognition. When the member has been recognized by the bishop, the member shall proceed to speak at a designated microphone. Before addressing the purpose of speaking, members shall state their names and local church or affiliation.
- 47) Limitations on Debate** –
- a) The chairperson of the agency that originated the report or recommendation(s) shall present them as the main motion before the plenary session and shall have five (5) minutes for comment, except as provided under h) below.
 - b) If there is a (are) minority report(s) or recommendation(s) from members of the agency, a representative shall be allowed five (5) minutes for a presentation.
 - c) All debate on the floor of the Conference shall follow the principle of alternate debate, that is, a speaker for, then a speaker against. When no speaker on the side opposed to the last speaker is ready, the President may recognize one who desires to speak on the same side as the prior speaker.
 - d) No person shall speak more than once on the same question without permission of the Conference, except as provided under g) below.
 - e) No person shall speak more than three (3) minutes at one time without permission of the Conference, except as provided under a) or h).
 - f) The initiator of the main motion shall in all cases be entitled to three (3) minutes to either
 - i. oppose the motion to lay the report or recommendation(s) on the table.
 - ii. close the debate before the report or recommendation is voted upon.

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- g) An agency presenting Special Reports at the direction of the Conference shall have sufficient time as determined by the Sessions Committee to present such reports and recommendations.
 - h) Except for non-debatable motions, no report or motion shall be put to the question without the opportunity having been given for at least two (2) speeches for and two (2) speeches against the pending question. After two (2) speeches pro and two (2) speeches con and provided no secondary (subsidiary, privileged--other than "previous question"-- or incidental) motions come to the floor and no other member seeks the floor to speak on the pending question, the question shall automatically be put to the question.
 - i) The motion for the previous question shall not be in order on the pending question until opportunity has been given for at least two (2) members to speak on each side of the pending question. If, after reasonable opportunity has been offered by the chair, no member has requested to speak against a resolution, motion or amendment, any member may move the previous question, to close debate. Likewise, if one member has spoken against a resolution, motion or amendment, but, after reasonable opportunity has been offered by the chair, no second member has requested to speak against the measure, any member may move the previous question, to close debate.
- 48) Representation of Committees** – When the chairperson of a Conference agency is not in harmony with a report or recommendation adopted by the agency, it shall be the chairperson's duty to state the fact to the agency. The agency may then elect one of its members to represent it in the presentation of the report or recommendation in Conference. If the committee fails to elect such a representative, the chairperson may designate a member to represent the committee.
- 49) To Limit or Extend Debate** – To move to limit or extend the limits of debate is in order at any time, except when a member has the floor, except as otherwise specifically provided elsewhere in the Rules.
- 50) Interrupting the Speaker** – No one shall interrupt a member who has the floor except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, a departure from the question, to direct the attention of the Conference that the time has arrived for a special order of the day, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
- 51) Questions of Privilege** – All requests from the floor to be recognized for matters of privilege must be made in writing to the Conference Secretary. They shall state the reason for the request to address the conference and the purpose of the request. The requests will be reviewed by a committee composed of the Conference Lay Leader, Conference Secretary, and the Chair of Conference Sessions. The committee shall recommend to the Presiding Bishop whether or not to recognize the requestor for the purpose of presenting the matter of privilege. The Presiding Bishop shall have sole authority in receiving and acting upon the recommendation of the committee.
- 52) Announcements, Courtesy Presentations and Distribution of Papers** –
- a) Announcements of matters of information to the Conference shall be submitted on the Announcement Authorization Form to the Conference Secretary before the conclusion of the plenary session prior to the plenary session when the

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announcement will be made unless it is an emergency matter which may be submitted as soon as possible after the matter is known.

- b) Requests to make Courtesy Presentation speeches during a plenary session by a person not a member of Annual Conference or by a member are subject to the discretion of the bishop. As a general rule, no presentations or speeches will be made to the Conference outside the agenda.
- c) Papers or other materials may not be distributed to the members during the Conference sessions, except with express prior permission by the bishop.

53) Privilege of the Floor for Lay Members of Conference Agencies – Laypersons not members of the Conference but currently serving on Conference agencies shall have the privilege of the floor without vote.

54) Lay Officers of a Conference Agency – Any Lay Officer of any Conference agency, who is not a lay member of the Conference, shall have the privilege to move and defend the report of the group such Lay Officer represents, without vote.

VI NOMINATIONS

55) The Committee on Nominations and its Ministry – The Committee on Nominations will consist of the District Lay Leaders, the Conference Lay Leader, the Director of Connectional Ministries, and the District Superintendents. The Committee shall nominate the appropriate number of people each year to the Annual Conference Session for election.

- a) The Committee on Nominations will develop and use a system to identify nominees based on their gifts, experience, and skills that will help the Conference achieve its vision, mission, and goals as adopted by the Annual Conference, particularly leadership evidenced in making and maturing disciples, growing vital congregations and transforming lives and communities. Additionally, the Committee shall ensure the nominations reflect the diversity of the Conference.
- b) Agency members shall be elected and placed into four staggered classes and each class will serve for a term of two years. An agency member may serve for four terms for a maximum of eight years. Nominations and elections will follow the rotation schedule unless otherwise mandated by the Book of Discipline.
- c) In order to aid the Committee on Nominations in its work, it is requested that any member of the Conference who has a personal preference to serve on any particular agency communicate such personal preference to the chairperson of the Committee on Nominations on the appropriate form prior to January 1.
- d) Nothing herein shall exclude additional nominations from the floor of the Conference. All nominations from the floor must be submitted on forms supplied in the pre-conference mailing or secured from the Chairperson of Nominations prior to placing the name in nomination. The signatures of the nominator and nominee must be on the form, or it will be declared invalid.

56) Chairpersons and Officers –

- a) For the sake of empowering diverse leadership, the Committee on Nominations shall nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, all chairpersons and officers for agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils, and teams except where the

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Book of Discipline instructs differently. All terms shall be for the quadrennial, or such other period as specified by the action of the Conference.

- b) The Committee on Nominations shall nominate all chairpersons and officers for agencies, boards, commissions, committees, council, and teams [hereinafter Agency/Agencies] that the Book of Discipline requires to select its own chair and officers. These nominations shall not come before Annual Conference but shall be presented directly to the respective Agencies for vote at their first meeting after Annual Conference. In the absence of a duly elected Chair, whose term has not yet expired, the District Superintendent assigned to the agency either permanently, or for the election process, shall chair the meeting until the new chair is elected.¹
- c) In all nominations, special attention shall be given to seeking diversity of inclusion by gender, age, racial and ethnic background, and to inclusion of people with disabilities and from all size churches. (See Discipline paragraph 610.5)

57) To Fill Vacancies –

- a) The Committee on Nominations is to recommend to the Connectional Table Executive Committee any persons to fulfill an unexpired term of any agency vacancy between Annual Conference Sessions except where the Discipline instructs differently.
- b) Preference will be given to members of the Annual Conference to serve on conference agencies when they have the skills, experience and qualities being sought for an agency.
- c) The Connectional Table Executive Committee shall approve the appointments or request additional nominations, in which case the Committee on Nominations is to submit new nominations. These individuals serve until they or someone else is elected at the next Annual Conference Session.
- d) When a person duly nominated and elected to any Conference agency does not attend three (3) consecutive meetings of the agency, it shall be the responsibility of the chairperson to attempt to contact that person by mail or telephone with a view to activation or resignation. The chairpersons shall report in writing annually to the Chairperson of the Committee on Nominations regarding contact with all non-participants and the results of such contacts. This information shall be provided by January 31 of each year.

58) Elections –

- a) The report of the Committee on Nominations shall be distributed in the Pre-Conference mailing and/or the packet received at the seat of the Annual Conference. The report shall be presented without reading. Upon adoption of a motion to close nominations, the Chairperson of the Committee on Nominations shall move the election of all nominees whose elections are uncontested.
- b) When the number of persons nominated exceeds the vacancies on an agency or when more than one person is nominated for a specific office, there shall be a secret ballot listing only those persons where a contest exists. The ballot will be taken at a time subsequent to the election in a) above. The ballot shall be distributed, collected and tallied by tellers selected by the Conference Secretary,

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who shall report the results listing only those elected. Election shall be by a majority of those voting. Lacking a majority, there shall be another ballot listing only those receiving 25% or more of the votes.

59) Quadrennial Agencies -

- a) An elected member of a conference or district committee, board or agency shall be eligible for not more than two consecutive four year terms unless specified otherwise in the Book of Discipline. Service of two years or more in filling an unexpired or vacated position shall be counted as a full four-year term. For this purpose, annual conference to annual conference shall be considered one year, regardless of the actual dates of the conferences.
- b) Persons elected by the Annual Conference to serve in an affiliated organization* may serve in accord with the by-laws of the organization in which they are elected to serve, except that no term of office may exceed five years. All persons elected or reelected to serve in an affiliated organization shall be elected in accord with the Annual Conference rules on nomination and election.

*An affiliated organization is one that wishes to maintain a connectional relationship with the United Methodist Church through the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.

- c) Members of the Annual Conference who are voting members of a general agency shall serve as ex-officio (with vote) members of the corresponding annual conference agency or its equivalent structure (§§610.6, 710.4 and 710.6).

60) Quorum – The members present and voting at any duly announced meeting of a Conference agency, board, commission, committee, council or team shall constitute a quorum.

61) Limitations of Service – No person shall be elected to more than two conference agencies, boards, commissions, committees, councils or teams, except for persons who are ex-officio members by virtue of an office or as a member of a general agency.

62) District Superintendent Voting – A District Superintendent regularly assigned to any Conference agency by the Cabinet shall have a vote in that agency, and shall be the only District Superintendent who shall have the right to vote in such agency, except where the Discipline provides otherwise.

VII PETITIONS AND ELECTIONS TO GENERAL AND JURISDICTIONAL CONFERENCE

63) Petitions to General Conference – All petitions to General Conference shall be presented as prescribed in ¶ 507 of the Discipline. Petitions for endorsement by the Annual Conference to General Conference will only be considered in the year in which General Conference delegates will be elected.

64) Nominations – In a year in which elections to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences are to be held, the Conference Secretary shall open nominations for lay and clergy delegates on December 15 and nominations will be closed on February 15. An individual who desires to be a delegate shall download and complete a candidacy nominations form from the web page. On the bottom of nominations for Lay Delegates shall be the names of two Lay Members of the Annual Conference who endorse the nomination of the candidate. On the bottom of nominations for Clergy Delegates shall be the names of two Clergy Members who are eligible to vote for such delegates, and who endorse the nomination of the candidate.

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- a) Nominees may address their respective sessions for no more than one minute each, provided that no more than forty-five minutes shall be allotted for speeches. If more than 45 lay persons or clergy persons are nominated, the allowed times for individual speeches will be adjusted accordingly. No speeches regarding nominees will be in order after the original time allotted for such speeches.
- 65) Balloting** – The Conference Secretary shall announce the number of clergy delegates to be elected. A like number of lay delegates will be elected.
- a) The time of initial balloting shall be set by the agenda committee.
 - b) Balloting shall be by electronic or mechanical means.
 - c) The Secretary shall announce a Chief Clergy Teller and a Chief Lay Teller, and two lists each of clergy and lay assistants.
- 66) Voting** – All members, lay and clergy, must be within the bar of the Conference to be eligible to vote.
- a) Before each ballot, the President shall announce the number of delegates each ballot shall elect. To be effective, a ballot must list the exact number of names of lay or clergy delegates to be elected.
 - b) The intent of the voter shall be allowed regardless of mistakes in spelling.
 - c) Where there is more than one member with the same family name, the Christian name or identifying initials shall precede the family name.
 - d) A majority of valid votes cast shall be necessary for election, except on the ballot to elect reserve delegates pursuant to Rule 68.
 - e) Only those nominated are eligible for election. If a ballot lists someone who has not been nominated, the ballot will be disqualified.
- 67) Counting and Reporting** –
- a) After a ballot has been counted, the chief teller, either clergy or lay, shall furnish a written report to the bishop, which shall contain (a) the number of ballots cast; (b) the number of ballots not valid; (c) the number of valid ballots counted; (d) the number of ballots necessary to elect; and (e) the list of names of persons voted for, including the number of votes received by each. The results will be disclosed or displayed before the next ballot is taken.
 - b) Minimum Votes. On the first ballot for both General Conference and the jurisdictional conference, the presiding officer shall read or distribute all names receiving 5 or more votes, together with the number of votes cast for each. Thereafter, the minimum number of votes received to be included in the next ballot shall be increased by five for each delegate elected (that is, on the first ballot a minimum of 5 votes to be included in the next ballot; after the election of the first delegate, a minimum of 10 votes to be included in the next ballot; after the election of the second delegate, a minimum of 15 votes, etc.). After the ballot in which the last delegate is elected to the General Conference, all the names that were originally nominated are available for election to Jurisdictional conference. Those elected to General Conference will not be listed.
 - c) If necessary, another ballot shall be taken in like manner, and so on, until the proper number of delegates has been chosen.
- 68) Qualifications** –

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- a) Clergy Delegates – The Discipline, ¶ 35 (Article IV), permits any active or retired member of the Annual Conference in full connection to be eligible for election to the General or Jurisdictional Conferences.
 - b) Lay Delegates - The Discipline, ¶ 36 (Article V), asserts that lay delegates shall be elected “without regard to age, provided that such delegates shall have been professing members of the United Methodist Church for at least two years next preceding their election, and shall have been active participants in the United Methodist church for at least four years next preceding their election, and are members thereof within the Annual Conference electing them at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional Conferences.”
- 69) Reserve Delegates** – After the authorized numbers of delegates have been elected, 3 clergy and 3 lay reserve delegates shall be elected on a single ballot, with the 3 persons receiving the greatest number of votes in each category being elected in the order of the number of votes received.

VIII CONCERNING FINANCIAL OPERATIONS

- 70) Budget** – The Annual Conference shall adopt at each Annual Session a budget for each of the following: Clergy Support, Administrative Costs of the Annual Conference, World Service, Conference Benevolences, and other Apportioned Funds. These budgets become effective for the fiscal year beginning on January 1st following the session. Apportionments of these budgets shall be sent to the several churches as soon after the session as is feasible.
- 71) Apportionments** – The Conference Shared Ministry Budget shall be apportioned annually among the churches of the Conference according to a formula recommended by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and adopted by the Annual Conference. Following adoption, the formula will remain in effect until such time as changes are recommended by the CF&A and adopted by the Annual Conference. The formula shall be outlined on a Shared Ministry data sheet, which shall be distributed to the churches as soon as practical after the end of each year’s annual conference, but in no event later than the end of the fiscal year.
- 72) Prior Action by Council on Finance and Administration** – Every motion, recommendation, resolution, or other legislative act having to do with budgeting, apportionments, allotments or expenditure of funds shall first be submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration. After adequate time is allowed for investigation and study, the council shall report its recommendation to the Conference. This report shall be received before such legislation may be acted upon by the Annual Conference.
- a) No agency or member of the Conference shall commit the Conference financially for the support of programs within or beyond the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference without first obtaining the approval of the Annual Conference after study and recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration, and not until funds are available or have been allocated to meet such commitments.
 - b) Any person or agency requesting an emergency offering should contact one of the Team Coordinators, who will present the matter to the Cabinet and the Council on Finance and Administration. Any funds received as a result of such an offering will

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be held by the treasurer and administered by a task force established by the Cabinet for that particular appeal.

73) Time Limit on Submitting Budget Requests –

- a) Requests for inclusion of an item in the Clergy Support Budget and/or the Administrative Costs of the Annual Conference Budget to be acted on by an Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Treasurer's office by the third Monday of January preceding the date of the Annual Conference, except in cases of unavoidable emergency.
- b) Requests for inclusion of an item in the World Service Budget and/or the Conference Benevolences Budget to be acted on by an Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Connectional Table by January 15 preceding the date of the Annual Conference, except in cases of unavoidable emergency.

74) Amending Allotments – An agency shall not attempt to amend its allotment in a proposed budget submitted to an Annual Conference unless it has previously presented an appeal to the Council on Finance and Administration at a meeting held preceding the date of the Conference.

75) Increased Asking by Amendment – In amending a proposed budget on the floor of the Annual Conference, no item shall be increased above the amount originally requested by the responsible agency in its asking to the Council on Finance and Administration, except when the consent of both the agency and the Council on Finance and Administration has been obtained.

76) Proper Use of Budgeted Funds – No agency of the Conference shall spend budgeted funds for any purpose other than the general purpose for which the funds were originally requested unless the consent of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Ministries Team has been obtained for such a reallocation. An expenditure item shall be budgeted for the year when it is expected to be spent, and it shall be spent only in the year for which it is budgeted. When uncontrollable circumstances warrant, an emergency request may be directed through the Ministries Team to the Council on Finance and Administration for a budget adjustment.

77) Financial Appeals to the Churches – Any agency planning to send a communication or appeal to the churches requesting contributions to any agency or fund shall first submit its proposed communication or appeal to the Council on Finance and Administration. The Council shall ascertain if the procedure is in accord with existing legislation and shall make certain that remitting instructions are correct. Any contribution received by the Conference Treasurer in response to a communication which has not been cleared as herein provided shall be credited automatically to World Service and Conference Benevolences through the remitting church.

78) Customary Draft – When presented and endorsed, the customary draft from the United Methodist Publishing House shall be turned over to the Conference Treasurer for pensions for clergy of the central conferences.

79) Bonding – All persons who hold or disburse conference funds shall be bonded in such amounts as may be deemed wise by the Council on Finance and Administration.

80) Fiscal Year – The fiscal year shall coincide with the calendar year unless another fiscal year is designated by the Conference Treasurer after approval by the Conference. All payments to be credited to a given fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference

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Treasurer not later than the following January 20th. All local church financial reports shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer by a deadline to be announced annually.

- 81) Audit** – The Council on Finance and Administration shall be responsible for arranging that a Certified Public Accountant shall audit the accounts of the Annual Conference. The Council on Finance and Administration shall publish a statement of Certification of each audit in the Journal.

IX CONSENT CALENDAR

82) Consent Calendar –

- a) The Conference Agenda Committee may present to the Annual Conference a proposed consent calendar, including those items which the Annual Conference may approve with one vote of approval by the Conference membership.
- b) A written list of items on the consent calendar, including the name of the motion, name of the author, and page number in the Pre-Conference Workbook will be presented to all members of the Conference upon check-in at the Conference session.
- c) The consent calendar list will include a space where Conference members may check any item(s) which they would like to see removed from the consent calendar.
- d) To vote to remove an item from the consent calendar, Conference members must:
 - i. Check the item(s) they wish to see removed from the list, or
 - ii. Write in an item which has been added subsequently by Conference action.
 - iii. Print his or her name and church on the list, and sign the list.
 - iv. Bring the list to the Conference Secretary's table and give the list to the Conference Secretary or one of the Assistant Secretaries.
- e) If any item on the consent calendar receives ten (10) or more such votes in favor of removing it from the consent calendar, that item will be removed and placed on the Conference agenda by the Agenda Committee.
- f) All requests for items to be removed from the consent calendar shall be delivered to the Conference Secretary as early as possible, but no requests will be received within the last twenty-four (24) hours before the stated time of adjournment of the Conference session. During this last twenty-four (24) hour period, items may only be removed from the consent calendar by a $\frac{3}{4}$ vote of the Conference.

X NOMINATION OF EPISCOPAL CANDIDATES

83) Nomination of Episcopal Candidates - The procedure for nomination of Episcopal Candidates to the Jurisdictional Conference as permitted by ¶1405 of the Book of Discipline shall be as follows:

- a) In a year in which one or more Episcopal Candidates are to be nominated by the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall provide for the receiving of nominations until the deadline for submission of proposed legislation for that year's annual conference. Each proposed nomination shall be submitted on one side of an 8 ½ x 11-inch sheet of paper or by electronic means designated by the Conference

Secretary. Only eligible persons may be nominated. The bishop shall, before the ballot is taken, remind the Annual Conference of the eligibility requirements for election to the office of the episcopacy.

- b) The Jurisdictional Conference delegates (acting as a group) shall have the privilege to speak to the Annual Conference on behalf of the person(s) they have endorsed for nomination to the episcopacy (provided they have submitted such nomination in the manner described in Rule 82(a) above). If no other nominations have been submitted as indicated in Rule 82(a) above, the bishop shall call for a vote of the body. A majority vote will be sufficient for this person (these persons) to be recognized as the episcopal nominee(s) of the Annual Conference.
- c) If there are additional nominations submitted in accordance with Rule 82(a) above, the Bishop shall call for a written or electronic ballot following this procedure.
 - i. Nominees may each give a three-minute speech. There shall be no seconding speeches.
 - ii. If any ballot contains the name of an ineligible person, that name shall not be tallied, but other names on the ballot shall be tallied.
 - iii. Conference members may vote for one such nominated individual. An individual must receive 60% of those voting to be nominated by the Annual Conference. If an individual does not receive 60% of the vote by the fifth ballot there will be no nominee. If someone is nominated, the conference will take up to three ballots to see if a second person is nominated. If no one receives 60% of the vote by the third ballot there will not be a second nominee. Those who do not wish to see anyone nominated may so indicate that desire on their ballots (in the manner prescribed by the Conference Secretary) and the ballot shall be counted as cast.
- d) Only the persons selected in the foregoing manner shall be deemed Nominees of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference.
- e) This procedure shall not foreclose efforts by individuals or groups in the Annual Conference to promote the candidacy for the episcopacy of other persons.

XI RULES OF ORDER RESOLUTIONS

84) Resolutions to Change the Rules of Order –

- a) Any resolution or proposed change, by addition or deletion to the Rules of Order, with the exception of ***Concerning Financial Operations***, shall first be referred to the Committee on Rules of Order for its recommendation. The Committee shall submit its recommendation to the body prior to any action by the body. The initiator of any proposed change to be included in the Pre-conference mailing shall at the same time submit a copy of said proposed change to the chairperson of the Committee on Rules of Order. The Rules Committee may request a meeting with the initiator prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.
- b) If the change is proposed at the site of the Annual Conference, it shall be referred to the Committee on Rules of Order and a report to the body will be made no later than the next plenary session.

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XII HOLY CONFERENCING PROCEDURE FOR CERTAIN GENERAL CONFERENCE PETITIONS

85) A procedure to facilitate holy conferencing shall be used, at the Bishop's discretion, to discuss petitions to General Conference regarding issues related to human sexuality or such other issues that would benefit from the same procedure.

A special order of the day will be established to provide for holy conferencing. The special order of the day shall proceed as follows:

- i. Representatives of the two primary positions selected by the bishop will each make a twenty-minute presentation.
- ii. Upon conclusion of the opening presentations, the bishop shall bring the Conference into silent prayer for two minutes.
- iii. Then ten minutes will be provided for delegates to share what they heard with their fellow Christians seated to their immediate left and right. This is not a time for debate, but rather to listen to what their neighbors heard.
- iv. The bishop will then call the Conference to order. Delegates will then have the opportunity to share their thoughts with the Conference. The bishop shall establish a total amount of time for discussion, not to exceed sixty minutes. No member may speak longer than two minutes. All speakers will be notified when ten seconds remain of their time. The speaker will be allowed to finish a sentence at the expiration of allotted time. Then, that microphone will be cut off and the next speaker will be recognized. This will continue until the total allotted minutes have elapsed or everyone who wished to be recognized had an opportunity to speak, whichever comes first. No subsidiary privileged or incidental motions will be in order during this time of discussion.
- v. The regular business of the Conference will then resume.

At a previously noted time during plenary session on the following session day, the petitions will be voted upon by secret written ballot. Thirty minutes will be allotted for this vote. No debate or motions will be in order at this time.

XIII HOLY CONFERENCING PROCEDURE FOR PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

86) A procedure to facilitate holy conferencing shall be used at the bishop's discretion to discuss proposed Constitutional amendments coming from the General Conference.

A special order of the day may be established to provide for holy conferencing. The special order of the day shall proceed as follows:

- i. The co-chairs of the delegation to General Conference will present the proposed amendments to the Conference in a fifteen-minute presentation.
- ii. Upon conclusion of the opening presentation, the bishop shall bring the Conference into silent prayer for two minutes.
- iii. Then up to ten minutes will be provided for members to share what they heard with their fellow Christians seated to their immediate left and right. This is not a time for debate, but rather to listen to what their neighbors heard.
- iv. The bishop will then call the Conference to order. Members will then have the opportunity to share their thoughts with the Conference. Sixty minutes will be

allotted for this. No member may speak longer than two minutes. Each speaker will be notified when ten seconds remains of their time. The speaker will be allowed to finish a sentence at the expiration of their time. Then, that microphone will be cut off and the next speaker will be recognized. This will continue until sixty minutes have elapsed or everyone who wishes to speak has been recognized whichever comes first. No changes are permitted to be made to Constitutional amendments.

- v. The regular business of the Conference will then resume.

At a previously noted time during a subsequent plenary session, the amendments will be voted upon by secret ballot. Members will be able to vote in favor of or against each individual amendment. If a member wishes to abstain, the member will leave the ballot blank for that particular amendment.

Should any of the foregoing Rules of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference be in conflict with the provisions of the current Book of Discipline, then the provisions of the Discipline shall take precedence.

Trustees Enabling Resolutions

Be it resolved that the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church hereby ratifies, approves, and confirms actions taken by the Conference Board of Trustees since the last Annual Session.

Be it further resolved that if subsequent to this Annual Session of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and prior to the 2022 Annual Session, any property, real or personal, that is conveyed or transferred to the Annual Conference by any church or other person, firm, partnership, or corporation, the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and empowered, in its discretion, provided that the same be approved by the Bishop and Cabinet, to sell, transfer, lease or convey any such real or personal property for such price and at such time or times and upon such other terms and conditions as the Board of Trustees of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church shall determine; and

Be it further resolved that the proper officers of the Board of Trustees of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church be and hereby are authorized in the name and on behalf of the Conference, to execute and deliver the Conference deed of conveyance or instrument of transfer and all other instruments and documents to implement and carry out the purpose and intent of the foregoing resolution and to affix the corporate seal of the Conference thereto; and

Be it further resolved that the President or Vice-President or Treasurer of the Corporation is hereby fully authorized and empowered to transfer, convey, endorse, sell, assign, and deliver, any and all stock, bonds, evidence of interest and/or indebtedness and all other securities, corporate or otherwise, now, or hereafter standing in the name or owned by this Corporation and to make, execute and deliver, any property to effectuate the authority hereby conferred; and

Be it further resolved that whenever there shall be annexed to any instrument of assignment and transfer, executed pursuant to and in accordance with the foregoing resolution, a certificate of Secretary or of an Assistant Secretary of this Corporation in the office at the date of such certificate shall set forth these resolutions and shall state that these resolutions are in full force and effect, then all persons to whom such instrument with the annexed certificate shall thereafter come, shall be entitled without further inquiry or investigation and regardless of the date of such certificate, to assume and to act in reliance upon the assumptions that the shares of stock or other securities named in such instrument were therefore duly and properly transferred, endorsed, sold, assigned, set over and delivered by this Corporation, and that with respect to such securities the authority of these resolutions and of such officers is still in full force and effect; and

Be it further resolved that after this Annual Session of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and prior to the 2022 Annual Session, the Board of Trustees of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference is hereby authorized to acquire or dispose of District parsonages, Program Director's, and Treasurer's residences, as in its discretion, it may deem necessary and advisable and in accordance with The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. The Conference Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into such contracts of sale and such other documents as may be necessary to effectuate the sale, transfer, or purchase of such properties. Such properties, real or personal, may be sold or acquired from any person or persons, firm, partnership, or

Conference Advance Specials

Be It Resolved that the 2021 Session of the Greater New Jersey Conference designates the following ministries and institutions as Conference Advance Specials for the 2022 conference year (without restricting in anyway a local church's ability to support other mission work):

Be It Further Resolved that the Executive Committee of the Connectional Table be authorized to make any additions and deletions to the Conference Advance Specials list based upon recommendations of the Conference Board of Global Ministries.

C.A.M.P. YDP (Community Association with a Ministry to People Youth Development Program) Provides pre-school, after-school and summer programs for children aged 5 - 14 and their families, mainly on the north side of Paterson. The program runs throughout the year. As an organization, we are committed to work as a "partner" within the community. A stimulating and nurturing environment is provided. Total care is available as well when schools are not in session with transportation available to pick up children from certain schools.

Centenary Fund/Preachers Aid Fund Supporting retired clergy and spouses.

Christian Outreach Project provides no-cost home repairs to persons in need in the northwest area of our Conference. Participants are made up of high school youth and adult volunteers. In addition to home repairs, participants engage in morning devotionals, singing, worship services and recreational activities.

CUMAC/ECHO works to alleviate hunger and its root causes for those in need in Paterson, Passaic County, and northern NJ. CUMAC has a Pantry feeding 3,000+ monthly. Our Depot warehouses over 2 million pounds of food annually for a network of about 40 partner feeding programs. This Community Food Coalition (CFC) distributes food while also screening clients for member pantries. We advocate at the local and state level on behalf of CFC clients. CUMAC also has a Community Closet that offers clothing & household items; Pathways to Work imparts job skills and hands-on experience; Place of Promise is a supportive housing program for chronically homeless individuals; and our seasonal projects for school supplies, holiday gifts and other items for area children in need. All our programs rely heavily on volunteer and financial support from the community.

C.U.M.I. Camden Urban Ministry Initiative, a cooperative After-School Program is a shared ministry amongst Camden churches. This partnering reaches families to ensure positive development of children. We provide a safe environment for youth activities, such as an after-school program, summer day

camps, youth Bible study, choir, and a career training program. There are arts and cultural activities for all ages. The exchange of stories, wisdom, advice, and experience builds a shared understanding of family and community. This church-based intergenerational community surrounds our youth with caring Christian adults who encourage, support, and pray for our youth while also holding them accountable. We are dedicated to the spiritual, emotional, and social growth of Camden Youth.

First Friends of New Jersey and New York With the expansion of detention centers in New Jersey, the need to provide advocacy, research, and social services to detained and released detainees has increasingly grown. We provide a link to the outside world by providing toll free lines (English & Spanish) in five different detention facilities where more than 2000 individuals are detained, and through visiting individuals in detention. Our Pen-pal Program allows volunteers who cannot visit to write to detainees.

Justice for Our Neighbors (JFON) is a ministry that works with people God calls us to work with: the immigrant or what the Bible referred to as the stranger in both the Old Testament and Gospels. New Jersey is a state of immigrants. Unique to this ministry is that three conferences, Peninsula Delaware, Eastern Pennsylvania, and Greater New Jersey, will pool resources to serve together to support immigrants in the Southern New Jersey, Philadelphia, and Delaware Region. It will provide volunteer compassion ministry and professional legal services. Greater New Jersey has long provided such services to clergy and laity, particularly in Northern New Jersey. This new ministry will provide services in Southern New Jersey, particularly to those with the lowest incomes.

The Neighborhood Center has served the Camden community since 1913. Today, they are a community center that provides a healthy and nutritious lunch six days a week, day care, an after-school program, and an evening teen program. We focus on a two-generation approach to lift families out of poverty. Our commitment is to provide a safe space for Academic achievement, Athletic accomplishment, and a flourishing Arts program. Our hope and vision for the next century of service is to create a "community living room."

Pennington School A college preparatory institution affiliated with the Methodist Church, reflecting the principles espoused by John Wesley and core values of Honor, Virtue, and Humility. Students experience an environment where talents and values are forged for making a positive difference in the world. We provide half scholarships for students in grade 6 to 12.

Ranch Hope/Victory House Ranch Hope provides ministry to troubled boys ages 9 to 16 ½ and Victory House provides services to troubled girls between the ages of 14–18 years. We are faith-based and provide learning environments for those whose needs can best be met through experiences outside their homes. They can obtain or regain their long-term academic, behavioral, and spiritual focus in our residential setting. Counseling, housing, and recreation is offered, as well as spiritual guidance, time to attend chapel services and Bible study. We are licensed by the New Jersey State Department of Children and Families.

The Maker's Place is a new initiative of the United Methodist Church of Greater New Jersey. The goal is to connect neighbors in Trenton with neighbors in central New Jersey and beyond, by opening a neighborhood resource center that empowers poor and marginalized people in our capital city. The Maker's Place is a site for local mission and ministry. Starting with initiatives centered around food and families, The Maker's Place will cultivate transformative relationships that help people build bridges out of poverty and create a multiethnic and economically diverse community hub where all people can experience the wide welcome of God.

Equitable Compensation Recommendation for 2022

Whereas The Commission on Equitable Compensation in seeking to support quality pastoral leadership to help United Methodists of Greater New Jersey to grow in all areas of vitality recommends the following:

Be it resolved that the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference adopt the following recommendation for required minimum salary for persons under full-time appointment in the local church effective January 1, 2022.

- a. Elder and Deacon in Full Connection: \$48,550
- b. Provisional and Associate Members: \$45,130
- c. Full Time Local Pastor: \$42,700

Any changes in clergy ministry salaries related to a change in clergy status through ordination, commissioning, or licensing in 2021 will become effective as of January 1, 2022.

These salaries apply to clergy (elder and deacon in full connection, provisional elder and deacon, associate members, and local pastors) serving in full-time appointments in the local church. The years of service for each clergy can be found on the Clergy Service Record at Wespath (General Board of Pension and Health Benefits). In calculating years of service, time on leave of absence is not counted in accumulated years of service.

For purposes of pension credit and years of service calculations, the minimum equitable salary for $\frac{3}{4}$ time pastoral appointments shall be $\frac{3}{4}$ of the required minimum in the pastor's cash salary. The minimum equitable salary for $\frac{1}{2}$ time pastoral appointments shall be $\frac{1}{2}$ of the required minimum. All appointments less than $\frac{1}{2}$ shall be considered $\frac{1}{4}$ time appointments for pension purposes, and salaries shall be determined by the District Superintendent in consultation with the pastor and the local church S/PPRC.

Each pastor's salary is determined by the local church or charge in consultation with the District Superintendent provided that the required minimum salary is met. In determining a recommendation for salary, each Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee takes into consideration the pastor's years of experience, education, leadership ability, health and dental coverage, social security, and family needs.

All full-time pastors shall be provided with a parsonage or a housing/rental allowance as part of their total compensation package.

All full-time pastors shall have an accountable reimbursement expense line item in the church budget to cover mileage for pastoral work, continuing education, and other professional ministerial expenses as allowed by the IRS. The reimbursable amount shall be at least \$2,500. For churches receiving Equitable Compensation support, their accountable reimbursement should not exceed \$2,500.

Vacation Policy:

All pastors regardless of full or part time status shall be entitled to receive the following vacation per appointment year:

4 weeks (including 4 Sundays) of vacation consistent with the average work week; with 5 weeks (including 5 Sundays) after 10 years of full-time or equivalent part time service consistent with the Clergy Service Record.

Vacation time shall not be cumulative from year to year. Time spent in leadership responsibility in conference/district activities shall not be considered vacation time. This includes Course of Study, Local Pastors Licensing School, Camps, Annual Conference related Ministries, and other education and renewal as required by the Book of Discipline (§1350.2).

In setting clergy compensation, local church Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committees are encouraged to consider a minimum of \$300 per year of service increment above the basic minimum compensation up to a maximum 15 years. Years of service are determined by the number of full-time years (or equivalent) fully completed prior to January 1, 2022.

Greater New Jersey Conference Arrearage Policy for Clergy Salaries

Be it resolved that the Greater New Jersey Conference adopt the following arrearage policy for Clergy Salaries:

1. In the event that the local church treasurer becomes aware that the church will be unable to provide to the pastor full payment of a regularly scheduled salary, or housing allowance installment, or pension payment, or health insurance payment, the church treasurer shall immediately notify both verbally (within 24 hours) and in writing (within 3 days) the Pastor, the Lay Leader, and the Chairs of S/PPRC, Finance, Trustees, and the Church Council or equivalent of the impending arrearage. Upon receipt of such notice, the Chair of S/PPRC and/or the Pastor shall immediately notify the District Superintendent and congregation of the impending arrearage. It is the pastor's responsibility to keep copies of all such written notifications, and to provide additional written confirmation to the District Superintendent when an arrearage has taken place. Failure to document salary or benefit arrearages may result in a loss of compensation.
2. Upon receipt of notice of a pending arrearage, the Chair of S/PPRC shall meet with the Pastor, Lay Leader, and Chairs of Finance, Trustees, and the Church Council to discuss the financial situation and seek remedies to prevent an arrearage from occurring. Consistent with The Book of Discipline ¶624, such remedies cannot include a reduction in the Pastor's compensation until the beginning of the next Conference year.
3. If after consultation among these leaders it becomes apparent that the church may be facing a long-term financial crisis, the Chair of S/PPRC shall notify in writing the Pastor, congregation and District Superintendent to consider potential solutions including but not limited to developing a

payment plan so that the pastor receives full payment of compensation, full benefit payments are made by the end of the fiscal and/or appointment year. The District Superintendent may refer this to another appropriate resource person to work with the church towards resolution of the situation.

4. If the local church is already receiving a subsidy grant, the District Superintendent or designee will determine if all subsidy grant funds allocated to the church were used to pay the pastor's salary.
5. It is the responsibility of the pastor to provide evidence of an arrearage by providing documentation such as: Treasurer's Reports, Charge Conference reports, check stubs, etc.
6. The statute of limitations for any salary arrearage is one year from the date of the initial arrearage. However, once an appointment ends the Pastor no longer has claim on the local church for compensation funds (§342.4).

Standards for Parsonages

Revised January 2021

Be it resolved that the following recommendation be adopted as the standards for parsonages for GNJUMC effective July 1, 2021.

Standards For Parsonages

Responsible Group in the Church

The Book of Discipline does not mandate a parsonage committee; however, it is strongly recommended that each local church which has responsibility for a parsonage form a parsonage committee. The committee will follow-up to assure timely resolution of parsonage problems affecting the health and safety of the pastor and/or pastor's family (much like a landlord). The chairpersons of the S/PPRC, Board of Trustees and the pastor shall make an annual review of the church-owned parsonage to assure proper maintenance and up-keep. (§258.2 g(16) and §2532.4).

Standards for Existing Parsonages

All parsonages shall meet local requirements for a Certificate of Occupancy. It is the responsibility of the Board of Trustees to be familiar with these requirements.

For existing parsonages, each local charge shall provide and maintain the following furnishings, equipment and services:

1. Living room and family room furniture.
2. Dining room furniture.
3. Kitchen appliances including stove, refrigerator with separate freezer compartment, exhaust fan, and dishwasher.
4. Furnishings for special rooms such as sun porch, den, etc. that may be different from one charge to another.
5. Laundry equipment – automatic washer and dryer.

6. Standard television connection (providing at least 30 channels/basic cable package), high speed internet service fast enough to support streaming where available, and one telephone line (cell or land line). As churches/parsonages are located in a variety of geographical areas, we encourage discussion at the local church level to provide comparable communication services and cost saving measures such as bundling of services.
7. Floor coverings (solid surfaces are preferred).
8. Functioning window shades and blinds, or curtains/drapes.
9. One fire extinguisher in kitchen and one extinguisher outside of the furnace room. There shall be at least one extinguisher per floor level. All fire extinguishers, smoke detectors and Carbon Monoxide detectors are to be in compliance with local code requirements for rental properties and certificate of occupancy.
10. Closets or free-standing storage units in each bedroom.
11. Drive and walkways should be hard surfaced.
12. Minimally acceptable outside light for safety to illuminate walkways and driveways.
13. Trash cans. In municipalities where garbage pickup is not part of the tax base and is billed to the parsonage, that local church is responsible to pay for this service.
14. Suitable equipment for lawn care and snow removal corresponding to the size and condition of lawns/driveways/walkways and/or appropriate lawn/plowing services.
15. A study for the pastor in either the parsonage or church building. Office furnishings shall include a desk, desk chair, minimally acceptable shelving for the pastor's library, additional chairs, and a locking filing cabinet.
16. Parsonage electrical service shall conform to the current National Electrical Code.
17. Parking space for a minimum of one (1) car shall be provided.
18. The septic or sewer system shall be fully functional and meet the needs of the parsonage family. Maintenance of septic systems is the responsibility of the church.
19. In parsonages where there is a well, testing of water on a periodic basis should be done consistent with local health codes for rental properties.
20. Radon testing is strongly recommended to be done periodically consistent with EPA standards and local requirements.

Additional Suggestions

1. Electrical service to be inspected every five (5) years by a licensed electrician
2. Roof inspection every five (5) years
3. Energy audit every five (5) years

Responsibility

1. Each pastor is responsible for:

- a. Furnishings for as many bedrooms as the family needs
- b. Personal items such as television, vacuum cleaner, small appliances, dishes, glassware, flatware, cleaning tools, wastebaskets, and decorative accessories
- c. The following regular maintenance
 - i. Routine cleaning
 - ii. Floor maintenance
 - iii. Trash disposal and recycling
- d. It is expected that the pastor shall provide tenant (renters) insurance to cover property loss and personal liability.
- e. Restitution for any damage beyond moral wear and tear.

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- f. At the time of a move, the current pastor shall remove all personal items and furniture from the parsonage and property and shall leave the parsonage in a “broom clean” state. Pastors are responsible for cleaning and disinfecting all surfaces such as kitchen counters, appliances and cabinets, bathroom fixtures, and church owned furniture that has been used by the parsonage family during their time in the parsonage.

2. Each charge shall provide:

- a. Utilities – heat, electric, gas/oil, sewage, cable, internet, and basic telephone, as well as any property taxes or HOA fees that are assessed to the parsonage.
- b. Maintenance for all parsonage equipment
- c. Basic furniture for all rooms except the bedrooms (see above)
- d. Funds for the repair of the parsonage and its maintenance should be allocated and allowed to accumulate so that continuing care and major repairs can be made when needed.
- e. At the time of a move, the church is responsible for cleaning and preparing the parsonage for the new pastor and her/his family. This includes washing or dry-cleaning curtains and drapes, cleaning window blinds, shampooing carpets and/or washing floor coverings, washing windows, cleaning disinfecting garbage cans, doorknobs, etc.
- f. Congregations and pastors are expected to follow the guidelines of the state and the CDC with regard to effective and proper cleaning procedures of parsonages at the time of a pastoral change. The most updated information for cleaning and disinfection is available on the CDC website at <https://www.cdc.gov/>.

3. Miscellaneous

- a. The parsonage is the pastor’s home for his/her tenure in that church or charge. S/he has, therefore, the responsibility to care for the home and its furnishings from damage by pets or people and, if it is damaged, to return the home to a condition equal to that when s/he received it to use. If an item of furniture is damaged beyond repair, s/he is obligated to replace it.
- b. The right of the pastor to own furniture and equipment cannot be challenged. However, if s/he does own furniture and goods that s/he wishes to use in the parsonage, and parsonage furnishings have to be stored, s/he should make every effort to store it properly, so it is in good condition and does not suffer damage from being in storage. The site or method of storage for any church owned furniture shall be determined by mutual agreement between the pastor and the Board of Trustees. The pastor assumes financial responsibility for the storage of any unused furniture.
- c. We recommend that in addition to the required written reports filed annually with the Church Conference paperwork, there be a complete video/photo inventory of all church-owned furnishings in the parsonage. The inventory and all videos and photos should be updated annually as needed.
- d. It is the responsibility of the Parsonage Committee to be acquainted with the parsonage and, after a new pastoral appointment is made, meet with the incoming parsonage family to discuss the minimum acceptability of housing and furnishings, and to meet annually thereafter with the parsonage family.
- e. At the time of a new pastoral appointment, the chairs of the S/PPRC and the Board of Trustees, the current pastor and the incoming pastor will walk through the parsonage together for inspection and planning. It is recommended to utilize the Church Conference parsonage inspection report as a guide.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- f. In order to respect the privacy of clergy and families, the church has a responsibility to make an appointment and secure the approval of the pastor or an adult member of the household prior to visiting the parsonage at any time.
- 4. Multiple Church Appointments and Clergy Couples**
- a. In appointments where a clergy person is appointed to more than one church and a parsonage is provided by one of the churches, the utility expenses (heat, water, and electric) will be divided equally between the churches. Any capital improvements and maintenance on the parsonage are the responsibility of the church that owns the parsonage.
 - b. In cases of clergy couples when the couple resides in the parsonage of one of the appointments, the utility expenses will be divided equally between the appointments provided that housing is considered as a part of the compensation package for each of the clergy. In situations where both persons in a clergy couple are utilizing their respective parsonages, each church will provide utilities for their own pastor.

Standards for Parsonages (Purchasing or Building a New Parsonage)

1. All parsonages shall meet local requirements for a Certificate of Occupancy.
2. The District Committee on Church Location and Building must be consulted in developing plans for all purchases or construction of a new parsonage.
3. All newly constructed or newly purchased parsonages shall be in full compliance with the Book of Discipline. Consideration shall be made for those with handicapping conditions.
Provide on the ground-floor of a newly constructed parsonage: (1) one room that can be used as a bedroom by a person with a disability; (2) a fully accessible bathroom; and (3) fully accessible laundry facilities (§2544.4d)
4. Churches considering selling their current parsonage and purchasing a new one need to explore property tax implications as well as leans on the property that may need to be considered in potential financing.

Option 1

1. The use of maintenance-free materials in building and in finishing and furnishing, thus contributing towards keeping maintenance costs lower.
2. The following room requirements:
 - a. Living Room/Family Room
 - b. Dining Room
 - c. Kitchen
 - d. Study
 - e. Baths (2)
 - f. Bedrooms (3)
3. A minimal electrical service of 200 amperes
4. A garage of a size to accommodate 2 cars, plus room for storage of lawn mowers, bicycles, tools, garden equipment, ladders, paint supplies, etc.
5. Space to store large articles of furniture/equipment
6. The use of materials meeting the most energy efficient standards for insulation and windows
7. Careful consideration should be given in choosing the location of the parsonage. This consideration might include the distance from the church, accessibility from main streets of the community and the church, the neighborhood and its future, and the community itself and its future growth.

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Option 2

1. The standards of Option One would apply with consideration by the church of purchasing, leasing, renting a townhouse or condominium. This option would be negotiated by the District Superintendent, the local charge and the pastor following consultation with the District committee on Church Location and Building
2. The purpose of this option is to provide an alternative to the “traditional” church parsonage for ministry in special situations. Allowing for the wide variety of townhouse/condo choices, it is difficult to recommend a single standard for such settings.

Appeals

Appeals by the churches or pastors on any of the above provisions should be made to the District Superintendent who has the final authority to interpret and implement the foregoing standards.

Pension and Health Benefits

Be it resolved that the Past Service Annuity Rate for January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022, be set at \$727 per approved service year prior to January 1, 1982.

Be it further resolved

1. That effective January 1, 2022, the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference will continue to sponsor CRSP for full-time, three-quarter time and one-half time clergy and continue to sponsor UMPIP for those clergy in one-quarter time appointments.
2. That contributions for January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022, for the Clergy Retirement Security Program for full-time and less-than-full-time ($\frac{3}{4}$ -time & $\frac{1}{2}$ -time) clergy and for Conference sponsored UMPIP Plan for $\frac{1}{4}$ -time clergy, be set at 14% of plan compensation. The increased percentage includes 5% for administrative costs and 7% uncollectable fees per the 2020 approved budget set by Special Session of Annual Conference on October 26, 2020.
3. That contributions for January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022, for the Comprehensive Protection Plan be set at 3.4% of plan compensation for full-time and $\frac{3}{4}$ -time ordained clergy, and for Conference Sponsored UMLife Options for $\frac{1}{2}$ -time ordained clergy to be set 2.2% of plan compensation. That local churches may sponsor $\frac{1}{4}$ -time ordained clergy and $\frac{3}{4}$ -time part-time local pastors in UMLife Options. The increased percentages for CPP and UMLifeOptions includes 5% for administrative costs and 7% uncollectable fees per the 2020 approved budget set by Special Session of Annual Conference on October 26, 2020.
4. That the starting date for retirement payments for new retirees commences July 1, 2021, unless otherwise stated.
5. That the following members of the former Southern Conference be included in terms of eligibility for conference-paid health benefits. Specifically, the following persons, upon becoming annuitants with at least 10 years of service, will be eligible for Conference-paid health benefits: Jae Jeong Shim, Mildred E. Bender, J. Evans Dodds, Nicholas Connolly, Daniel Gueh, William R. Hess, and Charles D. Mitchell.
6. That Robert L. Webster and family be eligible for Conference-paid health benefits upon retirement and receiving an annuity.

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7. That Rev. Patricia Bruger's actual years of appointment and service at CUMAC/ECHO, INC. from June 16, 1995, through retirement be fully credited for the purpose of calculation of service year credits to determine allocation of pro-rated health insurance premium payment responsibility upon retirement.
8. That the following clergy be subject to five years "under appointment through the Conference immediately prior to retirement" to meet eligibility requirements for health benefits in retirement, rather than the seven years as approved at the 2011 Annual Conference meeting (Paragraph 3 under Eligibility, p. 365 of the 2011 Conference Journal). Specifically, the following persons, if, at the time of retirement, meet all other eligibility requirements for health insurance in retirement, shall be granted under this provision: Rev. Vena Murphy, Rev. William Jacobsen, Rev. Christina Zito.
9. That clergy participants in the Conference Health Insurance Plan who have expenses associated with the adoption of a child will be reimbursed up to \$10,000 per child upon the presentation of the necessary documentation.
10. The Greater NJ Annual Conference (the "Conference") adopts the following resolutions relating to rental/housing allowances for active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergypersons of the Conference:

Be it resolved that an amount equal to 100% of the pension, severance, or disability payments received from plans authorized under *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (the "*Discipline*"), which includes all such payments from the Wespath Benefits and Investments, during the period July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022, by each active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental/housing allowance for each such clergyperson; and

That the pension, severance, or disability payments to which this rental/housing allowance designation applies will be any pension, severance, or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the *Discipline*, including such payments from Wespath and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a Wespath plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the *Discipline*, that result from any service a clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, a retired, a terminated, or a disabled clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such an active, a retired, a terminated, or a disabled clergyperson's pension, severance, or disability plan benefit as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a clergyperson's gross income in any year for federal (and, in most cases, state) income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2), and regulations there under, to the least of: (a) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the clergyperson's employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year; (b) the amount actually expended by the clergyperson to rent or provide a home in such year; or (c) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year. Each clergyperson or former clergyperson is urged to consult with his or her own tax advisor to determine what deferred compensation is eligible to be claimed as a housing allowance exclusion.

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1. That clergy retiring before July 1, 2022, be reimbursed for one-time moving expenses up to \$5,000.00 incurred while moving from church-owned housing to personal housing. This reimbursement is limited to actual moving expenses, not to include moving company packing costs. The same benefits and restrictions shall also apply to a surviving spouse moving out of the parsonage upon the death of a pastor while in active service in the Annual Conference, and to those entering disabled relationships.
2. That the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits be authorized to make modifications to the current Insurance Plan as the health care market demands. In addition, modifications to the Plan that could reduce premium costs to local churches and Annual Conference are to be studied and enacted as the Board determines appropriate. These changes might include increased participant deductibles, co-payments, greater use of generic medications, and other avenues of cost saving and sharing. Such changes will be subject to prior review of CFA and the Cabinet.
3. That the Guidelines for Health Insurance Participation, below, be approved and upon approval printed in the 2021 Conference Journal and Yearbook.

2021 Health Insurance Guidelines, Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits

The mission of the Conference Health Insurance Plan (the Plan) is to provide primary health insurance coverage to full-time full, provisional, and associate ministerial members and full-time local pastors of the Annual Conference and to eligible full-time lay employees.

The Plan provides secondary health insurance coverage for retirees who are receiving Medicare which requires both Medicare Parts A & B for coverage. For those who have retired early and are not yet eligible for Medicare, primary health insurance coverage is through the same plan as those in active ministry. The Plan is a non-vested current benefit for active and retired pastors and lay employees.

I. ELIGIBILITY

1. Clergy Eligibility:

- 1) Active clergy under full-time Episcopal appointment to serve a local church including Elders, Deacons, Local Pastors, Associate Members, and Provisional Members
- 2) Those under full-time appointment as district superintendents, clergy staff members of Conference councils and boards, treasurers, bishop's assistants, or directors of parish development, general evangelists, and campus ministers for whom the Conference provides pension contribution to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) who are:
 - a full elder or associate member (other than a missionary) (Book of Discipline ¶344.1a(1))
 - or an ordained clergyperson from another annual conference or another Methodist denomination (Book of Discipline ¶344.1a(1), ¶346.1)
 - an ordained clergyperson from another denomination if not covered by the group health plan of the denomination to which he/she belongs. (Book of Discipline ¶344.1a(1), ¶346.2)

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- 3) Enrollment in the Active health insurance plan must be completed within 31 days of appointment
- 4) Waiving coverage in the Plan - Contact the Benefits Assistant for required documents. Documents must be completed and returned within enrollment deadline periods
 - within 31 days of initial eligibility; or
 - once per year during the Conference open enrollment period for the following January 1; or
 - within 31 days of an open enrollment period for a spouse's plan; beginning January 1, 2016.
 - see PREMIUM PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY – ACTIVE for Waived Coverage Fees.
- a) Participant must certify that:
 - The plan is through a former employment or a spouse's current or former employment. Proof of such coverage is required.
 - The plan is not a marketplace plan. Under these guidelines and marketplace rules, Full-time clergy are ineligible for any Premium Tax Credit.
- b) Re-admittance to the plan is during any open enrollment period, or within 31 days of a Special Enrollment event (loss of other coverage, employment status change, divorce, death of a spouse, or gain a dependent).
- 5) Clergy in any category under Episcopal appointment to full-time service in an Extension Ministry [¶344.1a (3)(4); 344.1b; 344.1d; 331.1a,b; 326.1; 331.8; 346.1; 346.2], may enroll in the Plan within 31 days of initial appointment. Late enrollments are permitted only during the Annual Election Period or in the case of a Special Enrollment event - loss of other coverage, employment status change, divorce, death of a spouse, or gain a dependent.
- 6) Part-time clergy in any category are not eligible for coverage through the Plan.
2. **Ministerial members who are placed on Medical Leave status by the Conference** shall continue enrollment in the Plan regardless of whether they are eligible for Medicare disability benefits. The Conference Plan remains primary until the participant becomes eligible for Medicare due to disability, at which time the Conference Plan becomes secondary to Medicare. Beginning January 1, 2016, participants obtaining Medicare due to disability, may choose to remain in the Active Health Plan as their secondary insurance, or to enroll in the United HealthCare Retiree Plan (Medicare Advantage Plan). The premiums for ministerial members on Conference Medical Leave (and their enrolled family) will be paid by the Conference with Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits funds.
3. **Clergy in Retired Status** may be in the Plan if they were under full-time appointment for 20 years and appointed full-time through the Conference for the last 10 years with annuity credit immediately prior to retiring; *provided, however, that:*
 - (a) Clergy in retired status may also be in the plan if they retired on or before July 1, 2021 (provided that their participation shall be subject to the provisions of Part II and III below);
 - (b) Clergy in retired status may also be in the plan (subject to the provisions of Part II and III below) if:
 - i. they retired after July 1, 2021,

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- ii. they were at least 62 years old as of July 1, 2021, and
 - iii. they had at least 15 but less than 20 years of full-time appointment; *provided that Such retirees must pay such additional premiums or charges as may be established annually by the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.*
- (c) Clergy in retired status may also be in the plan (subject to the provisions of Part II and III below) if:
- i. they retired after July 1, 2021,
 - ii. they were at least 62 years old as of July 1, 2021,
 - iii. they had at least 7 but less than 15 years' service of full-time appointment, provided that
 - 1. *Such retirees must pay 100% of any and all fees, charges, premiums, and other requirements for participation established by the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits; and*
 - 2. *Such retirees under this paragraph (c) also shall not receive any financial credit or contribution toward the cost of the Plan.*

Retired participants and spouses age 65 and over are required to carry Medicare Part A and Part B in order to be eligible for Conference insurance in retirement. Monthly premium for Part A if any, and for Part B is a personal expense. A Retiree (and eligible dependents) not enrolling (waiving coverage) in the Plan at the time of retirement, or who left the plan as a retiree, may enroll during any open enrollment period, or within 31 days of a Special Enrollment event (including but not limited to voluntary or involuntary loss of coverage) (refer to Clergy Eligibility #1, subparagraph 1d). For dependent eligibility, see #5 under "Eligibility."

4. Any of the following **lay persons** are eligible to enroll in the Plan upon application within 31 days of hire. Late enrollments are permitted only during the Annual Election Period as allowed by the Plan, or in the case of a Special Enrollment Event - loss of other coverage, employment status change, divorce, death of a spouse, or gain a dependent.
- (a) Lay employees of the Conference or any of its subsidiary agencies working a minimum of 1,560 hours annually (30 hrs. per week)
 - (b) Full-time (minimum of 1,560 hours annually) lay employees of any church in the Conference that adopts the program, completes a Salary Paying Unit Sub-Adoption Agreement and whose church enrolls a minimum of 75% of its full-time lay employees
 - (c) Retired lay employees of the Conference, local churches, Conference-affiliated UM institutions, the Episcopal office, units of the Conference whose lay employees are not on the Conference payroll and the surviving spouse of such employees, may participate in the Plan provided they have received or will receive a UMPIP benefit from Wespith Benefits and Investments through their salary-paying unit and if they were employed full-time for 20 years and employed full-time through the Conference for the last 10 years with immediately prior to retiring *provided, however, that:*
 - (d) Lay employees in retired status may also be in the plan if they retired on or before July 1, 2021 (provided that their participation shall be subject to the provisions of Part II and III below);
 - (e) Lay employees in retired status may also be in the plan (subject to the provisions of Part II and III below) if:
 - i. they retired after July 1, 2021,
 - ii. they were at least 62 years old as of July 1, 2021, and
 - iii. they had at least 15 but less than 20 years of full-time appointment; *provided that*

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Such retirees must pay such additional premiums or charges as may be established annually by the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

- (f) Lay employees in retired status may also be in the plan (subject to the provisions of Part II and III below) if:
- i. they retired after July 1, 2021,
 - ii. they were at least 62 years old as of July 1, 2021,
 - iii. they had at least 7 but less than 15 years' service of full-time appointment, provided that
 1. *Such retirees must pay 100% of any and all fees, charges, premiums, and other requirements for participation established by the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits; and*
 2. *Such retirees under this paragraph (c) also shall not receive any financial credit or contribution toward the cost of the Plan.*

5. **Dependents eligible for coverage** in the Conference Plan are limited to the spouse, children who are qualified adult dependents, and children who are under age 26. Dependents may be added only during the Annual Election Period as allowed by the Plan, or in the case of a Special Enrollment event - loss of other coverage, employment status change, divorce, death of a spouse, or gain a dependent. If an annuitant marries (remarries), coverage of spouse and/or children may be available and premium for dependents is at the retiree's expense.

II. PREMIUM PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY – ANNUITANTS

The Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits shall establish rates of premiums for the participants, based upon the premiums charged by the insurance carrier(s).

Unless it has already been stated above under Eligibility, the Conference shall pay the premiums for all eligible enrolled annuitants of the Conference, lay or ministerial, from appropriate funds.

- A. A Clergy person age 65 or older, becoming an annuitant after July 1, 2021, who has 20 full-time approved years with annuity credit in (CRSP), the Clergy Retirement Security Program (includes prior plans), with Wespath Benefits and Investments, shall receive health insurance coverage under the Plan. Monthly premium for Part A if any, and for Part B (both required) is a personal expense.
 1. Annuitants age 65 or older who retired on or before July 1, 2021 shall continue to pay and be responsible for a percentage designated by the Board for each year short of 20 full-time years of service. The 2022 percentage will remain at 5%. The percentage will be reviewed annually by the Board.
- B. **A lay person age 65 or older**, who has received or will receive a UMPIP benefit after July 1, 2021, who has 20 full-time approved years of employment with participation in UMPIP, the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (includes prior plan), of Wespath Benefits and Investments, shall receive health insurance coverage under the plan. Monthly premium for Part A if any, and for Part B (both required) is a personal expense.
 1. A lay retired participant age 65 or older who retired on or before July 1, 2021 shall continue to pay and be responsible for a percentage designated by the Board for each year short of 20 years of full-time service. The 2022 percentage will remain at 5%. The percentage will be reviewed annually by the Board.
- C. The Active premium for an **annuitant under the age of 65 commencing benefits**

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1. Eligible annuitants under the age of 65 who retired on or before July 1, 2021 shall continue to pay and be responsible for the annual fixed amount determined in the year of retirement until the annuitant reach age 65. Premium payment for those that have less than 20 years of full-time service shall continue to pay 5% for each year short of 20 years of full-time service. Annuitants paying for the annual percentage for which they are short of 20 years of full-time service are subject to annual increase set by the Board of Pensions.
 2. Eligible annuitants under the age of 65 who retired after July 1, 2021 shall pay the amount equal to the actual plan premium rate set by Wespath Benefits and Investments until the annuitant reach age 65. The plan is subject to annual increases.
 3. Eligible annuitants who retired after July 1, 2021, *and*, as of July 1, 2021, were at least 62 years old and had at least 15 but less than 20 years of full-time appointment, see Part I paragraph 3(b) or 4(e).
 4. Eligible annuitants who retired after July 1, 2021, *and*, as of July 1, 2021, were at least 62 years old with at least 7 of service but less than 15 years net credited service under full-time appointment, see Part I paragraph 3(c) or 4(f).
- D. **Extension Clergy serving approved Conference Advance Specials** in the geographic bounds of the Annual Conference who are not eligible to enroll in the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) will be credited, solely for the years appointed to that Advance Special, with actual years of appointment and service to the Conference, for the purpose of calculation of service year credits to determine allocation of pro-rated premium payment responsibility upon retirement.

III. PREMIUM PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY – PRE-ANNUITY RETIREES

The Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits shall establish rates of premiums for the participants, based upon the premiums charged by the carrier.
For those who have retired early and are not collecting an annuity, the retired enrollee is responsible for the full Active premium payment until they reach annuity age.

IV. PREMIUM PAYMENT RESPONSIBILITY – ACTIVE

The Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits shall establish rates of premiums for the participants based upon the premiums charged by the carrier.

Unless it has already been stated above under Eligibility, the Conference shall pay the premiums for all enrolled active participants, lay or ministerial, from appropriate funds, except that:

- A. Each church shall pay the premium(s) or Waived Participation Fee(s) (which is equal to the blended premium) of each of its full-time appointed clergy (including clergy spouse and dependent children if enrolled) who are either a full, provisional, or associate member of the Conference or a local pastor.
 1. The salary paying unit shall also be responsible for remitting premium for its lay employees who are enrolled in the Plan.

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2. Plan participants are to pay the amount of their share of the premium in excess of the premium credit provided by the HealthFlex Exchange default plan selected by the BOPHB. The local church will deduct the funds from the participant's compensation and remit the participants' share to the Annual Conference on a monthly basis.
- B. Each eligible enrollee, whose fees are not paid as provided above, shall pay his or her own premiums either directly or with employer participation. In every case, the individual enrollee is responsible for seeing that payment of his or her own premium is made if the party with PRIME responsibility fails to make the payment.

V. CONTINUATION OF COVERAGE AFTER CERTAIN EVENTS

- A. **Voluntary and Involuntary Termination** - If a person's participation in the Plan ceases due to voluntary or involuntary termination of Conference membership or employment or discharge or removal from the Annual Conference, Continuation Coverage for health insurance may be available through application to HealthFlex.
- B. **Loss of Dependent Status** - If a dependent's participation in the Plan ceases due to divorce or to attaining the limiting age, Continuation Coverage may be available through application to HealthFlex.
- C. **Medical Leave** - See #2 under Eligibility.
- D. **Leave of Absence** (§353 and §354) - Clergy placed on voluntary leave of absence (personal, family, or transitional) or involuntary leave of absence may continue in the Plan for a period of twelve months, provided they pay the premiums. Continuation Coverage for up to an additional 12 months may be available through application to HealthFlex. Leave of absence is not an appointment, causes a break in appointment years, and does not accrue annuity credit towards health benefits in retirement.
- E. **Sabbatical Leave** (§351) Clergy placed on sabbatical leave may continue in the Plan for a period of twelve months, provided they pay the premiums. Continuation coverage may be available through application to HealthFlex. Sabbatical leave is not a break in appointment years for the purposes of health benefits in retirement.
- F. **Death** - Surviving spouses of clergy members are subject to the same rules (see Eligibility Guidelines #1 and 3) as the clergy member. Surviving spouses of lay employees of the Conference and District offices are subject to the same rules (see Eligibility Guideline #4 c) as the lay employee.

VI. ADMINISTRATION

All concerns, issues, requests, etc., relating to premiums, benefits, coverage (including voluntary termination of coverage, additions, or deletions to policies) and benefits at retirement must be "in writing" from the Plan participant to be considered official. Such correspondence, concerns, or requests for changes in coverage must be sent to the Plan Administrator or his/her designated coordinator. Commitments or resolutions of issues must come in writing directly from the Plan Administrator or his/her designated coordinator.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Benefits Officer and Administrator for the Conference Plan is the Conference Treasurer/Director of Administrative Services. The Benefits Officer shall be a member of the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits without a vote. He/she shall be responsible for promptly enrolling all eligible persons, for collecting all amounts due from churches, agencies or individuals for participation in the Plan, for arranging for their prompt deposit in a Conference account, for checking all billings from the Insurance Carrier to certify their completeness and accuracy and for making proper remittances on schedule for the Plan; and such Officer shall delete from the Plan any enrollee whose premium is not paid by the end of the month for which the premium is due. Termination is effective the first day of the month for which no payment has been received.

GNJ Designated Fund Policies, Processes and Procedures Legislation (May 2021 Annual Conference Session)

Whereas the world needs a strong GNJ to transform lives and communities as we recruit and develop transformational leaders to make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world. Key to this mission are strategic funds that help fund present vital ministry and ensure a sustainable future mission and ministry.

Whereas funds are invested in accordance with the social principles of the UMC and prudently to maximize gains so that balances keep pace with present AND future ministry needs. Further the funds are overseen so that funds are only used for the designated or restricted purpose.

Whereas funds are created to sustain the long-term health of the mission and ministry of GNJ. By investing wisely and making prudent disbursements, they will continue to grow and provide financial support for the important ministry and mission of GNJ. Healthy fund levels spur innovation and longevity of core ministry especially during financially challenging times. Appropriate levels enable GNJ to do more with less support from shared ministry giving.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference session adopt the following Designated Fund Policies, Processes and Procedures:

I. Two types of Funds shall be categorized:

A. Donor **Restricted funds** shall be contributions from an individual, or group of individuals, with a restricted purpose that can only be changed by the individual(s) or their estate when so designated or by the state's attorney general. GNJ must use restricted funds for the purpose designated by the donor. All restricted funds will be managed and dispersed according to the donor's restriction.

B. GNJ **Designated** funds are designated by the annual conference session and are overseen by a designated body. The annual conference session can change the designated purpose if needed. **These GNJ Designated Funds are the focus of this legislation.**

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

II. CF&A will establish a GNJ Fund Committee as follows:

A. GNJ shall have an eight-member GNJ **Fund Committee** made up of at least three persons from the CF&A investment committee, the CFO/Treasurer and one person from each of the following agencies – the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, the Connectional Table and the Cabinet. The GNJ Fund Committee is to report **at least twice a year** to each of the above agencies the state of each GNJ designated fund including balances and disbursements made toward approved uses (as defined in this policy), progress towards the fund goal amount, and recommend to the Board of Trustees and CF&A policy updates as needed.

B. Every March and September, the five agencies (CF&A, Board of Trustees, Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, Connectional Table and Cabinet) and any GNJ mission partners who have funds invested shall meet jointly with the investment institution(s) to hear about each fund's short, medium and long-term performance, their expectations for the market based on the trends observed and their economic forecasts and a report on the social impact our funds are making to create a more just and socially responsible world.

C. Each GNJ designated fund will have a goal. The goal is a target balance the GNJ fund committee sets that should be attained over time. When the goal is reached, CF&A and the Board of Trustees will review the goal and see if it is adequate or if it needs to be adjusted.

D. The CF&A investment committee shall be responsible to make the investment decision for each fund. These decisions should be communicated to the CFO in writing or by email who shall then be responsible for executing the necessary trades at Wespath and reporting back the executions to the CF&A Investment Committee in a timely manner. The investment committee's charter, policies and investment guidelines are to be incorporated into CF&A's policies.

III. Fund Procedures

A. Fund Purpose Designation

The Annual Conference shall identify and state the purpose of each fund.

Any proposed changes in purpose shall be submitted as legislation according to the date set by the conference rules. If an amendment is made to the purpose or designation of a particular fund, CF&A will have the opportunity to review its impact on the annual conference or a particular ministry prior to any vote being taken and make its recommendation to the annual conference session.

B. Fund Oversight

The Annual Conference shall identify who has oversight of the fund. The group or individual shall ensure the policies governing the fund are followed and the use of the funds is achieving the desired purpose and impact. Any use outside the fund purpose and policy is to be reported to the chairperson of CF&A and the bishop. For example, in the case of the Harvest Mission Fund, the Connectional Table has been currently assigned the oversight of this fund.

C. Fund Administrator

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Annual Conference shall identify who administers the use of the fund for the intended purpose of the fund. The administrator(s) is to evaluate the impact and report the use and impact of the fund to the oversight group. All disbursements from the fund are to be itemized in the budget that uses the fund. For example, in the case of the Harvest Mission Fund, the cabinet is currently responsible to administer the fund. Further note, the Fund Administrator has no direct access to the investment company to designate investment mix nor to the funds to initiate withdrawals. Only the CFA investment committee can designate investment mix and only the CFO, with approvals outlined in the policy in writing via email or letter, can execute the investment mix and withdrawals.

D. Fund Disbursements

In consultation with the fund's administrator(s), in the last quarter of the year, the investment committee of CF&A will review market performance of the last year and recommend between a 0-5% disbursement (with a minimum 3% disbursement if the administrator requests it) to the Board of Trustees and CF&A to be disbursed and used for mission and ministry for the coming year. The Board of Trustees and CF&A are to vote on the recommendation and the CFO/Treasurer is to make the disbursement as approved from the fund by December 15th. No further amounts are to be disbursed during the course of the year unless a need arises and then, as approved by CF&A, for a fund that didn't take a disbursement on December 15th of the previous year.

If a disbursement is not made in a particular year, they cannot be cumulatively disbursed in subsequent years - only the 0-5% set by CF&A for that year may be disbursed.

In the next five years when subsidies are still being provided to the churches in the annual conference for billables and benefits, disbursements that will be made from GNJ funds for the budget will be approved by Annual Conference.

E. Emergency Use of Funds

Emergency use of designated funds may be approved if there is **insufficient** cash available for critical mission and ministry. An emergency is not defined as poor budgeting or overspending or under raising of income for the budget. These issues must be addressed in the budgeting process. Before taking an emergency disbursement, spending reductions and fundraising shall be applied first.

An emergency use requires a 75% approval of those present at each of the board of trustees and CF&A meetings. The emergency usage is to be reported at the next annual conference session.

To the extent resources become available later, paying back the emergency disbursement should be a priority of the Treasurer, board of trustees and CF&A.

F. Borrowing from Funds

Borrowing from GNJ designated funds is not generally recommended but can be considered for capital projects if it is in the best interest of the ministry and mission of GNJ.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Note: Only up to 20% of the fund may be borrowed and only with the approval of 75% of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CF&A meetings. The annual conference must be notified of any borrowings at the next session. These borrowings are to be paid back within five years at the market interest rate.

For example, borrowing may be requested to purchase a new district parsonage. Before approval is given to borrow, careful consideration must be given as to whether borrowing the money commercially is more advantageous to the mission and ministry of GNJ. Specifically, the opportunity cost of not being invested in the market as a result of making the loan should be considered.

G. Property Sales and Funds

Once a property is sold and debt and fees have been deducted, 100% of the remaining proceeds shall be distributed as follows:

- To the extent the current year consolidated budget anticipates the need for property proceeds to balance the budget, the CFO/Treasurer is authorized to use up to the budgeted amount towards operating expenses.
- Proceeds above and beyond the operating budgeted amount (**Investable Property Proceeds**) are to be invested with the investment institution within 5 days unless the CF&A investment committee recommends waiting because of volatility in the market. During the waiting period, the property sale proceeds may not be spent for other purposes.

Example: The 2021 Consolidated Budget includes \$3,182,000 of property sales proceeds to balance. Net proceeds over this amount are to be invested.

In order to rebuild the funds, the distribution of the **Investable Property Proceeds** to the various funds will follow the plan established by CF&A until the funds other than the four funds listed below have reached their targets ("**Funds allocation steady state**"). After that the allocation of property proceeds shall be as follows:

- Harvest Mission Fund – 50%
- Strategic Disciple Making Fund – 20%
- Retiree Health Care – 15%
- Property Redevelopment Fund – 15%

Note: "**Fund allocation steady state**" will be reached after subsidies for billables are no longer needed and all funds other than the four above are fully funded at their targeted goal levels – we expect this will happen around 2026.

H. Audit

Each year the investments and fund balances are to be audited during the GNJ regular audit to ensure compliance with GNJ policies and the accuracy of fund balances.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Be it further resolved that the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference session adopt the following fund names and respective purpose:

IV. GNJ Designated Funds²

1. Operating Reserve Fund – each year, CF&A will establish a surplus needed to manage cashflow during the year. It shall be set at 10% of the consolidated budget approved by the annual conference. If more than 10% is needed, CF&A is to examine structural reasons why the problem exists and address it. The fund shall be invested in short term instruments as identified by the CF&A Investment Committee.
2. Harvest Mission Fund – supports leadership and congregational development and mission engagement. Impact – meet current goals of 51% vital congregations, enable 150 congregations to engage in A Journey of Hope plan and allow GNJ to achieve a 98% giving rate for shared ministry and billables. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A.
3. Strategic Disciple Making Fund – funds new faith communities (congregations, second sites, new worship services) so that we increase the number of new disciples and vital congregations. Impact – more new disciples and vital congregations. May use up to 80% of the fund balance.
4. St. John’s Native American Historic Preservation Fund – fund the preservation of the St. John’s building as a historical site and the Native American burial ground. Impact – preserve the only Native American Church in GNJ and serve as a cultural site for the people of New Jersey.
5. Next Gen Ministries Fund (formerly known as Tumetheca & Time is Now funds)– fund ministries of young people between 12 and 30 that may include camping, Ignite, youth ministries, campus ministries and other ministries to form and shape young people’s commitment to and faith in Jesus Christ. Impact – increase in the number of young people participating in young people ministries in GNJ congregations. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A.
6. Pension and Benefits Operational Fund – fund the administrative work of the Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits and up to \$ 30,000 billing gap shortfall in collections. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A.
7. Retiree Health Fund – fund payments for retiree health care and secure retire health care. The fund will be funded with pre-82 pension surplus as available and property sales of 15% starting once the “fund allocation steady state” has been reached. Impact – we will ensure retiree health care funding and back the funds appropriately. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A.
8. Property Operational Fund - funds maintenance and equipment purchases for the GNJ Mission and Resource Center, closed church property and cemeteries owned by the annual conference so that property is self-funded rather than funded through shared ministries and property sales. Impact – more shared ministry funding to mission and ministry and property sales to funds that will fund present ministry and sustain future mission and ministry. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A.
9. Property Redevelopment Fund – funds redeveloping GNJ congregational property. Our first priority is for congregations in low-income communities to be able to increase income for ministry and mission in low-income communities. Impact – redeveloping church properties

² Each of the designated funds will experience a 0-5% disbursement each year as explained in the Fund Disbursements section.

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- that can no longer be maintained by congregations so that they can continue to have a vital congregational ministry in GNJ's low-income communities. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A. Up to \$500,000 per project may be borrowed for viable redevelopment projects. At no time may more than 50% of the fund's balance be in loans. When this fund is reported it must include the cash balance and the amount in loans. Loans may be approved by a majority vote of each of the following agencies: Board of Trustees, CF&A and the Cabinet.
10. Superintendent Housing Fund – funds the purchase and maintenance of superintendent parsonages or provides a housing allowance for one or more district superintendents. The fund shall be adequate to purchase and maintain district parsonages or provide housing allowances for district superintendents. Impact – reduce the amount needed from shared ministries so that more funds are available for mission and ministry and/or eliminate the amount needed from church property sales so that more money may be added to the ministry funds. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A or by a 75% approval of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CF&A for the amount needed to purchase of a district parsonage.
 11. Episcopal Residence Fund – funds the purchase and maintenance of the bishop's residence or housing allowance. Impact – reduce the amount needed from shared ministries so that more funds are available for mission and ministry and/or eliminate the amount needed from church property sales so that more money may be added to the ministry funds. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CF&A or by a 75% approval of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CF&A for the amount needed to purchase of an episcopal residence.
 12. Episcopal Office Fund – funds discretionary fund and scholarships to the bishop's clergy convocation. Impact – supports emergency needs of clergy and ministry and assists pastors who need financial support to attend the bishop's convocation on ministry.

Rationale: This legislation clearly defines the roles and responsibilities for the stewardship of the GNJ Designated Funds by ensuring the stated purpose for each fund is established appropriately by Annual Conference and that robust policy and procedures are in place with respect to the investment and use of the funds.

Journey of Hope Legislation Modification

Whereas the October 2020 Annual Conference Session passed the *A Journey of Hope* legislation to end the sin of racism and align this ministry with the overall strategic plan and ministry of GNJ; and

Whereas part of that legislation recognized the inequities within the GNJ shared ministry apportionment and billable system and sought to create a more just and fairer shared ministry and billable apportionments by apportioning and billing congregations in low-income communities at a lower percentage; and

Whereas the legislation included language that required specific requirements for Journey of Hope congregations while it did not make those same requirements of all GNJ congregations;

Therefore, be it resolved that the following approved *2020 A Journey of Hope legislation* be amended to state:

Apportion shared ministries and billables to congregations in low-income communities using the same criteria in 5.a.i-v at the following percentages to pay shared ministry apportionments and billables, as long as the congregation has and is making progress on A Journey of Hope Plan and gives 100% of their apportioned shared ministry and billables.

- Communities with median household income \$50,000 to 55,000 – apportion at 70%.
- Communities with median household income \$45,000 to 49,999 – apportion at 65%.
- Communities with median household income \$40,000 to 44,999 – apportion at 60%.
- Communities with median household income \$35,000 to 39,999 – apportion at 55%.
- Communities with median household income below \$34,999 – apportion at 50%

A district superintendent and/or a congregation may recommend to CFA that their congregation be included in this program if the congregation is excluded only because the method used to determine the income of the community served by the congregation does not adequately determine the financial health of the community.

Whereas churches need to comply with ¶ 258.4(f) in our Book of Discipline which states “Contributions designed for specific causes and objects shall be promptly forwarded according to the intent of the donor and shall not be used for any other purpose¹¹. See Judicial Council Decision 976 “ ; and

Whereas beginning in 2021, the GNJAC changed the Shared Ministry statements to eliminate the itemized lines for each Fund Name and Fund Number and only shows two lines, one for GNJ Shared Ministry Fund and another for GCFA Apportioned Funds; and

Whereas beginning in 2021, the GNJAC changed the Shared Ministry Remittance form to eliminate the itemized lines for each Fund Name and Fund Number and only shows two lines, one for GNJ Shared Ministry Fund and another for GCFA Apportioned Funds; and

Whereas to comply with Book of Discipline ¶ 258.4(f), in 2021, churches will need to record and report giving for each of the 10 categories below according to the intent of the donor and designated giving shall not be used for any other purpose:

Whereas All recommendations with financial impact must be sent to CF&A for their reaction, prior to being placed before the annual conference. Those requirements are clear in our current rules, but the method guaranteeing that such review will be handled in an orderly fashion needs to be implemented.

Be it resolved that rule: III 19 b) shall be amended by adding:

iii. All recommendations submitted to the Conference Secretary in a timely manner shall be submitted to the CF&A by the conference secretary or his/her designee in time for the CF&A to present its findings to the annual conference in the Pre-Conference journal. If CF&A determines that adoption of the recommendation would have a financial impact, CF&A shall report its understanding of such impact.

Rationale:

The rules should be amended by eliminating the possibility of a proposed recommendation being ruled out of order because it did not reach CF&A, as required under the conference rules, in time to have their reaction reported to the annual conference. This is actually codifying what has been a long-standing practice for decades. This amendment clarifies "who" is required to act and "how" they are required to act in handling proposed recommendations.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

2022 Budget Legislation

Whereas in 2020, the world and GNJ went through an unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic that negatively impacted the ministry of our churches and their spending; and

Whereas normally the 2022 Shared Ministry Apportionment for each GNJ congregation is determined by multiplying the congregation's spending in 2020 (inputted by each congregation in the GCFA Ezra database) by a percentage set by the annual conference; and

Whereas the 2020-year spending was dramatically impacted by the pandemic and the spending is significantly different than normal trends; and

Whereas the strength of giving of a congregation for 2022 is not reflected in the 2020 Statistical Report numbers.

Therefore be it resolved that the 2022 Shared Ministry Apportionment for each congregation be calculated using the 2019 Statistical Report data and the same Shared Ministry Apportionment Percentage as was approved for 2021 so that the 2022 Shared Ministry Apportionment for each congregation will be the same as the 2021 Shared Ministry Apportionment for that congregation except for congregations that went from full-time to part-time in 2020 whose shared ministry will be adjusted for the appointment change; and

Be it further resolved A Journey of Hope equity shared ministry for qualifying churches as approved by previous annual conference legislation be apportioned according to the formula outlined in the A Journey of Hope report and legislation; and

Be it further resolved that the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference adopt the 2022 Budget that includes the following.

- A consolidated budget that includes all billings to congregations, GNJ ministry and mission and general church apportionments.
- 15.2% shared ministry apportionment, 12.3% for GNJ shared ministry and 2.9% for general church apportionment.
- Salary and support for six district superintendents.
- \$1.732 million from property sales to support congregations with their billings.

Additional property sale proceeds after the \$1.732 million, will be deposited into the approved designated funds according to the plan developed by CFA so that GNJ replenishes reserves by 2026 and at that time, or sooner, as funds are replenished continues with the annual conference policy to distribute property sale proceeds to the Harvest Mission Fund (50%), Strategic Disciple Making Fund (20%), Retiree Health Care Fund (15%) and Property Redevelopment Fund (15%).

For 2022, the incremental proceeds will be deposited as follows: 92% to Retiree Health Care Fund and 2% each to Harvest Mission Fund, Strategic Disciple Making Fund, Property Operational Reserve and Property Redevelopment Fund. \$578,535 from GNJ designated funds.

Be it further resolved that the monthly statements provided to congregations include the following.

- The total apportionment to the congregation for GNJ shared ministry.
- The total apportionment to the congregation on behalf of the general church.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Direct billings to the congregation from GNJ, which include but is not limited to, blended rate for active healthcare, active pastor/lay employee's incremental contributions for self-elected benefits (health, dental, vision, and health reimbursement accounts), workers compensation, property insurance and back payments for past billings.

GNJ Designated Fund Legislation

Whereas, the world needs a strong GNJ to transform lives and communities as we recruit and develop transformational leaders to make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world. Key to this mission are strategic funds that help fund present vital ministry and ensure a sustainable future mission and ministry.

Whereas, the Council of Finance & Administration has adopted a Designated Fund Policies, Processes and Procedures (see p. 47 of this workbook) :

Therefore, be it resolved that the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference session adopt the following fund names, respective purpose and 2021 beginning balances in the chart below:

GNJ Designated Funds

1. Operating Reserve Fund – each year, CFA will establish a surplus needed to manage cashflow during the year. It shall be set at 10% of the consolidated budget approved by the annual conference. If more than 10% is needed, CFA is to examine structural reasons why the problem exists and address it. The fund shall be invested in short term instruments as identified by the CFA Investment Committee.
2. Harvest Mission Fund – supports leadership and congregational development and mission engagement. Impact – meet current goals of 51% vital congregations, enable 150 congregations to engage in A Journey of Hope plan and allow GNJ to achieve a 98% giving rate for shared ministry and billables. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
3. Strategic Disciple Making Fund – funds new faith communities (congregations, second sites, new worship services) so that we increase the number of new disciples and vital congregations. Impact – more new disciples and vital congregations. May use up to 80% of the fund balance.
4. St. John’s Native American Historic Preservation Fund – fund the preservation of the St. John’s building as a historical site and the Native American burial ground. Impact – preserve the only Native American Church in GNJ and serve as a cultural site for the people of New Jersey.
5. Next Gen Ministries Fund (formerly known as Tumetheca & Time is Now funds)– fund ministries of young people between 12 and 30 that may include camping, Ignite, youth ministries, campus ministries and other ministries to form and shape young people’s commitment to and faith in Jesus Christ. Impact – increase in the number of young people participating in young people ministries in GNJ congregations. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
6. Pension and Benefits Operational Fund – fund the administrative work of the Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits and up to \$ 30,000 billing gap shortfall in collections. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
7. Retiree Health Fund – fund payments for retiree health care and secure retiree health care. The fund will be funded with pre-82 pension surplus as available and property sales of 15% starting once the “fund allocation steady state” has been reached. Impact – we will ensure retiree health care funding and back the funds appropriately. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

8. Property Operational Fund - funds maintenance and equipment purchases for the GNJ Mission and Resource Center, closed church property and cemeteries owned by the annual conference so that property is self-funded rather than funded through shared ministries and property sales. Impact – more shared ministry funding to mission and ministry and property sales to funds that will fund present ministry and sustain future mission and ministry. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
9. Property Redevelopment Fund – funds redeveloping GNJ congregational property. Our first priority is for congregations in low-income communities to be able to increase income for ministry and mission in low-income communities. Impact – redeveloping church properties that can no longer be maintained by congregations so that they can continue to have a vital congregational ministry in GNJ’s low-income communities. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA. Up to \$500,000 per project may be borrowed for viable redevelopment projects. At no time may more than 50% of the fund’s balance be in loans. When this fund is reported it must include the cash balance and the amount in loans. Loans may be approved by a majority vote of each of the following agencies: Board of Trustees, CFA and the Cabinet.
10. Superintendent Housing Fund – funds the purchase and maintenance of superintendent parsonages or provides a housing allowance for one or more district superintendents. The fund shall be adequate to purchase and maintain district parsonages or provide housing allowances for district superintendents. Impact – reduce the amount needed from shared ministries so that more funds are available for mission and ministry and/or eliminate the amount needed from church property sales so that more money may be added to the ministry funds. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA or by a 75% approval of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CFA for the amount needed to purchase of a district parsonage.
11. Episcopal Residence Fund – funds the purchase and maintenance of the bishop’s residence or provides housing allowance. Impact – reduce the amount needed from shared ministries so that more funds are available for mission and ministry and/or eliminate the amount needed from church property sales so that more money may be added to the ministry funds. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA or by a 75% approval of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CFA for the amount needed to purchase of an episcopal residence.
12. Episcopal Office Fund – funds discretionary fund and scholarships to the bishop’s clergy convocation. Impact – supports emergency needs of clergy and ministry and assists pastors who need financial support to attend the bishop’s convocation on ministry.

Be it further resolved, in order to rebuild the funds, the distribution of the **Investable Property Proceeds** (proceeds above and beyond the operating budgeted amount) to the various funds will follow the plan established by CFA until the funds other than the four funds listed below have reached their targets (“**Funds allocation steady state**”). After that the allocation of property proceeds shall be as follows:

- Harvest Mission Fund – 50%
- Strategic Disciple Making Fund – 20%
- Retiree Health Care – 15%
- Property Redevelopment Fund – 15%

Note: “**Fund allocation steady state**” will be reached after subsidies for billables are no longer needed and all funds other than the four above are fully funded at their targeted goal levels – we expect this will happen around 2026.

Council on Finance and Administration Report on the proposed “Shared Ministry Statements and Remittance Forms” Legislation

At the May 2021 Annual Conference Session, the proposed “Shared Ministry Statements and Remittance Forms” legislation (page 47, row 17 through page to 48, row 23 of the pre-conference journal) was referred to the Council of Finance and Administration (CFA). *This legislation is referring to the Itemized Shared Ministry Statements and Remittance Forms legislation in the 2021 AC Pre-conference workbook, p. 47, here <https://www.gnjumc.org/content/uploads/2021/04/2021-AC-PCWB-Legislation.pdf>.*

Statements and remittance forms are emailed each month to all church treasurers to enable them to properly make their remittances.

On reviewing the legislation, we note that the Book of Discipline paragraph 258.4 (f) referenced in the proposed legislation relates to the responsibilities of the local church committee on finance, not the responsibilities and requirements of CFA and the Annual Conference level. Paragraph 258.4 (f) specifically states, contributions designated for specific causes and objects shall be promptly forwarded according to the intent of the donor and shall not be used for any other purpose.

With respect to the responsibility of CFA and the Annual Conference, para 615.1 states: “The council on receiving from the General Council on Finance and Administration a statement of the amount or methodology for apportioning to the annual conference for the several general funds as authorized by the General Conference, shall apportion the same to the several districts, charges or churches **by whatever method the conference may direct.**”

Report number 8 of the 2016 General Conference also states: “4. If an annual conference decides to combine General Church apportionments with each other or with conference apportioned funds for apportioning to local churches, **the receipts on such combined funds will be allocated in direct proportion to the budgeted amounts for each fund or cause included in the combined fund budget,**”

The legislation approved by our Annual Conference in January said:

1. GNJ will give to the general church what it receives toward general church apportionments and CFA may add additional dollars if there is income over expenses in the shared ministry receipts and expenses.
2. Apportion churches \$1,850,316 for general church apportionments (one amount).

The new budget format recommended by CFA and passed for the 2021 budget separates General Church apportionments and the GNJ shared ministry apportionments.

The general church apportionments are assessed as one number for all of the seven general church funds. We also separately assessed the GNJ shared ministry amount as one number. We did not combine GNJ shared ministry funds and general church funds.

As a result of this, church treasurers only have to focus on two funds when remitting payments rather than detailing eight areas.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

GNJ does provide the fund details of each congregation's apportionments on the GNJ website:
<https://www.gnjumc.org/shared-ministry/2021-shared-ministry-calculation/>

If any church gives less than the assessed general church apportionment, the amount they pay will be sent to GCFA towards each of the funds in the proportion of the share of each of the funds to the total general church apportionment.

This approach is consistent with the Book of Discipline requirements and General Church directives. Since A Journey of Hope churches are assessed less than what GCFA requires GNJ to assess them, GNJ has budgeted to make up the difference to GCFA on the amount by which the general church apportionment was reduced at the giving rate of the church since we believe A Journey of Hope program is a GNJ program.

CFA believes our methodology is fully transparent and appropriately handles the Journey of Hope legislation.

Recommendation: **CFA does not recommend approval of the proposed legislation.**

(Amendment 1) Amendment to "Trustees enabling resolutions" by inserting words "except the presence of conflicts of interest" in every paragraph; line 44 on page 17 after "...taken"; line 2 on page 18 after "...empowered"; line 9 after "...authorized"; line 15 after "...empowered"; line 23 after "...effect"; line 36 after "...empowered"; line 43 after "...authorized" as words inserted in the resolution as above.

In response to Mr. Sim's amendment to insert the words "conflict of interest" in the Trustee's Enabling Resolution,

CFA has reviewed this proposed amendment and does not recommend moving forward with the amendment.

Administrative policy and procedure are governed by the agency for which the policy applies unless it involves the annual conference session.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

However, since the May 2021 Annual Conference, CFA has reviewed, recommended updates and clarified the GNJ Conflict of Interest Policies printed on page 50.

Included in the United Methodists of Greater New Jersey Adjourned Session Workbook for the October 2021 Special Annual Conference are the updated GNJ Conflict of Interest Policies and Report.

The updated GNJ Conflict of Interest Policy obviates the need for the amendment for the Trustees Enabling Resolution Legislation.

Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits / CF&A Joint Response on the Retiree Health Plan

In the 2021 budget, retiree health care costs were budgeted at \$2.9M, or 40% of the GNJ portion of Shared Ministry collections. The Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits (CBOPH) was tasked by the Council on Finance and Administration to find savings in the healthcare programs to ensure the long-term sustainability of the plans and GNJ's ministries, especially in light of the billing challenge facing congregations and GNJ as it assists congregations. CBOPH presented their plan at the May 2021 Annual Conference Session. *The legislation can be found on p. 29 in the 2021 AC Pre-conference workbook here: <https://www.gnjumc.org/content/uploads/2021/04/2021-AC-PCWB-Legislation.pdf>.*

During the session, the amendment below was presented:

“Add to page 29, line 9: However, no modified plan design for annuitant health care that would increase the maximum out of pocket (MOOP) of participants by more than 10% shall be implemented without an affirmative vote of Annual Conference.”

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

This amendment was referred to the Council of Finance and Administration (CFA) due to the potential budget impact.

You will note that the “2021 Health Insurance Guidelines” presented by the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits (page 29, row 16 through page to 35, row 7 of the pre-conference journal) were passed in its entirety during the May Annual Conference Session; therefore, this proposed amendment would at the earliest potentially impact only the 2023 budget.

It is important to bear in mind that there have been concerns regarding Greater New Jersey’s commitment to providing retiree health care benefits over the long run and GNJ’s leadership has been wrestling with how to adequately fund the long-term liability associated with this program.

This joint report of the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits (CBOPH) and Council of Finance and Administration (CFA) will address both matters.

Both CBOPH and CFA are committed to providing quality healthcare for our retirees for the long term. This requires prudent utilization of our limited resources to optimize the benefits provided to our retirees.

We have compared our plan to plans of other Northeast Conferences and have confirmed that we remain competitive in terms of benefits offered, deductibles and maximum out-of-pocket costs. Further, our 2022 commitment per-retiree at \$3,111 is higher than the average spending by Northeast Conferences of approximately \$2,733 per retiree.

Two of the CBOPH’s guiding principles when designing the plan and defining eligibility were:

1. Remain competitive and maximize benefits to members
2. Balancing the needs of Conference and participants

CBOPH and CFA agree that these guiding principles were adhered to.

The members of the CBOPH spent many hours in meetings with our subject experts at Wespath and Willis Towers Watson, educating themselves on the matter before recommending the changes submitted.

Here are some key points regarding the new plan:

- The Conference’s annual premium savings realized by the design changes is estimated to be \$600,000 annually. If we didn’t make these plan changes, the Shared Ministry rate would have to be increased to 16.2% vs. 15.2% or 7% increase to a congregation’s shared ministry apportionment at current giving rates. CFA believes that raising GNJ’s rate to that level will negatively impact the sustainability of many of our congregations and would decrease the giving rate.
- The eligibility and plan design changes approved at the May 2021 Annual Conference session resulted in a \$19M reduction in GNJ’s long-term liability, to \$37M from \$56M. This is important as the modelling used to monitor this liability (more below) indicates we have a realistic path of fully funding this liability over time.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- While it's impossible to predict future health care costs, CBOPH did the research with our subject expert partners to determine the impact of the new plan on our retirees:
 - With the 2021 retiree health care plan design, less than five retirees exceeded the out-of-pocket maximum (for parts A and B). While the cost of office visits and other services used by our retirees will increase with the 2022 plan (see comparative chart), their overall healthcare needs would have to dramatically change to reach the new out of pocket maximum of \$2,500 which implies an increase of \$1,250. For most, the cost increase will be much lower.
 - No retiree will be affected by the changes in Plan B drugs.
 - 86% of the retiree population will have no change in Part D prescription drugs (largest % of prescription drug use).
 - An individual's health care needs will vary person to person and year to year. The out-of-pocket maximum may be a concern one year, but not the next.
- While CBOPH regrets any negative impact on a few, their obligation is to the entire conference. As part of the CBOPH process, they did communicate with the Centenary Fund who indicated that they budget funds each year to assist retired clergy with any financial hardships.

For informational purposes, you will find attached as an appendix to this report a comparison of the old plan vs. the new plan.

Importantly, to honor our commitment to our retirees, GNJ now has a viable plan to fund the projected long-term liability associated with this benefit. With recent eligibility and plan design changes, GNJ has been able to reduce the current retiree health care liability to \$37M, from the previous level of \$56M. CBOPH, CFA, Board of Trustees, Centenary Fund, the Cabinet and Wespath have been working together to grow retiree healthcare reserve funds to match this liability, including the addition of funding via a percentage of property sales. We have updated and refined a financial model to confirm that GNJ has a realistic plan that will fully fund the Retiree Health Care liability within twenty years. The model makes reasonable assumptions that will be reviewed annually. There are "triggers" that can be altered as necessary if either the return on investments or if the health care inflation rates vary significantly from our assumptions.

Variables in our model are:

- % of Property sales proceeds
- Centenary Fund contribution
- Annual draw from fund to cover current year health care costs (the less is drawn from the fund, the more will have to be met from shared ministry).
- Healthcare Inflation rate
- Investment return assumption

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

In the spirit of transparency, the model is shown in the Appendix.

In respect to the amendment, both CBOPH and CFA affirm that the matter of funding and providing quality sustainable healthcare to our retirees is a complicated one that requires CBOPH to balance the needs of the retirees over the long term while maintaining fiscal responsibility to the Conference.

Placing a constraint like that envisaged by the legislation reduces the flexibility for CBOPH to manage the plan holistically and achieve the goals that we all share over the long term.

Therefore, CFA recommends the amendment not be adopted.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

GNJ COSROW Response to Harmful Remarks in the GNJ Pre-Conference Journal

Bishop Schol, clergy, and lay members of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference, my name is Iraida Ruiz de Porras, pastor at Christ United Methodist Church in Lakewood NJ. I am also a member of the GNJ Commission on the Status and Role of Women.

I stand here today with a heavy heart representing the commission to raise a deep concern regarding remarks published in this year's Pre-Conference Journal that are part of the report of the GNJ United Methodist Men.

The mission of the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women (COSROW) is "to challenge The United Methodist Church at all levels to work for full and equal participation of women in the total life of the denomination, including ordination of women, equal access to policy-making and recognition that Jesus Christ calls men and women alike to salvation, liberation, discipleship and service in church and society." Words from Paul to the Galatians affirm that "There is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:28)"

Over the past two days the GNJ COSROW drafted the following legislation for the prayerful consideration of the Annual Conference session.

WHERE AS, the report from the GNJ United Methodist Men found in the 2021 pre-conference journal on pages 105 and 106, in part states: *"when a man comes to Christ, the family follows. When a woman comes to Christ, the man and the rest of the family may not find Christ"*.

AND WHEREAS, these deeply hurtful and harmful remarks and the ideologies that support them are sexist, biased, and perpetuate a toxic gender hierarchy system that that leads to unfair treatment of women in the church and workplace and even lead to physical, spiritual, and emotional harm to women. This thinking is not in alignment with our beliefs as United Methodists in Greater New Jersey, nor The United Methodist Church nor the General Commission of United Methodist Men.

AND WHEREAS, these remarks suggest that men are called to have influence, even domination over women and propose that women are less than and not equal to men.

AND WHEREAS, GNJ proudly affirms women's gifts to lead families, bring people to Christ, for lay women to lead the administrative, teaching, worship, and other ministries of the church and for clergy women to lead congregations, and serve as district superintendents. GNJ elects women lay and clergy delegates to represent GNJ in General and Jurisdictional conferences and to serve in general agencies. And, as a denomination, United Methodists elect and consecrate women to serve as bishops to lead the whole church. Women also are gifted and called to lead in business, education, nonprofit organizations, and politics, including as president of the United States.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that United Methodists of Greater New Jersey affirm that women are full and equal parts of God's human family with equal value, skill, influence, and potential.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that as an Annual Conference, we denounce the sin of sexism in all its manifestations, in and outside the church, and all forms of prejudice and biases that negatively impact women, men, youth, and children in our congregations and communities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the harmful statement posted by the UMM in the Pre-Conference journal is not received by the Annual Conference and not included in this year's conference journal as it does not represent who we are as United Methodists in Greater New Jersey.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the annual conference amend the GNJ Rules of Order #19 to add the following paragraph:

c. The GNJ Commission on the Status and Role of Women and the GNJ Commission on Religion and Race shall review all reports, resolutions, and legislation submitted for the consideration of the Annual Conference prior to the printing of the Pre-Conference Journal for explicit or implicit biases and recommend changes to the appropriate bodies or individuals through the Conference Secretary to ensure just, inclusive, and equitable reports and resolutions that honor all of God's people and do not harm. If the agency decides not to make the change to its report, COSROW and Religion and Race will report to the annual conference session their concerns.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the GNJ Journey of Hope Plan intentionally addresses the sin of sexism as part of the call to address issues of inclusion in the church and the community.

Inclusive Nomination Process to the General and Jurisdictional Conference

Be it resolved that the GNJUMC amends the Rules of Order VII. Petitions and Elections to General and Jurisdictional Conference. 63) Nominations by inserting a sentence after the first sentence as followed: "In the event that there are an insufficient number of nominations to elect a full delegation, no nominations from every ethnic group, or women are under-represented in the nominations received by the deadline, the conference secretary has the permission of the annual conference to extend the nomination period until March 31st of said calendar year."

63) Nominations – In a year in which elections to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences are to be held, the Conference Secretary shall open nominations for lay and clergy delegates on December 15 and nominations will be closed on February 15. In the event that there are an insufficient number of nominations to elect a full delegation, no nominations from every ethnic group, or women are under-represented in the nominations received by the deadline, the conference secretary has the permission of the annual conference to extend the nomination period until March 31st of said calendar year. An individual who desires to be a delegate shall download and complete a candidacy nominations form from the web page. On the bottom of nominations for Lay Delegates shall be the names of two Lay Members of the Annual Conference who endorse the nomination of the candidate. On the bottom of nominations for Clergy Delegates shall be the names of two Clergy Members who are eligible to vote for such delegates, and who endorse the nomination of the candidate.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Rationale: The GNJUMC already approved this amendment during the Special Annual Conference in March 2019 whereas the conference leadership proposed to extend the nomination period to be inclusive to all & every ethnic groups and women represented in the nomination process. This amendment is putting the language in the rules of order permanently.

Reports to the Annual Conference

Archives and History, Commission on

Mission: The Commission on Archives and History (CAH) engages in the ministry of memory. We advance our Wesleyan heritage by doing extensive outreach and providing consistent resources for GNJC at a minimal impact on the shared ministry budget, thanks to the tremendous dedication and exceptional stewardship of our team. With changes to commission membership and restrictions on physical access to our archives collection at Drew University created by Covid-19 social distancing measures, 2020 has been a year of transition. As the keepers of our missional memory, we support vital congregations by resourcing clergy, lay leaders, and church historians with the tools to strengthen our Wesleyan identity. We fulfilled our Disciplinary mandate to identify, preserve and make available the historic record of ministry within GNJC. Our extensive physical archival and digital collections serve as resources within which local churches can research their “Methodist DNA,” and also function as repositories where churches can safely and securely maintain their historical records and artifacts. Additionally, we post guidelines for Church Historians, suggestions for writing church histories, records retention schedules, and provide other valuable resources online through the CAH webpage on the GNJC website.

Archival Collection: We preserve the historical records of closed churches within the bounds of GNJC and its antecedents and provide for the retention of the corporate records of GNJC boards, agencies, and committees. We manage a 1,100+ cubic foot archival collection located in the fire-safe, climate controlled, archival depository in the vault of the General Commission on Archives and History (GCAH) of the UMC, in the Archives and History Center at Drew University in Madison, NJ. Our archival space is secured through a unique and cost-effective rental agreement with GCAH. We look forward to Covid-19 restrictions being lifted and our materials again being available through Drew University’s Archival librarian.

Ancestry.Com: Our GNJCAH page on Ancestry.com received a total of **430,693 page-views, 224,992 image views** and **205,701 text views** during 2020. As a result, our closed church vital statistics (births, baptisms, deaths, and marriage records) are easily accessible, highly utilized, and extend our CAH influence far beyond GNJC. **On Ancestry.com, our GNJC records are identified as: New Jersey, United Methodist Church Records, 1800-1970.**

Internet Archive: We support a digital library of historical journals and resources on Internet Archive (IA) and maintain a link to this resource from the GNJC website. IA is a free portal that allows us to post an unlimited amount of material online without impacting GNJC data rates. Digital copies of The Historical Trail and The Circuit Writer, the respective historical journals of the former SNJ & NNJ Annual Conferences, are available on Internet Archive. Since 2016, the GNJC materials on IA have generated **4,390 page-views; 1,196 page-views** were made in 2020.

Work of The Archivist: Our commission assisted local churches in documenting their past ministry, individuals seeking church and family genealogical information with the help of our volunteer archivist, Walt Jones. Walt and Mark Shenise also assist the Conference Trustees with clarification of issues of boundaries and deeds, etc. In addition to processing records for our collection, Walt also responded to 21 search requests in 2020: 7 for vital statistics (marriage and baptismal records), 7 for church history, 5 for genealogy, and 2 for GNJ records.

Church History Awards: We inspire the celebration of our Wesleyan heritage and the preservation of local church history by hosting three annual church history awards; **The Robert B. Steelman Church History Award, the Morris L. Smith Ethnic Church History Award, and the John C. Goodwin Multi-Media History Award.** Each award is dependent upon qualified submissions. **In 2020, we awarded the first-ever John C. Goodwin Multi-Media Award to Haddonfield UMC. for their video, “The Heritage Project (190th Anniversary).”**

Conference Historic Sites: Recognizing churches as conference historic sites inspires congregations to celebrate their place in the mission of GNJC. The commission has now completed the multi-quadrennial task of formally recognizing the conference historic sites of the former Northern New Jersey Annual Conference.

Nominate Your Church: We welcome congregations to request nomination as a Conference Historic Site. A church must demonstrate that a site played a significant role in the historic development of our conference or denomination to be considered. We believe that there are other possible candidates for this honor in GNJ, especially within our growing diversity of ethnic churches, and invite congregations to reach out to the commission to explore this opportunity.

Donald DeGroat, our former Vice-Chairperson and Treasurer, who rotated off the commission this year. I am deeply grateful for Don's faithful leadership and support these past four years. He has led many of our initiatives during this time, including our Conference Historic Site process and our Church History Awards, as well as expended much energy on our Conference Table displays, supporting me in shaping the commission agenda and laboring to keep an accurate accounting of our commission budget. We are grateful that he will continue to actively support the ministry of the commission as a consultant.

Since the beginning of this pandemic, churches closed their buildings but NOT the ministries and missions. Now, more than ever, the words of the hymn, "**We Are the Church**" has become a reality in our midst, "**The church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is a people.**"

GNJ congregations have adapted and creatively found ways to be the church. Pastors and leaders have continued to be open, flexible, and adaptable to our current realities. Many churches have transitioned between online, outdoor, and inside worship services as the numbers of infections changed. District Superintendents continue to be engaged with congregations in their districts via Zoom, YouTube, Facebook, and other media platforms to praise God and worship together, to offer support and to let the church and pastors know that they are not alone. As a cabinet, we have experienced powerful and creative worship services. GNJ congregations continue to do Spirit-filled, creative, and life-giving work in their communities and beyond.

During this time of pandemic, the Cabinet continues to experience God's power, endurance, and wisdom as we lead our districts and regions for such a time as this! We completed all of our Charge Conferences by Zoom. Our districts and regions have engaged in meaningful workshops and trainings to continue equipping laity and clergy for the task ahead and to help churches to continue doing ministry in their communities. As "missional strategists", District Superintendents continue to strategize with the Connectional Ministry Resource team and the Circuit Elders to coach and develop resources like pace groups, workshops, training, Foundational or Days of learning, Financial Seminars, small groups, and many other district/regional events to strengthen and equip local congregations to remain vital during these unprecedented times. This year we continue moving towards the regional approach. This method will help us to provide quality and meaningful resources in a more effective way.

Our regular Annual Conference, originally scheduled for the month of May, was postponed to the Fall (October 5-6) and by special resolution and mail vote, we held our first virtual Annual Conference, "Courage". We celebrated the commissioning and ordination of siblings in Christ that God continues to call into the ministry, celebrated retirements of pastors that have served faithfully, and a service of remembrance. The Journey of Hope legislation was put forward and passed. This is an audacious plan for GNJ to work collectively to i) end the sin of racism in our conference and churches, ii) equity and inclusion, iii) and sustainable congregational vitality. We are planning and soon will start working with congregations to develop their Journey of Hope ACT Plans. The GNJ strategic plan, along with the Journey of Hope, solidify GNJ's commitment to create a culture of intercultural competency in our conference.

Since our last Annual Conference in October 2020, District Superintendents have continued working and giving out COVID-19 grants to the Districts/Regions to alleviate financial difficulties in the local churches due to this devastating pandemic. So far, we have given more than \$1.1 million dollars in grants. We witness how local churches continue to be engaged in mission and ministry, and some churches have increased their efforts during the pandemic to serve the increasing needs. We praise God for your hard work and faithfulness to the mission. The Bishop and Cabinet encouraged churches once again to offer two weeks of Renewal Leave to pastors at the beginning of the year 2021. The Conference along with

Bishop Schol, and the District Superintendents, created two worship services with Korean and Spanish translations for the churches to use while pastors were taking their Renewal Leave.

The cabinet recognizes and grieves the new financial challenges before us as a Conference, and trust that God is with us during this difficult season and that God will lead and help us so that the mission can continue moving forward.

We also adapted the way we meet by holding all our Cabinet meetings, Cabinet Retreats, Charge Conferences, Special Charge Conferences, appointments, and consultations by ZOOM. God is faithful!

During the appointment season the Cabinet and Bishop Schol enter into a season of discernment as we seek God's guidance to match the pastors' gifts and graces with the congregations needs. There are good appointments this year that will continue to advance the mission of the church forward. We pray for pastors and congregations that will receive a new appointment this year. We pray for a good and healthy transition even in the midst of the pandemic.

We continue to mourn the loss of our colleague and friend, Rev. Myrna Bethke – we deeply miss her contagious laughter, wisdom, hard work and strategic and missional mind. Losing her so suddenly was, and still is, very hard but we continue trusting in God for healing. She, and her legacy of love and service, will forever live in our hearts. Since Myrna left us in July 2020, her position has been vacant. Glenn Conaway and Brian Roberts took her district under their wings by caring, directing, leading, and supporting the pastors and churches-that she was so devoted to in the Gateway South District. We are so thankful for their faithfulness and hard work.

Now in 2021, we find ourselves in another time of transition as two of our District Superintendents will be moving on to what God has next for them in their journey. The Rev. Dr. Gina Hendrickson from Northern Shore will start a new missional appointment as the Lead Pastor for the First UMC of Moorestown and Rev. Gina Kim from Palisades will retire. We give God thanks for both of these strong and faithful women of God. They have served their districts, regions, and the Cabinet faithfully and with excellence. We pray God's blessings on their next steps of their lives and ministry. We will miss you!

Finally, there will be a significant adjustment moving forward in the area of superintending and resourcing, but we trust that God will sustain us for the days, months, and years ahead!

CAMP YDP

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I am extremely pleased to report that in the very challenging year of 2020, CAMP YDP has proven to be relevant, resilient, and instrumental, supporting the children and families in the neighborhood. In the last 12 months, thanks to the hard work and collaboration of the director, staff, board of trustees and with generous support from GNJUMC, CAMP YDP was able to meet the challenges that developed as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Even though our doors closed for three months due to a state health mandate, CAMP reopened for summer and fall programming. Through teamwork, faith, and persistence this year has resulted in a vital program that has found clear purpose during a year of cultural hardship and chaos. I gratefully report this year's developments.

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Licensing : All state licenses and certifications are to code. CAMP YDP is in good standing with the city and state.

Staffing: We have had an exciting new development at CAMP with the hiring of Kenrick Wagner as our new director. Kenrick is dedicated to providing top quality youth programming and building a generation of leaders who will use creativity to learn and thrive. He is a passionate, creative, effective leader. He has expertly picked up the CAMP YDP mission and moves us one step closer to transforming the neighborhood.

Programming: CAMP YDP is currently supporting Paterson Public School students daily as they attend virtual school, homework support and after school fun. A dynamic summer program is in the works.

Building and Grounds

During this past year the playground and building have had many upgrades. We are currently working with PSE&G, The Bergen County Women's Junior League, and local professionals to maintain and improve the building, the playground, and the future sacred green space where St. Phillip's Church once stood.

Finances: In lieu of holding any in-person fundraising events, due to gathering constraints and concerns, the board set up fundraising letter campaign and an on-line donation button on the website. We are grateful to our donors for their generous support. This includes many United Methodist Churches, The United Methodist Women, and a generous Community Outreach Grant from GNJUMC. We received three other grants.

President's Comments

Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Commission on

I am deeply humbled to present my report as the Chairperson of the CCUIC for year 2020-2021. Under the new structure approved by the 2021 GNJ Annual Conference, I or my representative represented within the Leadership Team of the Conference Connectional Table, but due to the COVID situation we were unable to meet as the committee for this past several months.

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As members together in the Body of Christ, we seek to “work toward the full reception of the gift of Christian unity in every aspect of the Church’s life and to foster approaches to ministry and mission that more fully reflect the oneness of Christ’s church in the human community. We also seek to “work for the establishment and strengthening of relationships with other living faith communities, and to further dialogue with persons of other faiths, cultures, and ideologies”. Our responsibilities are listed in paragraph 642 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and our Commission is in connectional relationship with the General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns.

This is an interactive, online training designed to support Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationship (CUIR) Chairs in Annual Conferences across the UM Connection. The training consists of every-other-month, hour-long Zoom gatherings. Subjects chosen by the CUIR Chairs are explored during some gatherings, and other gatherings are times of relationships-building and idea-sharing among the participants. Participants must pre-register for the live engagements, but teaching times are recorded and uploaded to bishops' website.

The 2021 UMEIT: Zooms will be monthly, last about 20 minutes, will have a brief teaching and will conclude in prayer for unity. Rev. Dr. Jean Hawxhurst will be leading this month's session.

During 2020, three CUIC members were asked to attend the National Workshop on Christian Unity in Texas, an ecumenical event hosted by the United Methodist Ecumenical and Interreligious Training (UMEIT). This year, all the CUIC members will be encouraged to attend the National Workshop on Christian Unity to be held (TBA) with an aim of continuing to raise up a new generation of ecumenical leadership.

In recent years, ecumenical ties between the UMC/Episcopal Church (USA) and UMC/ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) have been strengthened through establishment of Interim Eucharistic Agreements.

Finally, we affirm the work of many local congregations throughout the GNJ Annual Conference in fostering Christian unity and strengthening our relationships with people of other faiths. Indeed, through our ministry, we seek “to advance and strengthen ecumenical and interreligious commitments that are essential to the Gospel of Jesus Christ, by forming and inspiring the clergy and lay leadership within the Annual Conference.”

Church and Society Report, Board of

The Board of Church and Society worked closely with the Commission on Religion and Race this year to sponsor a series of anti-racism discussions and initiatives. This initiative included weekly panel discussions featuring clergy and lay leaders in addressing various aspects of anti-racism activism. These conversations created the impetus for the crafting and publication of “A Letter Confronting Racism,” endorsed by over one hundred and fifty clergy members of the Annual Conference, addressing racism and recommendations for congregational engagement and calling for pastoral leadership in addressing congregational and community concerns with racism and its systemic effects. The BCS also worked with the New Jersey Coalition of Religious Leaders and Salvation and Social Justice in engaging United

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Methodist participation in a "Say Their Names Funeral Procession," a four hundred and fifty car procession calling attention to deaths within the New Jersey State Prisons from Covid-19 and calling for early release of prisoners.

In consultation with allied groups, N.J. Coalition of Religious Leaders, Salvation and Social Justice, the BCS worked to resource and advocate for legislative initiatives addressing issues of systemic racism, including school desegregation efforts. These efforts were further supported by the social justice cohort project. This project is a partnership between the GNJ BCS and the General Board of Church and Society of the UMC. Currently based in the Capital District, it is hoped that the social justice cohort model will become a model to be replicated throughout the GNJ to activate local congregations and other districts to address local social justice concerns, particularly regarding race and discrimination.

Several BCS members participated in Black Lives Matters rallies held throughout GNJ over the course of the summer. These included community gatherings held in Woodbridge promoted by Rev. Dave Delaney, Camden led by lay member Ed Martin, and Willingboro organized by the Capital District and featuring a number of lay and clergy speakers from the GNJ, including Rev. Gil Caldwell. Rev. Caldwell, a giant in the Civil rights movement who called GNJ his home conference, went on to next life. Rest in power, Rev. Caldwell.

Board of Church & Society Grants 2020

In 2020, the GNJAC Board of Church and Society awarded two grants of \$2,500 each to the "Write, Read, Achieve Power" (WRAP) Literacy Program of UMC of New Brunswick and Justice for Our Neighbors of the Delaware Valley (JFON-DV).

The WRAP Literacy Program used the grant to provide 15 mobile hotspots to Lincoln Elementary School students and their families during the Pandemic. These students and their families benefited from having high speed internet access. Without these hotspots these students would have been unable to complete their schoolwork this year.

JFON-DV used the grant to help fund immigration intake clinics at United Methodist Churches. These clinics provoked immigrants with legal services and counseling services.

Disaster Response Committee

The Disaster Response Committee convened under new leadership following the October 2020 session of Annual Conference. The Committee wishes to thank Tom O'Hearn, lay member of Annual Conference from Brick who served as the Chairperson of the committee for several years, for his faithful and diligent service.

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The Committee currently consists of District Disaster Response Coordinators from 6 of our 9 districts:

Rev. Cricket Denton Brennan - Cape Atlantic

Frank Friend - Capital

Hee Young Lim - Gateway North

Pastor Kevin Davis - Gateway South

Rev. Dr. Robb Shoaf - Palisades

Pastor Scott Maat – Skylands

We are currently seeking District DRCs for Delaware Bay, Northern Shore, and Rarity Valley. Please contact your District Superintendent if you are interested in serving in this capacity.

These District DRCs have plugged in to their local and county-level VOADs (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) and are keeping abreast of ways that UMCs in their area can be prepared and helpful. The committee is also coordinating closely with A Future With Hope, the GNJ Communications staff, and United Methodist Volunteers in Mission so that we can operate effectively in the event of a disaster. UMCOR continues to be an important partner and a source of funding should the need arise.

So far, we have repositioned disaster response trailers to northern and southern positions in the conference and are keeping them ready for action with monitoring, upkeep, and inventory. We are beginning an effort to get all Early Response Teams in the conference re-certified and badged to be ready for deployment at a moment's notice. Currently we have about 300 volunteers in GNJ who have been trained. Nearly all of them require re-certification.

We will also review and update the Conference Disaster Response Plan. When it is ready, we will bring it before the Annual Conference for approval and it will be published on the GNJ website.

Thankfully we have not experienced large-scale disasters in GNJ from October 2020 up to the time of this writing. We pray that this will remain true in the year ahead, but we stand ready if called upon. It is also true that many annual conferences in the US were not spared from natural disasters during this pandemic time. The gulf coast was hit hard at the end of hurricane season, Tennessee had devastating tornadoes, and wildfires raged in the West. Our goal is to deploy our trained volunteers to assist with the long-term recovery operations in these areas as vaccination rates increase and as quarantine and travel restrictions allow.

In the meantime, we encourage all churches to continue making UMCOR Relief Supply Kits like Cleaning Kits, Hygiene Kits, and School Kits. You can deliver these to any of the three HUBs in Greater New Jersey - the Skylands Outreach Depot in Newton, the Central Jersey Outreach HUB in Edison, or the Good Shepherd HUB in Northfield.

Discipleship, Board of

It is important that we share our successes and learn from one another. That is the beauty of the connectional church. Now more than ever we must seek out our colleagues, our sisters, and brothers to affirm and support all of the work we are doing throughout GNJ. Also keep in mind that the Board of Discipleship for the GNJ honors people every year who are living, breathing sermons who by virtue of the way they live their lives and minister are evangelizing to the world around them. Drew University Theological School

As with most other schools in the northeast of the U.S., Drew University evacuated its campus in early spring 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Drew Theological School faculty and staff adapted to this challenge with resilience, compassion, and creativity. The Theological School faculty put their courses all online, led development workshops for faculty across the university, and, in order to accommodate our many international admits who would not be able to enter the United States for fall 2020, designed an asynchronous Master of Divinity program.

As a result of this work, the Theological School welcomed 147 new students, its largest entering class in a decade, with an enrollment of 380 for the current academic year. Our chapel team has also led the way in creating online worship experiences that connect the Drew community now across the globe. All degree programs at the Theological School include interdisciplinary courses that demand out-of-the-box thinking, apprenticeship training that addresses real-world issues, and modes of learning that promote adaptability and innovation. Our MDiv and MATM degrees include a required gateway year, vocational pathways, and experiential learning that develops and deepens adaptive leadership skills.

The curriculum features a team-designed and taught interdisciplinary sequence of core courses reflecting the integration of the theological disciplines and practices characteristic of the life of faith. The faculty have also articulated shared values that are infused across the teaching and learning at Drew: a commitment to anti-racism; gender and sexual-identity equality; eco-sustainability and environmental justice; and interfaith understanding and cooperation.

Drew cultivates pastors, preachers, deacons, activists, teachers, and thought leaders who go all over the world to take their place as the next generation of faith leaders and change agents.

Duke University Divinity School

Edgardo Colón-Emeric, the Irene and William McCutchen Associate Professor of Reconciliation and Theology, Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Director of the Center for Reconciliation will become Dean of Duke Divinity School (DDS) July 1, 2021. Dean Gregory L. Jones will leave DDS to become president of Belmont University.

Duke Divinity School (DDS) continues to discern fresh strategies to respond faithfully and wisely to the changing church and the world. The disruptions, challenges, and injustices of 2020 occupied enormous attention as the school adapted to different modes of teaching/learning and interacting while also managing financial challenges both to DDS and Duke University.

DDS announced a new hybrid version of its Master of Divinity (M.Div.) program that will give students the opportunity to earn the M.Div. degree without relocating to Durham, N.C. The hybrid learning curriculum combines remote coursework with week-long residential intensives, where students connect in-person. The first cohort will begin coursework in fall 2021.

DDS welcomed the largest incoming class in school history with 257 new students from 35 different states and seven countries, including China, Italy, Japan, Kenya, Nigeria, South Korea and the United States. Our Master of Arts in Christian Practice (28 students) and Doctor of Ministry (52 students) programs received

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record enrollments. The Master of Theology (13 students), Master of Theological Studies (34 students), and Doctor of Theology (6 students) had strong enrollment. Our new Certificate in Theology and Health Care will enroll 6 students, all of whom are TMC Fellows. Across all degree programs, 31 percent of the incoming class identified as a race/ethnicity other than white. Black students made up 21 percent of all students, Asian students, 5 percent; and American Indian students, 2 percent. 45 percent of students in the incoming class were female, and 55 percent were male. The Master of Divinity (M.Div.) degree program gained 113 new students. Students from minority groups comprised more than 25 percent of incoming M.Div. students, with black students making up 19 percent. Female students made up 46 percent of incoming M.Div. students, while males were 54 percent. There were 30 denominations represented in the M.Div. entering class, with 30 percent affiliated with the United Methodist Church. Nondenominational students made up 16 percent of the new M.Div. students; Baptists, 16 percent; and Anglican-Episcopalian, 9 percent.

2020 also witnessed an expansion of DDS's partnerships, including the Kern Family Foundation partnership with the Office of Wesleyan Engagement to provide accelerated pathways for undergraduate students to pursue the Master of Divinity degree at Duke. DDS welcomed its first cohort of students at Martin Methodist College, taking classes at Duke. The Americas Initiative, a fellowship of organizations, scholars and practitioners convened by the Center for Reconciliation, is working on peacebuilding among Latin American and Latinx communities, particularly those of Indigenous and African descent. The five-year Black Pastoral Leadership Collaboration, begun in the fall of 2019 and jointly funded by DDS and the Provost's Office, is working to harness the research and experiential wisdom of Black pastoral leaders nationally through a leadership school and practical theology archiving project.

DDS sought to reckon in deeper and broader ways with systemic racism and injustice, particularly in light of the overlapping pandemics of COVID-19, economic crisis, and mental health challenges, and the school sought opportunities to strengthen its partnership and racial justice work across Duke University. A Story Listening and Gathering project solicited past or present students, faculty, and staff to share stories of how race and racial discrimination affects daily life at DDS with a goal of understanding the experiences of the community and to inform the school's broader anti-racism efforts. A new Race and the Professions Fellowship, in partnership with the Kenan Institute for Ethics, and the Churches Promoting Recovery Project, in partnership with the Theology, Medicine, and Culture Initiative, provided new opportunities for students to deepen their vocational formation and reimagine community transformation beyond campus.

DDS hired eight new faculty members in 2020. Peter Casarella is a Professor of Theology and has published widely on medieval Christian Neoplatonism, contemporary theological aesthetics, intercultural thought, and the Hispanic/Latino presence in the U.S. Catholic Church.

Sarah Barton is an Assistant Professor of Occupational Therapy and Theological Ethics whose scholarly work is focused in theological ethics, with special attention to theological anthropology, disability, liturgy, and pastoral care. She has a joint faculty appointment as assistant professor of occupational therapy at Duke University Medical Center.

Quinton Dixie, Associate Research Professor of Church History and Black Church Studies, specializes in American religious history and has written on a wide range of topics, from the African American Civil Rights Movement to the history of Black Baptists in the U.S.

Zebulon Highben is Associate Professor of the Practice of Church Music at Duke Divinity School and Director of Chapel Music at Duke University Chapel, and his research interests include hymnody, liturgy, music and exegesis, the musical heritage of the Reformation.

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Alma Tinoco Ruiz is a Lecturer in Homiletics and Evangelism and Director of the Hispanic House of Studies. She is a practical theologian whose work centers on the intersection of homiletics, pastoral care, and evangelism and she is a provisional elder in the United Methodist Church.

Janet Martin Soskice is the William K. Warren Distinguished Research Professor of Catholic Theology and for the past 30 years was on The Faculty of Divinity at the University of Cambridge. Her work lies at the intersection of Christian theology and philosophy.

Norbert Wilson is Professor of Food, Economics, and Community, and his research explores food issues such as access, choice, and food waste. He is an ordained vocational deacon in the Episcopal Church USA.

Wylin D. Wilson is an Assistant Professor of Theological Ethics, and prior to joining the Duke faculty, she was on faculty at the Harvard Medical School Center for Bioethics and was a senior fellow at the Center for the Study of World Religions at Harvard Divinity School. Her research focuses on religion, gender, and bioethics, including rural bioethics and Black Church studies.

Equitable Compensation, Commission on

The work of the Commission on Equitable Compensation has been challenging over the past year as we have struggled with the realities of COVID-19 for both pastors and local churches. After our initial discussions in the fall and winter a year ago, the commission reluctantly made the decision to hold the

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2021 basic minimum compensation for clergy at the 2020 level for this year only, with a goal of catching up in 2022. The recommendation for adoption by the annual conference reflects that goal.

The responsibilities for the Commission on Equitable Compensation as outlined in ¶625.2 of the 2016 Book of Discipline are four-fold: 1) To recommend conference standards for pastoral support; 2) To administer funds used in base compensation supplementation; 3) To provide counsel and advisory material on pastoral support to district superintendents and committees on pastor-parish relations; and 4) submit an arrearage policy to be adopted by the annual conference. Last year, we developed a new arrearage policy that will bring to light situations where pastors are not receiving their salaries in full. Failure to do so puts a burden first on the pastor, and tangentially on the conference. Judicial Council rulings do not allow a pastor to receive less than the basic minimum salary even voluntarily, and when such situations occur, they need to be addressed as soon as possible.

You will find that policy in our recommendations for 2021 with some slight editorial changes. Parsonage standards are updated annually with a few minor changes for clarification. Copies of these standards should be in the hands of the SPRC, the Board of Trustees, and, if applicable, the Parsonage Committee. Upkeep for the parsonage is not just for the benefit of the pastor, it is a protection of the investment that the church has in one of its properties. While there are drawbacks to the parsonage system, the benefit to the church is that its pastor lives within the community that she/he serves, something that would be extremely difficult to guarantee particularly in an area such as GNJ with such a wide span of real estate costs.

Over the next few months, the commission will be working on updating resources to guide SPRCs in setting salaries. While the pastor's compensation is most often the largest single line-item in a budget, the pastor is a primary resource for ministry through worship and preaching, administration, pastoral care, community engagement, Christian formation, stewardship education, and many other ministries that often go unnamed. Congregations need to be in serious conversation on how they set clergy compensation and planning for the future in a way that considers years of service, educational levels, effectiveness, responsibilities and expectations, cost of living in a specific community, family needs and equity with pastors serving comparable sized congregations. A conversation that begins and ends with what's the least amount we can pay a pastor is a surrender to a mind-set of scarcity rather than a focus on the abundance of God's blessings. In the next few months, the commission will provide resources so that these conversations can start within the congregation as they are looking to setting their compensation packages in preparation for the 2022 Church Conferences.

As part of the Journey with Hope legislation, a significant part of our work in the coming year will be to begin to address the inequities in compensation across GNJ. In some of our most economically challenged communities, a pastor will serve in less than full time status (and therefore compensated accordingly) even though the congregation and area served is significantly larger than smaller congregations in more affluent communities. This has disproportionately affected churches and pastors in urban areas, and particularly communities of color. It is our desire to work with others in GNJ to provide new ways for ongoing, sustainable ministry that makes disciples and transforms communities for Jesus Christ.

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My thanks to the members of the Commission on Equitable Salary for their time and energy in our work together on behalf of United Methodists of Greater New Jersey.

Finance and Administration, Council on

As 2020 started, we had every expectation that that it would be a strong year for GNJ and that we would be able to build on the faithful stewardship and giving of GNJ congregations in prior years to fund local and global mission. In February 2020, the former treasurer announced his retirement, but we still did not expect any major disruption as the former treasurer promised to continue working till June 2020 and help with the transition. On March 11, 2020, the WHO declared COVID 19 a global pandemic - its first such designation since declaring H1N1 influenza a pandemic in 2009. That is when a year of uncertainty and adjustment started for everyone.

Once the potential scale and length of the pandemic was understood by April, the GNJ's financial and cabinet leadership developed a plan to support the congregations through the pandemic. Five million dollars was set aside through a portion of a property sale (Belmar) worth \$0.8 MM, through borrowing \$1.4 MM from our GNJ designated funds and through expense cuts for the rest. With those resources, GNJ offered congregations a four-month shared ministry holiday and assisted them to receive PPP funding. The budget was recast based on a 60% shared ministry collection rate vs the originally approved 92% collection rate.

Churches responded faithfully with courage and conviction. For the whole of 2020 we received 74% in shared ministry (14% more than we had projected in May) and GNJ congregations and ministries received more than \$8 million in PPP funding, and GNJ received 94% vs 90% with respect to billables in 2020 vs. 2019 from our congregations.

A new CFO/Treasurer, Rob Zuckerman, joined us mid-year and he is providing strong leadership for which I am very grateful.

Unfortunately, because of the pandemic and newly discovered financial constraints, GNJ was not able to pay 100% of general church apportionments in 2020. We did pay 66%, 16% points more than we projected in April but this was the first time in more than 15 years that GNJ did not give 100%. Going forward, we plan to apportion the churches for the General Church and pass through exactly what we collect.

In November, we realized that GNJ was significantly under-billing congregations with respect to billables – specifically in the areas of current employee healthcare insurance and property insurance. This shortfall in billings was being made up with draws from designated funds and property sales. Over a period of nine years, GNJ has spent down its reserves by \$10 million dollars. The under-billing led to a \$6 million shortfall in the 2021 budget.

GNJ's financial leadership and cabinet took a lot of steps to address the present challenges and the long term needs of GNJ.

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Steps taken:

1. Previously the budget would only cover the shared ministry piece of the finances which is under the domain of CF&A. Now we have created a 2021 consolidated budget that includes the domains of CF&A, Board of Pensions and Health and Board of Trustees. We have also ensured it is balanced by making the expense adjustments necessary.
2. A plan was developed to help transition churches over five years to paying the full cost of the benefit programs.
3. Worked with the Bishop, the cabinet, and the connectional table to update/implement the JOH legislation.
4. CF&A approved and organized an independent financial team to investigate the financial matters of the recent past and make policy and corrective recommendations.
5. A designated fund policy has been approved by CF&A to rebuild the reserves within 5 years which is being presented as legislation for the May 2021 Annual Conference to approve.

Major projects ahead:

1. Develop comprehensive policy and procedures manual covering all financial matters at GNJ.
2. Recommend a long-term funding plan with respect to shared ministry apportionments and billings necessary to implement the "Journey of Hope" legislation.
3. Establish a team in partnership with the Centenary Fund Board to work on generating a long-term stream of income to pay for retiree health.

We are at a state of maximum economic uncertainty – on one hand we are very aware of how COVID impacted our churches recently but on the other, we know that as vaccines are administered more widely, and the stimulus efforts of the Government take effect, things will likely return to greater normalcy in the next 3 to 4 months.

As a result, we think it prudent to delay putting together a 2022 budget till the fall of 2021 by which time we will know better how well our churches are indeed faring.

We expect to have a special Annual Conference to review and approve our 2022 budget in October of 2021.

First Friends of NJ and NY

Since its founding in 1997, the mission of First Friends of NJ and NY has been to uphold the inherent dignity and humanity of some of our nation's most vulnerable populations -- immigrants and asylum seekers detained in the four U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) facilities in northern New Jersey: the Elizabeth Detention Center, Essex County Correctional Facility, Bergen County Jail and the Hudson County Correction Center. A volunteer-based organization, we strive to reduce detainees' isolation and provide compassion and hope through visitations; a telephone hotline set up in each of the facilities; commissary funds, bonds, the provision of funds for phone calls to family and attorneys; supplying folders of stamps and writing materials to enable detainees to stay in contact with family members; resettlement assistance upon release; and advocacy.

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Most of the approximately 750 immigrants and asylum seekers currently detained are people from Mexico, Central America, the Caribbean, and Africa. They come to the US seeking safety and freedom but are unjustly detained for months, sometimes even years. Most have no money to pay an attorney, post bond or even telephone their families. In the facilities we serve, crowded conditions are common and have become a serious health risk during the COVID pandemic. Upon release, most former detainees work at minimum wage jobs which they lost when the pandemic hit.

In 2020, First Friends volunteers made 133 visits to detainees before the pandemic lock-down. 7,689 phone calls were received from detainees through our toll-free hot-line. Despite the challenges brought on by the pandemic, First Friends has been working harder than ever to continue to provide hope and healing for our detained friends. Although visitations in March 2020 were paused, 186 volunteers have served as pen pals, with 415 letters having been received from detainees. We posted 59 bonds that enabled immigrants to be released from jail while they await their immigration hearings. 93 newly released immigrants have been provided with hygiene supplies and transportation to their families or volunteer hosts, and 45 were provided with food, utilities, and rental assistance.

First Friends NJ/NY is an Advanced Special in GNJ, and as a Hope Center has strong partnerships with many United Methodist churches across the state. Morrow UMC in Maplewood began visiting immigrants held in detention almost ten years ago and continues to assist in training volunteer visitors, coordinate visits to detention centers, assist in post release support, collect donations, and fundraise for the organization. Chatham UMC participates in our Stamp Out Despair program that provides writing materials and postage to detainees to stay in touch with friends and families which is especially important during this pandemic. The UMW in Palisades have donated funds and signed up for volunteer visitations. Sparta UMC, Sparta UMW, New Dover UMC have all contributed to First Friends either through donations or direct service to immigrants. First Friends NJ/NY has a strong presence throughout GNJ and is supported by many congregants in our conference.

Fund Balance Evolution Over Time

The tables below show the projection of balances in the various designated funds over the next 10 years. These model projections will be reported each year after the model is updated.

The model makes an initial allocation to each of the 13 funds; then it sequentially directs excess property sale proceeds to the various funds to achieve the fund goals over time.

Once a fund is fully funded, it will be invested as its own fund through Wespath from that time onwards, and the draws for the particular ministry will come directly from that fund.

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Over time shared ministry will be focused on supporting the core mission of GNJ which includes superintending, leadership, and congregational development.

Model assumptions:

1. \$3.7 million in property sales in 2021 increasing to \$4.5 million in 2035.
2. Investments will return on average 7% per year and draws of 5% per year will be made to support the designated ministries.
3. Congregations will transition to full payment of billables by 2026 – so the last year requiring subsidies from GNJ to churches towards billables will be 2025.
4. Full funding of the St. John’s Native American church by 2023.
5. Full funding of all funds except for Harvest Mission Fund, Strategic Disciple Making Fund, Retiree Health Care and Property Redevelopment Fund by 2027.
6. The goal is to return to the GNJ approved allocation funds as follows:
Harvest Mission Fund (50%), Strategic Disciple Making Fund (20%), Retiree Health Care (15%) and Property Redevelopment Fund (15%).
7. The model may be affected by any or all of the following:
 - Changes in the number and value of property sales.
 - Market disruption.
 - Extraordinary crises or change in the denomination.

This model will be updated annually as needed and new projections will be made.

Through a network of chaplaincies, Wesley Foundations, ecumenical ministries and church-based ministries, The United Methodist Church reaches more than 1,300 campuses around the world!

“We are called to share with our campuses the transformational nature of Christ in a way that raises up a new generation of thoughtful, articulate Christians who care about making the world a better place. While this calling looks and feels very different across our campuses, it is central to our identity and it compels us to provide intentional, student-led ministries that reach this emerging generation of leaders.” (gbhem.org)

The Board of Higher Education and Ministries of Greater New Jersey has continued its work with Next Gen Ministries. Our partnership towards the development of campus ministries includes funding through grants from GNJ BHEM that will provide resources, directly and indirectly, for retreats,

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coaching, trainings, and other events sponsored and hosted by the General Board of Higher Ed for GNJ campuses and ministers.

As a GNJ Agency, the Board of Higher Ed will continue to promote and award scholarships to GNJ students aspiring to attend Methodist colleges and universities and other schools while growing into their call to mission and ministry in the areas of youth ministry, outreach, mission, service, and a call to pastoral leadership.

This past year scholarship applications transitioned to online and the application verification process of documents was reviewed and submitted by GNJ Connectional Ministries' administrator following CDC safety guidelines due to COVID19.

BHEM agency members met via Zoom to process the completed applications which were received electronically for review and awards process. BHEM received 36 completed electronic scholarship applications of which thirteen (13) GNJ students were awarded between \$1,500 and \$2,500 for a total of \$22,000 in scholarships awarded. The students who were awarded scholarships submitted complete applications by the deadline.

Every year members of BHEM are inspired with the mission and ministries that students engage in and are so passionate about. Due to limited amount of grant funds, the awarding process is not an easy one.

Every year BHEM encourages clergy and laity to nominate a person for the Francis Asbury Award. The Francis Asbury Award is a non-monetary award that recognizes those who encourage and support higher education and campus ministries within the United Methodist Church. It is for all clergy or lay, employed or volunteer, who are active in supporting, strengthening, and promoting higher education ministries. This year no nominations were received due to the transition between BHEM and NextGen Ministries who are now overseeing directly, while reporting to BHEM, the works and ministries of campus ministers in their respective campuses.

It is GNJ BHEM's commitment to continue to encourage new relationships with congregations and college campuses, and especially with students who are active members of congregations pursuing careers inspired by mission and ministries and those who have a personal call to ministry.

Your continued prayers and support for our campuses, ministers, and chaplains; our faithful and dedicated board members, and our conference youth and leaders will be greatly appreciated!

A Journey of Hope

Objective: To integrate and deepen the mission and ministry of Greater New Jersey (GNJ)--to make new disciples of Jesus Christ, make transformational leaders and make fruitful and sustainable congregations--by dismantling the systems and structures within the church that perpetuate racism and in turn, developing a more racially just, inclusive, and equitable church.

The above objective is driven by the "why" stated at the outset of the Journey of Hope plan as part of our urgent calling:

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As baptized Christians, we renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness, reject the evil powers of this world, and repent of our sin. We accept the freedom and power God gives us to resist evil, injustice and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves. We confess Jesus Christ as our Savior, put our whole trust in his grace, and promise to serve him as our Lord, in union with the church which Christ has opened to people of all ages, nations, and races.

Journey of Hope Scope: The Plan calls for a \$5.1 million investment to end the sin of racism in five areas:

- Increase and grow Leadership of Color.
- Start new and developing Congregations of Color.
- Develop resources to lead all leaders and congregations to integrate ending the sin of racism with the mission of Greater New Jersey.
- Review all policies and procedures of GNJ for bias and to ensure equity and inclusion.
- Invest financially in repairing harm and engage in the long-term work of racial justice, inclusion, and equity.
-

Accomplishments & Ongoing/Next Steps

- **One consultant organization**, which meets the key criteria as identified in the Plan's legislation, has been identified following a series of vetting of all candidates. The Journey of Hope team is currently in the process of identifying a consultant to assist GNJ in the implementation of the Journey of Hope plan, including the training of facilitators.
- **Journey of Hope Planning Guide:** The Journey of Hope ACT (Aspire. Comprehend. Transform) Plan is a congregational resource that will guide churches on a path to vitality that matches their strengths and needs and moves them towards a more sustainable future alongside ending the sin of racism. The two primary resources that will facilitate this work are The Leadership Academy and the Journey of Hope ACT plan. This spring churches will be invited to begin this process. The Journey of Hope ACT plan will guide congregations to assess their strengths, recognize the current realities of ministry and the future probabilities for vitality, reflect on how God is calling the congregation into the community, become culturally competent and take meaningful steps to end the sin of racism. Congregations will be supported by a trained resource coach that will help coordinate and facilitate their work. Congregations will then create a unique culturally competent plan for their ministry based on increasing sustainability and vitality, community engagement, organizational leadership, and ending the sin of racism.
- **Forbearance Plan (5a from the Journey of Hope Legislation) & Reductions in Shared Ministry (Apportionments) and Billings (5e from the Journey of Hope Legislation):** The Journey of Hope team's intent and impact are to ensure racial and economic equity for all congregations in low-income communities. Pending the approval of updated legislation in section 5e, the Finance and Benefits Department is ready to begin invoicing congregations who meet the five criteria (5.a.i-v) outlined in the legislation at the reduced rate for shared ministry and billings and to begin the implementation of the forbearance program (5a), which outlines that "GNJ will permanently forbear collecting on billable debt for all African American/Black and Native American congregations and all other congregations that meet the criteria."

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May we all remember our baptismal covenant as we work together to live out our GNJ Mission.

Justice For Our Neighbors of The Delaware Valley (JFON-DV)

No human being is illegal.

Justice For Our Neighbors of the Delaware Valley (Delaware Valley JFON) was established in 2019 and became an affiliate of National Justice For Our Neighbors in 2020. National JFON is an immigration ministry of the United Methodist Church composed of 20 affiliates across the United States that provides low-cost and no-cost legal services to immigrant communities. Initially, the Delaware Valley affiliate of JFON will serve communities in Southeast Pennsylvania and Southern New Jersey. It is a cooperative effort among three annual conferences - Greater New Jersey, Peninsula-Delaware, and Eastern Pennsylvania.

We are committed to providing exceptional immigration legal services to vulnerable and low-income immigrants and refugees in the Delaware Valley, as well as strengthening communities through education and family unification. Our attorneys can help those who are eligible obtain work permits through protective programs like Temporary Protective Services (TPS) and Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). Victims of domestic abuse, violent crime, and certain civil strife and natural disasters are eligible under U.S. immigration laws to apply for protective visas. Our attorneys can help victims fleeing dangerous homes and situations start life again with a clean slate. Our attorneys understand the importance of keeping families together and will guide family members through the immigration system and back into the arms of loved ones.

The New Jersey Council of JFON-DV has begun holding legal clinics on a monthly basis in Bridgeton and will never turn an immigrant away because they cannot afford to pay legal fees. Our clinics are held with the support of local churches and community volunteers to determine if those seeking help are eligible to apply for a permanent residence, naturalization, work authorizations or any other form of immigration relief.

JFON-DV became a Hope Center in October 2020 and has received a Peace With Justice grant and other financial support from GNJ and local churches throughout the conference. We are hoping to raise \$10,000 from supporting churches in GNJ in 2021 as we gradually expand our services from the Southern Region to the Northern Region. Churches that would like to support JFON, donors, and individuals who would like to volunteer their legal expertise or translation skills should contact New Jersey Co-Chairs Rev. Delaware Valley JFON plans to expand its services throughout Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, and the eastern shore of Maryland. We are committed to providing unparalleled excellence in legal services to unite families, enable eligible immigrants to work and help victims of violence live safely and permanently in the United States.

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Important Work and Goals

- 1) The Laity Board will review and ensure that lay representation at Annual Conference 2021-2024 is equal in membership in accordance with the GNJAC Rules of Order/ Book of Discipline. New Quadrennial “At-Large Members” will apply online and agree to be faithful to process as well as commit to attend Annual Conference and report back to local congregation.
- 2) The Leadership Academy will continue to work to create a culture of learning in which laity throughout the Annual Conference will have an opportunity to become engaged, equipped and empowered to be **effective** partners with each other and their clergy partners to lead the church and reach the community as disciples of Jesus Christ.
- 3) The Laity Board will continue to celebrate the ministry of faithful laity with a format called “Lay Ministry Recognition.” This program recognizes a person or group that has been creative and innovative in transforming lives and making disciples of Jesus Christ. This is for the purpose of resource sharing and encouraging congregations in their ministries. The Laity Board will choose ministries from each district to be highlighted in April each year, at GNJUMC Mission and Resource Center. This program will be reviewed on a yearly basis.
- 4) The Laity Board will work with the Connectional Ministry Team and District Superintendents to ensure Christian leaders are offered vital and vibrant educational programs that develop
 - a) Fruitful and transformational leaders
 - b) Communication and interpersonal skills
 - c) Passionate faith and biblical understanding
 - d) 100 laity who make disciples who make disciples (Leadership 100)
 - e) missional mindset that connects with the community
 - f) Lay Servant ministries**The lay servant ministries quickly adapted to the changes and challenges brought on by the pandemic and had 188 persons successfully complete basic and advanced classes. The ministry is exploring new ways to offer classes. Six persons completed the certified Lay Minister courses.*
- 5) The Laity Board will work collaboratively with all boards, committees, agencies, and the conference leadership to support the strategic goals of GNJ and align its work to advance the A Journey of Hope plan and other areas of focus from GNJ’s strategic plan.

Let us encourage one another to continue the work we have been doing to make disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Let us work together to have a significant impact on our churches, our communities, and our workplaces. Let us be active participants in the work of God in our midst. To God be the glory!

Our initial meeting, “Fighting Hate and Anti-Semitism” included member panelists from the Latino Coalition of Ministers, The African American Advocacy group Salvation and Social Justice, the Religious Action Center of Reformed Judaism, the Sikh American Legal Defense Fund, and the Council of Imams in New Jersey, addressing this issue. The Keynote speaker was new Jersey State Attorney General, Gubir Grewal, addressed the issue of bias crimes in New Jersey. He reported that 50% of known offenders of hate crimes are high school and college age persons and affirmed the need for faith leaders to partner with county prosecutor’s offices and local school districts.

Our fall program, “Cultivating a Moral Consciousness ... How does our Religious Imagery perpetuate Racism in America” was one of storytelling by three distinguished members of the Coalition, The Reverend Charles Boyer – founder of Salvation and Social Justice, Bishop Caryle Hughes – Bishop of the Newark Episcopal Diocese, and Imam Wahy-Deen Shareef – Convener of the Council of Imams in New Jersey. A distinguished panel of moderators included three members of the Drew Theological faculty and Temple’s University Professor of Islamic Studies. The program provided opportunities of story sharing and the impact of racism experienced as religious leaders.

Our most recent virtual gathering of some sixty religious leaders addressed the issue of “Racism Revealed: The attack on the Capitol ... what we need to learn and do as Religious Leaders.” Addressing

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the group, Congresswoman Bonnie Watson-Coleman (12th NJ Congressional District) spoke of the harrowing experience she had on January 6th as well as encouraged leadership to use their pulpit and media platforms to speak out against racial injustice. The Primate of the Episcopal Church of America, Bishop Michael Curry, also addressed the group reflecting on the current challenges confronting religious leaders at this time in our nation. He too challenged us to address the issues of racial inequities.

Over the past year the Coalition has worked in partnership with other civic organizations and leaders. The Coalition partnered with the Brave Angeles program “With Malice Toward None”, seeking to bring people together to build goodwill and friendships after the divisive national election. We shared in a partnership with the New Jersey Ambassador Program designed to address issues around re-entry of incarcerated persons in communities throughout New Jersey. One partnership was the development of a “virtual care program”, coordinated by the Governor’s office of outreach in response to mental hardships caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

A Coalition editorial appearing in the Newark Star Ledger, “No Time for Retribution”, was in response to the tragic death of Floyd George. Statements of support and collaboration were issues throughout this past year reflecting our sacred values that unite us as a Coalition of diverse religious leaders. In the ensuing year our focus will include a strategic plan of networks advocating for issues of criminal justice, fair share housing, environmental justice, and reparations study.

Next Generation Ministries

Throughout 2020 and 2021, Next Generation Ministries has remained passionate to fulfill its mission to *cultivate and catalyze new generations of enthusiastic disciples of Jesus Christ who connect, grow and lead in their congregation and community for the transformation of the world.*

Connect: Through Family Camps, IGNITE Communities, Fall Family Days and IGNITE Watch Parties, hundreds of students and families came together (in person and virtually) to connect with God.

Grow: Through learning cohorts and IGNITE Communities Leadership Teams, youth and youth group leaders grew in faith and learned together.

Lead: Through internships, Family Camp and in local churches, young people continue to be the leaders for their church and community today.

While COVID-19 has created challenges for Camping Ministry, Campus Ministries, and events such as IGNITE, congregations around GNJ continue to find creative ways to connect with youth and young people. We celebrate the many pastors, part-time church staff and volunteers who have hosted Zoom youth gatherings, socially distanced and outdoor events, created regular online content for young people and more.

Next Gen’s greatest learning since its beginning in 2017 is that synergy is the most important element to raise up new generations of disciples (other than God, of course!). Many churches and campus ministries have a good program, or group who meets, or a major event or retreat they do each year. However, we know that faith formation does not happen one weekend or major event each year. Faith formation happens through relationships developed over time through intentional planning and gathering. Truly, Next Gen’s original formation was to align the efforts of youth, camping and campus ministries to create synergy across expanding ministries with young people.

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This year we're so excited to give your congregation one tool that makes this synergy possible: the IGNITE Discipleship Calendar. Using the Discipleship Calendar, your church will be able to create a year-round plan for your people to connect with God, grow in faith and lead in the church and community today. Through events such as IGNITE, Camping Ministry and more, as well as gatherings and events specific to your church, this summer your church will be able to create its own, contextually specific Discipleship Calendar to be in ministry with youth for the next whole school year. Now it is easy for you, your leadership, and volunteers to have a great plan to reach young people in your church and community.

There you'll be able to download a copy for free, connect with a Next Gen Team Coach to help create your own calendar, download the IGNITE Discipleship App for youth leaders and volunteers, learn about upcoming events and more.

We're all discerning what ministry will look like coming out of the pandemic. This summer plan an entire year of discipleship for young people in your church and community. Next Gen has all the tools to help.

The GNJ Commission on Religion and Race (GNJ CORR) advances the mandate of the General Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR). "GCORR is the core agency within the United Methodist Church tasked with empowering the Church to pursue racial equity and cultural competency to build a stronger, more vibrant UMC." GNJ CORR is charged with this same task in the Greater New Jersey Conference (GNJ) by promoting full and equal participation of the racial and ethnic constituency in the total life and mission of the church GNJ CORR seeks to empower clergy and laity to develop transformational leaders and vital congregations.

I am honored to have been appointed as chair of GNJ CORR and I am grateful to lead such an exceptional team. I am happy to give a report on the work done since our last Annual Conference in October 2020. Because of COVID 19, my transitioning to becoming the chair was delayed until the month of October, but that was a blessing in disguise.

During the summer months I had the privilege of working hand in hand with Rev. Vanessa M. Wilson, who was the chair of our committee for 8 years. During that same time, we strengthen our partnership with the members of GNJ's Board of Church and Society. We met every week for about two months to strategize on how to respond to the news on police brutality in our nation and other racial issues affecting our churches and communities. In these meetings we drafted the legislation on Black Lives Matter that was approved in our Annual Conference in October. We also worked on the drafting of the open letter from white clergy.

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During the Summer and Fall we continued the series of *Conversations About Race*, where members of our team and special guests led the members of our Annual Conference in dialogue about race issues that are affecting our churches and the communities that we serve.

Our team continued to review and give input to the Journey of Hope (JoH). In January, we met to discuss the financial effects of the January 2021 Special Session on churches and clergy of color. GNJ CORR was invited to collaborate with the director of worship to create the "Not Soon Forgotten" service on legacy, love and leadership honoring Black History.

I am very thankful for our GNJ GCORR team. Each member is doing special work in their communities to combat the sin of racism. Our members are leading efforts to end school segregation in our schools, others are pushing for police reform, and others are advocating for immigrant rights. These are just examples of ways that we seek for God's justice for those who are hungry and thirsty for it.

During this coming year, GNJ CORR will continue to lead our Annual Conference in dialogue by reinstating the Conversations About Race in the Fall. The team has been charged by the JoH plan to revise the legislation that comes to Annual Conference for any racial biases they may contain. We will continue to strengthen our relationship with other agencies of our Annual Conference, so that, in working together, we will continue to fight the sin of racism.

Saint Paul School of Theology

Saint Paul School of Theology, a seminary of the United Methodist Church, is committed to the formation of people for innovative, creative ministry. We are one institution, online and on-campus, in Kansas and Oklahoma.

This past year, we have all faced new challenges amid these unsettled times. Saint Paul School of Theology began the 2020-2021 academic year offering students an online option for all courses. With many students choosing to attend class solely online, our Student Council created a monthly "Chat & Chew" where students, faculty, and staff come together to eat lunch and talk about life, seminary, and ministry. In addition, Rev. Rod Newman, our Oklahoma Campus Chapel Coordinator, crafts a weekly Community Prayer to provide encouragement and faithfulness as the school seeks to provide spiritual formation in new ways.

Kansas Campus Chapel Coordinator Dr. Casey Sigmon took worship to new technological levels by introducing our weekly online worship service via Zoom, bringing our separate campus chapel services together for one service where all are invited to create a sacred atmosphere from wherever they are. Along with our featured alumni worship preachers, the community was blessed this fall by the presence of Musician in Residence Hannah Rand, from The Many, who led the music each week for worship. In Spring 2020, Odell Talley, Director of Music for Swope Parkway United and organist for Zion Travelers Missionary Baptist, served as Musician in Residence. For those who cannot join us live, chapel recordings are available on the Saint Paul YouTube channel.

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Saint Paul staff and faculty continue to contribute to the academy, church, and society. This year, we have added new adjunct professors, including Rev. Dr. Carol Cook-Moore and Rev. Dr. Tiffany Nagel Monroe both of the OKUMC, Rev. Dr. Robert Turner of Vernon Chapel AME, UMC Deaconess Cindy Johnson of Rio Grande Conference, Rev. Adam Hamilton and Debi Nixon both of Church of the Resurrection, Rev. Chebon Kernell of the UMC Native American Comprehensive Plan, and Rev. Dr. Shannon Fleck of the Oklahoma Conference of Churches.

The faculty of Saint Paul School of Theology continue to maintain high standards of scholarship, research, publication, and engagement. Their many activities and publications over the past year are so numerous that space permits only the sharing of selected highlights.

1. Dr. Jim Brandt, Professor of Historical Theology, will publish “Schleiermacher’s Christian Ethics” in the forthcoming Oxford Handbook of Schleiermacher, which will appear in 2022 from the Oxford University Press.
2. Dr. Nancy Howell, Professor of Theology and Philosophy of Religion and Oubri A. Poppele Professor of Health and Welfare Ministries, continues her service on the Executive Committee of the International Society for Science and Religion, working on several committees advancing the aims of the Society.
3. Rev. Dr. Israel Kamudzandu, Associate Professor of New Testament Studies, will see the publication of his book, Reading and Interpreting the Bible with Global South Christians: A 21st Century Model for Europe and North America Christendom, by Wipf and Stock Publishers this summer. He has also written four Commentaries on 2 Corinthians and Ephesians which appeared on WorkingPreacher.org in April.
4. Dr. Hal Knight, Donald and Pearl Wright Professor of Wesleyan Studies, continues his work as a contributing writer in *The Missouri Methodist* magazine.
5. Dr. Kristen E. Kvam, Professor of Theology, serves as co-chair for the American Academy of Religion’s Program Unit “Martin Luther and Global Lutheran Traditions.” Over the last several months, she has conducted invited presentations to the Great Plains UMC Clergy and its Clergy Excellence in Liminal Time Conversations and the Fall Theological Conference of Central States Synod (ELCA) on October 14, 2020.
6. Dr. Casey Sigmon, Assistant Professor of Preaching and Worship and Director of Contextual Education continues to contribute regularly to WorkingPreacher.org and served as the keynote speaker at the Wesleyan Liturgical Society in Kansas City in March 2020. Her scholarly writing will appear in the Preaching the Manifold Grace, Vol. 2, edited by Ronald J. Allen and published by Wipf and Stock.

This year, we have faced several challenges that turned into opportunities for new recruiting spaces and partnerships to enhance students’ seminary experience. With the change from in-person to virtual events, Rev. Shannon Hancock, Director of Admissions and Communications, has expanded her reach to prospective students by participating as a virtual exhibitor at online conferences. Rev. Hancock engages with prospective students via apps such as Whova and HopIn to highlight Saint Paul’s unique course delivery system and formative community.

In February, Saint Paul held the 2021 Slater-Willson Lecture online featuring Rev. Dr. Miguel A. De La Torre. His lecture, “Why Do They Come?” explored the political, economic, and social causes of our current immigration crisis. Before the lecture, Rev. Dr. De La Torre participated in a student-led forum, entering a conversation centering around the practical aspects of ministry and immigration. Later in April, Saint Paul Evangelical Society, led by Dr. Hal Knight, hosted a lecture given by Dr. Sammy G. Alfaro, Associate Professor of Theology at Grand Canyon University and Pastor of Iglesia Nuevo Dia (New Day Church), on

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the “Pastoral Strategies for Ministering Among Latinx Immigrant Communities.” And for the first time, on May 22, Saint Paul held a virtual commencement celebration with videos, cap and gown photos, online congratulatory messages from friends and family, and a commencement address by Rev. Chebon Kernell.

The class of 2021 had 22 graduates, including 16 Master of Divinity and 1 Doctor of Ministry graduates. Due to the pandemic, for safety concerns, Saint Paul has postponed our 60th Anniversary Celebration. However, we have rescheduled the event for Friday, October 22 and look forward to coming together as a community for a safe, in-person gathering.

For the 2020-2021 fiscal year, Saint Paul Course of Study (COS) School educated 255 individual students, 40 of which were new students, with a total registration of 520 classes and offering a total of 51 courses. Due to Covid-19, the school quickly pivoted its course offerings and delivered lessons in both asynchronous and synchronous online formats. In Winter 2019, Saint Paul began a hybrid (online and on-campus) schedule for six courses. Although for 2021, this went fully online, plans to increase the number of hybrid course offerings are in development.

Saint Paul Board of Trustees added three new members to their ranks: Bishop James D. Tindall, Sr., Pastor Emeritus at Metropolitan Spiritual Church of Christ Kansas City; Ms. Sharon Cleaver, Senior Director of Marketing, Communications, and PR for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Kansas City; and Mr. Rogers Strickland, Founder/CEO of Strickland Construction.

Through a Board initiative related to diversity and inclusion, Saint Paul created a working group on Native American theology and ministries comprised of Native theologians and church leaders. Their efforts are focused on how the church and academy can work together toward healing generational trauma related to the spread of Christianity and the genocide of Indigenous North Americans.

As we have happily reported in past years, Saint Paul is financially sound and operates with a balanced budget. The changes made these last years have established a solid financial foundation for years of sustainability. We continue to be grateful for donations from the community that provide technology, scholarships, and emergency assistance to students. Our significant investments in technology have recently allowed our staff, faculty, and students to transition to a fully hybrid educational delivery model providing a safe learning environment during the pandemic. Our faculty was uniquely adept at managing technology in the classroom before the pandemic, making the transition to all online courses a smooth process.

With the Board’s assistance, led by Board Chair Rev. Dr. Tex Sample, the seminary focuses on its mission. Our trustees work to continuously enhance and evaluate the strategic plans in place to guide us into the future. Perhaps most importantly, we have learned much and grown closer as a community due to the pandemic.

Saint Paul School of Theology is blessed to be your partner in ministry and help those seeking more to answer the call. We are a seminary that offers online and on-campus classes with a flexible schedule to help our students manage pastoral leadership demands in the 21st century. We are grateful for your support of our students and our seminary. May we continue to live into the call of Jesus Christ to be faithful witnesses for healing in these unsettled times and for generations to come.

We at the Stewardship Foundation like everyone else are glad that 2020 is behind us. We experienced an unprecedented loss in investments, as performance dropped by 22% in March 2020. By the end of 2020 performance was at 19.43%. As a result of Wespath's excellent investment strategy and churches opening new accounts, at the end of January 2021 the investment balance of the Foundation totaled over \$53 MM. This is a milestone for the Stewardship Foundation.

The Foundation Board of Trustees monitors and establishes policies for the operation of the Foundation; supports the work of the Foundation with their time, and expertise, and encourages the ministry and mission of the Foundation as representatives in their churches, districts, and annual conference.

Wespath Investment Management became the Investment Manager in August 2015. As of the end of 2017, the amount of investment in the foundation was \$44.3 MM.

Developments in 2018: The focus of the Foundation is three-fold – to increase conference wide fund raising especially by providing planned giving opportunities; to resource congregations encouraging commitment to a 12-month Stewardship Plan; to provide socially sustainable investment opportunities for congregations and conference mission organizations.

United Methodist Women

It is my great honor to be the new president of the United Methodist Women of Greater New Jersey. I want to express my appreciation to our past president, Kathy Schulz, for her four years of service. She left the organization in wonderful shape, making my job much easier. For example, we have a full slate of officers including the Nominations Committee. Also, we met our “Pledge to Mission” for work in our conference, our country, and our world, with our focus on mission to women, children, and youth. This “COVID year” has been extremely unusual and difficult for everyone. That is why it is so remarkable that we made our Pledge to Mission of \$130,000, when many fundraising events had to be cancelled or creatively re-imagined as virtual or curbside. Many United Methodist Women stepped up to literally serve the needs in their communities as people lost their jobs and hunger reared its ugly head. Soup kitchens and food pantries multiplied and served more people than ever before.

There were many cancellations in the spring as the pandemic spread. For example, the spring meeting was to have been held in Sparta on April 4th on “Breaking the Cycle of Poverty.” Mission u, held in cooperation with GNJUMC, was to have been held at Georgian Court University, but became virtual on Zoom. The theme, “Finding Peace in an Anxious World” was just what we needed in these anxious times. Four single-day events were held with the following numbers attending: July 11th – 63 & July 18th – 54 (we thank Rev. Vaneekoven for leading these), Korean event on July 26th- 172 (thank you, Rev. Yi), and Hispanic event on Oct 31st- 10 (thank you, Rev. Santiago).

This quadrennium, United Methodist Women will focus on climate justice and the criminalization of communities of color. Our postponed-to-virtual Northeast Jurisdiction UMW meeting was in June. The quadrennial election included Marilyn Powell becoming the Chair of Nominations, Bethany Amey Sutton as the Secretary on the Board of Directors, and Yvonne Bouknight as an alternate. These women serve us in new ways, and we said goodbye this year to two in particular who now serve with God in heaven. June McCullough was a past conference president and Standing Rules Chairperson. Mary McLemore was president of the Capital District. The deaths of many other persons, especially due to COVID19, were remembered at our fall meeting.

The civil unrest following the death of George Floyd was just one impetus for our Charter for Racial Justice Committee to act. Over the summer, we held four sessions entitled “Understanding What We Don't Understand” : June 20 - A History of Slavery & Racism in America, July 25 - Healthcare Disparities, August 15 - Engaging the Community in Racial Justice, and September 12 - Hope for a New Generation. I want to thank all the committee members, facilitators they invited, and those who participated in these and the still-continuing conversations on race.

We are proud to have supported the Resolution for Black Lives Matter at GNJ Annual Conference in 2020, as presented by the Commission on Religion and Race. This legislation has become “A Journey of Hope” for GNJ to end the sin of racism. Likewise, “United Methodist Women condemns the culture of White supremacy and the racism it nurtures” - read the entire statement at <https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/news/black-lives-matter-to-god-and-united-methodist-women>.

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The theme continued at our fall annual meeting on October 17th, with Emily Jones, UMW Executive of Racial Justice, as our guest speaker. Fifty-three people attended on Zoom and watched the video, "Say Her Name." Important business included the election of myself as president, Pat Schutz - Vice-President, Barbara Miller - Spiritual Growth, Leslie Bivins - Nominations Chair, with Mary Bland Marilyn Beres, Cynthia Lydon, Ivy Daniels, and RosaLee McNair added to the Nominations Committee.

United Theological Seminary

"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" — Isaiah 43:19

It appears God is doing some new things at United Theological Seminary, even in the midst of health, racial, and political crises.

God is doing a new thing at United financially. United continues to make progress toward its goal of becoming debt-free by the Seminary's 150th anniversary on October 11, 2021. Thanks to the faithfulness and generosity of alumni/ae and donors, less than \$1 million remains of the original \$4 million mortgage debt. After the mortgage is paid in full, the Seminary plans to convert those mortgage payments into money for student scholarships.

God is doing a new thing in enrollment. Over the last five years, United's Doctor of Ministry program has grown by 48%, from 170 students in the 2016-17 academic year to 251 in 2020-21. In Fall 2021, Dr. Elvin Sadler, General Secretary of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, will become the Associate Dean for Doctoral Studies, upon the retirement of Dr. Harold Hudson who has been a vital leader at the Seminary for 17 years.

God is doing a new thing with partners in church renewal. In the 2020-21 academic year, United has partnered with Fresh Expressions US and the Mosaix Global Network to introduce two new Houses of Study. These houses oversee specialized tracks in the Doctor of Ministry and Master of Divinity programs. Rev. Dr. Michael Beck is director of the Fresh Expressions House of Studies, and Dr. Harry Li is director of the Mosaix House of Studies.

In collaboration with the Northwest Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church, United also introduced Rooted/Enraizados, a certificate program for coaches and mentors of Hispanic/Latino church planters. In 2020-21, the program served students from more than five annual conferences.

God is doing a new thing with the establishment of The Bishop Bruce Ough Innovation Center. For the world, 2020 was a year like no other. In the midst of a global pandemic, plus resurgent racism, mass unemployment, and politically challenging times in the US, Wesley remained committed to fostering wisdom and courage, preparing graduates to lead innovative ministries while remaining grounded in our biblical and theological traditions for the sake of God's inbreaking kingdom. The mode of educational delivery changed overnight, as we became an all-online seminary on March 15, 2020 and have remained so to keep students, faculty, staff, and all members of the Wesley community safe from COVID-19 exposure on campus. This is simply Wesley modelling what we teach our students: to be committed to our God-given mission while being innovative and responsive in the delivery of ministry. Here are some of the ways we are accomplishing that with our many partners in this mission, as we seek to faithfully minister to the world in the future.

Research projects support congregational community engagement and envision future ministry

Wesley is pleased to announce new opportunities for UMC congregations to explore, clarify, and pursue thriving in their communities. Through **The Source Collaborative**, Wesley will work with three cohorts of regional congregations in a two-year process of prayer, community engagement, congregational visioning, and coaching, with the goal of following Jesus in mission and ministry. This work, funded by a \$1 million Lilly Endowment, Inc, grant, raises Wesley's role as a leading research and development seminary for the whole church and complements Wesley's other Lilly Endowment-funded projects focused on congregational vitality.

The **Religious Workforce Project** is an expansive study of the current and future nature of religious work, particularly in local congregations, so as to understand what opportunities and constraints may exist in the future and to adapt resources and training accordingly. Through the **Wesley Innovation Hub**, the seminary has worked with 18 congregations in the greater Washington area to experiment with ministries with young adults outside the church. Together, these projects forge insight into future ministry and local church development, influencing the way students are trained in master's, doctoral, and course of study education, but also informing workshops, podcasts, articles, and training for church leaders working in their communities across the country.

Using research and partnerships to reach and equip the next generation of ministers

Research shows that the primary way people learn about and begin to consider seminary options is through their pastor or an alumnus. Whether you feel called or you know someone who does, **Wesley is ready to work with you** as we make theological education more accessible and relevant to the realities

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of ministry today—for laity and clergy, for those seeking a degree or certification or continuing education, and for ministry from within or beyond the church.

Wesley offers an 81-hour Master of Divinity, a 36-hour Master of Arts, and a 60-hour Master of Theological Studies, any of which can be focused around specializations in public theology, urban ministry, arts and theology, missional church, children and youth ministry and advocacy, or African American church leadership.

For full-time students, we offer a modern and affordable residential community in the nation's capital. Our **Community Engagement Fellows** program prepares students to engage in entrepreneurial, community-based ministry. Generous stipends are available for each Fellow while they complete their MDiv degree. Our **3+3 Fast Track BA/MDiv program with Shenandoah University** allows students to complete both degrees in six years, entering ministry more quickly and with less debt.

For people with work, ministry, and family commitments, **Wesley's Master of Divinity degree can now be completed via online, weekend, short-term intensive, and weeknight courses in 5 years.** Check out upcoming flexible course offerings for Summer and Fall 2021 at www.wesleyseminary.edu/admissions/try-a-class-3.

Wesley works with each student to make seminary affordable. Thanks to the consistent support of graduates, congregations, and friends, Wesley provides more than \$2 million annually in scholarships. In addition to our regular merit awards, ranging from 25% to 100% tuition with stipends, Wesley has released special additional scholarships: **full-tuition scholarships** for people recommended by Wesley alumni, campus ministers, or Christian camping or service ministries who feel called to leadership in the church as it is becoming; **Next Call in Ministry scholarships** for students who have worked in a non-ministry setting for at least 10 years; and **Generación Latinx Scholarships** for emerging Latinx/Hispanic leaders for ministries both within and beyond the church.

GNJ Designated Fund Policies, Processes and Procedures

The world needs a strong GNJ to transform lives and communities as we recruit and develop transformational leaders to make disciples and grow vital congregations to transform the world. Key to this mission are strategic funds that help fund present vital ministry and ensure a sustainable future mission and ministry.

The Council of Finance & Administration will ensure funds are invested in accordance with the social principles of the UMC and prudently to maximize gains so that balances keep pace with present AND future ministry needs. Further the funds are overseen so that funds are only used for the designated or restricted purpose.

Funds are created to sustain the long-term health of the mission and ministry of GNJ. By investing wisely and making prudent disbursements, they will continue to grow and provide financial support for the important ministry and mission of GNJ. Healthy fund levels spur innovation and longevity of core ministry especially during financially challenging times. Appropriate levels enable GNJ to do more with less support from shared ministry giving.

Therefore, the Council of Finance & Administration has adopted the following Designated Fund Policies, Processes and Procedures:

I. Two types of Funds shall be categorized:

A. Donor **Restricted funds** shall be contributions from an individual, or group of individuals, with a restricted purpose that can only be changed by the individual(s) or their estate when so designated or by the state's attorney general. GNJ must use restricted funds for the purpose designated by the donor. Only the donor may restrict funds, not GNJ. All restricted funds will be managed and dispersed according to the donor's restriction.

B. GNJ **Designated** funds are designated by the annual conference and are overseen by a designated body. The annual conference session may change the designated purpose as needed. **GNJ Designated Funds are the focus of this report.**

II. CFA will establish a GNJ Fund Committee as follows:

A. There shall have an eight-member **Fund Committee** made up of at least three persons from the CFA investment committee, the CFO/Treasurer and one person from each of the following agencies – the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, the Connectional Table and the Cabinet. CFA will endeavor with the help of Nominations to ensure that this committee includes both gender and ethnic diversity. The Fund Committee is to report **at least twice a year** to each of the above agencies the state of each GNJ designated fund including balances and disbursements made toward approved uses (as defined in this policy), progress towards the fund goal amount, and recommend to the Board of Trustees and CFA policy updates as needed.

B. Every March and September, the five agencies (CFA, Board of Trustees, Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, Connectional Table and Cabinet) and any GNJ mission partners who have funds invested shall meet jointly with the investment institution(s) to hear about each fund's short,

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medium and long-term performance, their expectations for the market based on the trends observed and their economic forecasts and a report on the social impact our funds are making to create a more just and socially responsible world.

C. Each GNJ designated fund will have a goal. The goal is a target balance the GNJ fund committee sets that should be attained over time. When the goal is reached, CFA and the Board of Trustees will review the goal and see if it is adequate or if it needs to be adjusted.

D. The CFA investment committee shall be responsible to make the investment decision for each fund. These decisions should be communicated to the CFO in writing or by email who shall then be responsible for executing the necessary trades at Wespath and reporting back the executions to the CFA Investment Committee in a timely manner. The investment committee's charter, policies and investment guidelines are to be incorporated into CFA's policies.

III. Fund Procedures

A. Fund Purpose Designation

The Annual Conference shall identify and state the purpose of each fund. Any proposed changes in purpose shall be submitted as legislation according to the date set by the conference rules. If an amendment is made to the purpose or designation of a particular fund, CFA will have the opportunity to review its impact on the annual conference or a particular ministry prior to any vote being taken and make its recommendation to the annual conference session.

B. Fund Oversight

The Annual Conference shall identify who has oversight of the fund. The group or individual with oversight shall ensure the policies governing the fund are followed and the use of the funds is achieving the desired purpose and impact. Any use outside the fund purpose and policy is to be reported to the chairperson of CFA and the bishop. For example, in the case of the Harvest Mission Fund, the Connectional Table has been currently assigned the oversight of this fund and is to ensure the proceeds of the fund are being used for the stated purpose.

C. Fund Administrator

The Annual Conference shall identify who administers the use of the fund for the intended purpose of the fund. The administrator(s) is to evaluate the impact and report the use and impact of the fund to the oversight group. All disbursements from the fund are to be itemized in the budget that uses the fund. For example, in the case of the Harvest Mission Fund, the cabinet is currently responsible to administer the fund. Further note, the Fund Administrator has no direct access to the investment company to designate investment mix nor to the funds to initiate withdrawals. Only the CFA investment committee can designate investment mix and only the CFO, with approvals outlined in the policy in writing via email or letter, can execute the investment mix and withdrawals.

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D. Fund Disbursements

In consultation with the fund's administrator(s), in the last quarter of the year, the investment committee of CFA will review market performance of the last year and recommend between a 0-5% disbursement (with a minimum 3% disbursement if the administrator requests it) to the Board of Trustees and CFA to be disbursed and used for mission and ministry for the coming year. The Board of Trustees and CFA are to vote on the recommendation and the CFO/Treasurer is to make the disbursement as approved from the fund by December 15th.

No further amounts are to be disbursed during the course of the year unless a need arises and then, as approved by CFA, for a fund that didn't take a disbursement on December 15th of the previous year.

If a disbursement is not made in a particular year, they cannot be cumulatively disbursed in subsequent years - only the 0-5% set by CFA for that year may be disbursed.

In the next five years when subsidies are still being provided to the churches in the annual conference for billables and benefits, disbursements that will be made from GNJ funds for the budget will be approved by Annual Conference.

E. Emergency Use of Funds

Emergency use of designated funds may be approved if there is **insufficient** cash available for critical mission and ministry. An emergency is not defined as poor budgeting or overspending or under raising of income for the budget. These issues must be addressed in the budgeting process. Before taking an emergency disbursement, spending reductions and fundraising shall be applied first.

An emergency use requires a 75% approval of those present at each of the board of trustees and CFA meetings. The emergency usage is to be reported at the next annual conference session.

To the extent resources become available later, paying back the emergency disbursement should be a priority of the Treasurer, board of trustees and CFA.

F. Borrowing from Funds

Borrowing from GNJ designated funds is not recommended but can be considered for capital projects if it is in the best interest of the ministry and mission of GNJ.

Note: Only up to 20% of the fund may be borrowed and only with the approval of 75% of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CFA meetings. The annual conference must be notified of any borrowings at the next session. These borrowings are to be paid back within five years at the market interest rate.

For example, borrowing may be requested to purchase a new district parsonage. Before approval is given to borrow, careful consideration must be given as to whether borrowing the money commercially is more advantageous to the mission and ministry of GNJ. Specifically, the opportunity cost of not being invested in the market as a result of making the loan should be considered.

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G. Property Sales and Funds

Once a property is sold and debt and fees have been deducted, 100% of the remaining proceeds shall be distributed as follows:

- To the extent the current year consolidated budget anticipates the need for property proceeds to balance the budget, the CFO/Treasurer is authorized to use up to the budgeted amount towards operating expenses.
- Proceeds above and beyond the operating budgeted amount (**Investable Property Proceeds**) are to be invested with the investment institution within 5 days unless the CFA investment committee recommends waiting because of volatility in the market. During the waiting period, the property sale proceeds may not be spent for other purposes.

Example: The 2021 Consolidated Budget includes \$3,182,000 of property sales proceeds to balance. Net proceeds over this amount are to be invested.

In order to rebuild the funds, the distribution of the **Investable Property Proceeds** to the various funds will follow the plan established by CFA until the funds other than the four funds listed below have reached their targets ("**Funds allocation steady state**"). Assuming the accompanying GNJ Designated Fund Legislation is passed by this Annual Conference the Fund allocation steady state will be as follows:

- Harvest Mission Fund – 50%
- Strategic Disciple Making Fund – 20%
- Retiree Health Care – 15%
- Property Redevelopment Fund – 15%

Note: "**Fund allocation steady state**" will be reached after subsidies for billables are no longer needed and all funds other than the four above are fully funded at their targeted goal levels – we expect this will happen around 2026.

H. Audit

Each year the investments and fund balances are to be audited during the GNJ regular audit to ensure compliance with GNJ policies and the accuracy of fund balances.

IV. GNJ Designated Funds³

Below is summary of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference designated fund names and respective purpose:

13. Operating Reserve Fund – each year, CFA will establish a surplus needed to manage cashflow during the year. It shall be set at 10% of the consolidated budget approved by the annual conference. If more than 10% is needed, CFA is to examine structural reasons why

³ Each of the designated funds will experience a 0-5% disbursement each year as explained in the Fund Disbursements section.

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- the problem exists and address it. The fund shall be invested in short term instruments as identified by the CFA Investment Committee.
14. Harvest Mission Fund – supports leadership and congregational development and mission engagement. Impact – meet current goals of 51% vital congregations, enable 150 congregations to engage in A Journey of Hope plan and allow GNJ to achieve a 98% giving rate for shared ministry and billables. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
 15. Strategic Disciple Making Fund – funds new faith communities (congregations, second sites, new worship services) so that we increase the number of new disciples and vital congregations. Impact – more new disciples and vital congregations. May use up to 80% of the fund balance.
 16. St. John’s Native American Historic Preservation Fund – fund the preservation of the St. John’s building as a historical site and the Native American burial ground. Impact – preserve the only Native American Church in GNJ and serve as a cultural site for the people of New Jersey.
 17. Next Gen Ministries Fund (formerly known as Tumetheca & Time is Now funds)– fund ministries of young people between 12 and 30 that may include camping, Ignite, youth ministries, campus ministries and other ministries to form and shape young people’s commitment to and faith in Jesus Christ. Impact – increase in the number of young people participating in young people ministries in GNJ congregations. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
 18. Pension and Benefits Operational Fund – fund the administrative work of the Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits and up to \$ 30,000 billing gap shortfall in collections. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
 19. Retiree Health Fund – fund payments for retiree health care and secure retiree health care. The fund will be funded with pre-82 pension surplus as available and property sales of 15% starting once the “fund allocation steady state” has been reached. Impact – we will ensure retiree health care funding and back the funds appropriately. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
 20. Property Operational Fund - funds maintenance and equipment purchases for the GNJ Mission and Resource Center, closed church property and cemeteries owned by the annual conference so that property is self-funded rather than funded through shared ministries and property sales. Impact – more shared ministry funding to mission and ministry and property sales to funds that will fund present ministry and sustain future mission and ministry. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA.
 21. Property Redevelopment Fund – funds redeveloping GNJ congregational property. Our first priority is for congregations in low-income communities to be able to increase income for ministry and mission in low-income communities. Impact – redeveloping church properties that can no longer be maintained by congregations so that they can continue to have a vital congregational ministry in GNJ’s low-income communities. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA. Up to \$500,000 per project may be borrowed for viable redevelopment projects. At no time may more than 50% of the fund’s balance be in loans. When this fund is reported it must include the cash balance and the amount in loans. Loans may be approved by a majority vote of each of the following agencies: Board of Trustees, CFA and the Cabinet.
 22. Superintendent Housing Fund – funds the purchase and maintenance of superintendent parsonages or provides a housing allowance for one or more district superintendents. The fund shall be adequate to purchase and maintain district parsonages or provide housing

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- allowances for district superintendents. Impact – reduce the amount needed from shared ministries so that more funds are available for mission and ministry and/or eliminate the amount needed from church property sales so that more money may be added to the ministry funds. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA or by a 75% approval of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CFA for the amount needed to purchase of a district parsonage.
23. Episcopal Residence Fund – funds the purchase and maintenance of the bishop’s residence or provides a housing allowance. Impact – reduce the amount needed from shared ministries so that more funds are available for mission and ministry and/or eliminate the amount needed from church property sales so that more money may be added to the ministry funds. May receive a 0-5% disbursement per year as set by CFA or by a 75% approval of those present at each of the Board of Trustees and CFA for the amount needed to purchase of an episcopal residence.
24. Episcopal Office Fund – funds discretionary fund and scholarships to the bishop’s clergy convocation. Impact – supports emergency needs of clergy and ministry and assists pastors who need financial support to attend the bishop’s convocation on ministry.

Conflict of Interest Report and Policy

What is a Conflict of Interest?

From a legal perspective, a potential conflict of interest arises within an organization when a key individual (either an employee or volunteer) or a relative of that individual (a) stands to gain a financial benefit by personally influencing the action taken by the organization or a transaction entered into by the organization; or (b) has another interest that impairs, or could be seen to impair, the independence or objectivity of the key individual in discharging their duties within the organization.

Within the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church (GNJ), a conflict, potential conflict or the appearance of conflict of interest occurs when an individual, be it the bishop, clergy, staff or laity, or a member of their family, business associate, significant other, domestic partner, any additional employer or employee of a staff member, has a direct or indirect financial, personal, legal or equitable interest in the outcome of a particular decision that they can influence.

What are the Issues Surrounding Conflict of Interest in GNJ

Concerns have been raised by members of the Annual Conference about potential conflicts of interest within GNJ. Recognizing, understanding and managing conflicts of interest are fundamental to trust and good, fair, ethical and just decision-making and sound financial management.

Whenever an instance of conflict of interest is self-identified or identified by a member of the Annual Conference, members of GNJ should seek to be ethical, transparent and act with integrity, committed to our mission in all decision making. Employees and laity are expected to self-identify all conflicts of interest or potential conflicts of interest and, where feasible and practical, excuse themselves from decisions from which they will financially benefit. Questions of conflict of interest will be investigated by the appropriate parties as defined in the GNJ Conflict-of-Interest Policy in accordance with the Book of Discipline Paragraph 702.2 which calls for the establishment of a Conflict-of-Interest Policy.

While GNJ is committed to operating with integrity and transparency in making decisions, there are some inherent potential conflicts of interest within the way we operate. In The United Methodist Church, clergy and lay persons are financial beneficiaries of employment, benefit programs and grants offered by GNJ and on which they have voting power. Likewise, clergy and lay members of the annual conference vote on issues that affect their congregation's budget and programming.

GNJ expects that our clergy and lay members of the annual conference will vote based on what is best for all members and all churches and in the best interest of meeting the overall mission, vision and financial goals of GNJ.

An example of such a potential conflict of interest is voting on lay and clergy benefit programs. The majority of clergy voting are directly affected by the benefit program they are voting on, and a lay person's congregational budget is affected by the type and the dollar amount of the benefit program. It is estimated that more than 90% of those voting at annual conference have such a conflict of interest when voting on clergy and lay employee benefit programs.

United Methodists are also generational with respect to membership and employment of both clergy and laity. GNJ has benefited from generations of clergy and lay employees from the same family. Presently there are more than 40 clergy who are related by marriage and birth. Sometimes a family member sits on an agency that has responsibility for clergy including family members. Additionally,

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there are lay employees of GNJ and congregations who are related to GNJ clergy. Also, clergy have friendships or are seminary classmates of other clergy that potentially present conflicts of interest. The ability to influence matters relating to salary, benefits, housing, etc. can all result in situations where there is a conflict of interest.

Agencies of GNJ have also hired or used United Methodists who own or work for businesses for contracts and services for GNJ and its congregations. All such contractual relationships must follow the Trustee's Contracting Procedures.

In all of these examples, GNJ recognizes there are inherent conflicts of interest in our system and expects that everyone (clergy, staff and laity) will recommend, vote, approve and act based on what is in the best interest of meeting the overall mission and financial goals of GNJ.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

INTRODUCTION

GNJ United Methodists should always seek to put God and the mission and vision of GNJ first when making decisions. This includes making decisions that ensure the financial stability of GNJ, thus positioning GNJ to achieve that mission and vision. It is important to have policies and procedures that identify, monitor and manage conflicts of interest so that, to the best of our ability, the mission and vision of GNJ are always put first. The Conflict-of-Interest Policy is used to manage these conflicts.

The Conflict-of-Interest Policy guides our decision making so that our decisions are made based on what is best for all members and all churches and in the best interest of meeting the overall vision and mission of GNJ.

The GNJ Conflict of Interest Policy is published in the GNJ Employee Handbook and on the GNJ Website under the "Administration" tab, "Finance and Administration" subtab. Further, a policy and procedures handbook is being prepared for all policies and procedures of GNJ and it will be published there as well. All GNJ policies and procedures are reviewed to insure there is no implicit bias in said policies and procedures before they are implemented.

All GNJ employees (clergy, laity and staff) and the bishop are required to review and sign the Conflict-of-Interest Policy annually. All GNJ volunteers (lay members of agencies, boards, commissions and committees) are required to review and indicate their understanding and agreement to abide by the Conflict of Interest prior to serving on any GNJ agency.

GNJ Vision:

We see transformational leaders cultivating passionate disciples of Jesus Christ in congregations with:

- Passionate Faith – Shape mature and fearless disciples that others want to emulate
- Boundless Hope – Inspire positive vision of current and future ministry
- Courageous Spirit – Connect with the community through risk-taking relevant mercy and justice ministries
- Transformational Leadership – Difference-makers who transform people's lives, the congregation and the community
- Congregational Vitality – Vibrant and life changing congregations

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- Regenerative Resources – Extravagant generosity that inspires new giving and resources

GNJ Purpose/Mission:

Transform the world by recruiting and developing transformational leaders who make passionate disciples of Jesus Christ and grow vital congregations

DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this policy, the term “employee” refers to all clergy, laity and staff who are employed by GNJ as well as the bishop, even though the bishop is not a direct employee of GNJ.

For the purpose of this policy, the term “volunteer” refers to all laity who voluntarily participate and serve as a voting member on any of the GNJ boards, agencies, commissions or committees.

For the purpose of this policy, the term “agency(ies)” refers to any and all of the agencies, boards, commissions or committees that are part of GNJ.

POLICY

It is the policy of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church that it conducts all staff, volunteer and agency-related business and duties free from conflict of interest or a substantial appearance of a conflict of interest.

No employee, volunteer or agency member of the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church may participate in any decision or cause GNJ to act upon any dealing in which they may have either a conflict, a potential conflict or a substantial appearance of a conflict of interest and, in such circumstances, must use their judgment to excuse themselves from the decision-making process whenever appropriate.

The only exception is at annual conference sessions in which votes are necessary to approve budgets, benefits and other matters that affect participants and their congregations. In these cases, annual conference members are to participate in speaking and voting based on the interests of the mission, vision and financial health of GNJ rather than their own interest or benefit.

A conflict of interest or substantial appearance of a conflict of interest shall be deemed to exist when an individual or a member of their family, business associate, spouse, significant other, domestic partner, any additional employer or employee of an employee has a direct or indirect financial, personal, legal or equitable interest in the outcome of a particular decision that they influence.

If any such conflict or appearance of a conflict of interest exists, the employee or volunteer, or another GNJ employee or volunteer who believes there is a conflict, must fully disclose such conflict or appearance of a conflict of interest and use their judgment to excuse themselves from the decision-making process whenever appropriate.

Employees must report a conflict of interest to the Director of Human Resources who is then obliged to report the conflict of interest to the Bishop and the CFO. The Director of Human Resources and the CFO will coordinate any required investigation and resolution. If the CFO has the conflict, they must report the conflict to the Director of Human Resources, Bishop and CFA Chair and the CFA Chair will coordinate

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any required investigation and resolution with the Director of Human Resources. If the Director of Human Resources has the conflict, they must report to the Bishop, CFA Chair and CFA's HR Committee Chair who will coordinate any required investigation and resolution. If the bishop has a conflict of interest, they must report the conflict to the CFA Chair and Episcopacy Chair who will coordinate any required investigation and resolution.

Lay volunteers must report a conflict of interest to the chair of the agency on which they serve, who is then obliged to report the conflict of interest to the Director of Connectional Ministries, the CFO and the Bishop, and the Director of Connectional Ministries and the CFO will coordinate the investigation and resolution.

All investigations for employees, staff and volunteers will be coordinated and conducted in such a way as to ensure that said investigations are free of racial and gender bias.

All employees of GNJ are required to review and sign the Conflict-of-Interest Policy annually.

Individual Agency Conflict of Interest Policies

Cabinet Policy

A conflict of interest occurs when an individual's personal interests or relationships – family, friendships, financial, or social relationships – could compromise their judgment, decisions, or actions in employment or as a voting member of GNJ.

Members of the cabinet, including the appointment and extended cabinets, from time to time will have family members, friends, classmates and other relationships that present both real and perceived conflicts of interest. It may include but is not limited to cabinet, extended cabinet, regional, resource, funding, task force, and supervisory meetings.

The cabinet in its work of spiritual and temporal oversight of the conference that includes but is not limited to appointing pastors, nominating clergy and laity for boards and agencies and supervising clergy and congregations is to notify the cabinet or extended cabinet or appointment cabinet in all instances when the cabinet member has a real or potential conflict of interests in any matter. When there is a conflict of interest, the individual and group is to monitor the conversation to ensure decisions are made in the best interest of the GNJ mission and not an individual's preference.

No cabinet or extended cabinet member is to supervise a family member nor participate in any conversation that involves a family member. If a cabinet member fails to disclose a conflict of interest, another cabinet member is to disclose the conflict of interest.

If there is a conflict of interest that is not disclosed, the bishop will take appropriate action and ensure it does not occur in the future. In January of each year the cabinet is to review, state any conflicts with family members and sign the conflict-of-interest policy.

In addition to this policy, the cabinet will abide by all conflict-of-interest policies and procedures of GNJ.

Board of Trustees Policy

All contracts, purchases, repairs and any improvements to conference-owned property must be made in accordance with the GNJUMC Conflict of Interest Policy and be authorized in advance by the Board of

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Trustees, or its Trustee designee. As such, all bidding and contracting for consultants, professional services, repairs and any other services must be in compliance with the Conflict-of-Interest Policy and in compliance with the Board of Trustees' contracting procedures.

Procedures for Sale of Property:

The board of trustees avoid conflicts of interest and, when the sale is to an individual or organization associated with GNJ, an appraisal shall be conducted and the property be sold at the appraised price, or at the highest offer on the property. The Board of Trustees looks favorably to make sales to GNJ endorsed entities that will continue the use of the property as a house of worship, church plant, church related agency or a non-church body within the UMC, and in all such cases with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the Cabinet, the property may be sold at a below market price or donated to the entity.

Board of Pension Policy

There is a conflict inherent in our United Methodist process, as members of Annual Conference, both clergy and laity, will vote on any changes to healthcare, pension and other insurance plans. Such decisions affect the individual clergy and their family as well as affect the budget of local churches represented by laity members to Annual Conference.

All members of GNJ Annual Conference, employees and laity, are expected to vote on these and all financial matters based on what is best for the mission and ministry of GNJ and will attest to such when registering for Annual Conference.

GNJUMC Conflict of Interest Policy meets the standards of the Book of Discipline, Section 1508, which applies to the financial administration of annual conference pension and pension-related funds.

Connectional Table Grant-Making Policy

In accordance with the overall GNJ CFA and Human Resources Conflict of Interest Policy, any employee or volunteer who is a member of an agency within GNJ that has grant-making approval authority, that employee or volunteer must excuse themselves from the grant-making approval decision process if they or a member of their family, spouse, significant other, domestic partner, business partner or employer is a member of the church under consideration for the receipt of a grant.

Connectional Table Policy

All employees and volunteers serving on any of the various boards, committees, agencies, and commissions of the Greater New Jersey UMC are required to read the GNJ Conflict of Interest policy and indicate their understanding of the policy and agree to abide by the policy during their time of service by signing the following:

By signing, I indicate that I have read and understand the GNJUMC Conflict of Interest policy and will abide by this policy during my term of service on _____ (name of committee, agency, or commission).

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Vital Mission Partners Policy

All employees and volunteers serving on the boards of Vital Mission Partners of the Greater New Jersey UMC are required to read the GNJ Conflict of Interest policy and indicate their understanding of the policy and agree to abide by the policy during their time of service by signing the following:

CFA also recommends that the Board of Ordained Ministry develop a conflict of interest policy for its ministry and work.

Trustees, Board of Report

The board of trustees follows all disciplinary requirements when disposing property and may use any or all of the following.

1. A licensed realtor.
2. Multiple Listing Service (MLS).
3. Contacting interested parties or churches in the area.
4. Contacting developers in the area.
5. Contacts made with the property staff
6. A price set in consultation with the realtor and approved by the board of trustees.
7. When a sale price is offered lower than the asking price, final sale price is approved by the board of trustees.

When a property is sold to another United Methodist Church, or an individual or organization affiliated with GNJ, an appraisal is developed using comparable properties in the area to set a price that will maximize income for the mission and ministry of the conference except in some cases when the property is sold or donated to another United Methodist Church. When a sale is made or the property donated, all disciplinary mandates are followed and the trustees review the sale to ensure that the sale or donation is in the best interest of the GNJ mission.

The board of trustees has listed the sale prices of church property sold since 2015 as requested at the 2021 annual conference session.

Council of Finance and Administration Five-Year Fund Report

At the May 2021 Annual Conference, the Designated Fund Legislation was postponed by the following motion:

I move to postpone this legislation until the next called session of the annual conference to allow the treasurer to provide a full accounting of the receipts, disbursements, and balances for the last five years of all funds listed on pages 41 – 43 of the pre-conference journal as required by paragraph 619.1(c)(2) of the Book of Discipline and to allow the conference trustees to provide a full report of its holdings and conference property transactions over the same time as required by paragraph 2512.6 of the Book of Discipline.

Regarding the 619.1 (c) (2) request, the Council of Finance and Administration recognizes the importance of providing this information and commits to do so annually going forward.

Regarding 2512.6, we again fully support providing the information requested and the Trustees are providing a response to the property information requested in a separate report.

In the following pages, we have provided a roll-forward of the general ledger balances of all of GNJ funds from 2015 through 2019. In addition, we have provided the roll-forward of all GNJ's investment accounts. As our 2020 financials have not been audited, this information will be provided at the next regular Annual Conference Session.

As there has been a lot of discussion over the past several months regarding GNJ's financial situation and the \$13M reduction in investments, we have attempted to provide a holistic recap of the sources and uses of GNJ's resources from 2015 to 2019. All of this information is derived from the audited financial reports for the years 2015 to 2019.

As the table below shows, we identified \$27.6M of resources that were consumed over the five years which need to be accounted for. This includes the \$13.1M of investment fund balance reduction plus \$5.7 M of investment earnings and \$8.9M from the proceeds of fixed assets (primarily consisting of the sale of closed churches). Against this, we identified some logical categories that has enabled us to explain 99% of the resource consumption over the five years. The remaining 1% is not easily categorized.

Of the \$27.3M we were able to explain, 34% or \$9.3M went towards local-church benefit billing subsidies; 32% or \$8.7M was the net operating deficit inclusive of \$13M of retiree healthcare costs; 27% or \$7.4M went towards the purchase/maintenance of fixed assets, which includes the MRC building, district parsonages and other capital improvements; the remaining 7% or \$1.9M was the result of paying 100% of General Church Apportionments while collecting less than 100%.

Resources to be accounted for:

- Change in Fair Value of Investments – net change in investments balance.
- Realized income – the income earned on investment sales.
- Change in unrealized income – change in the unrealized gains on investment between beginning of period and end of period.

The above three items in total tell us how much investment related resources were used. This method is exactly equivalent to using the net sales of investments minus net purchase of investments over the five years.

- Net proceeds from sales of fixed assets – net proceeds received on the sale of property or other assets, after accounting for closing costs, initial purchase price and other expenses.

How they were accounted for:

- Benefit Subsidies (three listed) – the difference in each case between how much a program costs versus how much was collected via billings is the subsidy provided by GNJ.
- Net Operating Deficit – the net deficit (loss) of all operating income less all operating expenses excluding the subsidies captured separately (i.e., the actual spend exceeded the income). Income includes shared ministry income, program revenue, etc. Expenses include clergy/congregational support, retiree healthcare, mission & justice, administration, etc.
- Purchase/Maintenance of fixed assets – includes the purchases of conference owned properties (such as MRC Office and District Superintendent parsonages) as well as the maintenance & expenses for all closed churches (lawn mowing, major/minor repairs, current & past due billings, etc.).
- General Church apportionments subsidy – the net difference between how much was collected via Shared Ministry vs. what we paid the General Church (we paid 100% of our GCFA apportionments while collecting less than 100%).

Journey of Hope Report

In October 2020, GNJ adapted a bold Journey of Hope Plan to commit to dismantling the sin of racism. Despite the continuing COVID pandemic and GNJ's financial challenge, GNJ has pushed forward and continues to make progress on this important work. In this report, please find our progress on the 5 Keystone Measures and 10 Reporting Commitments of GNJ.

5 Keystone Measures

1. **50 trained GNJ trainers and facilitators who are actively engaged with 150 congregations that are developing and engaging in A Journey of Hope Plan by September 2022.** A diverse team of GNJ facilitators will be trained by the consultant, Fearless Dialogues. This began for GNJ staff in September and will continue with additional facilitators in January. We expect as many as 150 facilitators to be working with congregations by September 2022.
2. **At least 50% of GNJ agency chairpersons are People of Color by June 2023 and the number of African American/Black and Hispanic/Latino clergy elders are doubled, and the number of all Clergy of Color is increased by June 2025.** More than 50% of GNJ agency chairpersons are People of Color. Recruiting work needs to be continued.
3. **25 new ethnic congregations (at least 10 African American) by using new technologies and innovative strategies, and strengthen the worship, ministry, and finances of 10 existing congregations of color by December 2025.** This is an area which needs intentional work in the next year.
4. **A handbook of all existing GNJ policies and procedures that have been reviewed and updated to ensure GNJ's policies and procedures create a culture of racial justice, inclusion, and equity by February of 2022.** The handbook is in process and expected to be complete on time.
5. **\$4.1 million investment in the health and vitality of GNJ through debt forgiveness, equitable salary, and shared ministry apportionment and billables in low income communities by December 2023.** 66 qualifying congregations began receiving their decreased shared ministry apportionment and billables in July 2021. 44 congregations have entered the debt forbearance program.

In addition to the Keystone Metrics, GNJ identified 10 items which the Staff Executive Team would report on each year.

They are as follows:

1. **The number of congregations with A Journey of Hope Plan and highlight three exemplary plans.** The Journey of Hope Plan Guide will be completed after GNJ staff and leaders begin working with the consultant, Fearless Dialogues. They have been contracted and began work with GNJ staff in September 2021. We expect the guide to be complete in January 2022. After that time, we will begin to share the number of congregations with a plan and highlight exemplary plans.

2. **The number of African American clergy recruited and in process to be elders in GNJ.** Presently there are 10 active African American/Black clergy elders in GNJ with only two under 58 years of age. An additional two are candidates for ordination and 5 African American candidates for Provisional membership at this time. There are 8 retired African America clergy members.
3. **The number of African American churches that are part of a congregational development cohort and are being resourced to grow congregational vitality.** The first congregational development cohort begins in October 2021 and we will report on their progress next year.
4. **The percent of congregations that have A Journey of Hope Plan and the overall progress that is being made.** Because the Journey of Hope Plan Guide has not been completed, 0 congregations currently have a Journey of Hope Plan. We expect to launch a pilot group of 30 churches in January 2022.
5. **The number and amount of grants given to African American and other ethnic congregations.** From January 1 to September 15, 2021, GNJ has awarded 8 grants for a total of \$103,119. 5 of these grants were to African American or other ethnic congregations, for a total of \$60,343. For the 2022 Congregational Development Grant Program, the Journey of Hope Plan will not be available before the grant application deadline. However, all applicants will need to agree that: *Our pastor and leadership team supports and commits to work in alignment with the principles, desired outcomes, and goals of the GNJ Journey of Hope Plan that seeks to eradicate the sins of racism and sexism in the church and society and grow vital congregations who nurture passionate disciples of Jesus Christ and share faith, hope and justice in the community. We will complete a Journey of Hope Plan by April 1, 2022 and demonstrate progress by September 1, 2022.*
6. **Progress on equitable salary where there is income disparity in GNJ communities and what steps were taken to address income disparity.** This is an area which needs additional work.
7. **The number of churches that are receiving half billable and half shared ministry.** 66 Churches began receiving reductions in billables and shared ministries in July 2021.
8. **The number of Hope Centers and the percentage in ethnic communities.** Presently, there are 27 Hope Centers, 10 of which are within ethnic communities.
9. **Progress on the lawsuit to desegregate New Jersey public schools.** In January 2020, the Court denied the State's motion to dismiss the case, instead allowing the matter to proceed to discovery. We have a pending motion, asking the Court to rule that the schools are unconstitutionally segregated, and ordering the State to propose a remedial plan. Discovery on that motion is currently scheduled to conclude at the end of September, at which point we plan to ask the Court to rule on the motion.
10. **A census of the percentage of African American/Black, Asian, Hispanic/Latino and Native American congregations' vitality, as compared to Anglo congregations.** We are building the process and system in the Arena database to be able to obtain this info.

Cabinet Report | District and Resourcing Plan to Recruit and Equip Transformational Leaders to Make Disciples of Jesus Christ and Grow Vital Congregations for the Transformation of the World

GNJ's 3 Priorities maximized through districts

1. Deepen Faith
2. Develop Leaders
3. Grow Vitality

COVID, financial challenges and future changes in The United Methodist Church, have required the cabinet to assess our districting, resourcing, and staffing to fulfill and grow the mission of GNJ. Over the past two years the cabinet has considered what is in the best interest of the mission and ministry of our congregations and the mission of GNJ. For seven years, we have been seeking to grow more vital congregations from 28% to 51%. Thanks be to God; the work has borne fruit. In 2019, the year prior to the pandemic, GNJ had 50% vital congregations. Just 1% away from our 2023 goal. Our clergy and congregations have been working together to increase congregational vitality and you are making progress. In 2020, we went from 50% to 46% vital congregations, and considering the challenges of the pandemic, you have stepped up and worked hard to maintain our commitment to making disciples and growing vital congregations for the transformation of the world. To God be the glory.

But all our congregations have not been able to take these next steps in their growth, vitality and sustainability, and the cabinet has supported and adjusted to address the financial challenges to grow vital congregations to 70% and even beyond. For example, we recommended and supported reducing how much we apportion churches for shared ministries from 17.4% to 15.2%. We surpassed the goal of 15.6% three years early. We are also providing more grants to congregations and outreach ministry and together the shared ministry giving rate has grown from 78% to 88%. To God be the Glory!

We have learned the following.

We find that churches make progress when resourcing (planning and training) is closely linked with follow up by staff, including superintendents. This follow-up includes consultation and coaching over a two-year period. Additionally, congregational development vitality workshops make a difference. We have learned that initiatives such as PaCE groups, team vital, clergy coaching, and Hope Center training have developed strong and forward-thinking leaders.

- We have a strong group of leaders who can set an inspiring and relevant vision and organize people and ministry to reach the vision.
- We have some leaders who want to lead the congregation toward vitality and are looking to grow their skills to increase congregational vitality and sustainability.

REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- And unfortunately, we have a group of leaders that are providing strong leadership and working toward change and vitality, but congregational leaders are not enthusiastic about making the changes necessary to grow the vitality of the congregation.

While there is much to celebrate, we have challenges. Based on these learnings, and that 50% of our congregations have identified the ministries to be more vital, and that 50% of our congregations are challenged to be more vital, and furthermore, based on the reduced membership, sustainability and financial challenges faced by as many as 35% of our congregations, we need to adjust finances and strategy at the GNJ leadership level to help more of our congregations become sustainable and vital. The superintendents supported and made a conscious decision to reduce superintendents and staffing to assist congregations with catching up on the underbilling of congregations. This will take five years.

The changes include the following.

1. Reducing districts and implementing a plan of redistricting.
2. A staffing plan that helps the next wave of congregations to become more vital and sustainable.

Rational for the Staffing plan

The cabinet in consultation with conference leadership has already made changes to staffing.

1. The conference approved a reduction in superintendents for the 2021 budget and the 2022 recommended budget continues this reduction to six superintendents.
2. We have reduced other staffing including program staffing.
3. We have committed to end the sins of racism and sexism that calls for all superintendents, bishop, and program staff to work towards this Holy Spirit inspired vision.
4. We have committed to grow the vitality and sustainability of our congregations and this requires two or more years of intense work with congregations providing planning, consultation, and coaching, and assigning a staff person to a ready and willing congregation for two or more years.
5. Organizing all GNJ resources under our Journey of Hope plan. Through planning, consultation, and coaching, GNJ will train and resource congregations, laity, and clergy to focus on developing leadership, growing the five markers of vitality, and ending the sins of racism and sexism.
6. There will be two regions and staffing patterns to implement the leadership academy and congregational development. Each region will have 3 superintendents, two full time equivalent resource directors (former connectional ministry staff) and 12-18 circuit leaders/elders. These regions will be led by a regional team leader (a DS) and will work together as a team to grow the leadership and congregations within a region. Each staff person will be assigned a group of churches to work with over a two-year period of time to grow vitality and end the sin of racism. We will evaluate progress every two years with a goal of reaching 70% vital congregations within five years building on our past success.

This model will grow the health of GNJ and save \$475,000 a year in shared ministries.

The Cabinet has reviewed the results of GNJ surveys and the results of regional superintendency committee meetings. Also, the Cabinet has consulted with General Council on Finance and Administration (GCFA) to look at the number of districts in comparison with other conferences in the Northeastern Jurisdiction and across the connection. As a result, the Cabinet recommended a 6-district model to Bishop Schol.

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The following are the new district names and their superintendents.

Metro-Highlands Region

- Meadowlands District – Rev. William M. Williams III
- Skylands District – Rev. Dr. Eunice Vega Perez
- Raritan Shore District – Rev. Sang Won Doh

Coastal Plains Region

- Central District – Rev. Héctor Burgos
- Cape Atlantic District – Rev. Brian Roberts
- Delaware Bay District – Rev. Glenn J. Conaway

Frequently Asked Questions

What are the suggested new districts?

1. Meadowlands District – It covers most churches in the New York area, eastern part of Palisades District and most of Gateway North District churches.
2. Skylands District – It covers churches in western part of Palisades District, some churches from Raritan Valley District and all churches in the Skylands District.
3. Raritan Shore District – It covers most of churches in the Raritan Valley District and churches in the northern part of the Northern Shore District.
4. Central District – It covers churches in the southern part of the Northern Shore District and most of churches in the Capital District.
5. Cape Atlantic District – It covers some churches in the Delaware Bay, Capital, and Northern Shore Districts and all churches in the Cape Atlantic District.
6. Delaware Bay District – It covers most churches in the Delaware Bay District and some churches in the Gateway South District.

How do I find out which district my church is in?

To find an interactive map and see a list of all the churches in the new districts visit the GNJ website. <https://www.gnjumc.org/redistricting-plan/>.

How will these changes directly affect my local church or my role in district?

Some churches will have a new District Superintendent. All churches will get a new identification number related to the new district numbers. Starting from Jan. 1, 2022, district superintendents will convene district committees within the region to discuss best ways to ensure advancement of the mission in ways that build on each other's strengths, are effective, and create efficiencies. Current district board and committee members expressed their intentions through survey whether they will continue to serve or not. No new members will be elected until the regular session of Annual Conference in 2022.

District Committees on Ordained Ministry will function in its current 9 district model until June 30, 2022, so as not to create confusion for clergy candidates. New District Committees on Ordained Ministry

within the new 6 district structure will be formed through 2022 regular Annual Conference nomination process.

How were the new district boundaries decided?

Attention was given to the historical and cultural differences and numbers of churches and clergy in each area. Every attempt was made to achieve balance so as to ensure effective and efficient superintending and resourcing within the districts. Consideration was given to culture, history, church size, distances, and traffic patterns as well as the guiding principles articulated by clergy and laity of GNJ. Under this new structure, each district has grown by approximately 25 churches.

- Ending the sin of racism - personal and congregational learning, growth and commitment in ending the sin of racism and engaging the community in ending racism through the acknowledgement, repentance of and addressing of past harm by word and deed, developing a process in partnership with the consultant Fearless Dialogues for two years to become trained at every level in engaging anti-racism work in ministry that builds on our 10-year intercultural competency plan to deepen understanding of racism and how to dismantle it.
- Organization - Creating appropriate organization of the congregation for vitality.

REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Based on consultation with the DS and the local congregation's resource guide, a congregation can pick and choose what focus area they are wishing to work on and in what order.

GNJ Leadership Academy is a comprehensive program for laity and clergy to develop as transformational leaders and grow vital congregations. As the academy is built over a period of years, it will become an umbrella that encompasses all resourcing. The Leadership Academy will offer a coordinated GNJ wide learning plan that reflects the necessary programs from the Discipline, as well as meets the missional needs of the Regions.

Programming development is a collaboration between the Leadership Development Team, and other teams within GNJ who provide resourcing such as the Regional Teams, Stewardship Foundation, Board of Ordained Ministry, and Board of Laity.

Built over time, programs residing under the Leadership Academy will include

- Residency in Ministry
- Local Pastor School
- Cohort Groups: i.e., Clergy Seminar, Regional Gathering of Top 25 pastors, etc.
- Short Term Courses of 4 – 6 weeks (Lay Servant Ministry will be integrated here)
- Foundational Leadership Training Videos (i.e., trustees, SPRC, role of lay leader, etc.)
- Coach Training

A trait of the above resources is that they are not “one and done” workshops, but each are a set of classes or a program that builds towards outcomes.

Short Term Course Development

Key Learning Focuses for a Short-Term Course

- UMC Tradition: Theology, Polity, History
- Bible
- The Five Markers of Vitality
- Leadership
- Cultural Competency

Courses should be of value to both clergy and laity to enroll.

2021 – 2022: Director of Leadership Development is Championing the Short-Term Course Development

- Courses will be offered synchronous (on ZOOM)
- Meet weekly for 1.5-hour session over 4 – 6 weeks
- Led by laity and/or clergy
- Content aligned and developed with the needs of each Region

2022 – 2023 Focus

- Evaluate courses from previous year that were effective
- Build 20-minute video segments of each of the courses to offer the course again
- Guest leaders beyond GNJ to offer pre-recorded learning segments for additional courses
- Build a certificate program

¹ Regional Teams: For a full resourcing plan, which includes but is not limited to A Journey of Hope, Ending the Sin of Racism and Sexism, developing leaders, increasing vitality, developing sustainability, engaging congregations in the community for witness and mission, Regional Staff Teams need to be enhanced. In Regional Staff Teams, resourcing is coordinated, coaches and consultants are assigned to local churches, and the administrative work of DS and other team members is organized. By including DS, Circuit Elders/Leaders, Resource Directors for the resourcing of congregations, Regional Administrators and other contributors, Regional Staffing Teams carry out the resourcing and the Journey of Hope plan within the Region. The Regional Staff Team is led by one DS who is the Regional Team Leader.

REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Based on make-ups, synergetic team works and robust strategic conversations, 2 Regions will be more appropriate to locate the work of Journey of Hope more closely to local churches across the conference. Each of these Regional Staff Teams will implement and measure progress on the Journey of Hope plan within the Region.

The following recommendation outlines the make-up, roles, and responsibilities of team members on the Regional Staff Teams:

Regions: 2 regions

Regional Team Make-Up

- 3 District Superintendents, (6 total) Resource 20 churches each. One DS per region (2 total) is the Regional Team leader who convenes, guides, and evaluates the team
- 2 Full-Time Equivalent Resource Directors, (4 total) Resource 20 churches each.
- 24 to 36 Circuit Elders, (4 to 6 per DS which is 12 to 18 per Region). Resource 5 to 8 churches each.

(Note: Each region will discern the number of circuit elder that will best help them move forward the mission and strategic goals, within their budget allocation.)

- 1 Regional Administrators. (2 total) 1 dedicated per region.

¹ Resource Directors are champions for a particular resource. They are primarily responsible for resourcing congregations in the region; they also spend time working with their regional staff and clergy and laity within the region to develop and improve resources in the GNJ Leadership Academy. Resource Directors have demonstrated effective ministry across multiple areas of vitality and are able to resource churches as a “generalist;” however, they may be a specialist in one area of vitality and be charged with the creation of those specific resources.

Focuses of Resource directors:

- With assigned churches, coach the clergy person and other leaders as may be identified by the pastor or congregation for coaching
- Lead/facilitate planning sessions with the assigned congregations.
- Follow up with each congregation who have completed plans, at least 1-2 times a month for 18 months with consultation, problem solving, plan evaluations, plan modification using 4DX approach.
- Work with and/or lead a resource planning team as assigned by the regional team leader to participate in the development of Leadership Academy classes and Journey of Hope ACT plan resources.

¹ Circuit Leader (Elder) are effective clergy within a region that serve as part-time resource persons for 5-8 congregations within a district. Circuit Leaders (Elders) are assigned by the appointive cabinet to assist in fulfilling the vision, mission, and strategic direction of the annual conference. Circuit Leader (Elder) assignments may be based on geographical location, similar ministry contexts, or other factors. They assist the District Superintendent with the disciplinary responsibilities. The District Superintendent works through the Circuit Leader (Elder) and as appropriate continue to be in the consultative and appointment process with each local church and pastor. Circuit Leaders (Elders) are expected to take on an additional 20-25 hours/month in this role. Appointments of Circuit Leaders (Elders) are made on a yearly basis and are included as part of the consultative appointment process.

Essential Functions:

- Consult/Coach assigned congregations to ensure they have a clear and actionable Journey of Hope ACT ministry plan so that they are continually deepening faith, developing leaders, and growing vitality, sustainability, and fruitfulness.

REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

- Regularly check-in with clergy and coach congregations so that they are addressing ministry challenges and making appropriate progress in their ministry plan.
- Preside regular and special Church/Charge Conferences as requested by their assigned District Superintendent. (UMC elders among Circuit Leaders can only preside Church/Charge Conference. ¶ 246.5)
- Assist District Superintendents in assessing the mission field of the churches assigned to the Circuit Leader.

Bishop Hae Jong Kim 1/18/1935 – 11/3/2020

Bishop Hae-Jong Kim was born in South Korea on January 18, 1935. During the Korean War, he came to Christ at the age of 17, and while working for a United States Marine Corps Chaplain as an interpreter, translating sermons before Korean audiences, he decided to enter ministry. After completing his studies at the Methodist Theological Seminary in Seoul, he came to the United States to pursue further education in 1961.

After earning a Master of Divinity from the Methodist Theological School in Ohio in 1964, he began his pastoral ministry serving various types of churches in the Northern New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. As a visionary, Bishop Kim founded the Korean Community Church, among the first Korean churches in New Jersey, serving the rapidly growing immigrant population. As a bridge person, he worked for the NJ Annual Conference and other agencies developing Korean ministry strategies, including 15 new Korean churches. He was an advocate for ethnic minority causes as well as having strong links to the Methodist Church in South Korea. Recognized for his gentle and grounded leadership style, he served in multiple and various leadership capacities, too many to list. Bishop Kim earned a Doctor of Ministry and an honorary PhD from Drew Theological Seminary. He has the unique distinction of serving as the first Korean American District Superintendent and elected as the first immigrant, Korean American Bishop of the United Methodist Church, serving 12 years in that capacity. Bishop Kim was an inspiring preacher, storyteller, writer and creatively gifted expressed through painting, poetry, photography and hymn writing. He enjoyed reading, movies, music and has traveled the world.

Wha Sei Park Kim was born in Seoul, South Korea on January 18, 1937. She graduated from Kyunggi Girls High School and Methodist Theological Seminary. She immigrated to America in 1963. 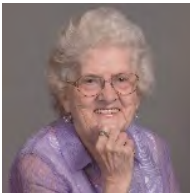

Clergy/Laity Sexual Misconduct, Abuse and Harassment Policy For The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference (Approved at the 2009 Annual Conference)

All references to the *Book of Discipline* are in the 2008 edition. Paragraph numbers are for easy reference and may change with future editions of *The Book of Discipline*. Unless there are substantive changes to the content of the *Book of Discipline*, the Policy will be updated to reflect the current *Book of Discipline* as editorial changes without the need to re-approve the Policy. Future name changes of Greater NJ Annual Conference will also be updated as editorial changes.

I. Context

For the purpose of this policy, we will use “clergy” or “clergyperson” to refer to all ordained, commissioned, consecrated, licensed local pastor, supply pastor and Certified Lay Minister.

II. Purpose

Clergy are in a position of great trust, power and responsibility. This provides the opportunity for unique relationships of grace and caring. While most clergy remain faithful to their vows and their covenant with God and the church, there are clergy who sometimes violate the trust given them. Sexual misconduct is one grave violation of this trust. We also acknowledge that laypersons can engage in acts of sexual misconduct, abuse and /or harassment. This policy seeks to address the abuse of power by all clergy and laity who engage in sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or sexual harassment. (See Section IV for definitions)

Incidents of sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment have been reported in United Methodist Churches, agencies, and institutions. It is both the ethical and legal responsibility of the Annual Conference to ensure that there are mechanisms for addressing grievances in these matters. The intent of this document is to provide guidance to both laity and clergy of the Annual Conference, and to the local churches contained therein regarding clergy/lay sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment.

It is our hope, as the people of Christ that this policy will help serve to guard against inappropriate behavior and be a guide for our community of faith as we seek to handle grievances should sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment occur.

III. Theological Foundation

All persons are created by God. In the Genesis stories, as in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, it is affirmed that we are created in the image and likeness of God. God values human life, intending all women, men, and children to have worth and dignity in all relationships with God and others. God calls us into covenant with each other as children of God and as the body of Christ. The scriptures remind us that Jesus was sent into this world that we might experience whole relationships with each other and God. “There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.” (Galatians 3: 28 RSV)

We affirm that our human bodies are good gifts from God and our sexuality is an integral part of our

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humanity. Healthy sexuality, and appropriate expressions of it, are derived from the goodness of the gift. As children of God, we are holy in Christ and created equal. Where one is injured, physically, emotionally or spiritually, all are rendered less than God's intended wholeness. Sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment is an exploitation of power and abuse of position that uses sexuality as an excuse and distorts the relationships and blessedness of relationships and the up building which God desires for humanity. It is sinful behavior.

One who repents for sinful behavior is promised forgiveness. However, discipline should be distinguished from forgiveness. A clergyperson guilty of sexual misconduct needs and may receive forgiveness and be offered avenues for redemption and change. Forgiveness, however, does not excuse one from responsibility to the community and accountability for the brokenness caused by one's behavior. The church must still take steps to protect the people of God.

IV. Definitions

Sexual Misconduct

It is sexual misconduct when a person within a ministerial role of leadership (pastor, educator, counselor, youth leader or other position of leadership) engages in sexual contact or sexualized behavior with a congregant, client, employee, student, staff member, co-worker, or volunteer within the ministerial relationship. (1996 Book of Resolutions, pp. 128-132, 2008 Book of Resolutions p.134)

Examples of ministerial relationships:

Pastor/member of church

Supervisor/church employee

Youth pastor/youth

Sunday School teacher/student

Pastor/student intern

Pastoral counselor/counseled

Examples of sexualized behavior or sexual contact:

Displaying sexually suggestive visuals

Making sexual comments or innuendos about one's own or another person's body

Touching another person's body, hair, or clothing

Touching or rubbing oneself sexually in the presence of another person

Kissing; fondling; sexual intercourse

This understanding is equally applicable in the context of ministries in which there are no "parishioners" but there is a community which acknowledges the authority of the clergyperson or lay worker as a spiritual leader or other ministries in which the ministering person serves a community much wider than the membership of the local congregation.

At the core of this definition of sexual misconduct is the abuse of power and trust that occurs when a ministering person initiates or allows sexual behavior with someone who is in a relationship of trust and/or dependence. Sexual misconduct breaks a sacred trust. Any such sexual misconduct is a violation by the ministering person who then bears the responsibility for his/her behavior.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment is any unwanted sexual advance or demand, either verbal or physical that is reasonably perceived by the recipient as demeaning, intimidating, or coercive. Sexual harassment must

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be understood as an exploitation of a power relationship rather than as an exclusively sexual issue. Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, the creation of a hostile or abusive working environment resulting from discrimination on the basis of gender. (1996 Book of Discipline ¶161.1, p.101, 2008 Book of Discipline ¶161.1, p.104)

Suggested guidelines for determining hostile environment:

Is the behavior sexual in nature or gender specific?

Is the behavior unwelcome?

Is the behavior severe or pervasive enough so that it creates an environment which interferes with one's ability to work, get an education, or participate in ministry?

Sexual harassment also includes the development or attempted development of a sexual or romantic relationship between a clergy person or lay worker and a person with whom he/she has a ministerial relationship, when that is an unwanted or inappropriate relationship.

Sexual Abuse

Sexual abuse is a sexual invasion of the body by force. Sexual abuse may be: rape, sexual assault, incest, indecent exposure, statutory rape, indecent assault, and aggravated indecent assault. Sexual abuse is also an internal assault, a deliberate violation of emotional integrity, and a hostile and degrading act of violence.

Domestic Violence

Domestic Violence Policy

It is not enemies who taunt me—I could bear that: It is not adversaries who deal insolently with me—I could hide from them. But it is you, my equal, my companion, my familiar friend, with whom I keep pleasant company. Psalm 55: 12-14a NRSV.

The Psalmist captures the feeling of many victims of domestic violence: the pain of being betrayed and injured by a loved one.

What is Domestic Violence?

Any abusive, violent, coercive, forceful, or threatening act or word inflicted by one member of a family or household on another can constitute domestic violence.

The United Methodist Church affirms the sacredness of all persons and their right to safety, nurture and care. It names domestic violence and sexual abuse as sin and pledges to work for their eradication. 2008 Book of Resolution, p.59. Thus, we recognize domestic violence as an immoral act and a chargeable offense for both clergy and laity. 2008 Book of Discipline, ¶ 2702.1 and ¶ 2702.3

We celebrate God's gift of intimacy, the image of God in each person, the inherent right of each person to health, wholeness, and safety, and we commit ourselves to working toward the elimination of domestic violence.

Standards for Clergy Conduct

Clergy related to the Annual Conference are always accountable for the ways they respond to persons who ask their ministerial assistance and over whom they have authority. Any breach of this ministerial relationship, ministerial responsibility, and ministerial authority is abusive and unethical.

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Clergy often relate to persons who are fragile and vulnerable, and therefore must exercise special care:

- That clergy are psychologically, emotionally, and spiritually healthy.
- That there has been proper and adequate preparation and education as well as adequate continuing education for providing appropriate help for those under their care.
- That they seek counsel, advice, and supervision.

Clergy sexual misconduct, abuse, and/or harassment places an unfair and unavoidable burden on the victim of such conduct. It is in the best interest of the entire church to inform the laity concerning appropriate standards of ministerial conduct.

Clergy self-discipline requires self-awareness and takes for a standard of ethics those implied and described in the vows of ordination and consecration. (1996, Book of Discipline, ¶¶301-¶365) Personal integrity and mature professional conduct are a part of every ministerial relationship. This prohibits any sexual behavior with a parishioner, colleague, staff, or client entrusted to his or her sacred care.

All clergy have the responsibility for developing healthy and ethical relationships with other persons. Married clergy have covenanted to nurture and maintain a faithful marital relationship. The covenant also reminds single clergy that dating relationships must maintain full attention to sexual conduct as understood in Christian teaching and the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. (1996 Book of Discipline, ¶165)

When clergy are providing professional pastoral counseling to persons in their church or community, it is understood that they shall keep appropriate standards of professional behavior and boundaries in that relationship. It is also recommended that clergy seek supervision for their counseling by a certified counselor supervisor to ensure that proper counseling relationships are maintained.

Standards for the Conduct of Laity

Within the United Methodist connection, lay persons are also called to a standard of conduct which stands against sexual misconduct, abuse and/or harassment as outlined in 2008 Book of Discipline ¶12702.3. Laity have the responsibility for not creating hostile environments as a result of sexual harassment, abuse and/or sexual misconduct against clergypersons or other laity. (Book of Discipline ¶ 605.8)

Honoring Perceptions of Reality

We understand that intentions and perceptions are not always the same. It is our policy to treat seriously a person's perception of the truth of their experience if/when sexual harassment, abuse, and/or misconduct are reported.

Confidentiality

The primary purpose of this policy is to encourage and support victims of sexual harassment, abuse, and/or misconduct to report such incidents, by providing a process that protects them from intimidation and preserves their dignity. We recognize that there also may be occasions when persons are falsely charged with sexual harassment, abuse and/or misconduct. In either case, it is of the utmost importance that confidentiality be assured for both the victim and the accused, and that advocates, church officials and others who may be involved in the process take every reasonable and legal precaution to honor the issue of confidentiality.

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Some instances of sexual harassment can be resolved easily and informally between parties. In all other instances, misconduct of a sexual nature or abuse within the local church should be reported to a Contact Person for sexual harassment and abuse. If the conduct involves a clergy person, the complainant may consider filing a written complaint and/or speaking with a District Superintendent.

IX. Compassionate Advocates

The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church provides the following support system to assist any individual who has a concern about an issue of sexual misconduct, harassment, or abuse with the church.

Listed at the end of this document are Compassionate Advocates trained by the Annual Conference and who will provide immediate support and direction for persons who feel that they have been sexually abused or harassed. Compassionate Advocates will explain policy and procedure and will provide confidential guidance throughout the process and respect confidentiality. Compassionate Advocates will be available for the complainant, the accused and the church.

We urge all related institutions/agencies in the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference to identify and train Compassionate Advocates to serve within their organization.

X. Process

The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference will adhere to the following steps when an accusation of sexual misconduct, harassment or abuse is brought to the attention of a District Superintendent:

A letter shall be provided to both the complainant and the accused at the time they first contact or are contacted by the District Superintendent. These letters are included in this policy as Appendix A. Limit all media responses on behalf of the Church/Conference to the Bishop or the Bishop's designate. If the complainant chooses to file a written complaint, the process will proceed as indicated in the 1996 Book of Discipline, section XIV ¶1358, 2008 Book of Discipline section XV ¶ 361.

A complainant has the option of following church policy and discipline when bringing a complaint of sexual misconduct against a pastor. They also have the option of seeking legal advice and filing charges.

Any incidence of sexual abuse in which the victim is a minor is a crime and must be handled appropriately. Anyone within the church who becomes aware of a child abuse issue is morally—for clergy, legally required—obligated to take steps necessary in the attempt to prevent further harm to the child. If an incident of child abuse occurs involving a church employee or volunteer within the church building or at any church activity, or if a minor brings forth a complaint of sexual abuse it must be reported to the local authorities.

The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference recognizes that accusations of misconduct of a sexual nature can be harmful to the whole congregation. The Greater New Jersey Annual Conference will provide support to the church affected by these accusations by providing guidance from the Leadership Advocacy Team and counsel in the form of a response team.

Treasurer Report

2020 Audited Financial Statements

The 2020 Audited Financial Statements have still not been completed by our current auditor and will not be completed in time for inclusion in the 2021 Annual Conference Journal.

In a typical year, the Council of Finance and Administration (CFA) would expect to have a final version of the prior year's financial audit completed no later than July 31st of the following fiscal year. The 2020 audit should therefore have been completed by July 31, 2021.

Despite our emphasizing to our current Auditor the urgency of completing this work, we have been informed by him that he will need more time to complete the 2020 audit and stated it will only be completed in January 2022 at best.

The CFA Audit Committee had already begun the process of searching for a new auditing firm even before this update and they had little confidence that this new deadline would be adhered to. After thorough research, they selected Tait, Weller and Baker LLP - a Philadelphia-based audit firm with offices in Iselin, NJ - that does significant audit work with non-profits including Christian, non-Methodist organizations.

Tait Weller has agreed to do both the 2020 and 2021 audits for GNJAC and its mission partners.

CFA will provide the 2020 and 2021 audited financial statements as soon as they are completed.

Our current expectation is that the 2020 audit will be completed by end of January 2022 and the 2021 audit will be completed by end of June 2022.

2022 Comprehensive Benefit Funding Plan Summary

INTRODUCTION

The 2012 *Book of Discipline* ¶1506.6 requires that each annual conference develop, adopt and implement a formal comprehensive funding plan for funding all of its benefit obligations. The funding plan shall be submitted annually to Wespath Benefits and Investments (Wespath) for review and be approved annually by the annual conference, following the receipt and inclusion of a favorable written opinion from Wespath. This document is only a summary of the information contained in the actual signed funding plan and does not contain all the information required for a comprehensive view of the conference's benefit obligations. You may request the full contents of the 2022 comprehensive benefit funding plan from your conference benefit office.

CLERGY RETIREMENT SECURITY PROGRAM (CRSP)

Defined Benefit (DB) and Defined Contribution (DC)

Program overview:

The Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) retirement program providing lifetime income and account flexibility designed for those who serve as clergy of The United Methodist Church. The program is designed to provide participants with one portion of their overall retirement benefits. CRSP replaced the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) effective January 1, 2007, which had previously replaced the Pre-82 Plan for service rendered prior to January 1, 1982.

CRSP consists of both a defined benefit (DB) plan, which provides a monthly benefit at retirement based upon years of credited service to The United Methodist Church, and a defined contribution (DC) plan, which provides a retirement account balance established and funded by the annual conferences.

Current funding plan information:

The Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP DB) annuities total liability as of January 1, 2020, is \$(2,075,403,337), while total plan assets are \$2,237,383,068, resulting in a current plan funded ratio of 108%. The Greater New Jersey Conference portion of the liability is 1.9119% and the 2022 contribution is \$1,779,462. The conference anticipates that the amount will be funded by Deposit Account, Direct Billing. Additionally, General Conference 2012 approved a change to CRSP that provides each annual conference the discretion to determine whether to cover three-quarter and/or half-time clergy. The Greater New Jersey Conference has elected to cover clergy serving 50%+ under CRSP effective January 1, 2022.

Effective January 1, 2014, the CRSP DC plan was reduced from a 3% to a 2% of plan compensation non-matching contribution. Clergy can earn up to an additional 1% CRSP DC contribution by contributing at least 1% of their plan compensation to UMPIP; therefore, if a participant contributes at least 1% of plan compensation to UMPIP, the individual will receive a contribution of 3% to CRSP DC. The 2022 CRSP DC contribution is anticipated to be \$621,000 and will be funded by Direct Billing.

MINISTERIAL PENSION PLAN (MPP)

Plan overview:

Supplement Three to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP), provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church from 1982 through 2006. MPP is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) retirement plan. MPP requires that exactly 65% of the account balance must be annuitized when the funds are to be distributed. The remainder may be rolled over to UMPIP, another qualified plan or an IRA, or it may be paid in a lump sum.

Current funding plan information:

The Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) annuities' total liability as of January 1, 2020 is \$(3,721,464,249), while total plan assets are \$4,147,098,325, resulting in a current plan funded ratio of 111%. The required contribution for 2022 is \$0. The Greater New Jersey Conference's percentage of the total liability is 1.9414%. Future MPP annuitants have a total account balance of \$3,373,198,931 and the Greater New Jersey Conference's portion of that balance is \$60,523,908 or 1.79% of the total.

PRE-82 PLAN (PRE-82)

Plan overview:

Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP), also known as the Pre-82 Plan, provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church prior to 1982. The Pre-82 Plan was replaced by MPP effective January 1, 1982. If a clergyperson retires within the Conference (and does not terminate), the minimum benefit payable is based on two factors:

- 1) Years of service with pension credit-approved by each conference on the recommendation of the Conference Board of Pensions (CBOP) in accordance with plan provisions and *The book of Discipline*.
- 2) The conference pension rate (past service rate)-the dollar amount chosen by the conference as the amount payable for each approved year of service with pension credit (may change from year to year).

The number of years of service with pension credit is multiplied by the pension rate, and the product is the minimum annual benefit payable to those clergy eligible for Pre-82 Plan benefits. In certain situations, the benefit received from the Pre-82 plan may vary based on the applicability of what is referred to as Defined Benefit Service Money (DBSM), which is the defined contribution feature of the Pre-82 Plan. At the time that a participant retires, the DBSM account is converted to a life based benefit and, at that point, the clergy's benefit is the greater of the PSR or DBSM benefit. If the conference increases the PSR, the clergy's benefit is recalculated; but the DBSM-based benefit does not change.

Current funding plan information:

The 2022 PSR recommended to the Greater New Jersey Conference will be \$727, representing a 2% increase from the 2021 rate. The conference expects future annual increases to be approximately 2.00%.

The contingent annuitant percentage is recommended to remain at the 75% level.

ACTIVE HEALTH BENEFIT PROGRAM

Program Overview

The Greater New Jersey Conference offers the following active health benefit to its active eligible participants: Self-Funded - HealthFlex.

Current funding plan information:

The total cost of the program for 2022 is anticipated to be \$5,300,000 and will be funded by Direct Billing, Property Sales. It is anticipated that increases for future years will average 1.00%.

The rationale for these changes is: Based on plan changes (premium credit at 88% of C2000 plan), estimated savings of \$1M

Claims Incurred But Not Reported (if applicable)

The Greater New Jersey Conference provides the following health plan to its eligible participants: Self-Funded - HealthFlex. As of 12/31/2022, the estimated IBNR claims total is \$0. It is anticipated that increases for future years will average 1.00%. It is anticipated that the IBNR claims, if applicable, will be funded via the following: .

Additional Conference-Sponsored Coverage (if applicable)

The Greater New Jersey Conference has elected to provide health benefits coverage to the following groups during periods where-without plan sponsor--funded premiums--the participants would not be provided coverage or benefits (all figures as of 12/31/2020):

1. Any other leave / arrangements that provide additional coverage: 0 participants at an estimated cost of \$0

The projected annual cost as of 12/31/2022 for additional plan sponsor funded coverage is \$0.

POST-RETIREMENT MEDICAL (PRM)

Program Overview:

The Greater New Jersey Conference currently offers Insurance for Post-Retirement Medical coverage.

Current funding plan information:

The plan sponsor's intention for 2022 is to Retain current plan benefit. PRM benefits provided are as follows: Clergy/Laity in Retired Status may be in the Plan if they were under full-time appointment/employment for 20 years and appointed full-time through the Conference for the last 10 years with annuity credit/UMPIP benefit immediately prior to retiring.

Future increases/decreases to the assets or APBO will be funded over the duration of the program as calculated in the PRM valuation report, or five years if not available.

These values are based on a 3.35% long-term discount rate, a 5.00% long-term expected rate of return on assets, and a valuation year medical trend (inflation rate) of 7.00% with an ultimate medical trend (inflation rate) of 4.50%, beginning in 2032.

In addition to the PRM funding contribution listed above, the projected annual plan benefit cost for 2022 (subsidies, HRAs, claims or premiums) is \$2,349,000.

COMPREHENSIVE PROTECTION PLAN (CPP)

Plan Overview:

The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) provides death, long-term disability and other welfare benefits for eligible clergy of The United Methodist Church and their families. It is an Internal Revenue Code 414(e) "church plan" funded by plan sponsor insurance premiums. Generally, clergy are eligible to participate in CPP if they satisfy the eligibility requirements, including full-time appointment with plan compensation of at least 25% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC). Plan sponsors may elect to cover participants with three-quarter time appointments and/or to continue to cover clergy who, due to certain leaves or appointments, are not otherwise eligible to continue coverage.

The CPP adoption agreement executed by the Greater New Jersey Conference contains its elections to cover or not to cover categories mentioned above.

Current funding plan information:

For 2022, the Greater New Jersey Conference has an expected required contribution to the Comprehensive Protection Plan of \$596,000, which is anticipated to be funded by: Deposit Account, Direct Billing. The anticipated average increase in future years is expected to be 2.50% per year due to: Based on YTD June 2021 (church+staff clergy), full year is trending at \$581K; adding 2.5% to get to \$596K

UNITED METHODIST PERSONAL INVESTMENT PLAN (UMPIP) FOR LAY AND CLERGY

Plan Overview:

The United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) defined contribution retirement savings plan for clergy and lay employees of The United Methodist Church and affiliated organizations. Participants may make before-tax, Roth and/or after-tax contributions through payroll deductions. Participant contributions, various optional plan sponsor contributions and investment earnings comprise the individual's retirement account balance.

Current funding plan information:

Conference office lay employees working an average of 35 hours per week or more are eligible on day of hire for a plan sponsor-funded pension contribution of 6% or 12% of salary (depending on position). Lay employees are encouraged to make contributions toward their retirement through payroll deductions to the UMPIP. The conference's estimated contribution for 2022 is \$315,800 and will be funded via: Shared Ministry.

(If applicable) The Greater New Jersey Conference, as of January 1, 2022 is planning on sponsoring the UMPIP for clergy serving one quarter -time and are eligible for a pension contribution of 12.5% of compensation (salary and parsonage value of 25% or housing allowance, whichever applies). The conference's estimated contribution for 2022 is \$53,525 and will be funded via Direct Billing.

OTHER DEFINED CONTRIBUTION (DC) OBLIGATIONS

Plan Overview:

The Greater New Jersey currently offers the following DC benefit(s): **UNUM Life Options**. The estimated contribution for 2022 is \$14,482 with the funding sources to be: Direct Billing. The anticipated average increase in future years is expected to be 2.50% per year due to .
